EMELIANO BENAVIDES, SLAYER SUSPECT, CAPTURED BY J. S. NANCE

Emeliano Benavides, charged with the murder of the four members of the Henry Calcote family near Eldorado, was apprehended Friday morning of last week by Sheriff J. S. Nance.

Arrest was made about 10 miles southeast of Sanderson at Charter Crossing, and only a few miles from the border of a mile from the border. Sheriff Nance stated that Benavides was turned over to him by a man who stated that Benavides apparently headed for Mexico when he was apprehended. Benavides was not armed at the time of the arrest, which was a two-week hunt, and he carried a billfold which contained a picture of himself. He had caught a ride from San Antonio to Sonora, and had

walked the remainder of the way, a distance of approximately 150 miles. Sheriff Nance had been close on the fugitive's trail two days and nights before the arrest was made.

Benavides was brought to Sanderson and lodged in jail, and the Eldorado officers were notified. Upon questioning he denied the murders, but after being placed in jail at Mertzon and questioned by officers there he admitted the murders and took officers to where the gun had been hid. Upon confessing he implicated two other men, one to whom he had given the gun, telling him that he had killed four people with it, and to get rid of it. The other man buried the gun. Another Mexican was implicated because he had left his suitcase and belongings with him. Both are in jail.

Sheriff O. E. Connor and Deputy Sheriff Frank Edmiston, of Eldorado, Cash Taylor, Deputy from Sonora, and F. B. Calcote, brother of the slain man, came to Sanderson Friday afternoon for Benavides, and it was understood that he was placed in the Mertzon jail. District court is in session at this time and will continue for another week, with the Benavides trial set for Monday.

Marfa, Sept. 25.—Cattle interested Texans (and many from the nation's corn belt) as well as those who love the pageantry of a parade and those whose favorite pastime is the watching of rodeo events will be here October 3-4-5—Thursday Friday and Saturday, of next week—for the thirteenth annual Highland Fair of the Feeder Sale.

A sales pavilion seating 450 to 500 has been built to make more pleasant the place where prospective buyers, and spectators, see the cream of the Highland section's cattle "crop" sold at auction. About fifty carloads of calves and steer yearlings will

be sold by Col. Earl Gartin, auctioneer who is known throughout the nation.

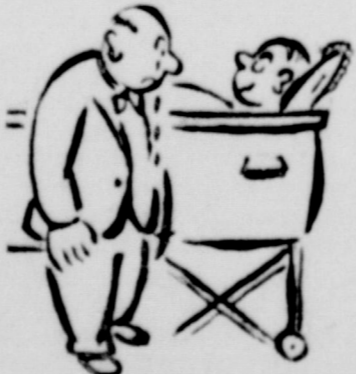

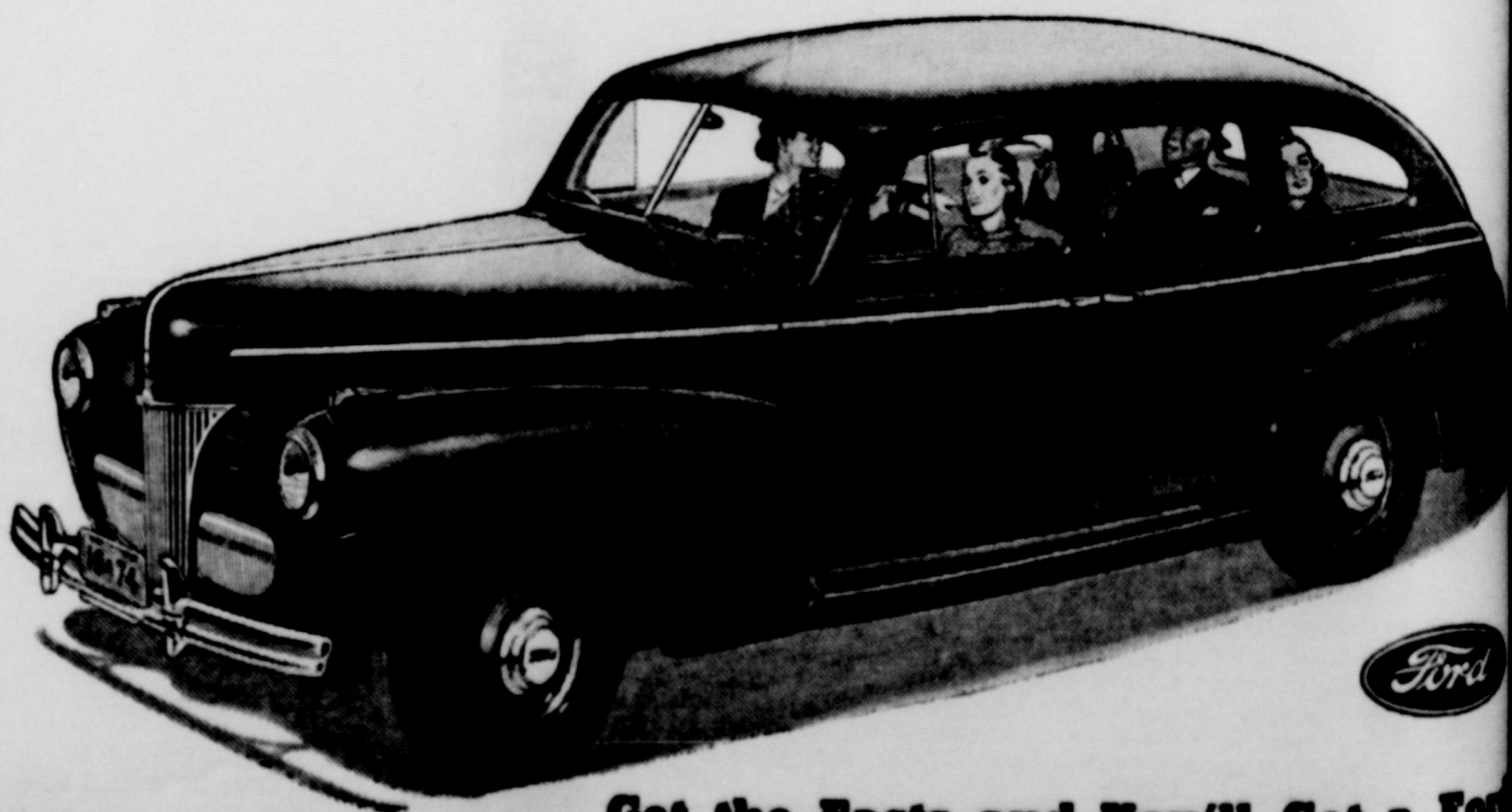

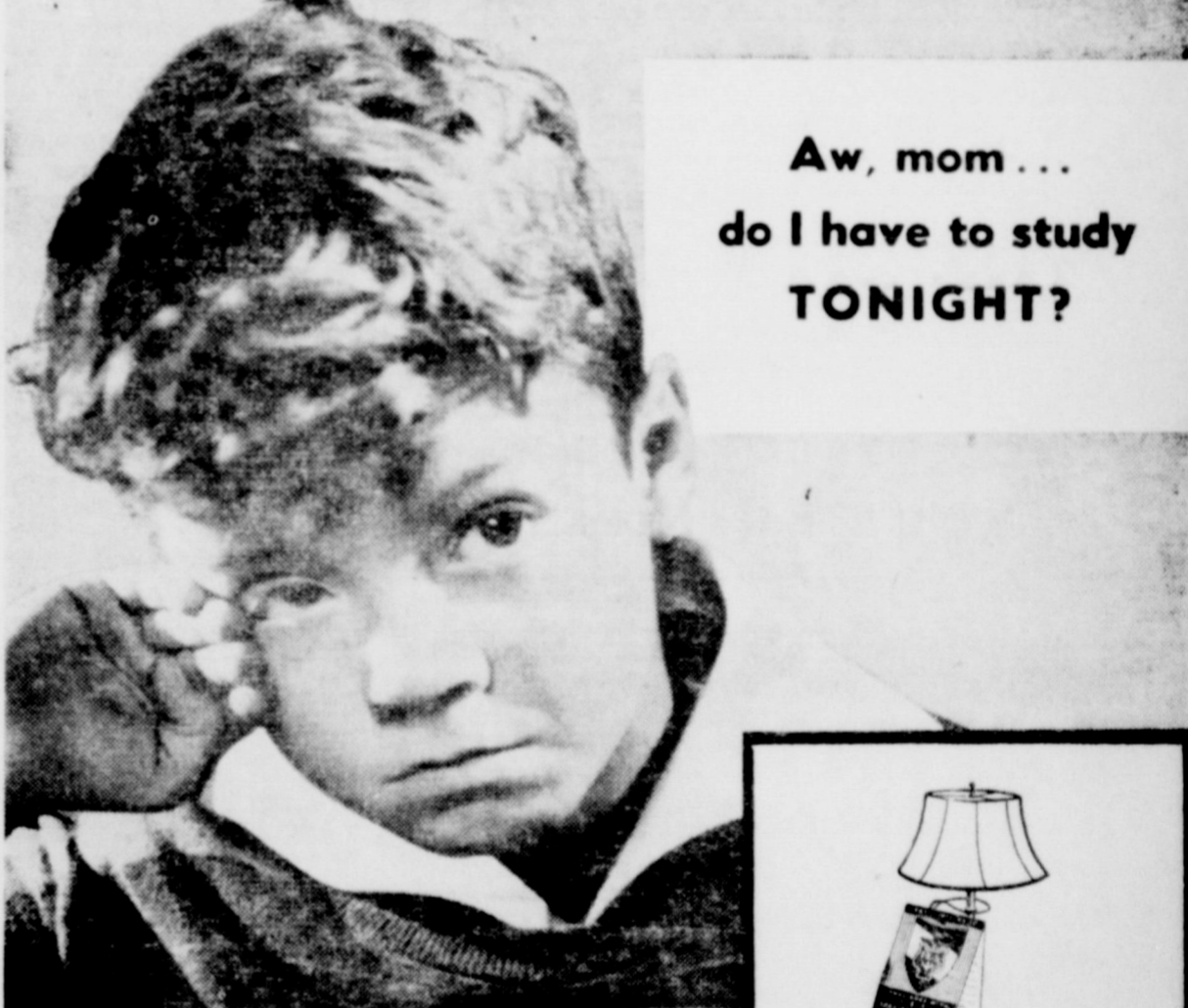

Everyone likes to serve individual steaks both for a family meal and for a guest dinner. Pork shoulder steaks such as those pictured above give you the rich, delicious flavor of pork in a form that is easy to serve, easy to prepare and, not to be overlooked, easy on the pocket-book.

The steaks pictured, cut from the pork shoulder, are most satisfactory when nearly an inch thick. Inez Wilson, home economist, suggests: Brown them on both sides in a small amount of fat. When brown, add three or four tablespoons of hot water, cover the pan and cook the steak slowly until they are thoroughly done. About an hour should be allowed for steaks an inch thick. It is important to cook all cuts of pork thoroughly, for the rich flavor of the meat is developed fully when it is thoroughly cooked.
