The fact that they grew in Terrell County is not unusual, but the fact that they grew to such size is proof enough of the fertility of the soil found in these hills. One of the melons weighed 631/2 pounds and the other 59 pounds. They were grown by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Herring on what is known as the Callie Stansell ranch 15 miles south of Sanderson. They were planted below a header tank and the only water received was when the tank overflowed. Several other melons weighing around 45 pounds were grown on the same vines. Mrs. Herring says next year she plans to . grow melons weighing 75 pounds. She also had a good garden.

## **Health Aid For Terrell County** Totals \$938.50

Detailing some of the ways the State Department of Health is aiding in the prevention and control of communicable disease, Dr. George W. Cox, State Health officer, today revealed that the number of specimens examined and the amount of vaccines distributed free to Terrell County in 1940 by the State Hygienic Laboratory would cost \$938.50 if purchased through private laboratories.

"The service rendered to this county is but one of twelve organized services set up to help you," Dr. Cox added.

The other services maintained by the State Department of Health include Vital Statistics. Food and Drug Inspection, Venereal Disease Control. Public Health Education, Tuberculosis Control, Sanitary Engineering, Maternal and Child Health, by Bell cost three yards. 
