receiving $\$ 5,000$ when they only answered only $6 \%$ of county fire calls in 1992. Well, the three year average shows Farwell answered at east $11 \%$ of the fire calls on a three year average.
I believe a three year average
would be more fair anyway. Every department has certain fixed costs which will be the same even if they do not make a run all year. I certainly do not begrudge any
of them $\$ 5,000$ up front as this of them $\$ 5,000$ up front as this
money helps immensely with fixed money
costs. doubled the amount for ruve protection from $\$ 25,000$ 50,000 in 1994. I'm sure the other departments are grateful fo
any increase that they receive. I, as a county citizen, taxpayer and volunteer fireman, did no appreciate the Friona City
Council's attempt at blackmail in threatening to stop all rural fir calls after October 1.
