



Tracking Down Tuberculosis

Tuberculosis is one of our nation's biggest health problems. Almost 34,000 people in the United States die of it each year. Tuberculosis is the first cause of death from disease among persons between 15 and 35 years of age.

But the heavy toll from TB is not the whole story. It is estimated that about 400,000 people in the they look and feel well. For TB country have active tuberculosis. The remaining 150,000 are unreported or unknown cases and many of them do not know they of undetected tuberculosis, and it have the disease.

A major problem in TB control is the fact that so many persons with active tuberculosis, unaware that they are ill, spread the disease to those who are well. Group X-ray surveys show that one or two persons of every 1,000 adults X-rayed have active tuberculosis, and some of these people have never suspected that TB had hit them.
