what is its purpose? A spreader divert heavy concentrations of water and to spread it over a large area at a safe velocity. It is occassionally valuable to use as a 'gully plug' thereby giving the gul-

ly chance to heal by establishment of a good grass cover. These structures are usually 4 to 5 feet high with a crown of about 2 fees The amount of dirt required to build these structures is approx -mately 2 cubic yards per linear foot and the cost is from 8 to 20 cents per cubic yard.

"What is pitting and what is its purpose Range pitting is the making of small basins in the soil at regular intervals to hold water where it falls. These small pockets hold extra water (4 to 6 gallons each) and encourage the growth of old and new plants. Pitting should be done on deep soils that crust badly and where water penetration is extremely slow unless it is held where it falls by vegetation or pitting. The average cost of pitting range is from \$1 to\$2

"From the above statements, we can see there is a place for both spreaders and pitting, but are we using the right practice in the right place? When we use spreaders for the purpose of holding by spreaders in this case is the small area in front of the spreader where we dug the dirt to build the dam. The cost of grass p.omately \$300 per acre, since the area benefitted is so small. A large area behind the spreader dam usually 4 or 5 times larger than the area benefitted is weaned of water that would sormally flow slowly over it through grass. This "weaned" area will never produce much grass. After we produce grass in front of the spreader it has accomplished its purpose. The grass will slow down the water and make penetration possible but what are we to do with the area that is weaned? There is not much that can be don for this area since the large dirt structure

In a case like the above, pitting should be used, since we can get it done for approximately \$1 to \$2 per acre and about one-third of the land will be in depressions, thereby benefitting more than one-third of the land. At this rate, the cost of grass production is approximately \$3 an acre compared with some \$300 per acre for

spreaders. "In trying to determine which practice to use, a rancher should ask himself: 'Which practice will best fit my needs and give me the most benefits for each dollar

"Each ranch and each pasture has its own problems," Withite said. "I will be glad to work with ranchers in the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District to help analyze the conditions and determine the best treatment."







Fort Worth - The largest run of cattle and calves of the season arrived at the 12 major livestock centers of the nation last Monday. Over 158,000 cattle, and over 20,-(00 calves were reported around the circuit.

While somewhat lower prices were reported at most points, the treak in prices was cushioned by to Mrs. Edward Kerr, second high the ability of the markets to absorb a heavy beef supply. Low grade slaughter cattle and caives were getting help from increased government purchases, and indications that foreign relief funds would be used to buy millions of pounds of beef was a favorable

At Fort Worth steers and yearings ruled steady to 50 cents off. Cows were fully 50 cents lower, come interest bidding additionally lower on fat cows. Bulis ruled s'eady. Slaughter calves edged downward again by 50 cents per hundred, instances off more.

Stocker trade showed moderate ectivity on the Monday trade at Fort Worth with higher grades generally steady with last week's close. Numerous !oads of feeder eattle sold in the \$13 to \$16 bracket, good kinds of steers and yearings numerous at \$15 to \$15,75 tocker calves sold from \$10 to \$16.50. Heifer calves and heifer vearlings usually sold from \$1 to 53 under their steer mates.

Fat steers and yearlings elegiscarce at Fort Worth Monday, a few from \$20 to \$22, and high choice or prime kinds were quot

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able to \$23 to \$25. Common and medium grassy kinds sold for \$10 t \$15.50, and cutter grades cashed at \$8 to \$9.

Slaughter lambs were weak to 50 cents lower, and other classes of sheep and lambs were sold about on a level with the previous

week at Fort Worth. Good and choice fed lambs topped at \$17 to \$18.50, two decks of choice fat lambs at the higher figure. Cull, common and medium slaughter lambs sold from \$10 to \$16. Stocker and feer lambs bulked at \$11 to \$14.

Fat yearling wethers sold fr \$12 to \$13, while old wethers dr \$7.50 down. Feeder yearlings co. ed around \$10 to \$10.50. Slaught ewes drew \$5.50 to \$6.50.
