FUNERAL RITES FOR F. M. WOOD IN SAN ANGELO

Funeral services were held in San Angelo Saturday afternoon for Frank M. Wood, 67, who died of a stomach ailment Friday morning in a hospital in that city. He entered the hospital Thursday afternoon.

Born in Greenville, Mr. Wood had lived in San Angelo since 1911. He was an employee of the Orient Railroad until an accident in 1921 forced his retirement. He was a long-time member of the San Angelo police force where he served as desk sergeant.

Besides his widow, he is survived by a son, F. M. Wood, Jr., of Sanderson, a sister, Miss Lena Wood of San Angelo, and five grandchildren.

Mr. Wood was at his father's bedside when death came and Mrs. Wood and the children left by car with Herbert Brown after receiving word of his death.

Annual Turkey Shoot To Be Here Sunday

The annual turkey shoot which is staged each year by the Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department will be on Sunday, November 25.

The shoot will begin at 10 o'clock at the range east of the old highway maintenance barn east of town.

Targets for the day will be turkey heads and regular rifle targets. The turkey head will be shot at from 100 yards and any size rifle may be used. Scopes will be allowed on 270 and bigger calibre rifles only. Open sights on all other size rifles.

There will be target shooting for turkeys at \$10 per match and up to five persons may enter the match.

Targets will also be used for chickens with \$2 per match being charged and up to five shooters per match.

Both of these targets will be fired at with .22-calibre rifles only.

There will be a pistol shoot later in the day at the turkey's head.

Firemen are urging the safe use and handling of firearms at the event. All children are asked to stay with their parents and back of the firing line. All guns will be loaded only when the shooter is ready to fire and until then all bolts or chamber locks should be kept open.

A shooter is allowed only one turkey for each series of three shots which will cost \$2.

All local citizens are urged to attend and take part in the turkey shoot which has been the only fund-raising campaign put on by the firemen for several years.

Local Men Attend Root Plowing Demonstrations

G. K. Mitchell and Clarence Chandler, supervisors of the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District, and Lloyd D. Booker, of the Soil Conservation Service, attended a root plowing demonstration at the Hatnes ranch south of Alpine Monday.

The demonstration was put on by the Central Texas Machinery Co. of Odessa. Supervisors of the Big Bend district provided a chicken dinner.

A D-8 Caterpillar was used to plow a flat, heavily infested with mesquite. This plow was pulled at depth of 18-24 inches. A D-2 "Cat" was used in a fur bush flat plowing about 8 inches deep.

This type of land treatment has proved very successful in South Texas where thousands of acres of brush land have been turned into good grassland on as little as 4 inches of rainfall. The root plowing kills the brush and opens up the soil so the rainfall will go into the ground.

The root-plowed areas were reseeded with native grasses.

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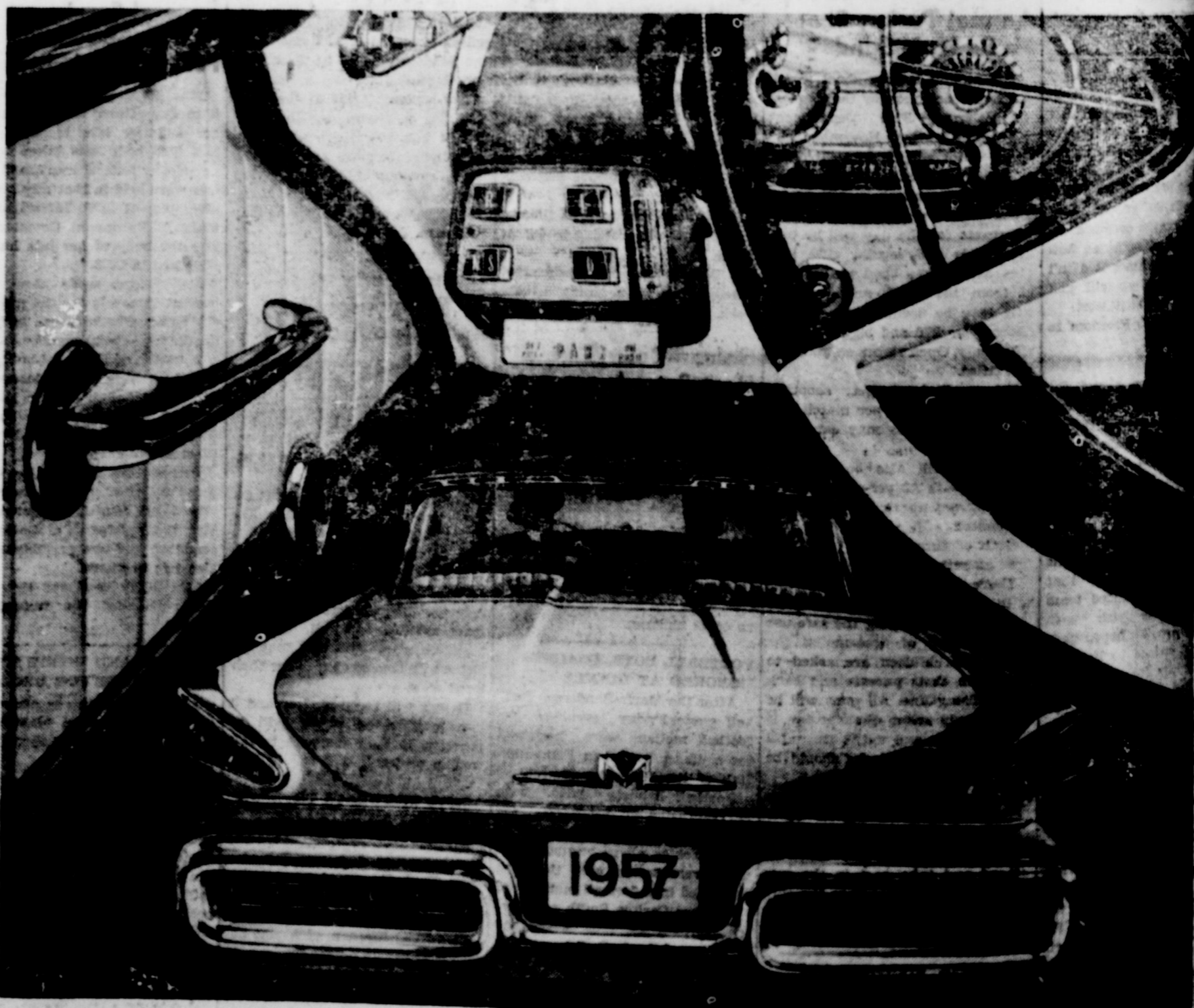
