A D-8 Catepillar was used to low a flat, heavily infested with nesquite. This plow was pulled at lepth of 18-24 inches. A D-2 "Cat" was used in a tar bush flat plowing bout 8 inches deep

This type of land treatment has roved very successful in South Texas where thousands of acres I brush land have been turned ato good grassland on as little as inches of rainfall. The root plowng kills the brush and opens up he soil so the rainfall will go buto the ground. .

The root-plowed areas were reseeded with native grasses.
