Locomotive Kills Dick Turner, 73, Former Resident

Funeral services were held in Alpine Tuesday afternoon for Dick Turner and burial was made in that city.

Mr. Turner was killed about 7 p.m. Monday when struck by a west-bound T&NO freight train as he walked across the tracks at the 11th Street crossing in that city.

He lived about two blocks from the crossing and apparently was walking south to his home when struck. The body was badly mangled.

Born in San Angelo in 1884, he had lived in West Texas all of his life and had engaged in ranching for several years. At one time, he resided in Terrell County.

Mrs. W. R. Turner and Mrs. L. H. Fletcher, a niece, attended the funeral services.

Survivors include two sisters, Mrs. F. L. Wise of Sheffield, and Mrs. Tom Wall of Sonora.

County TB Assn. Joins Observance Of 'Health Day'

The Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association will join with other health agencies over the world in observance of World Health Day on April 7. Mrs. Web Townsend, president of the organization, announced this week.

In his message on World Health Day, President Dwight D. Eisenhower declared, "World Health Day calls attention to the on-going international effort to combat disease and improve health in the offices of the United Nations. This year's theme, 'Food and Health' emphasizes the fact that sickness and hunger are closely allied and both are enemies of a durable peace."

World Health Day, Mrs. Townsend explained, commemorates the anniversary of the adoption of the constitution of the World Health Organization. The U.S. Departments of Health, Education and Welfare, the Department of Agriculture, and the State Department are cooperating with the National Citizens Committee for the World Health Organization.

David Vasquez Fatally Injured In Car Wreck

Funeral services were held in St. James Catholic Church Wednesday morning for Jose David Vasquez, 20, who died of injuries received in a car wreck near Comstock Sunday morning. The body was interred in Santa Rita Cemetery.

Vasquez was in a car driven by Ramon Cardenas of Sanderson, according to information received here. Also in the car were Enrique Reyes and Carmen Fuentes of Sanderson, who suffered minor injuries. The wreck occurred about 5 a.m. and Vasquez died Sunday night. He was thrown out of the two-door car and the vehicle apparently rolled over him. The car ran off of the road on the right side and down an embankment according to investigating officers.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Elvira Vasquez, a brother, Ramon Vasquez, and a sister, Mrs. Eulelia Villegas, all of Sanderson.

Short Freedom For Confessed Theft by Ex-Con

Joseph Raulerson, 21, was apprehended in Alpine Friday morning and confessed to the theft of an automobile belonging to E. E. Furley, according to local officers. The theft occurred Thursday night.

The story related by Raulerson and arresting officers was that the car was driven to Marathon and abandoned. Raulerson then caught a ride to Alpine. The chief of police of Alpine picked him up for questioning and while he was in the officer's car, the report came in on the car radio of the theft of the Farley vehicle. Raulerson then told the sheriff that he had taken the car and gave him the full story.

Raulerson was returned to the local jail and is being held pending grand jury action.

Raulerson told local officers he had served time in an Oklahoma penitentiary, they said.

ELECTION SATURDAY FOR SCHOOL POSTS

Saturday is the day for the election to fill the post of Trustee for Terrell County Common School District No. 1, and Terrell County Trustees in Precinct 2 and 4.

Herbert Brown is the incumbent school trustee and is running for his second elective term. He is unopposed on the ballot.

Rufus Ross in Precinct 2 and Charlie Turk in Precinct 4 are the incumbent county trustees and are not listed on the ballot.

Election boxes will be open in all four precincts Saturday and voting may be between 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. with only qualified voters of the county authorized to cast a ballot.

Voters in Precinct 2 and 4 will have a ballot to mark for the county trustee and a separate ballot for the school trustee. Voting in Precinct 1 and 3 will only have the school trustee ballot to mark.

West Texas Solons Against New Bill For Redistricting

West Texas legislators voted 10 to 5 against the consideration of a bill before the House. The bill would redistrict several West Texas counties and would give an extra congressman to Harris County.

Terrell, Glasscock, Reagan, and Crockett Counties would be removed from Rep. J. T. Rutherford's 16th district and added to Rep. O. C. Fisher's 21st District, under the proposal.

Other counties would also be involved in other similar shuffles. Six West Texas legislators who voted for consideration of the bill include George Thurmond of Del Rio.

AF Reserve Unit Organized Here

All veterans, regardless of the branch of service they were with, are eligible for membership in the local reserve unit. Details of the organization are available from Goode or Medaris.

The pay scale for members is for each 2-hour meeting and runs: A2C \$4.68; A1C \$5.59; S-Sgt. \$6.37; T-Sgt. \$7.15; M-Sgt. \$7.99; 2nd Lt. \$10.40; 1st Lt. \$11.70; Capt. \$13.52. This scale is based on over six years of service. The scale is graduated for more or less years of service.
