#### TB Research Made Possible By Seal Sale

No drop in the rate at which oung children are being infected with tuberculosis germs despite a sharp drop in the TB death rate, has been revealed in a recent study made in Kansas

Mrs. M. W. Duncan, president of the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association, an nounced findings of the study. financed by Chistmas Seal funds to local association members to-

Kindergarten children were given tuberculin tetss. This showed presence of tuberculosis germs within some of their bod ies. Adults with whom these chisdren had been in contact were also tested. Active tuberculosis among these adults was found at a rate 12 times as high as 18 found in X-ray surveys of the

general population. The study revealed that there is a connection between the severity of a child's reaction to the tuberculin test and the closeness of his association with persons with active tuberculosis.

Net Wire Diversions

Locations for net wire diversions have been staked on the Brown ranch at Longfellow and on the Downie ranch north of Sanderson.

The diversion on the Downie ranch will take water from an overflow range site and allow it to spread on an adjacent deep soil range site.

The diversion on the Brown ranch will be installed as part of the water spreading system that can be seen from U.S. Highway 90. The diversion will divert more low water out of Sanderson Canyon into the syestem.

The Brown and Downie ranches have soil and water conservation agreements with the Rio Grande-Pecos River SCD. Tne Soil Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture assists ranchers in carrying out plans that are approved by the
