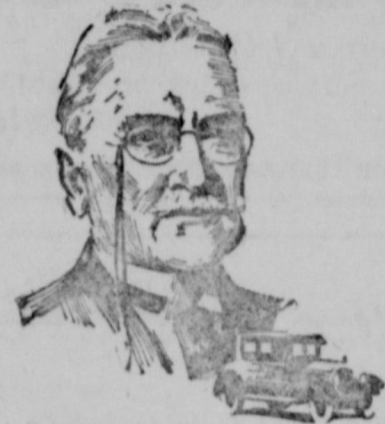

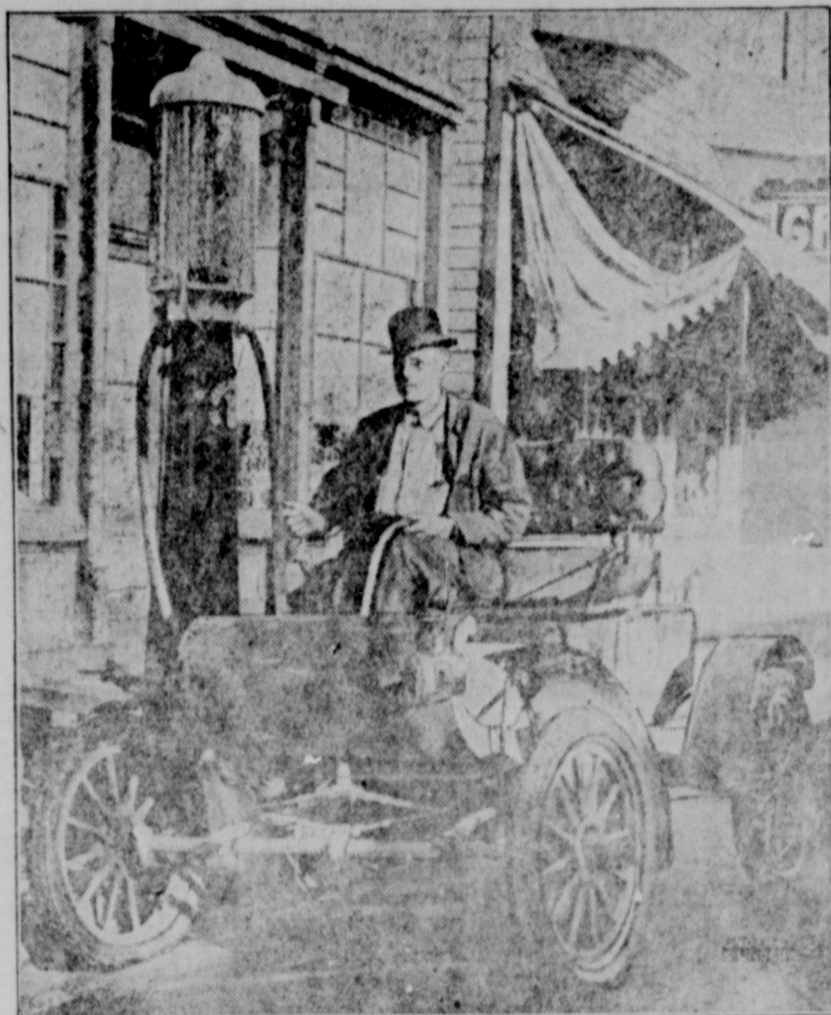

Speed Laws Are More Generous

A nation-wide tendency on the part of the states to liberalize speed limits and to judge the recklessness of the driver on the facts in the case is disclosed by a legislative survey undertaken by the American Automobile Association.

Increased speed limits were legislated in at least ten states during the sessions of the legislatures last year while the problem is to be considered in a large number of the other states in impending sessions, according to a statement by the organization, writes Karl W. Miller in the Detroit News.

Joe Pendleton Lauds Coaches

Joe Pendleton has been a football official for 35 years. He almost has become a tradition in some Boston school rivalries, the most notable of which is that between Roxbury Latin and Noble and Greenough, a game he has handled for 25 years. He estimates he has officiated in more than 600 school and college football games since the day when only two years out of Bowdoin college, he accepted a small school game merely to accommodate the young players.

"In the old days," relates Joe, "officiating was a labor of love. It was an honorary position without any honor attached. Those were before the days of the central board and organizations of officials. If Dartmouth and Williams were going to play in Hanover, Dartmouth would select the referee and Williams the umpire. Then the referee would be known as Dartmouth's man and the umpire as Williams'."

"Sometimes we had to take a lot of abuse from spectators, poor return, indeed, for the graciousness of those early officials. I have felt sometimes like the policeman at a game between West Virginia and Washington and Jefferson in Morgantown, W. Va., must have felt, when I asked him to keep several thousand coal miners off the field during the game. The miners, most of whom did not understand football, insisted on following the play a few yards behind the two teams, walking up and down as play progressed. There was only one forlorn little cop to handle this hungry looking mob. Finally I got so difficult that I turned to the cop and said, 'Won't you please keep these men off

Look for Trouble When Set Does Not Produce

The first place to look for trouble in a five-tube set that does not bring in most of the stations is the batteries. If they are all up to normal, next try the detector and radio-frequency tubes. If the radio-frequency tubes are not good, it will be difficult to hear distant stations. If the tubes and batteries are good and there are no noises to indicate trouble in the set itself, inspect the aerial and ground. A poor ground is very often the cause of not hearing many stations, while an improperly located or constructed aerial will also prevent the reception of such stations. The aerial should always be 10 feet from

the roof and 20 ft. if practicable. There is considerably more energy picked up by an aerial ten feet above the roof than one four or five feet and a great deal more with a 20-foot one than one ten feet high.

Cost \$1 a Day

According to figures compiled by the American Motorists' association, the average automobile cost the average American motorist \$1 a day in 1927. The operation and maintenance cost each motorist \$229, while the depreciation is based on the seven-year life expectancy of a passenger automobile. Fuel and lubricants represented 44 per cent of the operation bill, or \$101.

Plug-In Coils Should Be Watched Carefully

A few receivers make use of "plug-in" coils—that is, coils with terminals which fit into sockets and which may be replaced with others of different value to facilitate changing from one band of wave lengths to another. Such coils should be watched carefully for corroded or oxidized terminals, for unless these terminals make good electrical contact in their sockets poor reception will result.

When made at the factory these metal contacts frequently become coated with a film which, unless detected, results in a poor connection. The best method to follow is to scour each terminal with fine sandpaper occasionally.

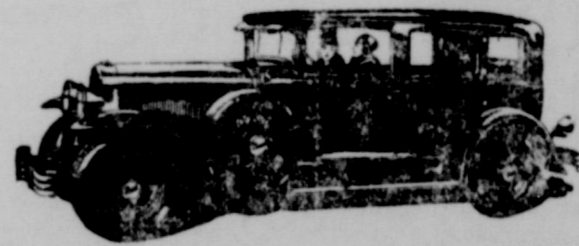

Saw a Dead Circus

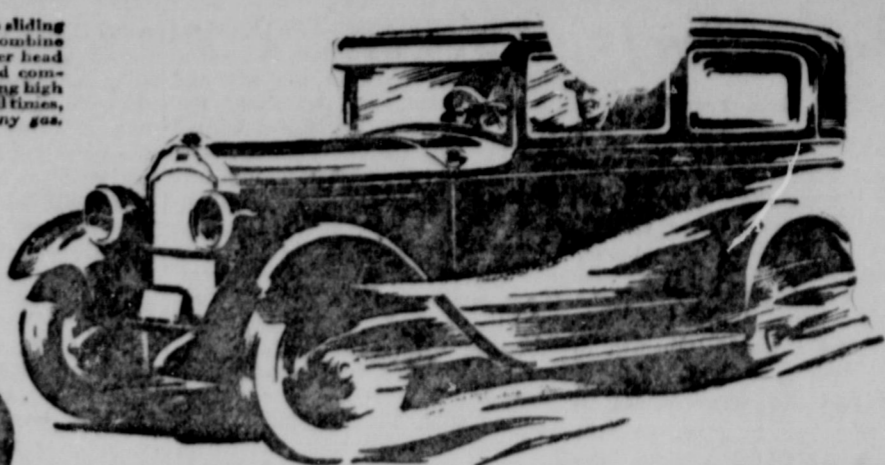
Billy, aged seven, was downtown with his mother one day. After doing some shopping they paid a visit to the museum. That evening the child began to tell his father that he had seen the circus.
