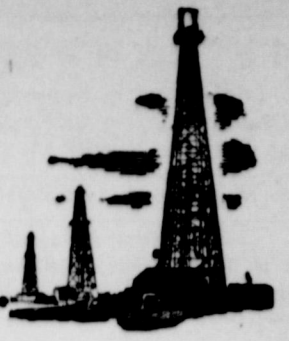

The time for the spring clean up campaign is drawing close and closer and there have been some wide-spread attempts on the part of many citizens to do some spring cleaning around their premises. We hope that this will spread and that a thorough job will result by everybody taking part for the best interest of the community.

Quite a bit of work has been done and is being done in the downtown section of Sanderson to spruce things up generally and it all makes for a neater and cleaner and more orderly appearance to the town.

There has been a steady increase recently, it seems, in local and area accidents which have taken their toll of life and property, according to Sheriff Buster Babb, who is quite concerned over the turn of events. He stated that he is trying his best to secure the services of a highway patrolman for Sanderson and he would appreciate the help of any citizen in writing to the division headquarters to urge action immediately toward that cause.

He stated that it was his opinion that a patrolman here would serve as a deterrent, in many instances, against traffic violations, and would also help when accidents did occur in seeing that those involved got the aid they needed and by being nearer the scene of the accident, could render all related services easier. Lee Holen Tells Of Survival Fight On Alaskan Floes

Local friends have received newspaper clipping from Mrs. Lillian O'Neill of Bremerton Wash., a farmer resident, telling of the recent survival fight made on ice floes in the Chukchi Sea of Alaska by her son-in-law, Lee Holen, 43-year-old pilot, and his bear-hunting passenger, George Bauman of Nevada, Mo.

Holen, after completing his military service, has been a bush pilot in Anchorage, Alaska. On a flight to Point Hope, about 300 miles north of Nome, on February 26, his Super Cub plane was forced down after running out of fuel from fighting heavy winds. Fashioning a raft out of the gas tank which they removed from the plane, they made it to shore and for seven days they lived on one rotting ice floe to another, often sinking to their waists in the frigid waters.

They credited their sleeping bags, although wet, with keeping them alive. They existed on snow for drinking water and some pre-cooked moose sausage and pilot bread. They ran into a party of Eskimos hunting caribou who took them into Kivilalina by dog sled.

Stockton Man Charged With Attempt to Murder

Esteban Pena Velasquez of Fort Stockton was charged with assault and intent to murder in Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath's examining trial court here Monday. Bond of \$1,000 was set to bind the defendant over for action of the grand jury Wednesday, after Velasquez had waived the examining trial.

The charge grew out of an alleged shooting in which his wife Mrs. Consuelo Velasquez, received a gunshot wound in the hand. The alleged offense took place about two and one-half miles from Sanderson on US 285.

Sheriff's officers apprehended the man and have a 22-caliber rifle which was supposed to be the weapon used by the defendant.

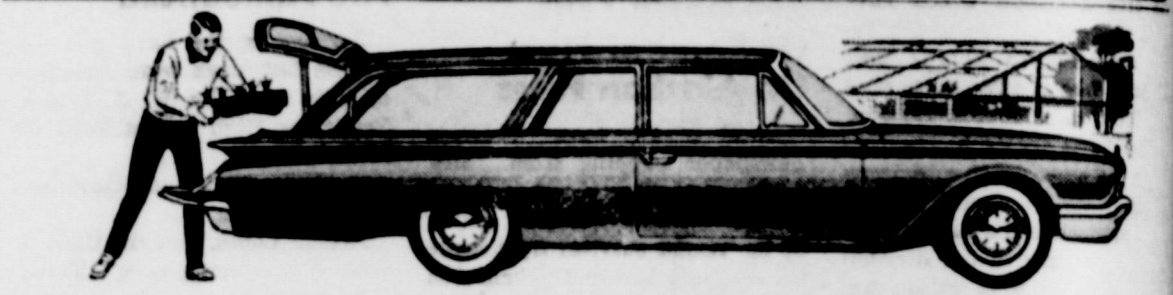
