

County Agent Deryl Coker this week sounded a warning to grain farmers as to the presence of Sorghum Midge in Parmer County

"Sorghum Midge populations have built up at a tremendous rate during the past 10 days and we have reached the point in most locations in the county where it could be dangerous or costly not to spray grain sorghum that blooms from now on, Coker stated.

"Heavy midge populations have been found south of Farwell, and in the Friona-Black area in some fields. Also, midge have been found in the Oklahoma Lane community," he said.

Coker pointed out that previous work has shown that the heaviest egg-laying by midge usually begins about the third day following sorghum head emergence from the boot. Chemical control depends upon the destruction of the adult female before egg-laying begins. Thus, each sorghum head must be covered with insecticide within three days after emergence from the boot to prevent egg-laving within its spikelets.
