MRS. KINSLEY GIVES LAND

New Masonic Lodge Is
Announced For Friona

The Friona Masonic Lodge is to begin a fund drive to raise \$18,000 for a new building which the Masons plan to build at Seventh Street and Ashland Avenue in Friona.

Mrs. Pearl Kinsley has donated the building site to the Masons, to take care of the first question in any building program--that of the building site. The building will be 36 feet by 100 feet long.

Plans for the new building, which will be a one-story affair, have been drawn up and will be approved by the lodge in a meeting March 2.

Floor plans include a lodge room, dining room, kitchen, storage rooms, ladies' lounge and rest rooms.

"When completed and comfortably furnished, the new building will be a place where Masons can meet and enjoy each other's company, and it (the building) will be a source of inspiration to our youth in which our future strength lies," stated Billy B. Sides, Worshipful Master of the Friona Lodge.

Sides pointed out that the present lodge building, (The old bank building at Fifth and Main) which has been used by the Masons the past 13 years, is now more than 40 years old. The lodge has made several changes in the old building's interior in that time.

"Our lodge officers and building committee feel that it is time to retire this building

and complete our plans for the new building," he added.

A building fund account has been started at Friona State Bank. The name of every Mason and friend of the lodge who contributes to the building fund will be permanently inscribed on a bronze plaque which will occupy a conspicuous place in the new lodge building.

The fund-raising campaign is to begin on January 6 and run through March 2, 1965. Members of the building committee include Charles Myers, Jr., Bud Elmore and Bob Rule. The finance committee will be made up of members of this committee and the lodge officers.

'T WAS A BIG YEAR

Newsmakers Of 1964
Reviewed In Passing

News of various sorts made the headlines in 1964 in Friona. Some of the news was of the bad nature, but by and large, most of it was of a forward-going progressive community doing things bigger and better than ever.

Passing a \$1.25 million school bond issue and subsequent work on the new high school complex, the winning of the state basketball championship by the high school girls team and a third straight year of building records in the city were a sampling of the top stories.

The biggest thing in the early part of the year was the winning of the long-sought state championship by the Squaws, who did it in impressive fashion. The team swept to 33 consecutive wins, culminating with the "big prize."

January saw a new postmaster, Wright Williams, sworn into office.

Big story in the Star during the month of February was the sale of Farmer County Implement Company by Granville McFarland to a three-man combination of Andy Hurst, Newman Jarrell, Jr. and Rene Sneed. McFarland had operated the company for 22 years.

The Friona school board announced its plans for the huge building program on April 1. Also on that date, Raymond Euler resigned as Farmer County Farm Bureau service agent after manning the post 15 years. His successor is Joe Owen.

Still in April, Mrs. Virgil Zeman broke the monotony of several years of all-menschool boards by being elected to a two term.

The school bond issue was held April 18, and was approved

in a record turnout by a 3-2 majority. Lois Moyer was the valedictorian for the 1964 graduating class, according to a headline in a May issue of the Friona Star.

The star gave itself some headlines throughout the year, as it won four first-place awards in press contests all the way from the regional to the state levels. In all, the Star received nine awards

BOVINA SCARES SQUAWS

Friona Teams Gain
Farwell Semi-finals

Both the Friona Chieftains and Squaws will be playing in the championship semi-finals of the Farwell Invitational Basketball Tournament tonight, after scoring first-round victories Tuesday.

However, the Squaws advanced to the second round by the narrowest of margins, having to come from behind to down a fired-up Bovina team, 53-47. The Chiefs, meanwhile, advanced on a ridiculously easy 69-12 win over Hart.

Both teams will meet Muleshoe in second-round games. The Chiefs and Mules meet at 6 p.m., followed by the Squaws and Mullettes at 7:30 p.m.

The Squaws' battle with Bovina turned out to be an unexpected fight to the finish, with the Squaws falling as much as 12 points behind late in the first half and having to pull out all the stops to keep from being upset.

As it was, the game was the closest Friona - Bovina girls clash since the Squaws edged Bovina, 59-54 in a game at Friona on December 16, 1958. The Bovina girls were bidding for their first win over Friona in at least 10 years.

For a time, it looked as though Tuesday night would be the time the Squaws' supremacy would end. The Bovina crew took an early lead, fell behind, then almost blew the Squaws out of the gymnasium in a second quarter in which Bovina looked like the state champs and Friona looked like a team Farwell called in at the last minute to fill out the tournament.

Bovina had taken a 6-4 lead, then saw the Squaws rally for a 10-6 lead on hook shots by Teto Jennings. Friona led 13-10 with a minute left, but Bovina rallied for five points to lead 15-13 at the buzzer.

The Squaws experienced the biggest nightmare they've been involved in for some time during the year.

Western Auto moved into a brand-new store and celebrated its grand opening in July. Also the first week in July, plans to build a Spudnut factory in Friona to service a 72-county three-state area were announced by George Taylor and Charles Allen.

Before July was over, groundbreaking was held for the much-needed addition to Farmer County Community Hospital.

Sandra Beene was crowned Maize Queen to highlight the community's annual Maize Days celebration in September.

In October, the Friona City Council officially estimated the city's population at 3,149, and requested the Highway Department to erect new figures on the city limits signs.

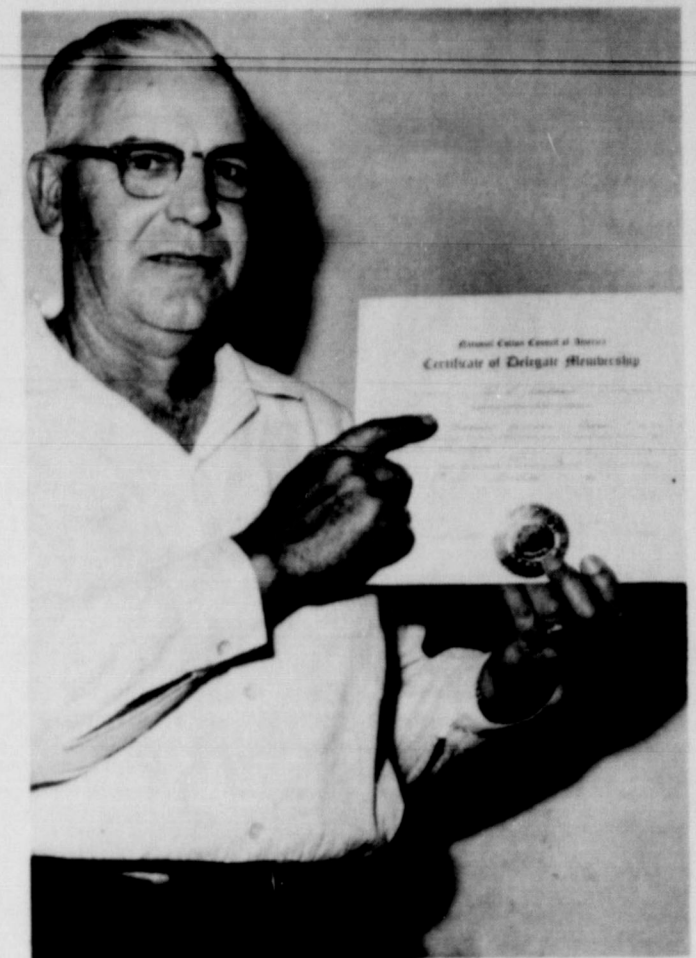
One of Edelmon's first official duties of his new job will be to attend the CCA's national convention in Houston January 25-26.

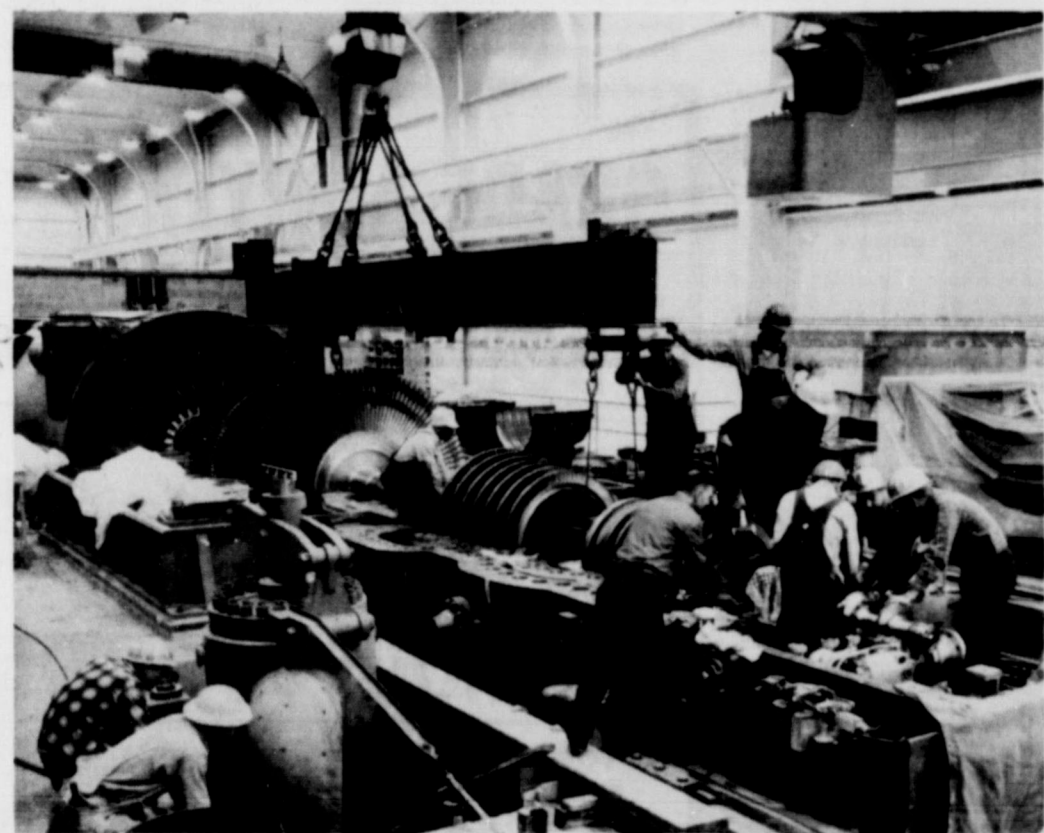

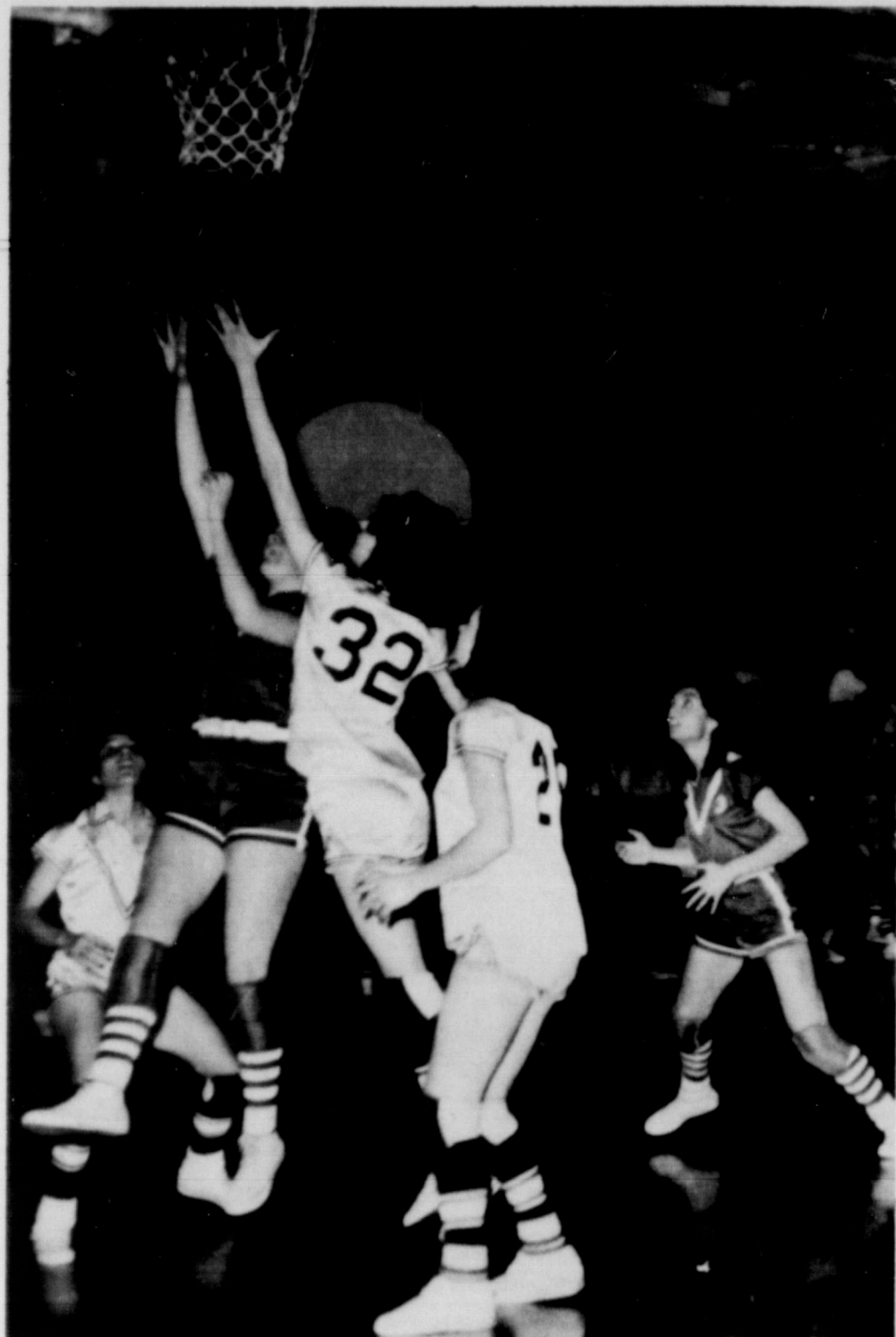

Jennings (As Usual) Is Squaws' Leading Scorer

Same song, third verse. That's the story of the Friona Squaw's scoring statistics after 12 games of the 1964-65 season. Once again leading the way -- and she's been at the top now for three seasons -- is senior Teto Jennings.

Miss Jennings, who had already scored something like 1326 points in her varsity career going into this season, is scoring right at the average she carried last season. Through 12 games she has pumped in 250 points, a 20.5 points - per - game scoring average.

Backing "Teto" up well this season is Linda Jo Davis, who has come on with a flourish to become a high - scoring player in many games this season. Her season average is 14.5, but she has been right at 20 points in five separate games recently.

After the top two, the scoring is divided among the other six

girls who have played at forward, Janet Rushing ranks third with 73 points, followed by Sheryl Long with 63 and sophomore Cindy Ingram with 55. Junior forward Janet Rushing has the best field goal percentage on the team, a 51.9 average, followed by Davis at 51.3. Rushing, who along with senior Sheryl Long has already scored more points than last season, has hit 28 of 54 field shots. Davis has scored on 58 of 113 attempts.

Davis leads at the free throw line, having hit 72.7 per cent of her shots there, 32 of 44 attempts. Jennings, who hit almost 75 per cent from the line last season, is down slightly so far, at 64.8 per cent.

The Squaws are averaging 54.3 points per game, and defensively are doing better so far than last year's state champion team, holding op-

ponents to an average of 36.8 points per game.

As a team, the Squaws are making 45.4 per cent of their field goal attempts, and 61.7 per cent of the free throw shots.

Teams Score Easy Wins Over Muleshoe Cagers

The Friona Chieftains and Squaws scored relatively easy wins over the visiting Muleshoe teams here on December 19. The Squaws broke a close game wide open in the fourth quarter for a 61-35 win, and the Chiefs soared to a 78-47 win over the Mules.

The Squaws maintained a 10-year, 16-game winning streak over the Mulettes, pulling away from a 38-28 third quarter lead by rolling up 23 points in the final quarter to only seven for the visitors.

Muleshoe made the game uncomfortably close during the first half. Friona didn't score a field goal until just 48 seconds remained in the first quarter, but free shots helped the team to a 13-5 first quarter lead. The Mulettes rallied to trim the margin to 13-11, but Friona increased the lead to 20-13 at halftime.

Friona grabbed a 10-point lead early in the third period, saw Muleshoe pull to within six points at 30-24, then rallied for a 38-28 third quarter lead. The Squaws clicked on all six cylinders in the final quarter.

Teto Jennings hit two field goals and four free shots to vault the team into a 47-31 lead. Then Linda Davis rammed in a follow - up shot and a hook-type layup for a 51-33 lead, and it was all but over.

Reserves played much of the final portion of the game, and got the score up over the 60-mark, after the team had a slow start.

The Chiefs were off and running in snapping a personal four - game losing streak to the Mule basketballers, Friona never trailed, getting off to a 3-0 lead. The mules never had so much as a tie, the closest being at 3-2 and 5-4 early in the game.

Dale Milner hit a lay-in shot and a free throw to up the margin to five points at 11-6, and that was still the margin at the end of a quarter, 17-12. Friona quickly made it a 10-point lead early in the second quarter, on Larry Buckley's three-point play with 7:08 left in the period. The Mules, who are in a building year in the cage sport, found themselves down by 14, 30-16 before the period was half over, and by

half-time the Chiefs were making a runaway of it, leading by 18, 42-24.

The Chiefs continued their onslaught in the third quarter, and by 2:26 of that period had built their margin to 30 points, 57-27. It was 59-32 at the quarter's end.

Reserves played the entire final period, and did right well by themselves, outscoring the Mules, 19-15. The 78 points rolled up by Friona was the second-highest point output for the team this season. In the Happy tournament, they romped to an 89-37 win over the Happy "B" team.

Statistics Prove Chief Squad Well-Balanced

It almost takes a magnifying glass to detect the top scorer on the 1964-65 Friona Chieftain team. After ten games, there are five players on the team whose averages are within a 1.1 point range.

Currently, Larry Buckley has a slight edge, having scored

101 points for a 10.1 scoring average. Dale Milner, who has come on strong after a slow start, has a 9.4 scoring average. Danny Murphee is at 9.2, Travis Graves at 9.1 and Gene Weatherly 9.0.

Weatherly has seen action in only half of the games due to

illness, and Graves has played in seven games.

The Chiefs, who carried a 7-3 season mark into the Farwell tournament, already have won three more games than all last season, and are only two wins shy of the previous year.

The team's scoring average is up considerably over last season, while at the same time the defensive average has improved greatly. The Chiefs are scoring an average of 56.6 points per game, to only 42.1 per game for the opponents. At this time last year the figures reversed would have fit the team almost exactly.

Milner, who had scored at a 15.4 average for the five games preceding the Farwell tournament, is the most accurate field goal shooter on the team. He has connected on 27 of 43 attempts, a good 62.8 per cent of his shots.

Next to Milner in field goal shooting is Ray Braxton at 53.6. Braxton, who broke into the starting lineup with a bang, has made 30 of 56 attempts.

Buckley is the top free throw shooter among the regulars with a good 77 per cent average on 25 of 32 shots. Travis Graves has a 71.4 per cent average on 22 of 43.

A member of the "B" team who has been in only two games, Bobby Jordan, hit 12 of 14 free shots in action at the Happy tournament, a sparkling 85.7 average. Jordan's two-game scoring average is 12.0, which actually tops any of the regulars over the 10-game slate.

As a team, the Chiefs are making 43.9 per cent of their field goal efforts, which is good, but their 59.6 average on free shots is somewhat low, although improving slightly over last season at this time.

throughout the third quarter, building it back to five, 41-36, with 1:23 to go in the quarter. Friona pulled to within one at 41-40, but a last - minute basket increased Bovina's margin to 43-40 as the buzzer sounded.

Miss Rushing's basket cut it back to one, 43-42 as the final quarter opened, and Linda Davis gave Friona the lead for the first time since early in the game with a follow - up on a missed shot with 6:41 to play, making the score 44-43.

Friona never trailed after that, but didn't have the game in the bag until the final minute. They built a five - point lead at 48-43, only to have Bovina trim it to two at 49-47. It was at this point that the Squaws went into their delay game. Davis was able to get open for two easy baskets in the final minute to push the final margin to six points, 53-47, but the final score was actually misleading. The 49-47 score would have been more representative of the game.

Devis, who came through with 10 important fourth - period points, led the Squaws with 19 points, same as Lynn Looney tossed in for Bovina.

Both teams had three forwards hitting in double figures, Miss Rushing, who came off the bench to provide a pillar of strength and help turn the tide, scored 17 points, her season high. Judy Strawn had 16 and Sandra Patterson had 14 for Bovina. Jennings, who scored important set shots in the uphill third period, had 13 points for the night.

The Chieftains romped -- that's about all you can say for a 69-12 game. The team shot

into a 13-0 lead before their opponent could score, and had a 17-5 first quarter lead.

Score at halftime was 29-9, as the Chiefs worked on a full-court press and did right well by it. The Hart team scored just three points in a hectic second half that saw Friona pouring 40 points through the hoop.

It was 50-11 going into the final quarter. The Chiefs had just eight players available for the game, so there was no such thing as "turning it over to the reserves." Coach James Anglin rotated the eight players throughout most of the game.

Dale Milner, improving with each game, scored 20 points and Larry Buckley 16.

Level Established For 1965 Cotton

The loan level for 1965 crop cotton (midding 1-inch) at average location has been established at 29¢ per lb. This compares with 30¢ per lb. for 1964 and causes the growing of cotton to be a little less attractive to those persons planting their full allotment on farms where the 1965 cotton allotment is in excess of 15 acres.

On the other hand, cotton farmers who cooperate in the domestic allotment program will receive payment at the rate of 4.35¢ per pound on the normal yield of cotton established for the farm times the acres planted for harvest. This compares with a 3.50¢ per pound under the domestic program in 1964.

The domestic cotton allotment for a farm is (in most cases) 65 percent of the effective allotment for the year; Except that, on farms having an effective allotment of 15 acres or less the domestic and effective allotment is the same. On farms with an effective allotment of more than fifteen acres, the domestic allotment may not be less than 15 acres. Examples are as follows: On a farm with a 100 acre effective allotment, the domestic allotment would be 65 acres. On a farm with an 18 acre effective allotment, the domestic allotment would be 15 acres. On a farm with an effective allotment of 12 acres, the domestic allotment is the same - 12 acres.

Some examples of how an individual farm might fare by participating in the Domestic Allotment Program are as follows: Farm has 14 acre allotment and 599 lb. normal yield. No

reduction in acreage is necessary and the payment earned would be 599 X 4.35 X 14 which is \$364.84.

Farm has 18 acre effective allotment. The domestic allotment is 15 acres. Normal yield is 599 lbs. per acre. By planting 15 acres the farm would earn 599 X 4.35 X 15 which is - \$390.90 or \$130.30 for each acre of reduction below the effective allotment for the farm.

Farm has 50 acre effective allotment. The domestic allotment is 32.5 acres. The normal yield for the farm is 599 lbs. per acre. By planting 32.5 acres the farm would earn 599 X 4.35 X 32.5 which is \$846.95 or \$48.40 per acre for each acre of reduction (17.5) below the effective allotment for the farm.

It would appear that a number of our farmers will wish to participate in the domestic allotment program because of the fact that the acreage not used for cotton production may be devoted to the production of other crops - such as, Soybeans, Sugar Beets and Etc.

We are advised that it will be necessary to sign an intention to participate in the Domestic Cotton Allotment Program, prior to the planting of your 1965 Cotton.
