Our advice to farmers who would like to see it snow more in Parmer County in the winter time would be for them to schedule more farm meetings for the Hub Community Center.

Two weeks ago on Monday night the Parmer County Irrigation Gas Users held their annual meeting at Hub. That was the night the Frions area received two inches of snow, although it was sort of a "spotty"

Then this week, with an important meeting featuring Dr. Allen Wiese of the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station in Bushland, talking on herbicides. the entire county was hit with a good snowfall Sunday night.

Monday's meeting at Hubwas well-attended, with some 160 farmers in attendance, despite there being two or three inches of snow on the ground.

Dr. Wiese gave the men some pointers on the recommended usages of herbicides for both cotton and maize land.

The Bookmobile will make its regular stop in Friona Saturday. The mobile library will be parked at its regular place adjacent to the City Park from 1 to 4 p.m. Anyone wishing to return books or check out books is invited to do so at that time.

Friona has been one of the places which uses the bookmobile services the most on the four-county route.

Thursday the bookmobile makes its regular stop at Oklahoma Lane, Rhea and Black, and on Friday it makes its regular trip to Hub, White's Elevator, Lazbuddie and Clay's Corner.

Pete Hollis, scoutmaster for Friona's Troop 56 of Boy Scouts, states that he would like for a Friona man to volunteer to help him with the Scouts, who meet once each month.

Hollis says that he is getting two or three new boys each month, and that with the increasing number of boys, he can use some assistance.

Hollis formerly had the late Bill Buchanan as an assistant scoutmaster, and since his death has had the troop to himself. Anyone who has a few minutes to spare and enjoys working with boys should call Pete at 247-3068.

City manager A. L. (Jake) Outland says that the city is having to begin a new "hard nosed" policy toward people people who are late paying their water bills. The city is adding a 10 per cent penalty on bills which aren't received before the 11th of each month.

Also, the city is going to enforce more tightly its rule for cutting off service if bills aren't paid by the 15th, Some local citizens found to their chagrin that the 10 per cent ruling isn't postponed if payment is made on the 11th of the month when the 10th falls on Sunday. as it did in January, Evidentally when that happens, the 9th of the month becomes the deadline for paying in person, or you should go shead and mail it on Sunday, if you haven't already.

The city council has voiced approval of this policy, and perhaps it will help turn the tide in delinquent bills. The number of delinquent bills for January stood at 162, compared to 74 the previous January, 66 the previous year and 63 the year before that.

FHS Teams Record Twin Championships

Simultaneous district championships -something of a rarity at Friona High School -have been recorded by the boys and girls basketball teams, giving Friona two teams in the playoffs for the first time in 20 years.

The last time this happened was in the 1944-45 season, when the Chieftains finished second in the district tournament, an achievement which allowed them to play in the regional meet, while the Squaws won the county and district tourneys and finished third at the state meet.

About the only other time this happened was back in the basketball seasons of 1934-35 and 1940-41, when both boys and girls teams won the county championship, advancing them to district tournaments.

The current season is the only time since teams from Friona High School have competed under the classification system that both teams won their district championship.

While it's something of a historic championship for the Chiefs, it's another in a long line of success stories for the Squaws. For instance, it is the third straight district championship for the FHS girls, seventh in nine years, ninth in the last 13 years, and 17th such title won in the last 25 years by girls teams at the school.

This achievement is even more impressive when it is considered that many of these years the Squaws have been in the same district with such teams as Dimmitt, which has battled to the state meet three times the last 10 years (same as Friona), and Tulia, which has made it twice in that time.

The three schools of Frions, Dimmitt and Tulia furnished the state representative from this region eight times in the last 11 years.

The local teams will play winners of District 4-AA in their bi-district (first round regional) games. The Squaws will play the Slaton girls, who beat out the Post team, winners the past two seasons.

The Chieftain opponent is unknown as yet, with three teams, Denver City, Morton and Slaton in the running for the title.

The last time the Friona Chiefs won a district title, they had to defeat the Amarillo Sandies in a district tournament at Canyon (1935-36). So, it has been a long dry spell for the boys division at Friona High School.

Dates and sites are to be worked out on the bi-district games for both teams. The Chiefs will play either Feb. 22 or 23, and the Squaws will play their game the following week, either March 1 or 2.

District 3-AA had an earlier start than most of the other districts, and hence finished up their round-robin schedule earlier than most. Also, there were no ties for the championship to slow down the procedure for naming the district champion.



We have said so far that the Lutheran Church is based on three main teachings which are fairly easy to remember: (1) Grace Alone (2) Faith Alone, and (3) Scriptures Alone. We wish to discuss the third one today.

Paul writes the above-mentioned words to Timothy, He is really referring to the Old Testament. The Greek words for "All Scripture" mean "All the writings" or "All the words". This means then that every word in the original

Hebrew was inspired by God. Jesus put His stamp of approval on the Old Testament also when He said, "Scripture (the writings) cannot be broken." John 10, 35.

But what about the New Testament? These books were carefully gathered together by the early Christian Church. They followed the rule that a letter apostle of Christ or one whom the apostle taught. This is how, together with prayer and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, the New Testament canon was

brought together. The Lutheran Church accepts these 66 books as we know them in today's Bible as inspired by the Holy Spirit in the original languages and in the original manuscripts. It places the wisdom and teachings of the Bible ABOVE the plane of authority of any other book or any writing source of all doctrine.

We trust it completely. We believe in studying it in the original languages to come closest to the truths esposued therein. In it we find the Savior and Lord, Jesus Christ, and the directions for living a life pleasing to our Heavenly Father.

To assist them in reducing their 1964 income taxes, we have information which lists tion at the Hub Community Cena number of items they may ter, Wednesday, February 17 claim as charitable deductions provided the leaders itemize their deductions.

Among the items are outof- pocket transportation expenses, including the cost for use of cars or trucks to and from 4-H sponsored events, necessarily incurred in rendering donated service to 4-H.

Actual unreimbursed expenses incurred by 4-H adult leaders in attending contests, training meetings and other 4-H sponsored events. This includes meals, lodging and transportation expenses while away from home.

Also expenses for cash contributions and contributions in kind, such as food, equipment, paints and other supplies. The amount to deduct is the fair market value at the time the gift was made. No deduction is allowable for the time contributed.

Leaders who claim decutions by itemizing their accounts should keep accurate records throughout the year.

MILK HOMOGENIZATION

More than 75 percent of milk going to consumers is homogenized. Gone is the creamline which for many years was the measure for richness of milk. But, homogenization hasn't taken anything away from the value of milk as a food,

The process is a simple one. Milk, at 145 degrees Fahrenheit, is forced under high pressure through a restricted opening against a flat surface. The impact of the fat globules against the flat surfact, plus the shearing effect of a great change in pressure, causes the globules to break up into smaller ones.

Homogenized milk tastes richer. This is because the surface area of the fat has been increased five times over that of the original fat globules surface. The milk has a richer color because it is more densely white due to the increase in the number and area of suspended fat particles capable of reflecting and scattering light. Homogenized milk fat is more easily digested to the digestive

Most homogenized milk contains between three and onequarter and three and one-half percent fat. This is a very small percentage of fat when compared with many foods.

The homogenization process does nothing to the nutritive value of milk, except make it easier to digest. Milk continues to be nature's most nearly perfect food and you never outgrow a need for it.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK Will you please give information on Cleaning bathroom shower tile?

REGULAR CARE OF

CERAMIC WALLS Ceramic tile walls around the bathtub and in the shower acquire a film from soapresidue, body oil and the minerals in hard water. If a solution of baking soda or detergent and water does not clean effectively, water softener msy help dissolve the film. Using a sponge, rub the tile with a solution of I cup of water softener (Calgon or other) mixed with one-half pail of water. Rinse the surface, then wipe it with a soft, dry cloth, preferably before the tile has a chance to dry. For protection against film (or water spotting) apply a thin coat of cream wax.

SPECIAL TREATMENT FOR TILE WALLS

If the above cleaning method is not effective combine 1/2 cup of water softener with several tablespoons of mild abrasive household cleanser (such as Bon Ami). Add about I cup of hot water. Mix this solution and with a stiff nylon brush, scrub the tile well. Nylon bristles do not soften when wet. For a more thorough treatment, scrub tile walls with moistened fine (3/0) steelwool or fine steelwool soap pad. When the tile is clean, rinse and dry. Then apply a coat of cream wax for easier mainte-
