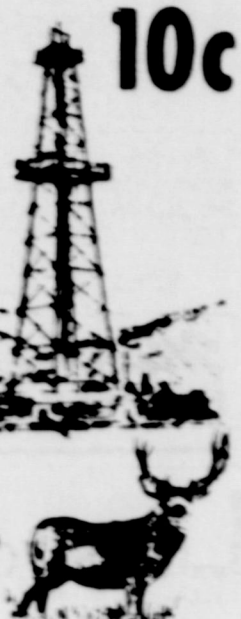

Mrs. Pagitt Buys Local Drug Store

Announcement is made this week of the purchase of the local drug store by Mrs. A.J. Pagitt. The sale was effective January 1.

The business will be known as Sanderson Drug instead of Sanderson Pharmacy, the name used by Bill O'Banion and Billy Joe Hinson, both of Fort Stockton, the former owners.

Mrs. Pagitt stated that the business would be open from 8:30 to 6:30 the same as has been the practice before, and the only change noted by the new owner is the prescription service. Mrs. Pagitt stated that the prescriptions would be called in every afternoon to the Stockton Pharmacy and that the medicine would be in Sanderson Drug every morning to be picked up.

The new owner also stated that she would appreciate the patronage of local and area residents and would strive to merit their confidence and business.

County Officers Installed Tuesday

Terrell County officers who were elected in the general election in November took the oath of office Tuesday morning at the courthouse and began serving their four-year terms in the respective offices.

The new officers elected in the county include:

Jack M. Hayre, county attorney,

Dalton Hogg, sheriff, tax assessor-collector,

W.W. Sudduth, commissioner of precinct 1,

George W. Gann, constable of precinct 1,

David Mitchell, commissioner of precinct 3.

Hogg is serving his first full term as sheriff of Terrell County, having served also the unexpired term from the time of the resignation of Bill C. Cooksey in July, to the time of the general election.

Sudduth is serving his first term as commissioner in precinct 1 after having won the post in the general election.

Early Sign-Up For ASCS Work Urged Of Ranchers

Terrell County ranchmen who plan to carry out ranch improvement work under the ASCS program in the coming year are urged to make application early in the year since funds are to be limited next year. Sign-up began January 2, 1973, at the local ASCS office.

Ranchers are cautioned to sign up at the office before starting the work.

Producers of wool and mohair are reminded that applications must be filed in the ASCS office for 1972 wool and mohair incentive payment not later than January 31, 1973, and applications are for sales made during the 1972 marketing year. Contact your ASCS office if you have any questions on eligibility of sales or other details of the program, according to a news letter.

Incentive price levels for the new year remain the same as for 1972, 80.2 cents on mohair and 72 cents on wool. The rate of payment will be determined later in the year based on average prices during the 1972 marketing period.

Now called the "Rural Environmental Assistance Program" the ASCS program for 1973 provides a limitation per ranch operation in Terrell County. Practices approved for 1973 include cross fences, livestock water storage and pipelines, well drilling, and various brush control measures.

Water District Election Is Tuesday

Election day is Tuesday for the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District #1. Three-year terms will be given to the winners of the election as members of the board of directors of the district.

The terms of Weldon Cox and Edward Kerr expire at this time and both have announced for re-election. There are no other candidates in the race.

The water district comprises what is usually considered the town of Sanderson with the exception of the Loma Vista Addition just west of town and all resident qualified voters in the district may vote in the election.

Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. and voting will be at the courthouse.

Carlton White will be the election judge, and clerks will be Mrs. Cruz Marquez and Mrs. Jack Laughlin.

The directors have the responsibility of making decisions concerning the operation of the water district.



EAGLES 2ND IN TOURNEY

The Sanderson Eagles lost in the finals game of the Alpine Invitational Tourney last weekend to the strong Lydia Patterson Institute of El Paso to gain second place in that meet. Bill Mott was named to the all-tournament team.

In the opener tilt for the Eagles, they beat Crane 68-47. Mott led the scoring with 22, Ike Billings had 19, Ricky Marquez 8, Darrell Cooke 7, Jake Murrah 6, Robert Kline 4, and Kendall Billings 2. Carlos Munoz also saw some action.

In their second game, Sanderson met Canutillo and won 41-36. Mott again led the scoring with 18, Billings had 15, Cooke 4, Murrah 3, Marquez 1; and Kline saw some action during the first half.

In the final game, Lydia Patterson Institute players jumped out to a 12-2 lead at the end of the first period. They held onto the lead 26-11 at half-time and Sanderson's scoring during the third frame was 10 to 29, and the Eagles led the scoring 12-7 in the final period and trailed at the end of the game 33-62.

Billings led the scoring with 15 points in the finals, Mott had 11, Marquez, Kline, Munoz, each had 2, and Cooke had 1. Kendall Billings, Jake Murrah also saw some action.

The Eagles were presented a gold trophy for their second-place win.

Tires Must Pass Safety Check

Captain Dean Glazner, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced that effective January 1, the inspection of tires became a requirement as part of the required annual inspection of motor vehicles in Texas.

Tires with a tread depth of less than 1/16th inch or which have visible damage such as fabric breaks, lumps, bulges, or knots indicating sidewall or tread separation, will not pass inspection. Tires temporarily repaired by use of blowout patches or boots may also be rejected.

Tires which are marked "not for highway use", "farm use only", "for racing purposes only", or any other marking that would indicate the tire is not intended for normal highway use, will also fail inspection.

Other items to be inspected along with the new requirements on tires include brakes, lighting equipment, horns, and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts, steering, wheels, and rims, exhaust system and emission control systems.

Captain Glazner urged vehicle owners to save time, expense, and possibly a traffic accident by insuring that tires and all vehicle equipment are in good condition at all times.

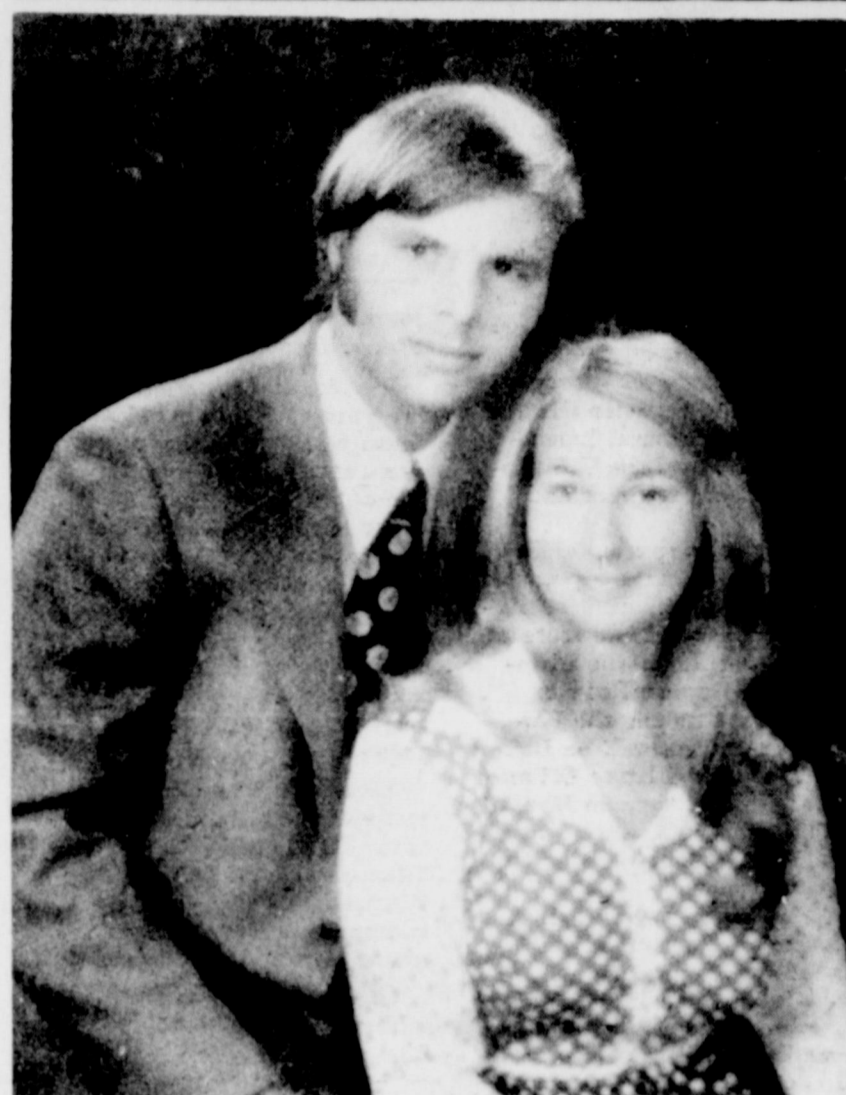
Miss Sylvia Olivares ...to marry Carlos Garza

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Rats, Mice Control Available Locally

Sanderson area residents now have a new ally in their fight against rats and mice in their homes and community.

This ally is the newly organized Urban Rodent Control Program of the Texas Rodent and Predatory Animal Control Service, authorized by the last State legislature as a cooperative program between the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service and the U.S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

Under this program, 13 Urban Rodent Control Specialists have been located in major urban areas of the state to educate people in the elimination and control of rats and mice. Serving the Far-West Texas area will be Robert W. "Bob" Miles of El Paso. Miles, 32, was born in Marfa and lived in both Alpine and Fort Davis before moving to El Paso.

According to Miles, the Urban Rodent Control Specialists will work primarily in towns to educate and assist lower income groups in rodent control, but will also be available to assist anyone with rodent problems. "We will offer advice and suggestions, but will not be in competition with established commercial pest control operators," he stressed.

Rats and mice are both dangerous and deadly pests. Besides carrying more than 15 kinds of diseases ranging from salmonella food poisoning to rabies, they often cause fires by gnawing on electrical wires, damage buildings, contaminate stored food and grain and fre-

quently attack livestock and even children.

The Urban Rodent Control Program will be carried on through publicity, talks and demonstrations in the proper use of traps, rodenticides and other methods of control and prevention. The emphasis will be on such ecological means of control as cleaning up an area to remove the three basic necessities of rodent survival -- food, water and shelter -- rather than the use of poisons.

Miles will be available to present programs to any of the civic clubs in the Far-West Texas area, and it is hoped that many of these clubs will undertake rodent control programs as service projects.

Miles is officed in Room 501 of the U.S. Courthouse; El Paso, Texas 79901.

license plates shortly after Christmas. Vehicle owners who wish to avoid the trip to the courthouse to purchase the license plates may simply return the entire application by mail to the tax assessor-collector in their home counties with the registration fee and \$1 per vehicle for handling and mailing.

All who use this method of purchasing their registration plates are asked to keep the following things in mind:

Leave the handy 3-part form intact. Do Not Separate the three parts; Mail it to the county tax office in your home county; Be sure to include your registration fee plus an additional \$1 for each automobile to be registered by mail.

You may apply for your license plates by mail after January 1. However, county tax offices won't be sending the license plates until after February 1. You should allow at least 30 days from the time you apply for the license plates to be returned.

The license plates must be displayed on your vehicle by April 1.

In-person registration will begin at county tax offices and in some counties, special substations on February 1, 1973.
