But sometimes "need to know" results from "desire to know"!

At least that's the way we look at it!

When a person feels that the electorate gave him supreme powers that goes beyond the mere interest and inquisitive nature expressed by asking or an explanation, then usually some person has been misled in his thinking. There is no elective office that belongs to the elected. and everything connected with the office does not belong to the elected! For example, the president's favorite toy - the recording devices in the White House and the tapes recorded - that he has been using to play with justice, to play with the feelings of people, to toy with the passions of the electorate, and actually holding up as a lure to tantalize the efforts at plain old basic "fairness" by so many people who are trying to keep some stability to our nation's movement. The recording devices, the unused tapes, the used tapes, and any other part of that system, do not belong to the person of the president; they belong to the office of the presidency. This places some restrictions on their use and gives also some liberality to their use. For them to be used for personal gain, for personal use

Eagles Rally For Iraan Win 21-13

The Sanderson Eagles rallied from a 13-0 half-time deficit to come out on the top side of a 21-13 score here Friday night to thrill homecoming Sanderson fans.

Iraan scored in the first period on a 20-yard run by Rudy Galindo and Billy Smart converted the point-after with a kick. Wayne Cummins went over the goal line from the 3-yard line for the second Brave score and the extra point try kick was no good. Sanderson had difficulty

putting a drive together during the first half, but had one kind of threat early in the first period that failed to materialize.

Early in the third quarter Kevin Phillips took a handoff from Robert Kline and ran 58 yards for a score. Bill Mott added a point with a kick.

A picture-book pass play in the fourth frame which was good for 60 yards and another touchdown put the Eagles up with the Braves and Mott's good point-after kick made the scoreboard read 14-13 in favor of the Eagles. The pass was initiated when Kline lateralled to Mott who threw to Ricky Marquez who went the rest of the way in front of pursuers.

Marquez saved a touchdown by the Braves when he grabbed the football-carryingarm of Cummins right at th goal line and caused him to fumble the ball which was recovered by Sanderson. Sanderson had a touchdown threat called back due to an infraction of rules earlier in the game. The long carry was to inside the 5-yard line. Sanderson put the icing on the cake with another touchdown drive that was successful when Mott ran over from the 4-yard line. A penalty in the try for the extra point put the ball back 5 yards and the ensuing kick was good to give the total of 21 points to the Eagles.

NOVMEBER 8, 1973

Is Granted SP The Texas Railroad Commission has granted the Southern Pacific Transportation Co. authority to establish its first regional agency service center in Texas, notice having reached places involved on Friday.

The order allows Southern Pacific to discontinue its designated agency stations at Marathon, Sanderson, Del Rio, Uvalde, Hondo, Seguin, Luling, Flatonia, Schulenberg, Gonzales, and Kennedy.

Functions presently handled by agents at these stations will be transferred to the new regional agency service center in San Antonio.

Agent positions at all of the stations besides Kennedy will be changed to clerk positions. The agent position and depot at Kennedy will be eliminated, according to information received.

The clerk positions at Luling, Seguin, Schulenburg, Hondo, Uvalde, and Marathon will be eliminated upon completion of the Centralized Traffic Control system currently being installed between Flatonia and Sierra Blanca. Until the CTC is completed, these personnel are needed to assist in the issuance of train orders in the movement of traffic, but upon completion these services will no longer be required.

Mrs. Bolinger was not present at the time of the shooting, but rushed to the front porch when she heard the shots and found Bolinger and her ex-husband both lying in a pool of blood. Bolinger was shot in the chest with a .380 calibre pistol and the other man was shot in the head with a .30-.30-calibre rifle. Bolinger died before the arrival of the ambulance, according to accounts of the shooting and deaths.

Bolinger, who was a Texas Highway Patrolman, transferred from Alpine to Sanderson. He left Sanderson on a transfer to Odessa, later going to El Paso, and then Pecos. His employment with the Department of Public Safety had terminated several months ago. 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

He began as a section hand and was lead car man in the local yards at the time of his retirement.







NHS Induction For 10 Students






