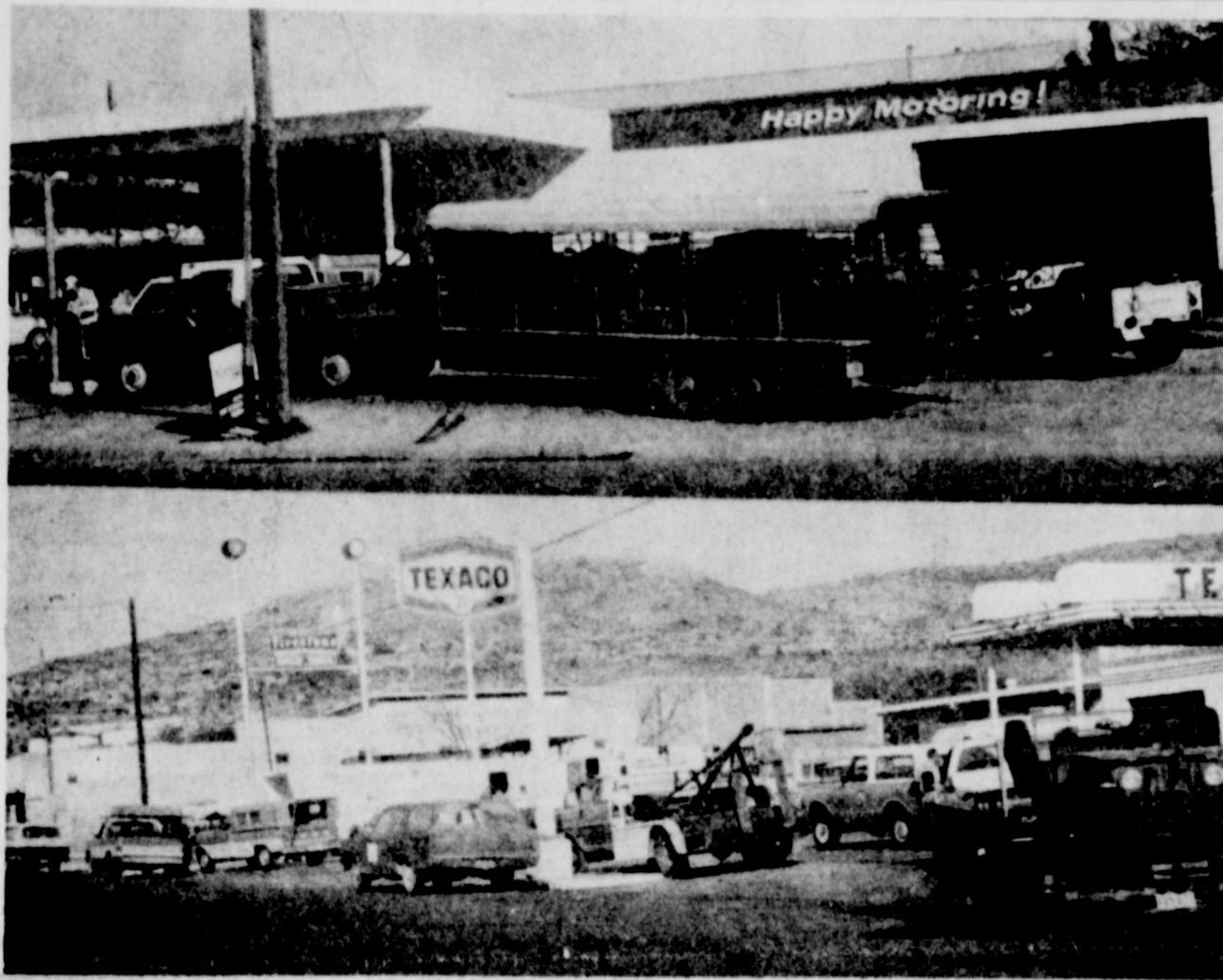
One thing about the Sunday closing of gas stations! What about people or vehicles on positively emergency missions? We can think of several examples!

LOCAL INDIGENT FUND INCREASED ABOUT \$85

An offering was taken at the community thanksgiving service held recently at the Presbyterian Church for local indigent needs. The offering increased the fund by about \$85.00, according to J.A. Gilbreath, treasurer of the local ministerial alliance.

When appeals are made to ministers who are members of the local alliance, they are referred to Gilbreath who ascertains their needs and helps them accordingly. Most of the help sought is a meal by persons hitch-hiking or otherwise traveling with little or no funds for their own sustenance. Some of the money is used to buy gasoline to get a family further down the road, according to the treasurer.

The fund was initiated to help ease the financial burden of the ministers who were asked to shoulder all of the responsibility of helping indigent or "hard luck" travelers.

The Thanksgiving service and Easter sunrise service are the two occasions when an offering is taken to support the local fund.

During the past year \$96.35 was expended out of the fund to help 30 cases, some of which were families with small children, with each case averaging \$3.21+.

COYPA(?) CAUGHT HERE

What is thought to be a coypa - the animal that produces a fur called nutria - was caught on the Jack Rigg ranch last weekend. The animal looks like a large rat, only black, with a long uniformly-tapered tail.

If it is a coypa, the animals were introduced into Louisiana to rid the irrigation ditches of water vegetation, and, according to information we have, the animals became a bigger problem than were the weeds.

Other reports of similar animals have come from the north-central part of the county, one was identified as a coypa and the other as a muskrat.

Several friends of the Talbots also attended the service.

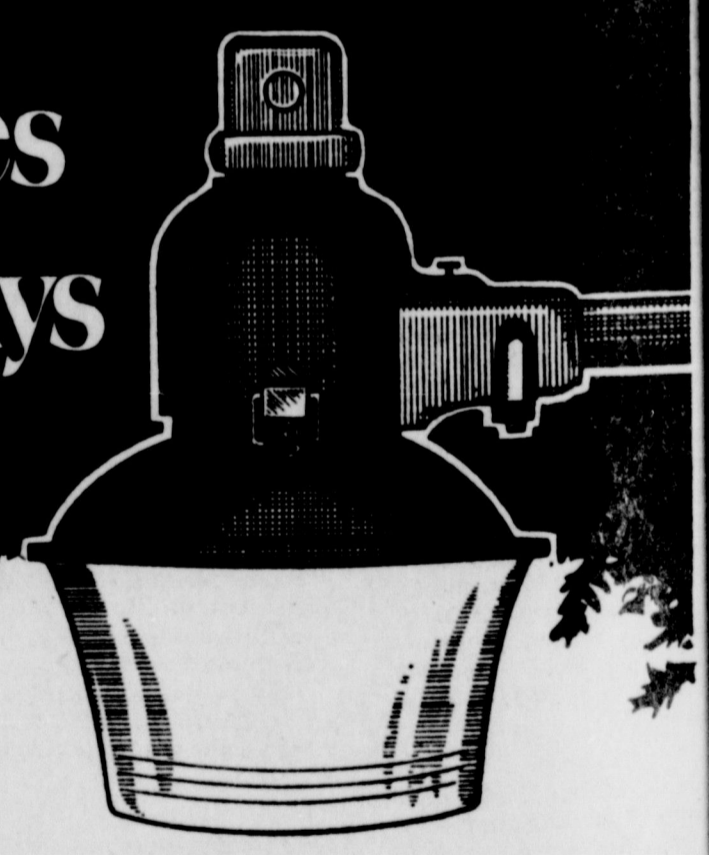
