

United States Representative Ed Foreman, the outspokenRepublican from Odessa, told members of the West Texas Press Association last Saturday in Midland that President Johnson's announcement on national television that North Viet Nam was to be bombed was "the most grave act of irresponsibility that I ever heard of."

Foreman states that the announcement was broadcast about an hour and a half before the actual bombing was carried out.

"This was better warning to the communists than the most intricately-devised radar system could ever have brought," Foreman said.

The Saturday papers carried a story stating that Foreman was booed by his fellow congressmen on the House of Representatives floor for his criticism of the President's handling of the announcement.

"However, representatives of the Department of Defense finally admitted that I was correct in my charge," Foreman pointed out.

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The dynamic young reprehad committed such an "act of irresponsibility," he would have been held for treason.

The Odessa lawmaker argued that the president should have waited until after the attack to announce it to the American people.

Either that, or the telvision networks should have known or should have been told to delay the broadcast.

Foreman stated that it was "about time" that the U. S. was standing up and defending its interests. He cited areas such as Cuba and Panama where he declared that American prestige has suffered.

"Appeasement is nothing more than surrender on an installment basis," Foreman stated.



Problems most prevelent among do-it-yourself rug cleaners are: 1. Heavily soiled areas are

"gone over" several times, resulting in streaks and blotchiness.

2. Excessive amounts of liquid are applied causing overwetting which often results in brown stains and/or rapid resoiling due to soapy deposits in the carpet. The resolling precipitates another shampooing and the felony is compounded.

3. After the do-it-yourself cleaning, many spots and stains remain. If something stronger than shampoo is used, such as a bleaching agent, the result usually is disaster.

4. Because the homemaker does not have a "pile-lifter". used by professional cleaners to loosen embedded soil when cleaning wall to wall carpeting, the soil in the carpet is merely redistributed and masked with brightners in the shampoo solution.

The homemaker, started at the poor and often disastrous results of her endeavor, complains that the carpet is defective, faded, streaked, stained and worn out. She is right, Mr. Reidhlin says, but she did it herself.
