## How You Look At It!

So many things to talk about this week! One of the most important is the necessity to vote! Call someone and insist that they go and vote and offer to take them if necessary.

Dogs are becoming more and more of a problem - in Terrell County as well as in other places. Dogs turning over trash barrels create a mess, as well as a nuisance. Dogs killing stock make an unnecessary cost and more than just a nuisance. Dogs that habitually go to the yard of neighbors to make a mess are more than just a nuisance and neighbors should not have to tolerate it. Thoughtful neighbors would not permit it. And, certainly, dogs have an instinct or sense to not stay at home for this practice.

Why do we have to continue to be plagued by stray dogs, owned and not owned?

Some of the water that falls in the extreme northeast part of town runs through yards, across streets, etc., and winds up at the corner of Oak St. and Fifth St., if it isn't stopped by running into the junior high building or into Morrison's.

## Seal-Coating Delayed by Rain

Seal-coating of local streets was delayed following rains that fell three consecutive days last week and continued foggy, damp and chilly weather. Another shower early Sunday night made a continuation of the work impossible on Monday.

Plans for black-topping certain streets or blocks of local streets were cancelled due to the fact that residents on those streets did not choose to pay their share of the cost of black-topping. All the streets of Sanderson that have received black-topping, with the exception of a few blocks like Cemetery St., were paid for on a cost-sharing basis, with the property owner and the county splitting the cost of the improvement.

Work was resumed Monday in preparing the streets to receive the seal-coating and applications of the hot asphalt and crushed rock were being added Monday afternoon to local streets to pick up where the work had stopped last week prior to the rains.

The work was completed this week.

## Eagles To Go To Grandfalls Friday

The Sanderson Eagles will go to Grandfalls for district competition in football on Friday night of this week. They had a night off last Friday.

Grandfalls is expected to be the toughest competition in the district for the Eagles and a good game is promised those who would be able to go to see the fray.

The game will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Coach Don Malone stated that the Eagles were in full strength physically at the time of this writing and hoped that there would be no injuries during the remainder of the practice sessions in hamper the Eagles' chances of coming home with a win.

## Antlerless Deer Permits Nov. 11

Antlerless deer permits will be issued at the courthouse on November 11 to eligible ranchers or landowners. To be eligible for permits, the rancher or landowner must have a surplus of doe deer on his property as determined by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Eligible persons who want permits, but cannot pick them up on the above date should either contact the local wildlife biologist -- Bill Russ, Box 112, Sanderson, phone 345-2954 -- or Game Warden, or designate in writing someone as his agent to act in this matter.

By state law, no permits will be issued after November 19, 1974.

Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday in Terrell County for voting in the general election.

The county commissioners named the polling sites at a recent meeting as follows: Precinct 1 will vote in the county courthouse; Precinct 2 the old store building on the northeast corner of the intersection of Fifth and Pine Streets; Precinct 3 at the elementary school; and Precinct 4 in the band hall. Those voting places are the same as those used in the Democratic Primary in May.

Election judges for the four voting boxes will be James Caroline, Lewis James, Monty Harkins, and Mrs. James Cooper, respectively for Precincts 1 through 4.

A light turn-out of voters for the general election is predicted, judging from the number of absentee votes cast at this writing on Monday.

The office of County Clerk Ruel Adams reported only 45 absentee votes cast at that time.

At the first primary May 5, 310 county residents voted absentee, and in the run-off primary June 5, there were 223 absentee ballots cast.

It is hoped that there will be a sudden interest displayed before the deadline Friday afternoon of this week.

## Rain Last Week Totals 2.65 Inches

Rains during the week past totalled 2.65 inches, according to Ervin Grigsby, keeper of official rain and temperature figures locally.

An earlier shower this month locally left .72-inches in the gauge, totalling 3.37 inches for the month, Grigsby stated.

There was a heavy hail to the west of Sanderson Thursday, and to the east of Sanderson the same day, but no serious damage was reported. The hail was said to have been small, but exceptionally heavy in quantity.

Heavier rains were reported in some parts of the county than were received locally, but there was not serious damage to the country to the same extent as when the prolonged and heavier rains came in September.

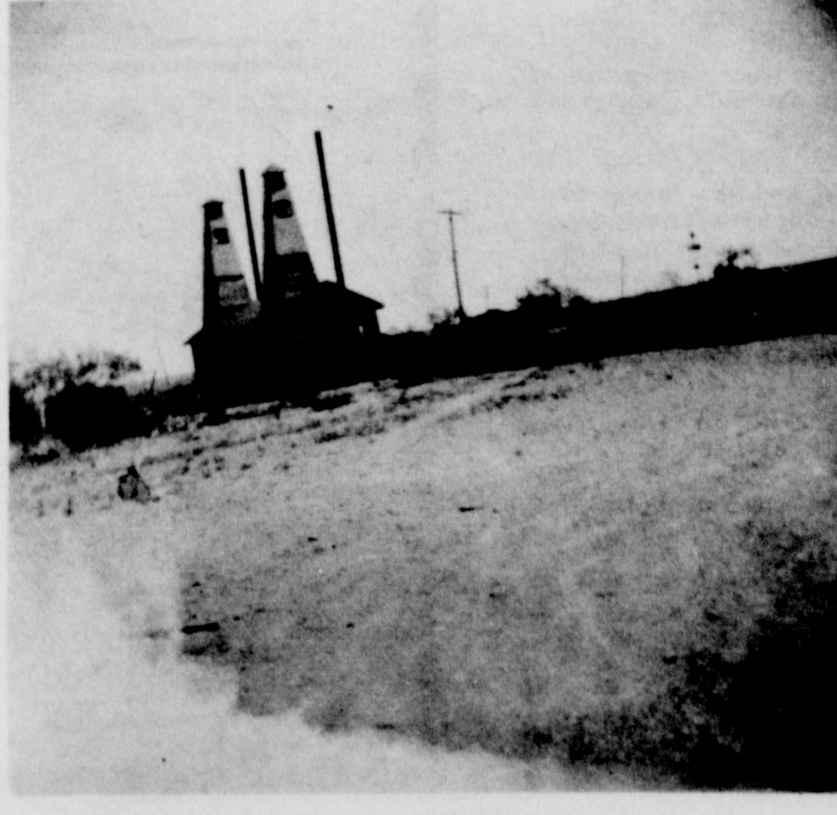
The amounts of rainfall during the past week were: Tuesday 1.84, Wednesday .68, Thursday .13. The figures include rainfall of 24 hours, but are taken at 8:00 a.m. each day.

filled beyond their capacity, and when it jumps out of these ditches, it takes off again to the southeast part of town.

It's interesting to watch the flow of water after a local rain.

We continue to read in area papers about other towns in our area who get government grants to do this and that in the way of entertainment, recreation, medical improvements, civic improvements, etc., etc. These grants, like other government hand-outs, are for those who qualify for them as long as there's any money in the pot. The failure of Terrell County to get some of those grants does not curtail the expenditure of federal funds by any amount. It means simply that some other community is spending money that might could be spent in Terrell County. And it would be difficult for us to justify a refusal to accept a government hand-out into our left hand, while we are taking more into the right.

If you have a similar idea or an opposing idea why not let someone else know about it. Only when our ideas are expressed will they be heard by any ears.

We don't know that we need a swimming pool in Sanderson, for example. But with a "matching funds" deal, that puts it at half-price, and a lot of entertainment, and a welcome past-time for young people could be the possibility of spending some money wisely. This is not a proposed project, but the idea behind it is a proposal.

**Mitchell Bulls Average \$405**

Depressed beef prices to the cattle man, high feed prices, and other increased costs to livestock producers caused the overall average to be comparatively lower than last year's sale of Polled Hereford bulls by N.M. Mitchell and Son Wednesday of last week, according to information received by The Times. The sale was in the Pecos County Coliseum in Fort Stockton.

An average of about \$405 was received from the sale of 59 bulls auctioned off by Bert and Ruben Reyes, with Henry Elder in charge of the sale. N.M. Mitchell and N. M. Mitchell Jr., who ranch in the north-central part of Terrell County have been breeding Polled Hereford bulls for many years.

Top price for a bull was paid by Bob Buescher of San

Angelo for \$650. Second-highest purchase was by Robert Browning of Brady for \$600. Tony Allen of Ozona bought one for \$550.

The top buyer at the sale was T-Bar Ranch of Ballinger, which bought a total of 13 head for \$4,500. Another top purchaser was Allen, who bought eight head for \$3,525.

Other top buyers were The Perner Ranch of Ozona that bought three head for \$1,070; Earl Ward of Victoria, 4 head for \$1,915; George Bunger of Ozona, 4 head for \$1,300; H.E. Gatlin of Sanderson, 1 bull for \$400; Jack Walker of Mountain Home, 1 bull for \$300; G.K. Mitchell of Sanderson, 1 bull for \$500; and George Lane of Menard, 1 bull for \$450.
