White Angel, Blue Angel altheas the latest Texas Superstar releases

COLLEGE STATION - Two hybrid altheas - Blue Angel and White Angel - have been named the latest Texas Superstars for characteristics that make them a top option for landscape lovers.

Blue Angel is a vigorous growing shrub to small tree with an extended blooming season featuring beautiful single blue, broadly trumpet-shaped flowers. The variety crosses Bluebird and Diane altheas.

White Angel althea combines Diane and Rose-of-Sharon shrub hibiscus and provides similar garden characteristics but features a larger final size and numerous clean white

Texas Superstar is a registered trademark owned by AgriLife Research, a state agency that is part of the Texas A&M University System. Plants are designated Texas Superstars by the Texas Superstar executive board, which is made up of nine AgriLife Research, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and Texas Tech University horticulturalists.

To be designated a Texas Superstar, a plant must not only be beautiful but perform well for consumers and growers throughout the state. Texas Superstars must be easy to propagate, which should ensure the plants are not only widely available but also reasonably priced, said Dr. Mike Arnold, Texas A&M

AgriLife Research landscape horticulturist, College Station.

"There are several characteristics that make these cultivars a better choice than other altheas," he said. "Aside from the exotic look, the flowers have unique colors. The stone blue is vibrant, and the white is a good, crisp, clear white. These are resilient plants with prolific flowering and high output over a long period of time, which makes these varieties a good choice."

Both cultivars offer tough, versatile plants with reliable and attractive warm-season flowers, Arnold said. They grow as erect woody deciduous shrubs or small trees, and both varieties perform best in full sun or light afternoon shade, he said. Shady locations tend to reduce flower production.

Blue Angel is somewhat smaller than the typical species type, maturing at 6-8 feet after several years. Plants eventually form upright oval to vase-shaped habits with a spread equal to or often less than their height.

"The Blue Angel is more compact with a nicer, denser canopy than other altheas while the White Angel is similarly dense but larger," Arnold said. "It's good for in most settings, especially urban landscapes, and is a relatively foolproof variety for any home-

Both varieties can be planted as bare-root plants in early winter, or container-grown or balled-and-burlapped plants year-round, he

The plants need well-drained soils, Arnold said. Plants are well-adapted to a range of soil pH but may occasionally require iron chelate in very high pH soils.

These plants respond favorably to good fertility, but can persist in low to moderate fertility soils, he said. They are moderately drought tolerant and low maintenance once established.

Blue Angel and White Angel can be incorporated in landscapes as a general-purpose deciduous shrub, warm-season accent, limbed up as a small tree, or grown in large landscape containers. Flowers provide ecosystem services as pollinator and hummingbird attractants and are sometimes employed as cut flowers for floral arrangements.

Insufficient winter chilling can sometimes reduce or delay budbreak in warmer parts of Zone 9. Homeowners could experience light

aphid infestations, but they can be controlled by spraying plants with a strong stream of water.

"Aphids can be a problem as with any hibiscus, but can be dealt with without pesticides," Arnold said. "Other than that, Blue and White Angel altheas are two great choices for any landscape. The plants are tough once they are established. The flowers are vibrant and are great attractors of butterflies and other pollinators, and the varieties aren't aggressive invasive growers so they don't require much maintenance."



May 25, 2017

The Friona Independent School District Board of Trustees held a special session on Friday, May 19, 2017 at 7 a.m. address a short agenda that included the resignation of President Ricky Barnett and the appointment of new members and officers. The Board heard from Director of Technology Darla Hutchins concerning bids taken for a new phone system for the district. After a lengthy discussion, the item was tabled until the representatives for the two bids that were received could make a presentation to the board. The board voted to accept the resignation of Ricky Barnett from the Board of Trustees after a letter written by Barnett was read by FISD Superintendent Dr. Pam Ray to the assembled group. Corbin Riethmayer was accepted by the board to finish out Barnett's term of one year. A special election will be held in May of 2018 for a one-year term. The regular election will be held in May of 2019 when a three-year term becomes available. Wade Schueler, Jamie Lewellen and Corbin

Riethmayer were sworn in as new members of the board. The oath of office was administered by Imelda Saucedo, Superintendent Secretary. The board elected Becky Riethmayer as the new president of the board. Andy Montana was elected the vice president and Jason Rector will take over the secretary duties. After a brief discussion the meeting was adjourned. The FISD Board of Trustees will meet in regular session on Monday, June 12, 2017 at 7 p.m. in the administration building boardroom. All meetings are open to the public.

May 24, 1997 The ninth annual "Drugfree, Alcohol-free" all night party for members of Friona High School's 1997 senior class will be held following the graduation exercises on Saturday. A number of activities are planned by the senior parents. The party will be held at the FHS gymnasium and cafeteria. Among the activities for class members are a Karoake (music) contest, volleyball matches, three-on-three basketball competition, a putting green contest with the contestant making the most hole in one getting a prize, and pingpong. Casino games will also be held in the cafeteria, and there will be plenty of eats and snacks. Special T-shirts are being prepared, and every class member who stays the entire night at the party will be awarded. The special graduation party has grown each year since its inception in 1989, and a large percentage of the graduates participate in the party. "I think every member of the class is planning to attend," said Pam Kendrick a class sponsor. Drawings will be held about every 15 minutes for merchandise donated by local and area businesses. Class members earn points in each of the games andactivities, which they use to purchase the donated prizes and/or merchandise in a special auction at the conclusion of the party. Some of the things which will be awarded include "date packs," which

includes coupons for gas and entertainment (movies, etc.) "I think we'll have enough merchandise and coupons so that every class member can be awarded one of the datepacks," said Reta Martin, class parent spokesman. "Once again we had excellent participation by the local and area businesses. We appreciate this support," Mrs. Martin said. The activity was started in order to give the graduates a fun party following their graduation, that would insure a "safe" night of activities on this special night. The party concludes with a breakfast for all of the grads at the cafeteria.

May 30, 1987

The Friona area has been buffeted with severe weather during the past week, which included a brush with tornado clouds and severe hail. For the week, the city received a total of 2.75 inch of rainfall. Added to the rain which had been received during the previous week, most of the farmland, gardens and yards in the area have received a generous watering. On the "down" side of the weather story was the damage to crops, roofs and vehicles due to the bad hailstorm of Sunday afternoon, May 24. Marble to golf ball sized hail pelted the city and parts of the area that afternoon, and a deluge dropped .75 inch of rain during the period. Friday night's measurement in Friona was 1.37 inches. Farmers reported damage to wheat crops, especially in the Rhea area and in the state line vicinity. Some young cotton also has been damaged and replanting will be necessary in some cases. Floyd Reeve said that the hail stripped up his young corn crop somewhat, but he thought the plants would bounce back. " All in all, the rain we have re-

ceived has been real benefi-

cial. Most of it has fallen just about right," Reeve said. Many of the farmers say they have received around four inches of rain since it started about two weeks ago. For most of the past week, rain has been received virtually on a daily basis. But Tuesday was the most frantic day locally, when a funnel cloud threatened the city. The tornado warning was sounded, and the warning was also broadcast to local cable customers during the noon hour. Ed Lemons, manager of Sutter's Inn on West Highway 60 was one of those spotting the funnel cloud. Lemons said he first saw the trash dumpsters behind the Dairy Queen being rolled along on the ground. He also saw what appeared to be rocks being whirled around in the area between the Dairy Queen and the motel parking lot. Lemon, his wife, and their daughter, Beverly Wagner, looked out a window in the motel's laundry room and saw the funnel dip slightly from the cloud as it passed over the city. The strong wind also was felt at Reeve Chevrolet-Olds, where Glenn E. Reeve, Jr., said some trim was ripped from the top of the building, and it appeared that the wind tried to lift the roof from the building. The biggest loss sustained at the car agency, however, was during Sunday's hailstorm, when a number of new cars were severely damaged. Similar reports were heard from Friona Ford-Mercury, as well as from car owners around town whose vehicles were outside at the time. The Tuesday wind also blew down a fence at the Bill Stephens residence, which is just north of Reeve's. A member of the Hereford Sheriffs Department spotted a funnel which touched down in an open field between Friona and Hereford, causing no damage.

Texans for Healthcare Access Applauds New Law Modernizing Nurse Practitioner and Physician Meeting Requirements

Texans for Healthcare Access today applauded Texas lawmakers for passing HB 278 by Rep. Tom Oliverson, MD, which allows nurse practitioners and their delegating physician to use technology for required monthly meetings, removing an outdated mandate that they meet in person. The bill was signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott and takes effect September 1, 2019.

"Texas currently allows health care providers such as physicians and nurse practitioners to diagnose and treat patients via telehealth by taking advantage of the tremendous efficiencies offered by the internet and other current real-time technologies," said Robert Metzger, President of Texas Nurse Practitioners. "We applaud lawmakers for passing, and Gov. Abbott for signing into law, this common-sense bill that will allow nurse practitioners and physicians to fulfill the monthly meeting requirement using the same technology."

Under Texas law, nurse practitioners are required to enter into delegation agreements with physicians in order to practice. As there is no requirement that the delegating physician live or work in the same community as the nurse practitioner, the requirement that they meet face-to-face at least once per month often results in significant time and travel demands for both the nurse practitioner and the physician, particularly for those serving the most rural

communities in Texas.

Sen. Charles Perry carried the companion bill, SB 311, in the

"Our first priority as health care providers is to spend time caring for patients; allowing for the use of current technology to comply with the monthly-meeting requirement frees up time for nurse practitioners and physicians to do just that," said Metzger.

"Given the need to bring quality health care to more Texans, it's important to cut the red tape that prevents nurse practitioners from practicing to the full extent of their education and training," said AARP Texas Director Bob Jackson. "We sincerely thank Representative Oliverson, Senator Perry, and everyone else who worked to pass House Bill 278."

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

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

Spinach

Although this has become a cliché, I can't help but think of Popeye when I think of eating spinach. I remember watching Popeye cartoons at my Granny Ruth's house with my Aunt Sally. Popeye was one of her favorites. We would sing the theme song together and give a loud, "Toot, Toot" at the end. However, this didn't make me like spinach as a kid. I am not a big fan of wilted spinach, but I have come to enjoy fresh spinach in a salad. As you will notice in this week's recipes, bacon also makes spinach better.

Spinach, like our last few vegetables, is best grown during the cool, wet months of spring. The three most popular varieties are Savoy, Semi-savoy, and flat/ smooth leaf. California is the number one grower of spinach in the U.S. Other

states that grow spinach include Texas, Arizona, New Jersey, Colorado, Maryland, and Arkansas. Alma, Arkansas holds an annual spinach festival in April. Alma boasts to be the "spinach capital of the world," but so does Crystal City, Texas, where they erected a statue of Popeye the Sailor in 1937. In the 1930's the spinach producers gave credit to Popeye for a 33% increase in spinach consumption. In 2005, the national yield of commercial spinach was 350, 000 tons. However, the U.S. is only the second largest spinach producer, growing only 3% of the spinach in the world. China comes in first at 85%.

Spinach is native to Persia or modern-day Iran. It was introduced to China in the 7th century and brought to Europe in the 12th century. It showed up in the United

States in 1806. Catherine de Medici loved spinach and brought this love to France when she married the King of France. Because of her love of this vegetable, French dishes that include spinach are often called Florentine after the name of Florence, Italy where Catherine was born.

Spinach is full of vitamins and nutrients including vitamin A, vitamin C, vitamin K1, folic acid, iron, and calcium. It also contains fiber and other plant compounds such as lutein, kaempferol, nitrates, quercetin, and zeaxanthin. As a side note, if you are prone to kidney stones, you should avoid spinach. Also, the high vitamin K1 can cause a problem for those on blood thinners.

Shrimp and Spinach Salad with Hot Bacon Dressing

Ingredients

- 1-1/2 pounds uncooked shrimp (31-40 per pound), peeled and deveined
- 1 teaspoon Montreal steak seasoning
- 4 bacon strips, chopped
- 1 shallot, finely chopped
- 1/3 cup cider vinegar 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 package (10 ounces) fresh spinach
- 3/4 cup roasted sweet red peppers
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds

Sprinkle shrimp with steak seasoning. On four metal or soaked wooden skewers, thread shrimp. Grill, covered, over medium heat or broil 4 in. from heat until shrimp turn pink, 2-3 minutes on each side. Meanwhile, in a large skillet, cook bacon over medium heat until crisp, stirring occasionally. Remove with a slotted spoon; drain on paper towels. Discard all but 1 tablespoon drippings. Add shallot; cook and stir over medium heat until tender. 1-2 minutes. Stir in next six ingredients; bring to a boil. Remove from heat. In a large serving bowl, combine spinach and dressing; toss to coat. Layer with shrimp and pepper slices; top with cooked bacon and almonds.

- 1 1/2 cups heavy cream Salt and pepper
- 2 cups chopped fresh baby spinach, packed
- 1-pound bacon, cooked and crumbled
- 1 1/2 cups shredded Swiss cheese
- 1 (9-inch) refrigerated pie crust, fitted to a 9-inch glass pie plate

Directions

Preheat the oven to 3750 F. Combine the eggs, cream, salt, and pepper in a food processor or blender. Layer the spinach, bacon, and cheese in the bottom of the pie crust, then pour the egg mixture on top. Bake for 35 to 45 minutes until the egg mixture is set. Cut into 8 wedges.

I don't know why you have to use a blender to mix the eggs. Just be sure to thoroughly break up all the egg yolks with a whisk. I also think you could use ham instead of bacon and add ingredients you have on hand such as mushrooms.

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State Capital Highlights

Top officials say state's top issues are resolved

AUSTIN — With the governor's mansion as their backdrop, Gov. Greg Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and House Speaker Dennis Bonnen on May 23 announced their agreement on the Texas Legislature's state budget, property tax reform and school finance reform bills.

Standing behind the state's top three elected officials in the press conference were members of three House and Senate conference committees tasked with smoothing out the sticking points in House Bill 1, the state budget; Senate Bill 2, property tax reform; and House Bill 3, school finance reform.

Abbott spoke first, saying the assertion that he, Patrick and Bonnen made in January at the beginning of the legislation session that together they would decrease property taxes and improve public school finance - is now accomplished. "I'm proud to tell you, today, we are announcing that we've done exactly that," Abbott said.

Patrick, using a football analogy, said, "We have a touchdown, and we have had the Super Bowl of legislative sessions in the history of this state, and I think in the history of the country: transformational ideas in education which take us to number one in the country."

"This bill resolves eq-Bonnen uity," added. "It ensures that all students, whether they're in a wealthy district or a poor district or a rural district or an urban district, they will know that Texas leaders care about the quality and the funding of their education."

Meanwhile, House and Senate members must seal the deal by giving final passage to those bills in the few remaining days of the session ending May 27.

Abbott, Patrick and Bonnen agreed that Texas homeowners can expect to see a total reduction in local school property taxes topping \$5 billion, an average reduction of 13 cents per \$100 valuation by 2021 and additional tax relief in years going forward. They also will see a reduction in recapture, or "Robin Hood" — the distribution of funds from property-rich to property-poor districts — and increases to the state share of education funding by 7 percent, up to a total of 45 percent.

Patrick added that new property tax rollback rate reductions are part of the tax relief package, decreasing to 2.5 percent for school districts and 3.5 percent for cities and counties.

HB 3 would put an estimated \$4.5 billion more into classroom programs, including free full-day prekindergarten classes for economically disadvantaged students as well as more resources to improve reading outcomes among these students by the end of 3rd grade. The legislation also would add an optional month of classes in July for low-income students who wish to participate. Furthermore, all schools will see more money per student through an increase in the principal variable in the school finance formula system, the basic allot-

On the topic of teacher pay, Patrick said the average teacher in Texas will see an increase in compensation of about \$4,000, with more possible through merit pay and other incentives, such as participation in the July term or mentoring other teachers. School librarians, nurses and counselors also would see a pay raise and retired teachers would get an actuarially sound pension fund and a bonus check next year, on average, of \$2,000.

Senate approves CBD bill

More Texans could be prescribed a cannabis derivative to treat certain disorders under HB 3703, a bill approved by the Senate on May 22.

Therapeutic use of cannabidiol (CBD) oil was first allowed in Texas under a bill passed two sessions ago, but could only for the treatment of a particular seizure disorder that resists standard treatments. In the four years since the law passed, it has proved its effectiveness, said sponsor and New Braunfels Senator Donna Campbell.

"For patients participating in this program, they have had a remarkable and life-altering change because of this," Campbell said. "That's compassion."

State resources on standby

Gov. Abbott on May 20 placed emergency resources on standby across the state in preparation for an outbreak of severe weather.

Put in readiness mode were ambulance strike teams, medical incident support teams, saw teams, game wardens, boat teams and more.

Abbott cautioned Texans that when severe storms threaten, the safest place to be is indoors. He added that residents should avoid areas already flooded and avoid any fast-flowing wa-

Dangerous waters, he said, can seem deceptively calm and if you encounter flooding, move to higher ground.

Texas Junior Anglers: It's all about family for participants, organizers

The recent Texas Junior Anglers fishing day May 18 at Josserand Aquatic Park Pond in Hereford was truly a family event on all sorts of levels.

There were close to 200 registered folks participatingkids, Moms, Dads, grandmas, grandpas, uncles and aunts, brothers and sisters, all helping those 16 and under to have a good time trying to catch a channel catfish.

Then, you consider all of the other folks who were making it go. A whole mass of City of Hereford employees, Texas Junior Anglers officials and volunteers.

Jeff Scott of Arlington, executive director of Texas Junior Anglers, has been making the drive to Hereford for spring and fall fishing events for 25 years now.

"Hereford's fishing event for kids is the longest running in the whole Texas Junior Anglers program, and we do 40 communities, large and small, across Texas. I love seeing the look of happiness, the smiles on the faces of kids catching fish at our events. Here in Hereford, kids that fished with us when I first started with TJA are now bringing their own kids to fish. That's not only gratifying to see, but you feel like they are a part of our TJA family," said Scott.

That TJA family encompasses a wide circle, just in those who do the planning and the paperwork, the participant registration, the rigging of rods and dispensing of tackle and bait at Hereford and in neighboring Friona, which customarily has its TJA events the same weekend as Hereford.

All told, Scott and the inner circle of volunteers/helpers, including Hereford residents who simply walk up and lend a hand with TJA in Hereford/ Friona have a cumulative total of nearly 80 years of involvement with the program.

"I've got 25 years and Sylvia Mendoza of Hereford has been helping for 25 years. Her son was a winner the first year I was involved here—he's 24 now, and Sylvia's granddaughter Jaybree Mendoza who is 5 fished for the first time last year and won a trophy for first in her age group. She fished with us again this year," said Scott.

Scott's hunting and fishing amigo Jason Smart of the Arlington area has been coming to Hereford and Friona for the past 10 years. Friona resident Glendel Jones has been driving over to Hereford to help with its Saturday event, then doubling up to help with the Sunday Friona event for the past decade.

"I started out with Junior Anglers while still a City of Friona employee. You meet many friends over the years untangling rods,

hooks and weights, handing out tackle and bait and fishing advice," said Jones as he busily untangled a rat's nest of snarled line in a couple of rods and reels.

"My pickup knows the way to Hereford and Friona by heart," says Scott. "I put on 30,000 miles a year traveling to TJA events—we do 40 events a year all over the state. We have events in Lubbock and Muleshoe on the schedule and the weekend after that we're in Port Arthur—that's a long haul. The Hereford and Friona events always fall the weekend after Mother's Day in the spring, and the weekend after Labor Day in the fall," he said.

How did a fellow like Scott end up dragging a trailer filled with 200 fishing rods bound in 15-rod and reel bundles with zip ties, assorted tables, prizes, tackle boxes, bait and gear all over the state most every weekend of the year?

"A buddy of mine who was a high school friend started with Texas Junior Anglers years ago and I was a volunteer. I got drawn in and ended up running the thing," says Scott.

Most of the fishing days involve lining up contracts for the TJA event, coordinating with sponsoring cities to see that catfish for stocking are secured, and reloading on award trophies, prizes, and bait and tackle that are provided free to Texas Junior Angler

participants.

"Nearly all of the TJA events in Texas get their fish to stock from a hatchery in Oklahoma. The Muleshoe event gets their fish from a federal fish hatchery," Scott explains.

The City of Hereford, sponsor for TJA locally, customarily stocks 1,000 pounds of channel catfish for both its spring and fall events—literally a ton of fish in the course of a year.

Scott is thrilled that kids 16 and under get first shot at angling for the stocked fish for the Hereford event.

"These events remind me of my childhood growing up. Weekends we were either out hunting or fishing, or we ended up working, so I figured out pretty quickly it was better to be out hunting and fishing as much as I could," Scott said with a sly grin.

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

Big Innovations in a Small Way

Nanotechnology company making a worldwide mark at WT

Benton Allen, like three other engineering graduate students and one West Texas A&M University dean, is thinking small. No, smaller than that.

No, really small. Like one billionth of a meter, or 1/25.4 millionth of an inch small. It's called nanotechnology, which is the ability to control atoms and molecules, which are, you know, small.

"It's really hard to put into perspective how small we're talking about," Allen said. But a sheet of a newspaper is 100,000 nanometers thick.

But in thinking small, this group that has formed the startup company BTG Products is thinking big. They are discovering solutions that are impacting the oil and gas industry as well as everyday life.

"The material we're developing is being used all over the world," said Dr. Emily Hunt, dean of engineering and professor of mechanical engineering. "Their motivation is not just to make something do something, but it's truly to make something to help people and improve people's quality of life. I work with incredible people and incredible engineers. The work they have already done in their short careers is really unbelievable."

Or as Allen said, "There's some amazing things going on in Canyon, Texas." One, in particular, he points to is BTG Products, short for Buffalo Technology Group.

Allen, a 2011 Randall High School graduate, is one of 27 in the master's program in the school of engineering. He will be the second at WT to receive his master's in August. The first was this month, Paige Earl-Dodge.

Those two, along with fellow WT grad student Nikolay Essani and Trent Kelly, a Ph.D. student in industrial engineering at Texas Tech University, are working under the tutelage of Hunt in their 19-month-old startup company that is focused on nanotechnology.

"What we're doing is using really, really small particles to create new materials," Allen said, "and we're using them to combat harmful microorganisms – bacteria, viruses, fungi."

Hunt, who came to WT in 2003, was a graduate student at Texas Tech under Dr. Michelle Pantoya, a pioneer in nanotechnology with weapon systems and energetics.

Later, at WT, a Department of Defense grant allowed Hunt to pursue nanotechnology experimentation in combating anthrax and other bioterrorism gases. There were breakthroughs that

the DOD used in some gas masks.

After the grant, WT maintained ownership and could commercialize any inventions. In a way, that led to the formation of BTG Products.

"My perspective is in the area of material science," Hunt said, "and so what nano has done for us is reinvent material properties. The material in the past you might use in just one way you can now create and build the kind of material you want. It's really opening up a new field of science and engineering."

BTG is making an impact most in the oil and gas industry as well as paint material that prevents mold.

Oil producers in horizontal drilling face problems with bacteria in pipes, Hunt said, especially when they come in contact with the natural environment of soil and water. The bacteria causes corrosion in pipes.

"So our material acts as a protective barrier," she said, "so the bacteria won't build in one place."

BTG coded similar material for offshore oil platforms and drilling to prevent marine life and biofilm from causing corrosion and blockage as well preventing larger ocean life from attaching to the platform.

One of the products BTG produced is for consumers. Paint Guard, available on Amazon, can be put in paint that prevents mold from growing on the surface. Mold became a serious issue inside damaged homes when Hurricane Harvey trigged catastrophic flooding in the Houston area in 2017.

"The hope is with these innovations is to develop materials that will help with more efficient, safer, higher quality of life," Allen said. "That's our drive at BTG, but on a smaller scale – like preventing bacteria from harming people and keeping costs down on buying gasoline."

Frontier Capital Group of Dimmitt is BTG's venture capital supporter. The WT Enterprise Center has supported the company's commercialization efforts through the Enterprize Challenge.

While their work has taken them to places as far away as Shanghai, BTG's focus is regionally. From there, its impact has spread.

"The material we've developed in the oil and gas industry is being used all over the world," Hunt said, "but it began right here in this area and the Permian Basin. Dr. Wendler (president of WT) talks about meeting regional needs and taking that to the rest of the world and that's exactly what's happened here. Essentially reaching out to meet regional needs is having an impact all over the world."

That's noteworthy for a department of engineering that is just more than 15 years old and just this year is graduating its first master's students.

"When I graduated from Randall, I wanted to go anywhere but WT," Allen said. "I thought staying in my hometown was the worst thing I could do for my personal growth. But I remember a conversation with my dad who said, 'If WT was 100 miles away, you'd go in a heartbeat.' That's some of the best advice I ever got.


"The professors are not scared to pour themselves into their students. They're talented researchers, but they're really good people who care about students. The way Dr. Hunt has built this program has been exceptional. There's some really cool groundbreaking things happening here right now."
