## STAR Lites by Bill Ellis

The front page photo of Mrs. Florence Sonntag in a recent issue of the WOODWARD COUNTY JOURNAL of Woodward, Okla., is our idea of a dramatic news-picture in these days when everyone everywhere is fretting over descending water tables and we read that the world must soon find a practical means of converting seawater into fresh if its various populations are to survive.

Mrs. Sonntag, a grandmotherly type, pioneer resident of northwest Oklahoma, is shown holding the forked ends of a willow stick and walking intently over a bare field.

As Reporter Robert E. Lee describes the scene:

"She grasped the forked stick in both hands, palms up. The butt of the stick stood out from her hands horizontal to the ground.

"She appeared intensely absorbed in the work as she started forward, one slow step after another. She stared straight ahead, much as if she was daydreaming.

"Suddenly, the stick swung down - so violently that the butt end slapped her skirt.

"There's a water vein right here," she announced. "A strong one. I can't even force the stick back up." She appeared to be fighting the forked stick. The muscles in both hands strained to pull the stick from its downward position, while some unseen force - like a pair of invisible hands - pulled it down. . . ."

Fascinated by this experience Mr. Lee made an extensive study of "water-witching," reading books both "pro" and "con" on the subject and discussing it with all who might have experience or worthy opinions. "There is," he concluded, "no middle-of-the-road thought on water-witching. Either you believe in it or you don't."

Mrs. Sonntag discovered her powers in 1932, reports Mr. Lee, when another "water-witcher" offered her his divining rod and told her to try it. Since then, the story says, she has brought in 35 to 40 wells - with no misses. In one case, a well-driller found it inconvenient to drill over her peg and set up his rig four feet away, only to dig a dry hole. Moving over to the stake, he produced a well that today, years later, is still flowing.

Mr. Lee says that most of the US water - witching is done in New England these days, where it is called "dowsing." He quotes Kenneth Phillips as the "Down East" authority on the subject:

"The man who sneers at the dowsing rod today would have scoffed, 50 years ago, at radio, television and jet planes that travel at supersonic speeds."

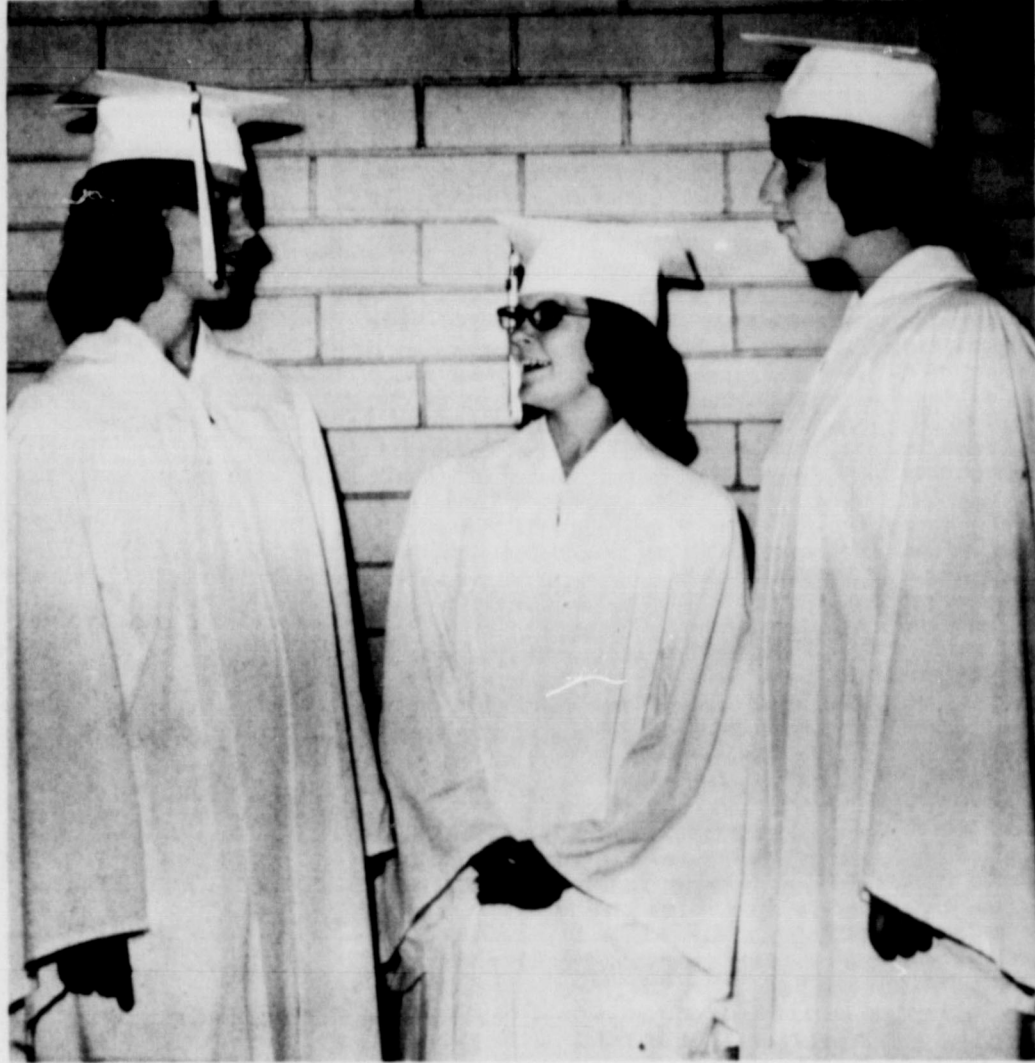

## Friona's Little League Starts Season Monday

## Single Service To Mark Memorial Day

Special Memorial Day services will be held in Friona Sunday morning, with a change from the usual routine for the observance, due to the holiday falling on Sunday.

Contrary to the practice of the past several years, there will be just the one service, and it will be at the Friona Cemetery beginning at 7 a.m. Previously there had also been a service at the City Park in downtown Friona.

Delivering the Memorial Day message at the 7 a.m. services at the cemetery will be Rev. Jake Armstrong, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church.

A highlight of the service will be the placing of a special wreath by the "Gold Star Mother," who will be Mrs. E.E. Taylor. Rev. Paul Mohr will deliver the invocation and will also give the "roll call of the dead."

Friona Feed Yards, Inc. was a major attraction on the first day of a three-day tour of the West Texas-Eastern New Mexico area beginning Monday by a group of Englishmen who are members of the Institute of Corn and Agricultural Merchants, Limited.

The 16 men, all users or potential users of area grain sorghum in feeds manufactured by their plants in the United Kingdom, arrived in Amarillo on Sunday. Hosts for the tour were the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

The group was given a tour of Friona's 18,000-capacity feed lot, which opened in 1963, by manager Jack Carrothers. The Friona lot was a "natural" for the tour, as it uses grain sorghum exclusively in its feeding program.

After a bus tour of the lot, the men were permitted to inspect the lot's modern feed mill and other facilities at their discretion.

One of the visitors, John Hamlin of Devonshire, a feed

manufacturer, commented on the vastness of the area the group was touring. "We have much of the same things in England that you have here, but there is so much more of it in Texas."

Prior to the Friona stop, the group had visited the neighboring Hereford Feed Yards, then visited a grain-cotton-vegetable farm to observe machinery, irrigation and farming practices.

Other points visited in Parmer County were the Security State Bank of Farwell, where they received a discussion on farm credit and banking services.

They then toured the Shirley - Anderson - Pitman Grain Company to see how grain is received, handled and stored in a commercial facility.

The men were guests at a reception and dinner at the West Texas Country Elevator Association Monday evening at Clovis' Holiday Inn.

After spending Monday night at Clovis, the group toured the Lucerne Milk processing plant, the Swift beef slaughtering plant and Worley Feed Mills, where they saw steam-rolled milo, cattle, poultry and sheep feeds processed and merchandising.

Tuesday afternoon they visited the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, and observed cotton grain sorghum, soybeans and corn production research, witnessed a slide film presentation and a field and laboratory tour.

The three-day tour was to wind up with a visit to the Paymaster Feed Mills in Amarillo. The group was to leave for Dallas at 4:15 p. m. Wednesday.

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association has been instrumental in raising exports of grain sorghum from 20 million bushels in 1956 to 120 million bushels per year at present.

Baker Duggins will once again serve as instructor. Fee is \$15 for the series of 15 lessons. Classes are to begin on Monday, May 31.

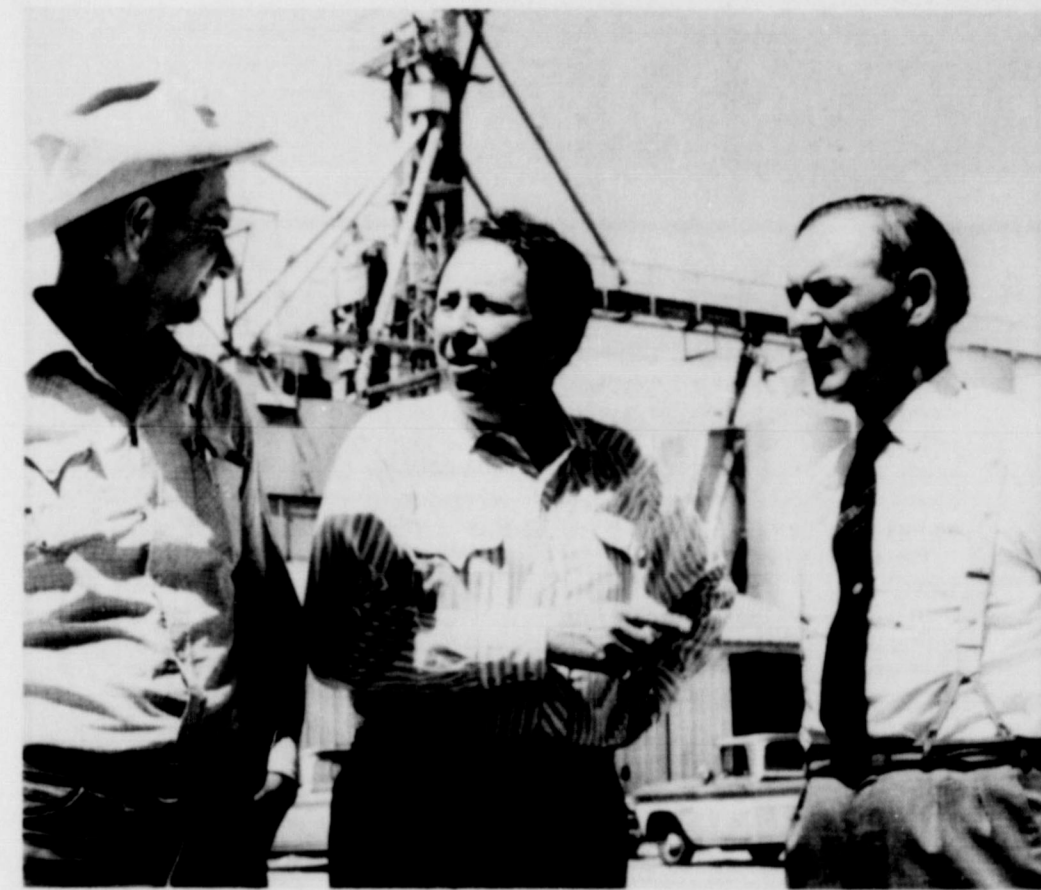
Classes will be offered in beginning swimming, advanced beginning swimming and junior and senior lifesaving.

### "UNCLE JOHN" WHITE

## Pioneer Newspaperman Observes 97th Birthday

J. W. (Uncle John) White quietly observed his 97th birthday on Sunday, May 23. The old gentleman, Friona's pioneer newspaperman, spent a quiet day with his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Flippin, Jr.

White, who up until recent years has remained fairly active despite his advanced age, has made his home with the Flippins for some time now.

"Uncle John" not only claims the role as original editor and publisher of the first permanent newspaper in Friona, but also served as the town's first mayor, and was a civic leader for many years.

White came to Friona from Illinois in 1914. His first job was as a teacher in a country school in Illinois at the age of 16.

"I taught school in the winter time and farmed in the summer," Uncle John recalls. Later he served as a deputy sheriff in Illinois.

In 1925, as secretary to the local Chamber of Commerce, White was instrumental in establishing the Friona Star. In the summer of that year, the Chamber of Commerce set out on a project of establishing a local newspaper.

"Uncle John," as secretary of the organization, was instructed to set out and find an individual or individuals who would be interested in establishing a newspaper in Friona.

White did this, and interviewed several possible applicants. However, he was not satisfied with the prospects, and reported this to the Chamber of Commerce. "I could produce a better newspaper than most of the men I've talked with," White remembers telling the group. (He had had some previous experience in the newspaper business).

Before he knew it, "Uncle John" had talked himself into a job. It was decided that he would produce a newspaper as part of his Chamber of Commerce duties, and all advertising revenues would be given to him as payment for the "extra work."

White's "sideline job" turned out to be pretty steady, and he remained as editor and publisher for the better part of 25 years, seeing the paper through some rocky roads and hard times during the formative years.

He retired as editor in 1950, but continued until recent years to do printing in his small shop on the outskirts of Friona, proclaimed by a sign as "Uncle John's Print Shop."

It was 1929, shortly after Friona was incorporated, that White was elected first mayor of the town. He has also been instrumental in forming the original Chamber of Commerce, along with J. L. Black-

well and Jesse Osborn, and was its first president.

Other positions he held at one time or another in Friona were city tax assessor and collector, and treasurer.

White received his nickname of "Uncle John" during World War II. He received letters from a couple of nephews (Roy Hart and Merle Harry), which he would print in the Star. The letters, naturally, began "Dear Uncle John. . . ."

He mailed papers to the boys overseas, and it wasn't long before other Friona boys began writing to him and calling him "Uncle John." And he printed their letters the same as his real nephews'.

But Alamo or no Alamo, we find living proof of this contention in the fact that Gov. John Connally recently sent us a free package of Bluebonnet seeds with the following instructions:

"Plant now. Today, you plant the seeds symbolic of a rich and bountiful heritage to reap the bright new blossoms of tomorrow's future."

The big trouble is that bluebonnets just plain won't grow in this area, according to all of the green thumb experts. In fact, they do not respond very well even in flower boxes -- and our cold weather eliminates them annually. Despite this situation, the bluebonnet remains Texas' state flower; a symbol of Texas unity. Dandelions, on the other hand, seem to flourish all over our part of the country.

If we do not choose to organize our own West Texas, with the dandelion as the state flower and the English sparrow as the state bird, we should at least send sample of our own flora and fauna to Gov. Connally with a request that Texas consider altering its present state symbols to fit the second largest state's entire territory.

Or, better still, they could put up signs in the tax office pointing out that we do not fit into the scheme of things and, consequently, they are remitting our state taxes.

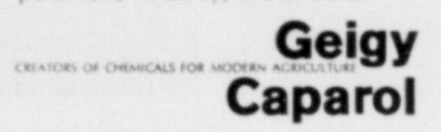

You can adjust the width, come as close as you want to the crop (almost overlap, if you wish), roll over crops up to 14 inches high. These are adjusted to throw dirt away from the crop; turn them the opposite angle and they'll throw toward it.



Some folks have made the mistake of mounting the spiders the wrong way, being used to ordinary cultivators that simply "finger" the ground. Actually, the spider turns the opposite way, "backhanded," you might call it. Instead of just picking the soil, it slices through and displaces the dirt as it rolls. There's never been any cultivating action even nearly as effective as this.

## Library Begins Third Year Of Operation

Mrs. Ross Ayers, chairman of Modern Study Club's library committee, this week announced the summer schedule for the Friona Public Library.

School-age children are asked to register for the library's reading program, which will be held from June 1 through July 31. The students must read at least 12 books in the program to earn a certificate from the Texas State Library.

"We are encouraging students to read for fun and recreation during the summer months," stated Mrs. Ayers.

The library will once again sponsor a "story hour," details of which will be announced later. Mrs. Billy Mercer of the Progressive Study Club is chairman of the story hour project.

Several teen-age girls are assisting the club ladies with the library work during the summer. Four girls, Myrtle Latham, Susie Carmichael, Darlene Wilson and Gay Wyly, will use the library work as the "community service" requirement in their application for Future Homemakers of American state degrees next school term.

Also helping out with the library work during the summer will be Crista Evans and Ann Ayers. The girls will serve as assistants. They will check books out and in, as well as shelve returned books and help out in other capacities as they are needed.

The library, entering its third summer of operation, is to receive 100 new books from the Texas State Library, and in addition will have 50 to 75 additional books on loan from the TSL's bookmobile after it makes a special stop in Friona today.

The library is located in the Friona Women's Clubhouse, at Ninth and Pierce Streets.

Since the establishment of the library, some 1200 books have been donated and 500 have been loaned by the Texas State Library and Bookmobile. During the past year 230 people have registered as readers.

An estimated 1047 readers checked out 2520 books. Volun-

teer workers have spent 450 hours checking out books, conducting story hours, etc., and 285 hours have been spent cataloging the library. A total of 52 children received certificates for reading a minimum of 12 books during the summer.

The library lists as its purpose "To foster informative, recreational and educational library opportunities for our community."

### COUNTY AGENT SAYS

## Youth Must Prepare For Keen Job Competition

Rural youths must prepare themselves educationally for stronger job competition in the future regardless of whether they plan a career on the farm or in town, says County Agent Joe VanZandt.

Both on-farm and off-farm opportunities will be available for youths with the necessary background and training, but for those poorly prepared, the going will be rough, he predicts.

The county agent says that rural youth often face a double problem in securing a job, since they frequently must leave the farm and make a social adjustment to city life.

Nationally, an estimated 65 to 85 per cent of rural boys and girls must leave the farm. The off-farm movement will be made necessary for two reasons. First, there are many more farm boys than are needed to replace their fathers.

Secondly, output per farm worker, which has been climbing at about six per cent annually, is expected to continue increasing. If this occurs, farms will become fewer, larger, more mechanized.

Coupled with this competition on the farm, will be competition for jobs in urban centers. Economists estimate that 26 million people will join the U.S. labor force in the decade ending in 1970.

Acute employment problems already have developed in the creation of new jobs in the face of automation, as well as in providing training necessary for new workers to fill new jobs.

Along with unemployment there is often a shortage of adequately trained workers. Therefore, it is the preparation that rural youths receive now that will determine whether they end up among the unemployed or find satisfactory jobs in the future.

## At Home In Parker County

### SENIOR CITIZENS MONTH

President Johnson has designated May as Senior Citizen month with this year's theme "Community Action for Older Americans".

As part of the U. S. Department of Agriculture the State Extension Service, through their County Agents has played a vital role in helping senior citizens the year round through technical assistance, research and educational services.

Studies conducted by scientist in food research has made information available to older people through County Extension offices.

Here are some facts pointed out through recent studies of food and nutrition for older people.

Older people - one out of two need better diets.

Overweight, inadequate diets and inappropriate use of extra vitamins are some of the major diet problems of older people. Calcium and vitamin C were most often found short in diets and about one-third were overweight-more women were overweight than men.

What does this mean? It is this - Senior citizens need fewer calories even the nutrients requirements remains the same.

Let us look at some nutrients found inadequate in older peoples diets (and many younger ones too).

First - Lack of Vitamin C in diets - (ascorbic acid) can result in: Tooth decay, bone-changes, bleeding and sore gums, weak blood vessel walls that break down, pains and swelling in joints and limbs and slow healing of wounds.

The other nutrient found lacking in diets - Calcium. This is highly important in maintaining good health. Here is why calcium is needed: It is essential for clotting of blood, the control of the passage of fluids through the cells walls,

the right proportion of calcium in the blood is responsible for alternate contraction and relaxation of the heart muscle. Also, the irritability of the nerves is increased when the amount of calcium in the blood is below normal.

A good slogan for anyone to adopt especially the senior citizens - "Eat, not only to add years to your life, but to add life to your years."

Good health is more than freedom from pain and disease-it means individual efficiency at its peak-being radiant with energy and enthusiasm.

For bulletins now available from our office-free for the asking are: "Getting Enough Milk" and "Food for Older People". Another one is "Food and Your Weight" that is good authoritative information for those with weight problems.

Come by the Home Demonstration Agents office on 2nd floor of the Courthouse in Farwell, and pick up a copy or call 481-3619 and ask for a copy to be mailed to you. Other helps and programs are available to both individuals and groups upon request.

- 1 cup plus 2 tablespns shortening
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 4 cups buttermilk
- 4 cups rolled wheat or oatmeal
- 1 Tablespoon salt
- 5 cups flour
- 1 cup raisins
- 5 teaspoons of soda
- Cream shortening and add sugar and eggs. Beat well. Mix together dry ingredients and raisins. Add alternately with buttermilk. When mixed, this batter may be stored in refrigerator as long as six weeks. Spoon out as much as needed

when you wish to bake them and put the rest back in refrigerator. Bake 15 minutes in 400 degree oven.

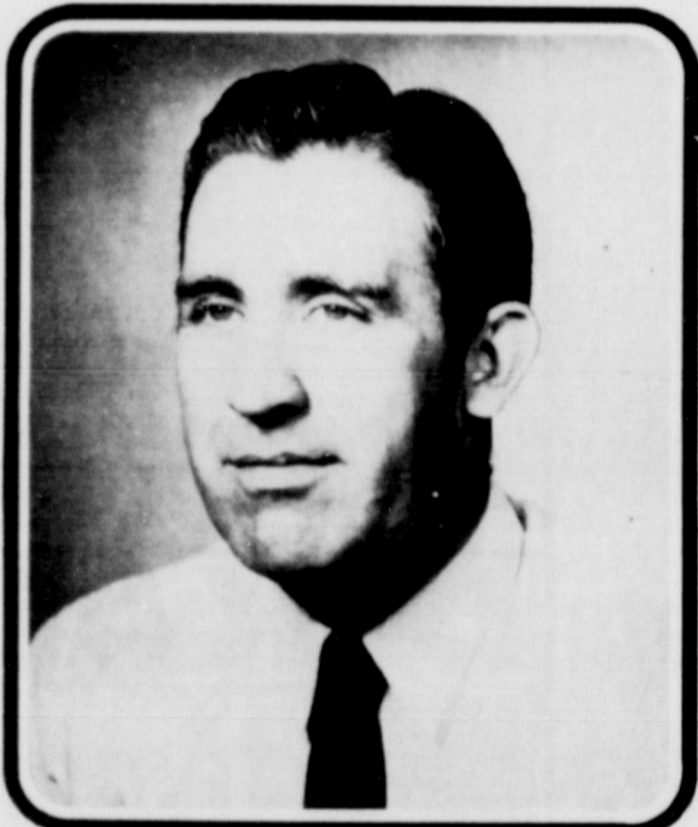

2. If a stranger tries to join in their play.

3. If a stranger talks to them or touches them in the movies.

4. If a stranger tries to make them disobey any of those rules.

ALSO STRESS THESE THINGS:

1. Never take rides from persons you do not know.

2. Never take money, candy or toys from a stranger or let him touch you.

3. Never go with strangers when they ask for directions.

4. Never go with strangers when they offer you a job.

5. Never play around alleys, empty buildings, public rest rooms or secluded places.

6. Take a psi along when you go to movies, playgrounds, stores, etc.

7. Unless told otherwise by your parents, go straight to and from school, and preferably with other children.

8. And finally and most important to the apprehension of would-be molesters: GET THE LICENSE NUMBER OF THE CAR and a description of the person, if possible, scratch the license number on the sidewalk or in the dirt.

These rules should be impressed on your children. In at least one community the instructions paid off in saving a girl from a degenerate. She repelled his advances and wrote down his license number as he drove away. He was later arrested and convicted.

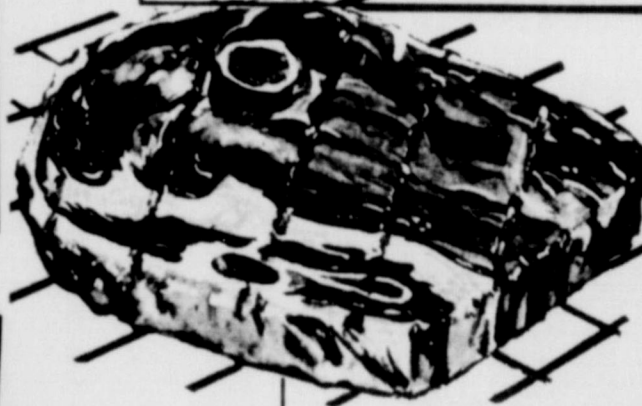
