Secretary Perdue Statement on Farm Safety Week

Washington, D.C. - U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue today applauded President Trump's proclamation making September 15-21, 2019 National Farm Safety and Health Week. The theme for this year's National Farm Safety & Health Week is

"Shift Farm Safety into High Gear" as a reminder that it is everyone's responsibility to prioritize safety on the farm and the rural roadways of

"America's farmers, ranchers and producers work hard to feed our nation and the



world," Secretary Perdue said. "Farming is not always the safest profession and it is our responsibility to continue to improve workplace safety and pursue initiatives that create healthier work environments. They must also have access to innovative technologies and production practices to protect themselves and their employees. President Trump has our farmers backs and this proclamation further demonstrates this issue as one of great importance. Promoting Farm Safety will help our American agriculture workforce to continue producing the healthiest, safest, most af-

fordable, and most abundant food supply on earth." Background: This week

is an opportunity to spread awareness of the inherent risks associated with work in the agriculture sector and commit to improved practices that advance the health and safety of farm and ranch operators, their family members, and their hired workers. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, 581 workers in agriculture and related industries died from a workrelated injury in 2017, making agriculture one of the most dangerous professions in the United States.

Hart honored at **Amarillo Tri-State Fair Shorthorn Show**

The 2019 South Central Regional Shorthorn Show was held September 15, 2019 at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo, Texas. The show was dedicated to Dale Hart who owns Hartsdale Polled Shorthorns in Friona. The South Central region of the American Shorthorn Association includes Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Arkansas and Louisiana. The other shows for the 2019 show season include the Kansas State Fair and the Tulsa State Fair.

Hartsdale Polled Shorthorns started in 1948 with the purchase of one polled Shorthorn heifer for an FFA project in Dale's freshman year of high school. 90% of the present cow herd of 60 mother cows are descendants of this heifer. For many years the herd was maintained at 100 mothers. A severe drought between 2010 and 2013 forced the sale of 60% of the cow herd in 2013. All heifers have been kept since that time for building the herd back up. Cattle have been purchased at the Texas Shorthorn Association sale and the Fortune 500 sale in Oklahoma in recent years.

In the late 70s and early 80s, Hartsdale Polled Shorthorns consigned cattle to the 5-State Shorthorn sale in Guymon, Oklahoma. The Dual Purpose cattle were registered in the American Milking Shorthorn Society as well as the American Shorthorn Association. The Harts exhibited cattle on the county, state, and national level in Texas, Kansas, New Mexico, Colorado and occasionally Arizona. In 2005 and 2006, the Harts exhibited the Grand Champion bull at the National Dual Purpose Shorthorn show in Hutchinson, Kansas with Hartsdale Texas Chess and Hartsdale Texas Big Red. Hartsdale Polled Shorthorns also exhibited the Reserve Champion female at the 2005 show. Some of the herd bulls used in the past include Willbro Harvestor, Ridgeview MM Chief P, QCC Impressive Jax P, Kahoa's Wabash Harvey P and Cherry Plus Chess. Hart has also had some line breeding with homebred bulls with good success.

Dale has been a member of First Baptist Church in Friona for over 75 years, and was a 4-H leader for over 20 years. Dale and his wife Laura of 65 years have four children; Karene Bass and husband Troy of Canyon, Holly Campbell and husband Danny of Friona, Evelyn Romero and husband Joe of Amarillo and Jeremy Hart and wife Marla of Friona. The Harts have 11 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren.





Proposed trade pact could further boost thriving Texas dairy industry

This month I had the opportunity to attend a meeting with U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz of Texas at the Texas Farm Bureau headquarters in Waco. Several commodity groups were represented at this town hall-style meeting and listened to the senator discuss the importance of trade agreements to U.S. agriculture, such as the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA).

The USMCA is expected to be an even greater benefit to Texas agriculture due to our state's proximity to the growing Mexico economy. Sen. Cruz encouraged attendees to have their membership contact Democrats in Congress to ask them to support USMCA because of the Texas agriculture impact.

The Texas dairy industry is poised to increase sales to our southern neighbor with the passage of the USMCA. Mexico already is a large consumer of our dairy products, but there is an opportunity for more sales. With new plants in Texas producing butter, butter powder and milk powder, Texas dairies are positioned to export into the Mexican market for decades to come.

The \$3.5 billion impact the dairy industry has on the Texas omy will continue to grow, as these plants are capable of moving more and more product south across the border.

Sen. Cruz's comments were a vast change from almost three years ago when TAD staff toured Hilmar Cheese and Del Rio Dairy with him to educate him on the dairy industry in Texas. He now has a better understanding of the importance of agriculture to Texas and the U.S. He also understands that agriculture in Texas represents many votes.

TAD has a continuous challenge to educate lawmakers and regulators about the economic impact of the Texas dairy industry.

I encourage those in the Texas dairy industry to contact your congressional representatives and tell them why USMCA is important to your livelihood.

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

From the Friona Star Archives

5 years ago - September 18, 2014

Banuelos attempts Chieftain Challenge -Fernando Banuelos, of Bovina, had a birthday wish to take on the Chieftain Challenge at the Tasty Cream in Friona. He turned 22-yearsold on Saturday, September 6 and celebrated his birthday wish on Wednesday, September 10. Banuelos had an hour to consume the gigantic cheeseburger that contained 5 lbs. of hamburger garnished with cheese, lettuce, tomatoes, onions, pickles on a bun specially made for the challenge at Belmar Bakery in Amarillo. He also had four pounds of French fries to accompany the burger. Overseeing the challenge was the owner of Tasty Cream Janet Hernandez. Banuelos managed to polish off three quarters of the burger before calling a halt to the challenge after 39 minutes.

10 years ago - September 17, 2009

Juveniles cause \$25,000+ in vehicle damage - Using rocks and clubs, a group of juveniles caused an estimated \$25,000 to \$30,000 in damage to several vehicles belonging to Delton Lewellen.

The vehicles, including a recently refurbished travel trailer, were stored in a fenced area behind Lewellen's barn and storage units located on the north side of Highway 60 near the east city limits.

Damage to the travel trailer included breaking all the interior lights, mirrors, and glass cabinet doors as well as exterior glass. A Suburban belonging to Kent Patterson also had all the glass broken. Mr. Patterson is employed by Mr. Lewellen and had stored the Suburban in the lot to fix it up later and use as a hunting vehicle.

Patterson discovered the damage when he returned to the storage yard late Thursday afternoon. Pam Hamilton, Lewellen's daughter, said while she was on the property visiting with Sheriff Randy Geries about the damage, two juveniles came through a hole in the fence and were surprised to find she and the Sheriff there.

At first they claimed to be looking for a ball that came over the fence but soon confessed to participating in the destruction. Names of the three juveniles charged in the case cannot be released due to their ages. They are said to be junior high students. Sheriff Geries said he is still investigating and several other juveniles might be involved.

The three youngsters, two males and one female, accused of trespassing and damaging private property were taken before Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Trey Ellis Friday evening by the Sheriff's office to have their rights and the charges explained. Mrs. Hamilton said a total of nine

vehicles were damaged. The youths pulled back part of the metal fence to enter the storage yard, which constitutes the trespassing

Sheriff Geries said the investigation was helped along when it was discovered the juveniles had videotaped themselves during the destruction.

15 years ago - September 19, 2004

K. Graham Places In Teen Pageant - Krista Shea Graham, the daughter of Ky and Lanis Graham of Friona, was a contestant in the National American Miss Junior Texas Teen Pageant held in Dallas on August 8-9.

Texas A&M-Commerce Brings Quail Back to Texas

California Valley Quail can survive where bobwhite's have perished Experts see return of \$1 billion quail hunting industry

COLLEGE STATION, Texas - Texans usually don't like when Californians move here, but these newcomers are quite a bit different.

Research by a Texas A&M University-Commerce scientist has shown that a species of American quail - the California Valley Quail - will prosper in just about every part of Texas. These hearty birds are expected to attract new hunters and subsequently help steer struggling communities out of tough financial situations.

Dr. Kelly Reyna, professor of wildlife and conservation science at Texas A&M-Commerce, said his research shows that bobwhite quail in Texas have declined by 80 percent in the past 50 years. Bobwhite quail do not fare well in the face of expanding residential areas and increased agriculture. But California Valley Quail are more resilient, and they could replenish Texas' dwindling population of quail.

Texas A&M University System Chancellor John Sharp said Dr. Reyna's research could be the foundation of a renewed quail hunting industry in Texas and the beginning of a steady stream of new money for state and county governments.

"Before I was chancellor, I was the comptroller of Texas, and I know the financial benefits of a robust hunting

industry," Chancellor Sharp said. "Kelly's research may just be the key to bringing back one of my favorite childhood pastimes, while also growing state conservation dollars."

Dr. Reyna's research offers real hope for some parts of the state, especially areas where quail hunting once flourished.

Ted Lyon, a conservationist and a former state senator from East Texas, said bird hunting used to support many Texas communities, and it can again.

"If we could get that back, it would be an economic boon for East Texas, as well as parts of North Texas. It would be great for the state's economy," Sen. Lyon said. "This is probably the most innovative program going on in quail research in the United States."

Wild California Valley Quail that have been introduced in other places have brought with them enormous economic benefits. In Idaho, they helped generate \$135 million in economic activity per year.

In a state the size of Texas, Sen Lyon added, California Valley Quail could bring \$1 billion a year to state coffers.

As part of the research at Texas A&M-Commerce, Dr. Revna and his research team successfully transferred 250 wild California Valley Quail last spring from Idaho to Texas. They fitted many of the birds with radio trackers and located them weekly for monitoring.

Dr. Reyna's research further shows that bobwhite quail are highly susceptible to heat and lack of water. He found that just four days of high heat will significantly reduce the hatching success of bobwhite quail. Increased agriculture and new development also aggravate the problem by reducing the amount of covered areas and habitat, he added.


But the California Valley Quail are much more adaptable than their bobwhite cousins, Dr. Reyna said. Their native range runs from Mexico to the northern United States, and they have a proven ability to survive in a variety of habitats and climates. They also can live in a wide assortment of landscapes from agricultural land to suburban neighborhoods.

California Valley Quail already have been successfully introduced all over the world in areas such as New Zealand, Argentina, Hawaii and British Columbia.

Dr. Reyna said he expects the same positive results in Texas.

"What's really been encouraging about this process is the high survival rate," Dr. Reyna said from a ranch northeast of Dallas. "We've seen that they've done really well out here."

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



Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have fallen 0.4 cents per gallon in the past week to an average of \$2.27 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 8.6 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and 33.7 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$1.92 while the most expensive is \$3.19 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country today stands at \$1.80 while the most expensive is \$4.99 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 0.4 cents per in the last week to an average of \$2.55 per gallon. The national average is down 6.5 cents per gallon from a month ago, and stands 28.9 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"While gas prices have drifted lower for the ninth straight week, all eyes now turn to Saudi Arabia after an attack that knocked out over 5% of global oil production and how oil prices are likely to jump as a result," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for Gas-Buddy. "While there is some good news that motorists should not expect a sudden and major uptick in gas prices, there may be a minor impact beginning mid-week and continuing until Saudi Arabia's state-owned oil company, Aramco, is able to restore all production. However, even after oil production levels return to normal, there is an undeniable factor that will now forever impact oil prices- and that is that Saudi Arabia's reliability and stability is no longer guaranteed, and this missile strike is evidence that perhaps one of the world's most stable oil producers may no longer be seen as stable as they were prior to this event. Motorists should stay tuned to GasBuddy for any further developments. but for now, we are not expecting this attack to lead to major price hikes. While the situation may change with Saudi Arabia, motorists are now able to fill up with cheaper winter gasoline and demand continues to seasonally weaken, perhaps softening the blow and impact of the attacks on gas prices."


Earth to host rodeo

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Governor Abbott to Lead Economic Development Mission to Japan and South Korea

AUSTIN - The Office of Governor Greg Abbott announced that the Governor will lead an economic development mission to Japan and South Korea. The delegation will depart on September 20 and return on September 27. The week-long mission will make stops in Osaka, Nagoya, and Tokyo in Japan and Seoul, South Korea, to meet with CEOs, dignitaries, and other business leaders. The mission will strengthen the strong economic and cultural ties between Texas and the two nations, while exploring new areas for expansion in

the business sector.

"Texas has a strong cultural and economic bond with Japan and South Korea, and this mission will deepen our growing partnership," said Governor Abbott. "From Toyota to Mitsubishi, leading manufacturing and tech companies have found a home in Texas because of our shared values and commitment to the free enterprise system. I look forward to strengthening these critical relationships building a brighter future for all those who do business and call Texas home."

Japan is the fifth largest export destination for goods from Texas, with more than \$12.1 billion exported from Texas to Japan in 2018. Texas ranks No. 2 among the U.S. states for imports from Japan, with imports valued at \$16.7 billion in 2018. More than 400 Japanese companies currently have operations in Texas, including the U.S. headquarters of Toyota, Kubota Tractor Corporation and Mitsubishi Heavy Industries. The trip will be sponsored and paid for by the Texas Economic Development Corporation.

Report provides details on what can be done to prevent shootings

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on Sept. 12 released the Texas Safety Action Report, a document that details what Texas and Texans are doing to prevent mass shootings.

The report elaborates on executive orders Abbott issued a week earlier to coordinate state and local expertise and resources and "identify any shortcomings in our current systems and explore ways to prevent these horrific tragedies from taking place."

Abbott said strategies laid out in the report result from meetings with law enforcement officials; community, business and faith leaders; technology experts; counselors; advocates; lawmakers and survivors of mass shootings.

"We must act with resolve in response to the despicable acts of violence we have witnessed in Texas," said Abbott. "Solving the problems that have led to these horrific events will take more than governmental action. The complete solution will require more than what is outlined in this paper. It will require parents, families, churches, law enforcement, community groups, schools and others working together to fortify the social fabric of our society. Texans are at our best when we are tested. Together, we will transcend this test and forge an even better future for our state."

Here are some of the actions recommended in the report:

- -Refresh training for all licensed peace officers on the procedures and criteria for "emergency detention" of individuals who pose a danger to others or themselves;
- —Educate physicians and behavioral health professionals about the law concerning disclosure of confidential information to law enforce-
- -Accelerate the development and implementation of the Texas Department of Public Safety safe firearm storage campaign, supported
- by a recent \$1 million appropriation; -Expedite the reporting of criminal convictions to the Texas Department of Public Safety;
- -Prohibit straw purchases of firearms under
- —Enact laws that crack down on criminals who try to illegally buy or possess guns;
- -Require courts to inform convicted criminals, both orally and in writing, that they may no longer possess firearms; and
- -Encourage social media companies to report suspicious activity to law enforcement.

Select panels appointed

House Speaker Dennis Bonnen on Sept. 4 appointed 13 members of the Texas House of Representatives to serve on the newly formed House Select Committee on Mass Violence Prevention and Community Safety. The committee was formed in response to the mass shootings that occurred in El Paso on Aug. 3 and in Midland and Odessa on Aug. 29.

Bonnen said the panel will study and recommend legislative solutions and other measures to help prevent mass violence and improve community safety. The panel is to deliver a report to the speaker in early December.

Appointees include: Chair Drew Darby, R-San Angelo; Vice Chair Poncho Nevárez, D-Eagle Pass; César Blanco, D-El Paso; Giovanni Capriglione, R-Southlake; Charlie Geren, R-Fort Worth; Barbara Gervin-Hawkins, D-San Antonio; Julie Johnson, D-Carrollton; Brooks Landgraf, R-Odessa; Mike Lang, R-Granbury; Joe Moody, D-El Paso; Geanie Morrison, R-Victoria; Four Price, R-Amarillo; and Armando Walle, D-Houston.

Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who presides over the Texas Senate, on Sept. 4 named the Senate Select Committee on Mass Violence Prevention and Community Safety.

Patrick tasked the senate panel with studying issues in response to the recent mass shootings and previous mass shootings in Santa Fe, Sutherland Springs and Dallas.

Leading the senate panel will be Chair Joan Huffman, R-Houston, and Vice Chair Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo. Other members include Donna Campbell, R-New Braunfels; Kelly Hancock, R-North Richland Hills; Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound; Charles Perry, R-Lubbock; Jose Rodriguez, D-El Paso; Larry Taylor, R-Friendswood; and John Whitmire, D-Houston.

Revenue is distributed

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Sept. 11 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$801.5 million in local sales tax allocations for September.

The amount is 8.5 percent more than reported for the month of September 2018.

Allocations are based on sales made in July by businesses that report tax monthly.

AGs target tech giant

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Sept. 9 announced he is leading a coalition of 50 attorneys general in a multistate, bipartisan investigation of California-based technology company Google LLC's business practices in accordance with state and federal antitrust laws.

According to a news release posted by Paxton's office, the coalition plans to investigate Google's "overarching control of online advertising markets and search traffic that may have led to anticompetitive behavior that harms consumers."

Paxton said legal experts from each state would work in cooperation with federal authorities to assess competitive conditions for online services and ensure that Americans have access to free digital markets.

PCCA Announces Year-End Cash Distributions of \$21.59 Million to its Grower-Owners

LUBBOCK, TX - At its 66th Annual Meeting on Tuesday, September 17th, Lubbockbased Plains Cotton Cooperative Association announced fiscal year-end further cash distribution to its grower-owners totaling \$21.59 million. The distribution, to be completed this month, consists of \$9.16 million in cash dividends and \$12.43 million in stock retirements and base capital plan retirements. As of June 30, 2019, PCCA's Warehouse Division had received 1,442,337 bales, one of the division's top five largest crops in its history. PCCA President and CEO Kevin Brinkley reported the coop's achievements were made despite difficult challenges during the fiscal year.

"This past season was full of challenges for our marketing team," Brinkley said. "Significant difficulties were developing even before the marketing year began as exceptional drought and a rapidly escalating trade war combined to cre-

ate an unprecedented level of uncertainty in the cotton market. We are coming to terms with the fact that China, which uses one of every three bales in the world, may no longer be a reliable market for U.S. cotton; therefore, we are adapting our business and risks models to this new era along with continuing to develop new marketing solutions for the future." Brinkley also reported that PCCA has worked hard throughout the year to accomplish the co-op's mission.

"Our mission is to ensure the long-term profitability of our grower-owners through value-added marketing programs and through services to their gins," Brinkley said. "To that end, we mapped out a number of initiatives that would help us accomplish our mission. Those initiatives focused on enhanced marketing methods, better communications and strengthened rela-

tionships with the individuals

that own this cooperative and

the people who work for it. I am pleased to report that significant progress has occurred on many of these efforts."

In other business during the annual meeting, PCCA grower-owners re-elected directors Kody Carson, District 2; Dean Vardeman, District 6; and Dahlen Hancock, District 7. Clint Abernathy was elected director from District 1 to replace retiring director Robert Robbins.

Founded in 1953, PCCA is a marketing cooperative owned by farmers in Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and New Mexico dedicated to supplying sustainably-grown, highquality cotton fiber around the world. In addition to cotton marketing based in Lubbock, Texas, PCCA also owns cotton warehouse facilities in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas and develops and offers software programs and networks to local co-op gins that help add value to their grower-owners'



Queso

Even though you don't need an excuse to eat queso, September 20th is National Queso Day. So, grab your chips and start dipping.

Chile con Queso most likely originated in Mexico. There were references to the dish in Mexican literature around 1816, but an actual recipe for chiles and cheese did not appear in Mexican cookbooks. In fact, the first published recipe for a version of chile con queso was in the United States in 1896 in an article about Mexican cuisine in the magazine, The Land of Sunshine. The recipe was called Chiles Verdes con Queso and was intended to be a side dish.

At this point in the journey, there is a European influence on the recipe we know today as Chile con Queso. At the time Swiss Fondue and a British dish, Welsh Rarebit (rabbit), were becoming popular in Europe. Americans gave the Welsh rarebit a twist and added chile pulp to the melted cheese, milk, and egg mixture that was served over toast. A recipe for Mexican rarebit was published in 1908 in a Kentucky newspaper. In 1909, a San Francisco newspaper published a recipe, but added chile powder instead. It was around this time that the version of chile con queso that we would recognize began to appear. San Antonio's Gunter Hotel served chile con queso as early as 1910. In 1920, Chile con Queso appeared in the Woman's Club Cookbook of Tested and Tried Recipes which was published by the Woman's Club of San Antonio. This recipe did not call for the use of an egg and suggested the use of American cheese.

1918, everything changed for chile con queso. Velveeta was invented. The first recipe to mention the use of Velvetta for queso was published in 1939 in a cookbook by the First Christian Church of Lubbock. Then in 1943, the queso game changed again when Carl Roetelle began producing Ro-Tel, or canned tomatoes and chiles. It wasn't until 1949 that an ad appeared with a recipe using Ro-Tel to make chile con queso. Still queso has remained a very regional dish. It is most popular in Texas, the Southwest, and Midwest.

Although most familiar in its processed cheese version, the dish has recently begun to evolve by using different kinds of cheeses and adding other flavors to the cheese

If you love queso, you might check out Lisa Fain's cookbook titled, Queso! It is filled with even more history and queso recipes. The information for this article was found at foodrepublic.com.

Bill's Queso Dip

Ingredients

- 1 2-pound block of Velvetta cheese
- ½ cup milk
- 1 cup of prepared salsa (I like Leal's Hot sauce)
- ½ cup grated mild cheddar cheese
- 1-pound breakfast sausage, browned and drained

Directions

Cut the block of Velvetta into small chunks to make it easier to melt. Add the chunks and the milk to a crock pot set on low. Then add the salsa. Allow the mixture to melt, stirring occasionally. When the mixture is melted, add the grated cheddar cheese and stir. Finally, add the cooked sausage and combine. Keep in the crockpot on low to keep the mixture heated until ready to serve.

This recipe is just an estimate. You can add more or less of the ingredients to suit your tastes. We like to this dip for snacking, but it can be used as a meal also.

Instead of using the easy to melt processed cheese, this recipe creates a bechamel sauce before adding the cheese. It is a more all-natural version of cheese dip. This is delicious, but it can be tricky to keep your dip from breaking.

Queso Dip

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 cups whole milk
- 1 cup diced tomatoes
- 1 cup fire roasted whole green chilis chopped 3 cups grated cheddar cheese
- 3 cups Monterey Jack cheese

Instructions

Add butter to the cast iron skillet on medium heat until melted before adding in the flour and whisking for 1 minute. Add in the milk slowly while whisking and keeping the mixture smooth for 3-4 minutes before adding in the tomatoes, chiles, cheddar cheese and jack cheese until the mixture is completely combined and smooth (except for the chunks of tomato and chiles).

Queso Fundido

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INGREDIENTS

- 1/2-pound Hot Breakfast Sausage (such As Jimmy Dean or J.C. Potter) Or Chorizo
- 1 whole Medium Onion, Finely Diced
- 2 whole SMALL Bell Peppers (any Color Combination), Seeded and Finely Diced
- 1-pound Monterey Jack, grated (OR Mozzarella, Or Other Stringy Melting Cheese),

Sprinkle of Chili Powder

- 3 whole Roma Tomatoes, Diced
- 1/4 cup Cilantro, Chopped
- Tortilla Chips for Serving

INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. In a large skillet, cook and crumble the sausage until brown. Remove from skillet and drain on a paper towel. Pour off any excess fat. Add onions and bell peppers to the skillet and cook over medium-high heat until the veggies are soft and golden brown, about 7-8 minutes. Remove from heat and set aside. To build the skillet, place 1/3 of the cheese in a medium-sized ovenproof skillet. Add half the as much of the veggie mixture as you'd like (you may have a little left over.) Add almost all of the remaining cheese, the rest of the sausage, then whatever cheese you have left. Sprinkle the top very lightly with chili powder. NOTE: Depending on the size of your skillet or baking dish, you may have some ingredients left over. Just build so that the ingredients roughly reach the top of the skillet; they'll shrink quite a bit once the cheese melts! Place into the oven and start watching it about 4 to 5 minutes in. You want to bake it until the cheese is totally melted, hot, and slightly bubbling...but before the cheese starts to firm up/harden. (In other words, you still want the cheese to be extra gooey.) Remove from the oven, top with the diced tomatoes, sprinkle on the tomatoes, and serve immediately with tortilla chips! NOTE: Be sure to have everything ready so you can serve the queso fundido pretty much right out of the oven. It's best when piping hot!

IMPORTANT: Wrap a cloth around the skillet handle so guests won't burn themselves.

Green Chile Queso

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 onions, diced

- 2 to 4 chipotle peppers in adobo, finely chopped 4 pounds processed cheese, such as Velveeta, cut into chunks

Directions

Set a large skillet over medium heat and add the butter. Once melted, add the onions and cook until starting to soften, 2 to 3 minutes. Add the green chiles and chipotle peppers and cook for a minute. Add the cheese and let it melt. Add the enchilada sauce and give it all a stir. Transfer to a slow cooker to keep warm.

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
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

It was a rough year for Friona Wheat Growers. As always, the weather was a factor in the quality and quantity of various crops. Low wheat prices encouraged farmers to graze instead of grow to grain. The export market for all grains has been less that stellar and the ethanol mar-

ket has been poor. In fact, Wheat Growers manager Greg O'Brian said that we are in a "grain deficit" in our area. There is just not enough volume of grain to buy, sell, trade, leverage, hedge, or do anything with. The one bright spot on the horizon is barley. Barley works well as a feed and is more drought tolerant than wheat. Also, new customers have been hauling barley to Friona from out of state. New trade agreements could also boost business for all farmers if

Xcel Energy customers see higher bills because of hot August use patterns

Xcel Energy customers in Texas and New Mexico used more electricity than normal keeping cool during August, and likely are seeing higher bills as a result.

August was an exceptionally hot month across Xcel Energy's Texas-New Mexico service territory. The National Weather Service in Amarillo reported the average high temperature in the city was 96.4 degrees Fahrenheit. Lubbock's average high was 97.7 degrees, and Roswell was even hotter at 100.6 degrees. This was 8%, 7% and 10%, respectively, above normal highs for the month of August. Across the entire month, the average temperature was above normal, if not well above normal, every day except

one. "Our air-conditioners use a lot of power, and when we have a month of consistently high temperatures, air conditioners have to run longer to keep the temperature inside at the desired thermostat setting," said David Hudson, president, Xcel Energy - New Mexico, Texas. "Electricity prices are actually lower per kilowatthour than this time last year. It's the higher-than normal use of air conditioning that caused our August bills to

go up." Xcel Energy recorded the highest demand on its regional transmission network Aug. 26. At 5 p.m. that day, the system was loaded with 6,198 megawatts. A megawatt is equal to a million watts of electricity de-

Fortunately, a planned \$16 million fuel cost refund will soon appear on customer bills, returning \$14.53 to a typical residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours in a month. The one-time refund will show as a credit and be based on September use. The refund may be

spread over two months, since many customers are on billing cycles that straddle two calendar months.

The refund reflects an earlier period of low costs for natural gas. In addition to the refund, at the beginning of July, the fuel cost factor was reduced to reflect the lower costs of purchased electricity and fuel to run generators at area power plants. The July reduction translated into an overall bill decrease of 5%.

Xcel Energy offers information on ways to use electricity more efficiently, which helps lower bills. Additionally, the company offers rebate programs that incentivize efficiency efforts, as well as an average billing option that smooths out high-use months such as August. Explanatory Statements for the November 5, 2019 **Constitutional Amendment Election**

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 72)

HJR 72 proposes a constitutional amendment permitting an elected municipal judge to serve as a municipal judge in more than one municipality at the same time. Unlike an appointed municipal judge, an elected municipal judge may not concurrently hold another municipal judge office. This amendment would allow an elected municipal judge to serve as a municipal judge in more than one municipality at the same time, in the same manner as appointed municipal judges.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting a person to hold more than one office as a municipal judge at the same time."

Proposition Number 2 (SJR 79)

SJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional general obligation bonds, in an amount that does not exceed \$200 million, for the economically distressed areas program. These bonds can only be used to provide financing for the development of water supply and sewer service projects in those economically distressed areas as defined by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$200 million to provide financial assistance for the development of certain projects in economically distressed areas."

Proposition Number 3 (HJR 34)

HJR 34 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to temporarily exempt from ad valorem taxation a portion of certain property located in an area covered by a disaster declaration of the governor. The proposed amendment would allow the legislature to prescribe the method of determining the amount of the tax exemption and the duration of the exemption and also would allow the legislature to create any additional eligibility requirements for the tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a temporary exemption from ad valorem taxation of a portion of the appraised value of certain property damaged by a disaster."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 38)

HJR 38 proposes a constitutional amendment prohibiting the state from imposing or collecting an individual income tax, including an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income. There is no current constitutional bar on imposing or collecting an individual income tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prohibiting the imposition of an individual income tax, including a tax on an individual's share of partnership and unincorporated association income."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 24)

SJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would automatically appropriate the net revenue received from the portion of the state's tax revenue received on sales of sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) and the Texas Historical Commission (THC). The legislature would maintain the authority to determine the specific uses of the funds and their allocation between TPWD and THC.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment dedicating the revenue received from the existing state sales and use taxes that are imposed on sporting goods to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Historical Commission to protect Texas' natural areas, water quality, and history by acquiring, managing, and improving state and local parks and historic sites while not increasing the rate of the state sales and use taxes."

Proposition Number 6 (HJR 12)

HJR 12 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to increase the maximum bond amount for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT) from

\$3 billion to \$6 billion to be issued by the Texas Public Finance Authority. CPRIT was created in 2007 to promote and fund cancer research in Texas. CPRIT uses bond proceeds to award grants for cancer research and preven-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislaauthorized for the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas."

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 151)

HJR 151 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions from \$300 million per year to \$600 million per year to the available school fund and also allowing the State Board of Education, the General Land Office, and other entities that manage revenue from land or other properties held in the permanent school fund to distribute certain revenue to the available school

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing increased distributions to the available school

Proposition Number 8 (HJR 4)

HJR 4 proposes a constitutional amendment creating the flood infrastructure fund as a special fund in the state treasury, using money appropriated from the economic stabilization fund. The flood infrastructure fund would provide additional resources to implement plans to mitigate flood damage. The proposed amendment would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to use money in the flood infrastructure fund for drainage, flood mitigation, or flood control projects. The proposed amendment also would authorize the creation of separate accounts in the flood infrastructure fund as necessary to administer the fund or authorized projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the flood infrastructure fund to assist in the financing of drainage, flood mitigation, and flood control projects."

Proposition Number 9 (HJR 95)

HJR 95 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to create a property tax exemption for precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation precious metal held in a precious metal depository located in this state."

Proposition Number 10 (SJR 32)

SJR 32 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to allow a state agency or political subdivision to transfer a law enforcement animal to the animal's handler or another qualified caretaker in certain circumstances. Currently, the Texas Constitution prevents the transfer of certain public property, such as law enforcement animals, to a private person or organization at no cost. This amendment auture to increase by \$3 billion thorizes the legislature to allow the maximum bond amount the transfer of a law enforcement animal to the animal's handler or another qualified caretaker at no cost, upon the animal's retirement or at another time if the transfer is determined to be in the animal's best interest.



Flying Queens soar into Basketball Hall of Fame

The Wayland Baptist Flying Queens program from 1948-1982 was enshrined in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame on Friday night September 6th in Springfield, Massachusetts. The women who were a part of the historic teams were honored for their contribution to women's basketball and for changing the game.

Sue Crow, from Hereford, Texas played on the 1948 team and made the journey to Springfield to make history again. Wayland's President Dr. Bobby Hall and former Flying Queen Linda Pickens Price proudly display the trophy at the Enshrinement Ceremony. Thirty-seven former Flying Queens and their families made the trip to be a part of the historic event and to view first-hand the coveted orange blazer!

This is the highest honor possible for a basketball team and entirely fitting for the Flying Queens. As ground-breakers in women's collegiate basketball, the Wayland team's rich history includes several induction worthy accomplishments:

• Wayland gave women full basketball scholarships in



the 1950s, 25 years before the Title IX was passed.

• The Flying Queens are the ONLY team in collegiate basketball history (men or women) to record a 131 game consecutive winning streak (1953-58). In 2013 the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame honored this winning streak.

• The Wayland Team is the winningest team in women's college basketball. The Flying Queens have posted over 1600 wins, around 300 more wins than the nearest competitors.

• The Wayland Team has won 19 National Championships.

• The Flying Queens' program has had nine individuals inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame.

• Members of the Wayland Hutcherson Flying Queens have received 197 All-American Awards.
