Rural Crashes Claim One Life In County

The Highway Patrol investigated nine rural traffic accidents in Parmer County during the month of July, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person killed, six persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$5,015.

The rural traffic accident summary for Parmer County from January through July shows a total of 62 crashes resulting in seven persons killed, 23 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$52,898.

"Yes, it is hard to believe here in the middle of August that school days are almost here again. Do not be surprised if in a few days when you round that curve or top that rise you meet a big yellow school bus," Sgt. Wells said.

The Sergeant reminds all motorists of the state law regulating traffic in regard to school buses. "The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which is stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may proceed past such bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding 10 miles per hour, with due caution for the safety of such children."

Commenting on the upcoming Labor Day weekend facing Texas motorists, the veteran patrol supervisor said, "Many Texas families will be taking advantage of this last long summer weekend to take trips prior to the opening of school. Many of these families will be trying to cover too many miles. As a result, the possibilities of traffic crashes will be increased."

Because this holiday is mostly a family affair, more persons will be occupying cars, thus, any traffic accident might result in several casualties. This has been evidenced several times on Texas Highways in recent weeks. During the 72 hour Labor Day weekend last year, 31 crashes claimed the lives of 44 persons.

WITH CATTLE TRUCK

Cattle Killed; Driver Spared In Train Crash

Twenty high-quality cattle were killed and a truck driver was injured as a result of a truck-train accident at a railroad crossing six miles east of Friona last Thursday.

Injured was Shurl Goodall of Oklahoma City, an employee of Armstrong Trucking Company. He had just loaded 31 cattle on the truck at Friona Feed Yard, and was set to begin the trip to Oklahoma City.

Goodall was taken to Farmer County Community Hospital by Claborn ambulance. According to Dr. Lee Spring, he suffered a fractured rib on the right side, bruises and skin abrasions and a mild concussion.

Although Goodall was thrown from the truck some 40 feet, he suffered no bad lacerations.

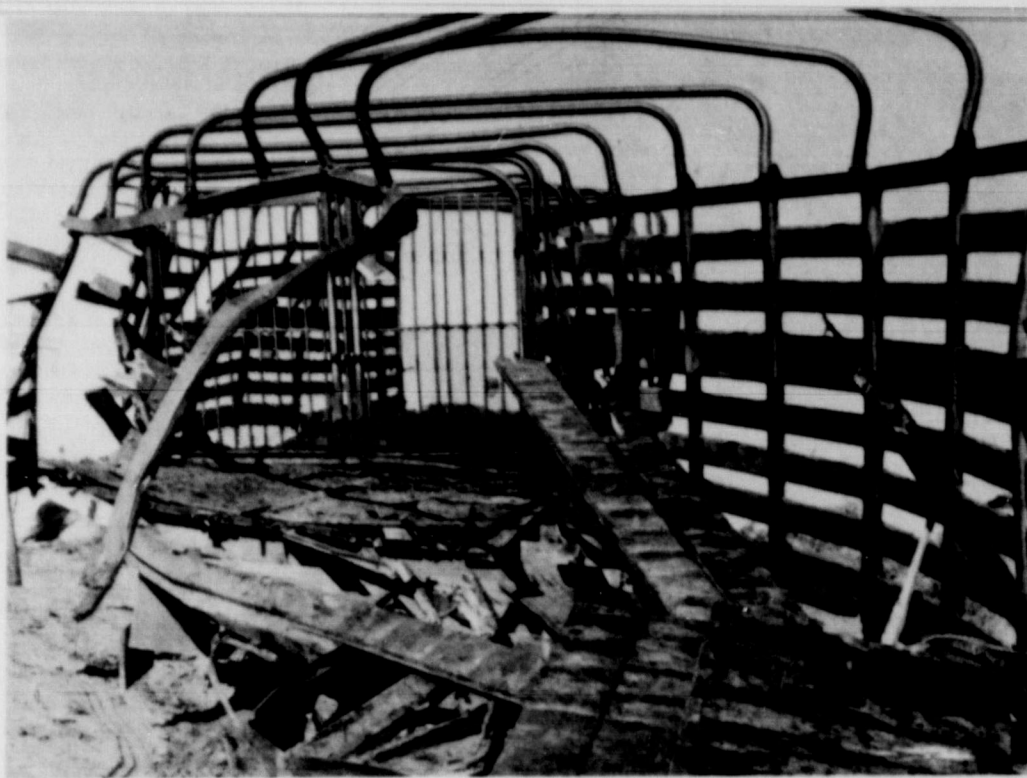
The wreck happened about 7:40 a. m. Tom Lewellen, who lives about a quarter of a mile from the wreck scene, said he was in his home at the time of the accident. "We heard a crash that sounded like a jet plane breaking the sound barrier. We looked down the road and saw the dust flying," Lewellen said.

The Lewellens called a ambulance, and it was dispatched to the scene. Goodall was still conscious when he was rescued at the accident.

It was reported that another truck had crossed the railroad in front of Goodall, and stopped at U. S. Highway 60. That truck's driver sounded his horn several times, apparently to warn Goodall of the approaching train, but he evidently did not see the freight until just before it struck his truck.

Most of the 20 cattle were killed outright, although several had to be shot by Sgt. W. E. Wells, Highway Patrolman who investigated the accident. The cattle had just been purchased from Friona Feed Yard by Wilson and Company of Oklahoma City.

Dead and seriously injured cattle were scattered for yards down the track. Seven of the

crash occurred. In one of the crashes, Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Herring were injured, and in another, also involving a cattle truck, Robert Isbell of Clovis was killed.

Rattlesnake Bites Farm Worker Here

Carthel stated that the snake, killed by Alemon after it bit him, was about 30 inches long and had seven rattles. Alemon was working with a crew of

fellow workers in a maize field at the time of the accident. The men were at the end of the maize rows, where it adjoins grassland.

Mrs. Carthel, in driving Alemon to the Friona hospital, came upon the wreck scene involving 20 cattle which was killed east of Friona, and the railroad crossing had barely been cleared enough for her to get by, it was stated.

Carthel said that the man told other employees it was the

fourth snake he had killed during the week, and made a comment as to "Why they all came to him?" A tourniquet was fastened on the man's leg, as he was bitten on the right ankle.

Dr. Lee Spring credited the fast action in getting Alemon to the hospital with keeping the infection down. "You can't afford to lose much time on a rattlesnake bite," Dr. Spring said.

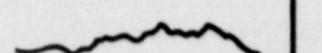

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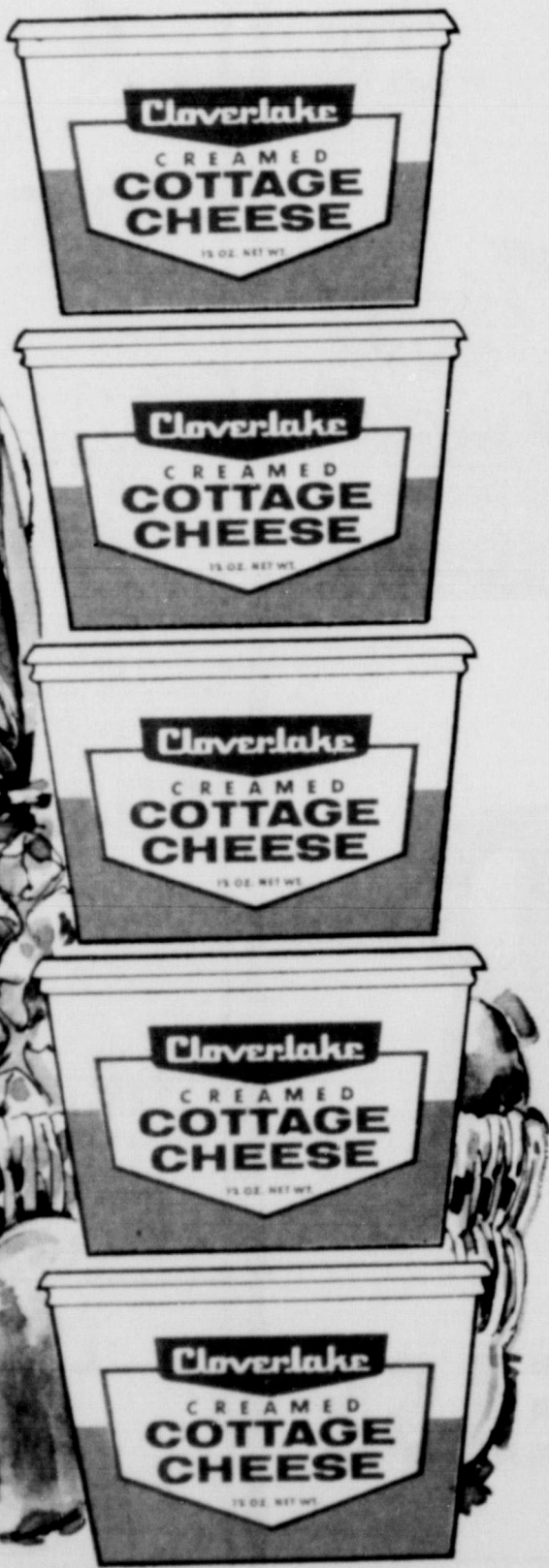

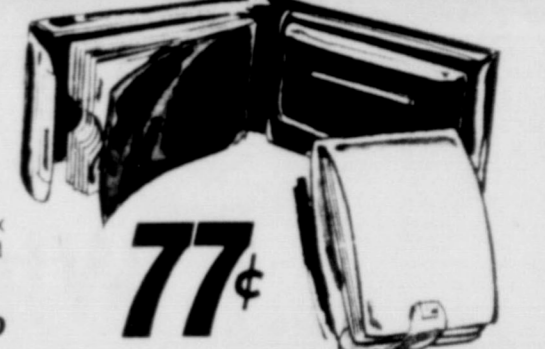

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows: "(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts." Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Texas, gunning for another national championship, will be met in night game a week later, Sept. 26.

Three successive road games are interspersed before Southern Methodist engages the Red Raiders in a contest climaxing Dad's Day the night of Oct. 24.

Following a regionally televised game with Rice, the Red Raiders return for a three-game home stand winding up the season. First comes the Raiders' oldest rival, West Texas State, at 7:30 p. m. Nov. 7, Washington State of the AAWU whose Cougars first met the Raiders last fall, plays Texas Tech in the initial day game of the home schedule at 2 p. m. Nov. 14, Arkansas will furnish opposition for the homecoming game at 2 p. m. Nov. 21.

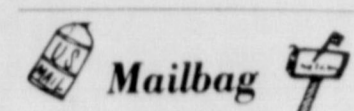
While in Dallas, the Maces visited Six Flags Over Texas. They met several members of the "Campus Revue" cast.

AT HEREFORD

Holly Plant Dedication Scheduled September 19

Dedication of Holly Sugar Corporation's new multi-million-dollar sugar plant at Hereford, first such industrial complex in Texas, has been scheduled for Saturday, September 19, with Texas Governor John Connally the principal speaker. It was announced today by Dennis O'Rourke, Holly President.

The plant has been named in honor of the late Merrill E. Shoup, former President and Chairman of the Board of Directors of Holly, who died on July 15.

A program to which the public is invited will begin at 10:30

a. m. at the plant which is located on a 1,700-acre site just west of the Texas Panhandle community. Immediately following the program, the public will be conducted on tours of the huge new food plant.

Construction of the Holly installation, the newest and one of the most modern and largest in the world, has been under way since the spring of 1963. Sugar-making operations are scheduled to begin about October 1, Mr. O'Rourke said today.

The Hereford beet sugar refinery will be able to produce under optimum conditions up to as much as 200,000,000 pounds

of sugar annually. This will be the only sugar produced on farms in Texas, and refined in Texas the Holly President pointed out. Some of the beets processed at the plant will be grown in a portion of neighboring New Mexico.

Sugarbeets processed at Hereford will be supplied by farmers located in the vast high plains agricultural area surrounding the impressive big new industrial complex. The plant will have capacity to process in excess of 6,000 tons of beets daily and will operate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, each fall and winter until the entire annual beet crop has been converted into sugar.

"We are honored that Governor Connally will be with us on the important occasion of the plant dedication which will mark the beginning of a new chapter in Texas agriculture and industry," Mr. O'Rourke said.

He added that dignitaries and special guests from many parts of the nation have been invited to be present and to participate in the dedicatory program.

The Merrill E. Shoup plant includes several outstanding features. Closed circuit television will be used in monitoring some plant operations. Another feature is the largest diffuser of its kind in the world. This huge cylindrical machine is used in steeping sugar juices from the sugarbeets. The plant also includes an impressive main process building in which is housed sugar-making equipment of latest design; bulk sugar silos with a capacity of 60,000,000 pounds of sugar; three huge dried beet pulp warehouses, each covering an area almost as large as a football field, and numerous other buildings and manufacturing installations.

Latest techniques of instrumentation and automation have been incorporated in the new plant which is expected to draw technicians and other visitors from many parts of the world where beet sugar is also produced. The plant, unique in the southwest, also includes juice storage equipment pioneered

and developed by Holly at its Imperial Valley, California, refinery and novel in the sugar-making industry.

In this maiden year of the new operation, some 27,500 acres of sugarbeets were planted in the region. Next year and in future years the total acreage is expected to be increased sharply and will be distributed among farmers who welcome the new non-surplus cash crop as a valuable addition to their farm rotation programs.

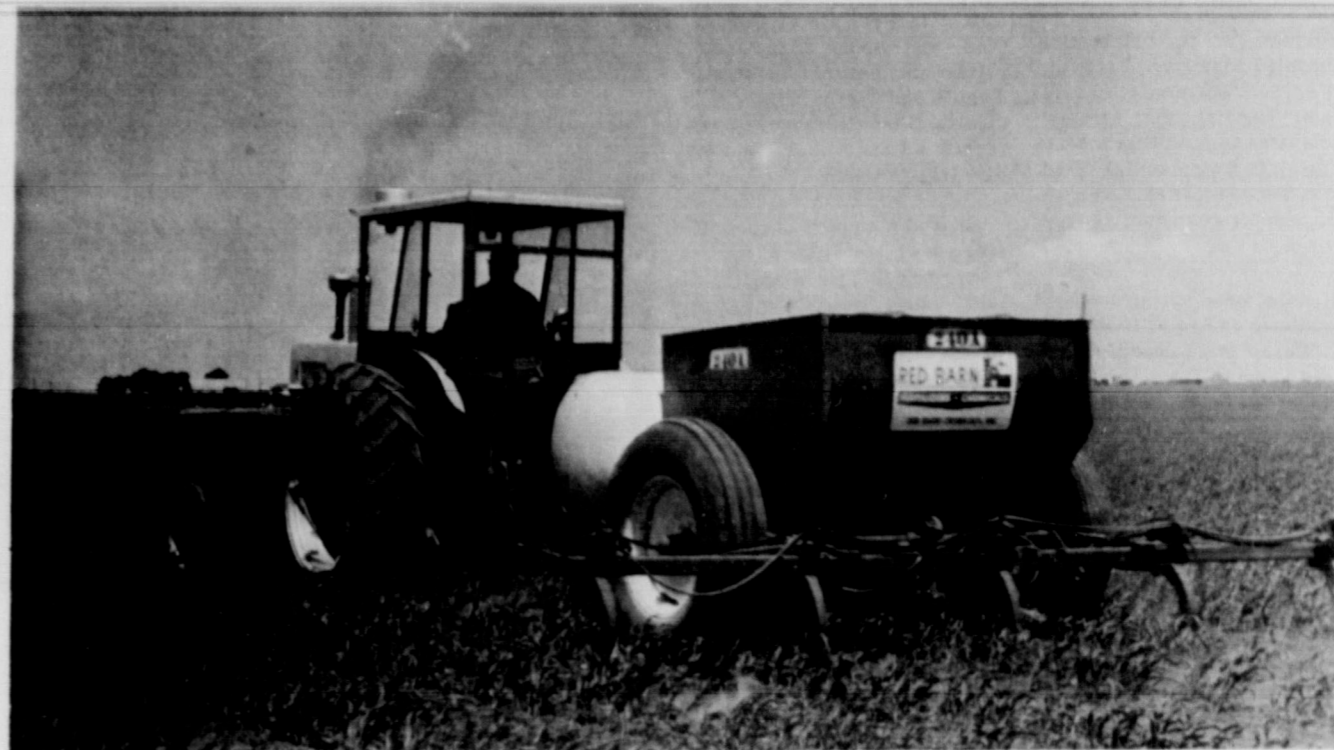
"This new enterprise will add many millions of dollars in new wealth and dollar circulation every year to the economies of the region and the nation," Mr. O'Rourke said today. "This will include cash payments to farmers for their beet crops, employment at the plant and purchase of a multitude of supplies and services necessary in the operation of a plant of this great scope."

Already the new facility has brought an economic surge in the area, it was reported recently by Congressman Walter Rogers (D-Texas) who said that some 46 permanent new business and service establishments have opened in the Hereford area since it was known that the Holly plant would be located there.

Mr. O'Rourke said that Holly has moved to the area more than half-a-hundred key plant technicians, agricultural specialists, and others who will guide the operation of the plant and help growers in production of the beet crop. These people, along with members of their families, will be permanent residents of the Hereford community. Employment at the plant year-around is expected to be approximately 100 individuals, while total employment during sugar-making operations will increase to about 350 in all departments of the complex operation.

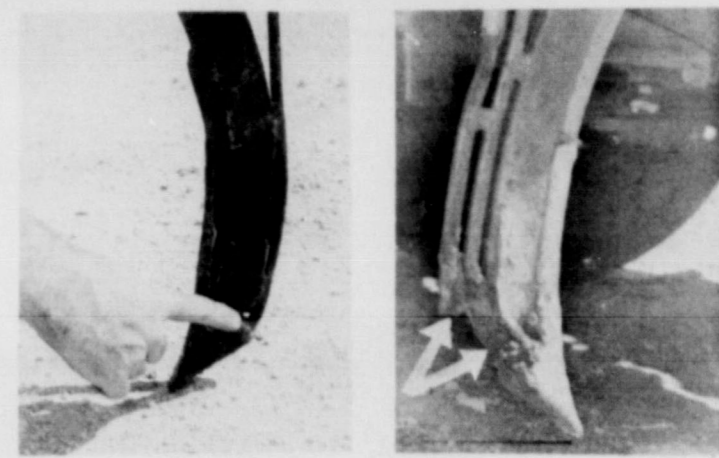
Visitors to the Holly plant for the dedicatory program will be given special gift packages of Holly sugar and other mementos of the occasion, according to Holly officials.

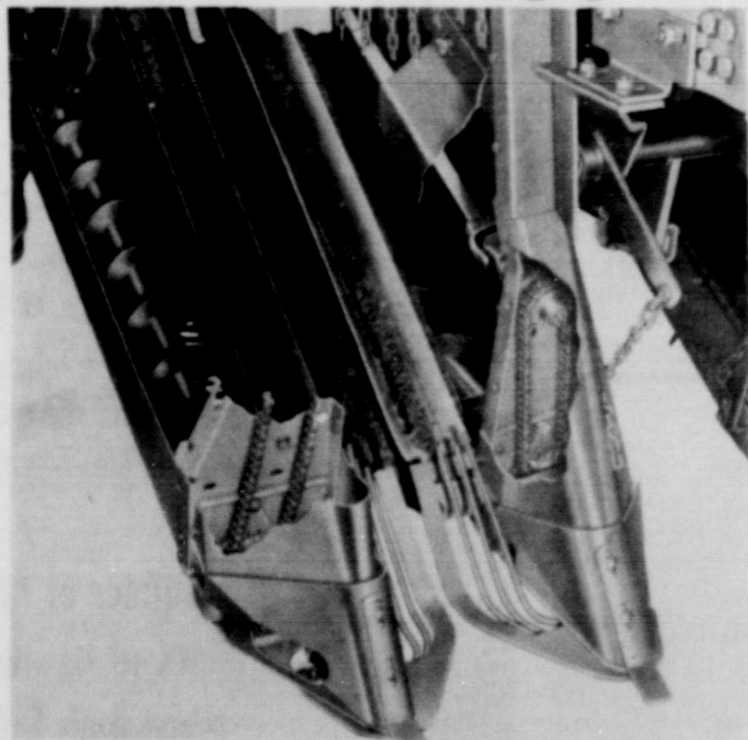

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BRUCellosis PROGRAM

The testing of cattle in Parmer County for recertification as a modified certified Brucellosis free county has been making good progress this summer. Bob Bennett, Federal Livestock Inspector, has been handling the testing program.

All of the cattle in the reactor and suspect herds during the 1961 test are being tested by Bennett. The other requirement for recertification is that 20 per cent of the cattle in other herds be tested. All herds are not required to be tested, only a percentage. Therefore, everyone will not be contacted to test their cattle.

Cattle owners that want to have their herd tested for brucellosis should contact either Bob Bennett at the Golden Spread Motel in Friona or the County Agents office in Farwell. Bob is anxious to test all the cattle that the owners desire a test on.

Having your cattle tested is good insurance for maintaining a clean cow herd with a high per cent calf crop every year. You need to know whether you have a brucellosis reactor in your herd so you can get cleaned up before it spreads. This is one way to help maintain a highly productive herd of cows at no expense to the owner, except for his time.

BEEF CATTLE RESEARCH
The proceedings and research reports given at the 14th Annual Beef Cattle Shortcourse has been published. This contains 161 pages of the latest information on Beef Cattle and contains 24 separate reports covering many phases of beef production. There is about 40 pages devoted to hybrid bermuda grass reports.

There is considerable expense to publishing this publication. Therefore, those of you who desire a free copy must send me your name and address so I can have our Agricultural Information office send you a copy.

SOIL TEST NOW
The application of sufficient fertilizer, in proper balance to correct soil deficiencies, is now accepted as one of the most profitable single practices.

Soils vary greatly in their ability to supply nitrogen and phosphorus. The soil test remains the best single guide for determining the amount and grade of fertilizer needed. Remember that 50 bu. of wheat grain alone contains about 50 lbs. of N and 25 lbs. of P2O5. Forage removed by grazing can contain 20 per cent protein or about 3 per cent actual nitrogen on a dry weight basis.

Data from research conducted on the Pullman soils indicates time of nitrogen application is not a major factor where wheat is being grown for grain only. Yields were about the same when nitrogen was applied preplant, in split applications, or as a topdress in February. However, where grazing is to be practiced it is important to apply all or part of the nitrogen as a preplant to stimulate early growth. The nitrogen can be conveniently applied anytime before listing. If solid or liquid forms are used, they should not be left on the surface for long periods.

If the soil test indicates a deficiency of phosphorus, the phosphate should be applied in such a manner that it will remain in moist soil—in reach of permanent roots. Like other

field crops, much of the phosphorus is utilized while wheat plants are young. Because phosphorus moves very little from point of application it is important it be applied preplant. Topdressing with phosphates after wheat is up cannot be expected to give the most profitable response.

Taking soil samples now will insure getting your report back in plenty of time for final planning and fertilizer application. Complete information on sample collection and mailing may be obtained through the county agent's office.

HEAD SMUT
Now is the time for grain sorghum growers to check their fields for head smut.

Particular attention should be given to resistance among different varieties. This information can be used in selecting a variety to plant next year.

There is a direct relationship between the per cent smutted or sterile heads and the per cent yield loss.

Beet Dump Nearing Completion For Friona

The sugar beet dump for Friona, currently under construction by Holly Sugar Corp a mile west of town on Santa Fe Railway, is nearing completion.

The dump, which will be equipped to handle "several hundred thousand tons" of beets is located just behind West Friona Grain, Inc.

Dave Eddington, Holly's field representative for the Friona area, says that it will be completed in plenty of time for beet harvest, which will begin sometime around October 1.

The dump will be the central collecting point for some 3,000

acres of beets in the Friona area. Similar installations are being built at Bovina, Dawn and Clovis for beetfarmers in those areas.

Holly Sugar Corporation's main factory in Hereford, will, of course, be the main receiving station for beets. The factory, located just west of Hereford, is nearing completion. A formal dedication for the facility has been scheduled for Saturday, September 19.

Eddington states that the beets in the Friona area are as good this year as any he has been personally connected with.

"Unless we come up with some type of problem within the next few weeks, beet farmers should realize a good harvest," Eddington says.

The Holly field representative states that the crop in this area has had little if any problem this year from insects or diseases.

"There has been a few isolated cases of leaf spot, in the Hereford area, but because of the type of summer we've had, this has not been a problem and apparently we will be able to miss it at this late date," Eddington said.

FOOD COSTS

Have you known husbands or other members of the family who were always raising the roof about the grocery bill? It is a conviction of some that the grocery bill gets accused of more wrong doing than anything else.

SAD BUT TRUE -
This scene took place at a supermarket check-out counter.

Check-out girl: "The amount is \$12.91."
Customer: "No wonder the farmers are getting rich."

These were the items in her basket:
6 bottles of soda pop
3 pairs of nylons
2 long-playing records
4 lbs. ice cream salt
1 box corn flakes
1 long-handled mop
1 egg beater
1 quart of milk

The groceries (corn flakes and milk) come to 62 cents. The farmer's share of the sale was only 14 cents.

The revision of supermarkets to the old general store line-up of merchandise helps obscure the fact that food is really a bargain.

The homemaker who wishes to control her food cost will want to analyze her buying habits to see whether she is (1) buying to get the best dollar value; (2) buying at the best dollar value; (3) buying at the best time; (4) choosing sensible quality for each use and not using the highest grades for all purposes which may be very wasteful, (5) getting the quality she should for the dollar spent.

Buying habits of the homemaker, because she is the food-purchasing agent for the family, have a striking effect upon food costs.

It is important to record family living expenses correctly in order to analyze buying or spending habits.

Eggs produced by older hens are more valuable for processing into liquid, dried, and frozen products, U. S. Department of Agriculture studies show. The

eggs from young hens contain more thick white -- preferred for table use. Consumers, producers, and processors, the scientists say, could benefit

from these findings. Processed products now absorb about 10 per cent of the nation's output of eggs.

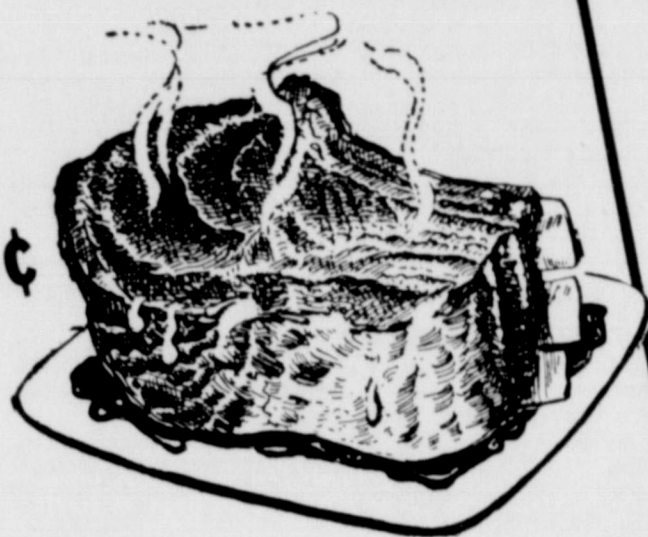

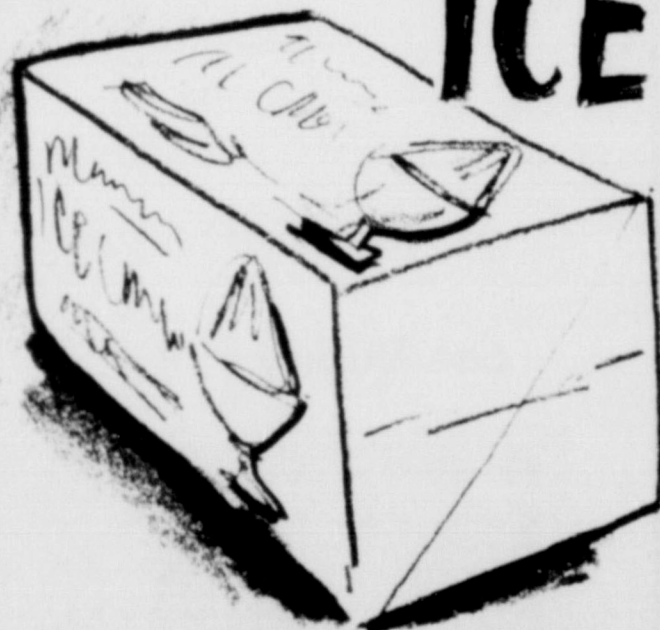
