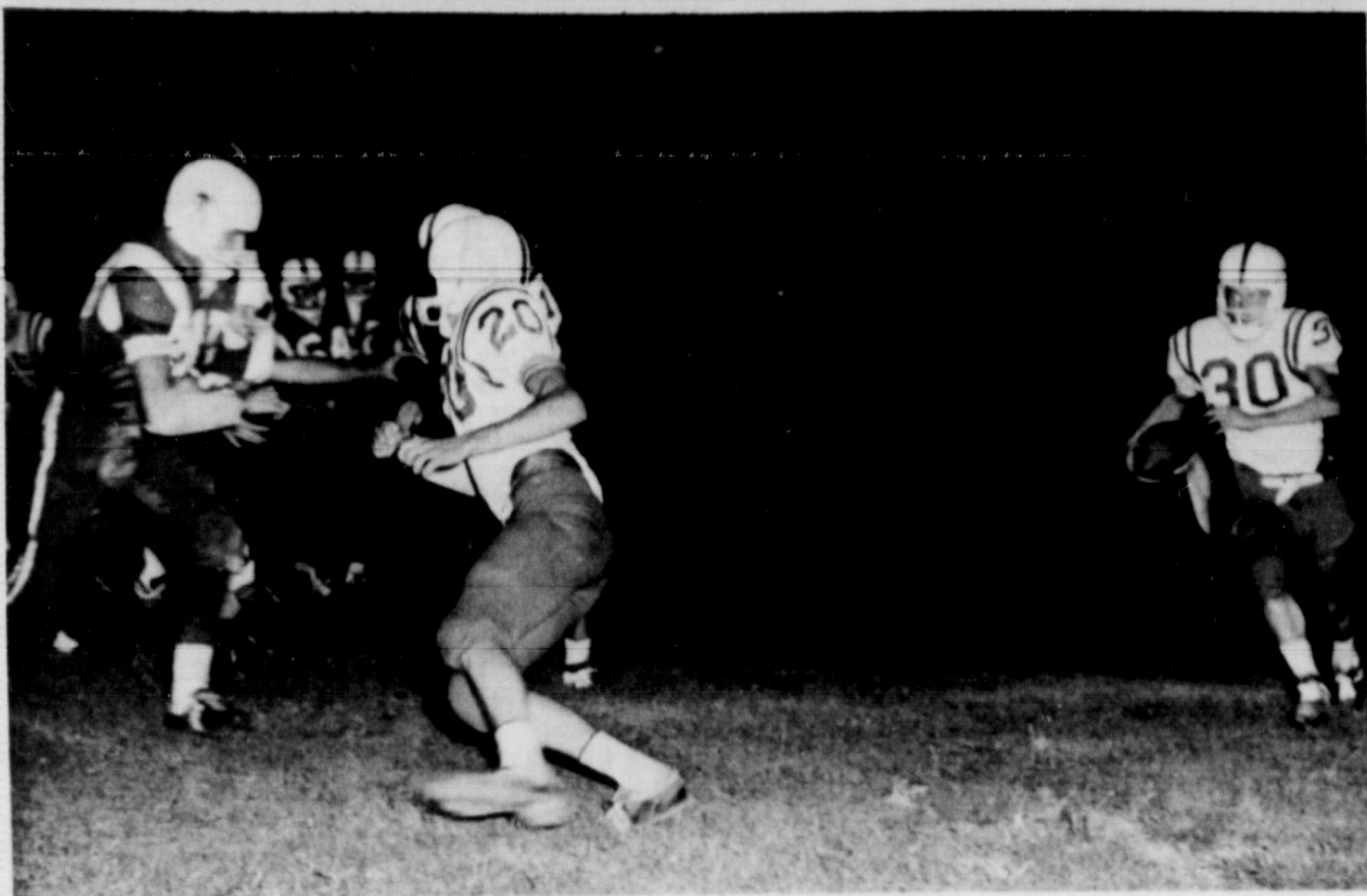

# Opening Game: Perfect Except For One Thing

It was a very suitable game for the opening of a new football stadium. The seats were all filled, it was a nice night. It was a close, hard fought game. Only one thing wrong with it as far as the Friona Chieftains and their fans were concerned was the final score. Visiting Farwell came out on the top end of that, by a narrow 8-7 margin.

The Chiefs were shooting for a rare three-game winning streak over their country rivals, but the Steers had other plans for the evening. A rallying band of Chieftains made motions of pulling the game out of the fire, driving deep into Farwell territory as the game ended, and fell victims partly to an erroneous down marker on the next-to-last play of the game.

yard punt, didn't make a first down, and a shorter punt gave Friona good field position at the Steer 46.

Two first down gallops by Larry Johnson set the Chiefs up on the Farwell 23. However, the drive failed to penetrate the 20-yard line and the Steers took over.

The Chiefs got their good field position a few moments later as play entered the second quarter. A 15-yard penalty set Farwell back to their own 30-yard line, and a Steer fumble gave Friona possession at the Steer 28. From that point the fired-up Chieftains cashed in their touchdown in seven plays. Quarterback Travis Graves, got most of it on three runs totaling 20 yards, one of which was a nice 13-yarder.

The Chiefs had it first-and-goal at the Farwell five, and on third down, Tim Herring crashed over from the four. Bob Sims split the uprights with his kick, and with 6:26 left in the half, Friona was ahead, 7-0.

Farwell came back, however, and the Chieftains simply could not halt the maneuvering of quarterback Field. The Steers drove 75 yards in 13 plays, Field connected on three passes during the drive for 33 of the yards, and picked up 10 more on a running play.

Fullback Larry Flowers, got the six points on a one-yard dive with just 40 seconds left in the half. Farwell then lined up for the try for two points, and Field

methodically tossed to end Doyle Johnson, and the scoreboard read 8-7. Although few probably suspected it at the time, that was all the scoring for the night.

Penalties, and Field's injury hampered Farwell's attempts to score in the second half.

The first time Friona had the ball in the third quarter, the Chiefs drove to the Farwell 30, but a 15-yard clipping penalty ended this scoring threat.

Immediately after this drive, Field completed a pass which would have carried to the Friona 10 for a first down, but a holding penalty against the Steers brought the play back.

In the final quarter, Farwell mounted a drive ended at the Friona two-yard line. In the process, Field was hurt and had to leave the game. Farwell had a first down at the 10, but Friona took over four plays later on their own two-yard line.

The Chiefs were 98 yards away from possible victory, with only 6:12 left in the game. Twice they faced critical third-down situations deep in their own territory. Bobby Jordan kept the drive going with a seven-yard gain for a first down on a third down call from the Friona eight-yard stripe.

The four plays later from the 24, Herring gained a precious yard to get the team four more

downs from their own 25. Fullback Tommy Sherley gave Friona good field position with a fine 32-yard gallop to the Farwell 43, but the clock was rolling, showing just 2:03 left to play.

Herring ran 13 yards to the 30, and two plays later Graves hit Johnson with a seven-yard pass for a first down at the 18, but just 1:12 remained on the clock.

The Chiefs got to the 11-yard line, but an intentional grounding penalty set them back. This penalty cost the team a down, and resulted in part of the confusion. Two plays later the team was on the 14 after an incomplete pass and two seconds left on the clock. Friona started to line up for a field goal try when the Chiefs discovered they had used up all four downs in the series.

The Farwell quarterback fell on the ball on the game's last play to keep the Chiefs from having a chance at the pigskin.

The win stretched Farwell's lead in the series to four games, once again, in games since 1931. The Steers have won 16, to 12 for Friona, and there has been one tie.

Farwell's one-point win was the third time in the rivalry that the Steers have eked out such a slender victory. In 1936, Farwell won a game 13-12, and in 1950, they took a 20-19 win. Those are the only other one-point games in the series rivalry.

The Steers proved they came to play, taking the opening kickoff from their own 20 to the Friona 23 before a fumble stopped the drive.

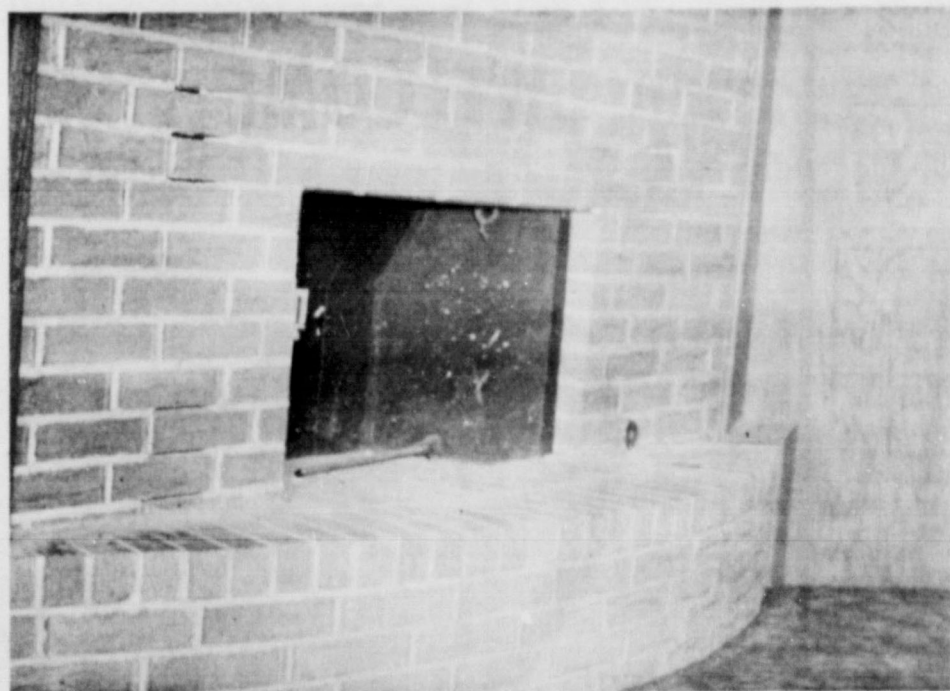
Friona made one first down and had to punt. The Steers, deep in their own territory thanks to Ray Braxton's 41-

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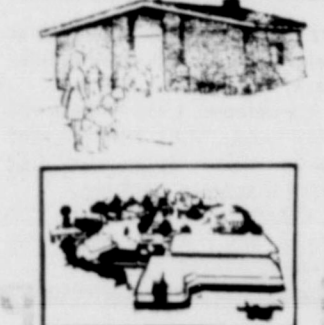

One of the largest, if not the largest, collections of 65 John Rogers statuettes is on display at Pioneer Village in Minden, Nebraska. Known as the "Father of American Sculpture" few of his creations are in existence today for they were modeled of common clay a century ago.

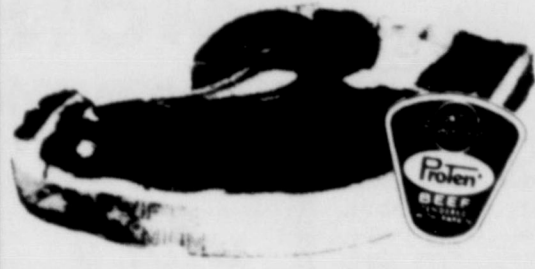

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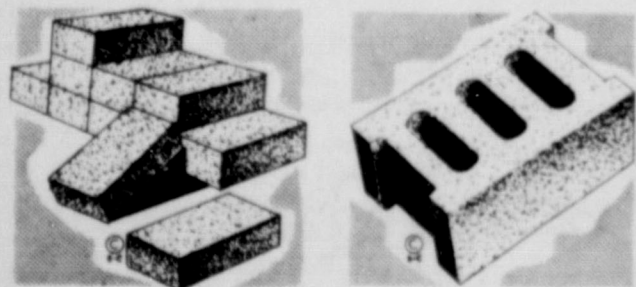
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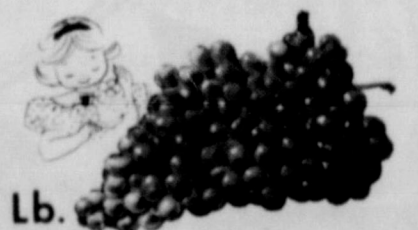
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
