## Chiefs Can Clinch 3-AA Title By Beating Olton

The Friona Chiefs will be gunning for at least a share of the District 3-AA championship when they host the tough Olton Mustangs in a game here tomorrow. Game time is

If Friona can handle the mysterious Mustangs, the team will have clinched at least a tie for the district title. That's the same thing Friona got last year (a tie), but a win Friday would also clinch a place in the playoffs, something the Chiefs lost out on a year ago.

"I still think that Olton is potentially the toughest team in the district," stated Coach Don Light this week as he prepared his team for its third straight "Waterloo" in district

Olton was picked by district coaches to win district in preseason voting, on the strength of returning lettermen and starters. However, the Mustangs hit a snag as district play

Earlier in the year, though, the Mustangs showed their potential. In non-district play Olton had just a 2-3 record, but the losses were to class AAA teams Muleshoe, Tulia

Their two non-district wins were over Morton and Hale Center, and Olton routed the latter team, 35-7 just a week before the owls romped over Friona, 33-6.

So it would appear that the Mustangs have at least as much potential as do the Chieftains.

The two teams have played just six times. Last year's game at Olton marked the first time in the series that Friona was able to score a win over the Mustangs.

Olton beat the Chiefs 14-6 in 1948, 39-0 in 1949 and 53-7 in 1950, before the series was interrupted for 12 years. Finding themselves in the same district alignment once again in 1962, Olton picked up where they had left off with a 25-8 win at Olton in 1962 and a 21-6 win here in 1963,

Friona finally broke the drought last year with a 20-0 win, to set up their showdown at Floydada, Coach Light has a personal record of 1-1 against the Mustangs in his two seasons as head coach at Friona, with the overall record reading 1-5 in favor of Olton.

The Chieftain workout on Monday was termed "sluggish" by Coach Light. "We had a few bruises following the hard game at Abernathy," he said.

Tuesday, however, the Chiefs had a good workout, the coach said. Members of the B-team ran Olton plays, so that the Chiefs had a chance to work on their defense.

Joe Mabry, who has starred in each of the team's district wins, was sent home for rest with a mild case of influenza. Doctors thought Mabry would be ready for action Friday after a couple of days rest.

Travis Graves was one of the players coming up with a bruise from the Abernathy game, but it wasn't considered too serious. Bob Sims, who saw mostly defensive action last week due to his knee injury, is expected to play on both offense and defense this week. Center, Bing Bingham, will be back at his regular offensive post Friday, so Bill Weatherly will move back to the tackle slot, which has been manned by Mike Smith.

"The team seems to have an air of confidence following the Abernathy win which has not been evident before this year," Coach Light said Tuesday.

Reflecting back on his earlier statement about Olton's prowress, Coach Light said that the Mustangs were capable of being the top team in the district. "If they put together a good game Friday," we're liable to be in for it," he said.

I guesss it should come as no great surprise to most people that the Friona Chieftains will be playing for the district championship when they meet Olton here Friday.

After all, the Chiefs have been in the thick of the district race, and have played a key game directly involving the championship on the ninth week of their schedule each year since Don Light has been coaching the team.

This year has been a different approach to the situation, you have to admit. In both of the previous years, the Chiefs had 7-1 records going into their ninth game.

This year's team, although it will carry only a 4-4 season mark, is held in just as much esteem by most townspeople as the previous two. For, in spite of its lacklus-

tre season record, the very fact that the team will be playing for the championship; the fact that it can clinch a "breakeven" season, is an accomplishment.

This year's Chieftain eleven got off to about as rocky a start as you could expect, posting just a single win against four defeats at the season's halfway mark. Going into the district schedule it appeared that the pre-season prediction of third place in district for the Chieftains might, if anything, have been a notch too high.

Abernathy then took the center ring. The Antelopes had not only beaten Olton, but had crushed the Mustangs, 56-12, and were feeling their oats.

Some fans were thinking Friona might slip up on the Antelopes, but few were saying it out loud. If so, they were just hoping.

But the Chieftains had something to prove, and they did it. and in impressive fashion. Almost to a man, the team exhibited that "second effort" which often pays off with a win instead of a defeat.

So the team meets Olton tomorrow night in a game that could determine the district championship.


Many times a quick check in the United States Department of Agriculture's Home and Garden Bulletin No. 72, "Nutritive Value of Foods" (September, 1964 edition), will reveal the correct information about calorie, vitamin and mineral values of foods.

For example, the idea that margarine contains fewer calories than butter is quickly disproved when a calorie chart is consulted. Both contain the same number; 50 calories per pat. And some dieters omit pork from their menus. Research has proven that many cuts of pork are just as low in fat as cuts of beef or lamb. Therefore pork, as well as other meats, has an effective place in reducing and low-fat

Not all food fallacies can be checked on a nutritive value chart. Materials from our state colleges and universities, the USDA, nutrition textbooks, the American Medical Association, state public health associations and the Nutrition Foundation give information to counteract food fads. Our office on second floor of Courthouse in Farwell has free copies of these books. Come by for a

copy or call 481-3619. Much food misinformation is so widely believed that it is difficult to counteract. Some of the most commonly repeated fallacies concern digestibility of foods, conditions under which food is grown and how it is prepared.

Contrary to the popular opinion, all fats-margarine, vegetable oils, butter and other fats from animal sources - are equally digestible. The theory that food-stuffs from animal sources are more useful to the body than those from vegetable

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


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


