CHEMICAL WEED CONTROL

I suspect there has been more talk, questions asked and only partially answered about weed control chemicals this year than ever before. I would also guess that Parmer County is one of the largest users of weedherbicides this year. There are a lot of things we are all learning about these chemicals due to such widespread use. The chemical residue in our soils and how this affects future crops is the main area that we don't

know a lot about yet. PRECAUTIONS ON 2,4-D Herbicides can be useful tools for controlling weeds if they are properly applied. Improper application can cause crop damage and lawsuits from neighbors.

The use of 2, 4-D can usually stir some quick comments, either pro or con, depending on your past experience with it. Several farmers are about

ready to start using 2, 4-D to control weeds in their grain sorghum. Extreme care should be followed when spraving with 2. 4-D. Follow directions on the label exactly.

Use only amine salt or low volatile formulations as they are less likely to vaporize and drift. Spray only when wind is less than 10 miles per hour. 2, 4-D formulations may be used at 1/2 pound per acre to control broadleaf weeds once sorghum is 6 inches tall but before flowering. Hybrids containing Wheatland parentage should not be treated with 2, 4-D because serious yield reduction and lodging may occur. Best and most profitable results will be obtained if weeds are treated before they are 6 inches tall.

In Parmer County, farmers must obtain an application permit from the field representative of the State Department of Agriculture, Gene Cupp, 1924-34th Street, Lubbock, Texas, made before the first blooms for applying any herbicide on plots of 10 acres or more. On smaller plots, the operator must notify the same office of his intents to spray before making application.

The State Herbicide regulations outlines that when the wind is 7 to 10 miles per hour and when I pound of 2, 4-D is applied, the distance to susceptible crops must be 4 miles, downwind, and 250 feet, upwind. If 1/2 nound is used then these

After cotton reaches six inches in height and if soils are moist and grass is in an active stage of growth, Karmax, plus a surfactant, gives good control. Another chemical, Caparol and surfactant can also be applied post-emergence when cotton is 6 inches high.

Some confusion still exists on the use of DSMA and surfactants as a post-emergence spray for grass control in cotton. There are two forms of the arsenicals. One is disodium methanearsonate and the other is monosodium methanearsonate.

The disodium is a wettable powder and the monsodium is a liquid. Most of the research done with DSMA has been with the disodium form and is fully recommended for use on cot ton after it has reached a height of three inches or more. The monosodium is more toxic than the disodium. It is probably a little more effective on weed control but a little "hotter" on cotton, Monosodium has caused some leaf burning and plant stunting on young cotton but it seems to recover and make a normal yield. Both the disodium and the monosodium forms have been cleared for use on cotton, both materials are cleared

for two applications. The first application should be made after the plants measure three inches in height. The last application should be drop. These materials work better during high temperatures, above 85 degrees F., and dry weather, Follow directions and precautions on label as these are arsenic compounds.

BINDWEED CONTROL Recent rains have helped furnish bindweeds with needed moisture for good growth. Bindweeds are a costly weed to everyone. They reduce crop production and one patch of areas. Field Bindweed is most susceptible, therefore most readily controlled by the following herbicides: Fenac (2, 3, 6-Trichlorophenylacetic acid) at 20 pounds per acre; Tritac (2, 6-Trichlorobenzyloxypropanal) at 20 pounds per acre; weed.



Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capital

AUSTIN --- A total of 33 interim study committees were created during the recent legislative session,

Meetings of these committees will bring most of the legislators back to Austin during the next 18 months.

Studies will cover a wide area, ranging from state and local tax policy to such subjects as livestock auctions and restorations of Santa Anna's battle flag.

All but three of the legislators who are appointed to the interim panels will be eligible to draw travel expenses to and from meetings. In addition, some study panels are furnished staff funds.

Some committees will delve into: election laws, juvenile crime, rights of news media in reporting on persons charged with crime, liquor laws, the nursing profession, problems of farmers and ranchers, feasibility of a Pleasure Island State Park, public education, facilities for the criminal insane, and need for modernizing state fair facilities.

GOVERNOR VETOES SPENDING -- Gov. John Connally red pencilled \$2,600,000 of what he termed non-essential items in the \$3,600,000 state budget for 1966-67.

Connally said he felt the Legislature in general appropriated wisely, but he line-item vetoed:

\$1,100,000 for one of three new buildings at Angelo State College, San Angelo;

\$300,000 from a total of \$800,000 for a museum at Washington State Park;

\$200,000 for state aid to airport construction;

\$200,000 for further improvements at Dam B State Park near Jasper;

\$275,000 for boll weevil eradication

\$126,000 for salaries in the new Department of Mental Health and Retardation;

\$138,000 for water system Improvements at Rusk State Hospital;

\$12,000 a year for a new special director in the Parks and Wildlife Department;

\$5,000 for stream flow measurement in Upper Red River


