



The state of Texas has during the past couple of years become "tourist-conscious," and the West Texas area is also beginning to get in on the act.

In particular, two major tourist attractions have opened this summer, one near Amarillo and the other near Lubbock. The Pioneer Amphitheatre near Canyon is expected to be a perfect compliment to Palo Duro Canyon, and help pull tourists into the state park there.

Near Lubbock, some enterprising businessmen have built "Rimrock City" in a canyon near Buffalo Springs Lake, and are bidding for their share of the tourist dollar.

And, even closer to home, the people of Muleshoe have just finished erecting their monument to the Mule, which must also be considered in the tourism category.

Reports coming from those who have attended the production "Thundering Sounds of the West" at the Pioneer Amphitheatre say that the new outdoor theatre, carved out of Palo Duro Canyon, is worth going to see.

The production, which is pageant on the history of this section of the state, is not the one which is being prepared by Paul Green for production next year, but is a first-class production, we understand.

We toured Lubbock's Rimrock City last weekend. This facility features a full-size "frontier city," with stores built exactly as they might have appeared in the west and southwest 100 years or so ago.

The main building is the saloon, which is a take-off on the Crazy Horse Saloon of Six Flags Over Texas fame. The interior of the saloon, like the other buildings, has been reproduced to resemble as closely as possible those of yesterday.

There are old-time music boxes, a player piano, and some actual gambling tables used 100 years ago in Colorado.

The frontier town has every kind of store in its 100-year old setting: general store, post office, drug store, blacksmith, the works.

It even has a small church built on the canyon wall, and outside of the saloon, it is probably the most elaborate building of the bunch.

Besides the frontier town, the facility features a stagecoach ride, miniature train ride, an amusement park, zoo and reptile house.

The reptile house has about as complete a collection of snakes, lizards, etc., that we have ever seen, and that includes similar exhibits in San Antonio, San Diego and San Francisco.

The zoo will be the most complete of any in West Texas by the time it is completed.

For years, the only zoo in this area has been at Clovis. And, we might add, if you haven't taken your children to that zoo lately, you should, because it has changed a lot in the last few years, and is a credit to the town of Clovis.

But Rimrock City's zoo already has all the "basic" animals, including an elephant, lions, monkeys, deer, bear, a buffalo, an ostrich, and others. And it appears that they are adding to the zoo as time goes on, as a big cage was being installed while we were there Saturday.

Since this is a private enterprise, be prepared to pay a small fee for the zoo and frontier city. The next time you're in the Lubbock area, you might investigate.

**HURDLE PASSED**

**Commissioners Name Site For Multiple-Purpose Dam**

The Parmer County Commissioners Court, in its regular meeting Monday underscored its continued participation as a sponsor for a multiple - purpose structure for Running Water Draw, and asked the state Soil Conservation Service to plan for such a structure in the southeastern part of the county.

The court voted to back the "east" location of three proposed sites for a multiple purpose structure, ending what could have become a stumbling-block toward an eventual dam--selection of the site. Soil Conservation Service officials had discussed three possible locations for the multiple-purpose structure. The

one selected by the court lies on land owned by J.B. Williams four and one-half miles east of where Running Water Draw bisects State Highway 214.

The other two locations were (1) a quarter of a mile west of the highway, on land owned by Sue Stevens of Denver City and (2) on the B.R. Greeson

estate three miles west of the highway.

SCS officials stated that the "eastern" location would be the best as far as water yields are concerned; the middle location was next best, and the western location was considered poorest.

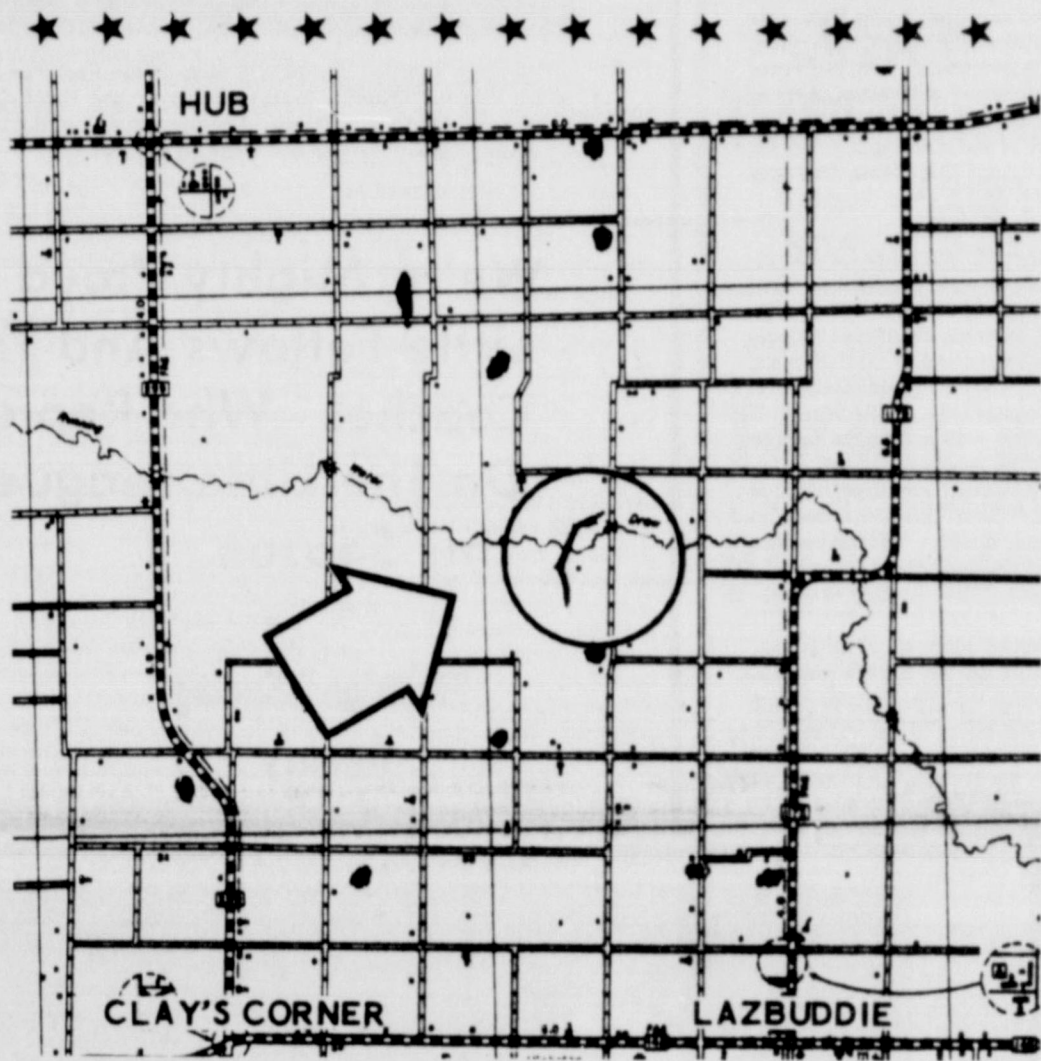
Members of the county steering committee for the multiple - purpose dam met earlier Monday and recommended that a site be chosen. The committee had favored the middle location because of its more central location and accessibility, with the "eastern" location rated second choice.

However, Andy Hurst, chairman of the county committee, stated that he is pleased with the commissioners' action.

"The main thing, as we have stated all along, is to secure a dam for Parmer County. The location is minor, so long as we get the dam while we can at such a relatively small investment," Hurst said.

At a meeting earlier this month in Bovina for members of the committee and commissioners court, SCS officials told the group they felt confident that Parmer County's project would be approved if the eastern site was chosen. The middle site "probably" would have been okayed, although some doubt was raised concerning the

## AN EDITORIAL

### Perhaps We Could Learn From The Swiss

The nation with the lowest crime rate and the fewest law enforcement officers per capita in the world is Switzerland. They have practically no juvenile delinquency problem. How would you like to live there?

Children under sixteen are not allowed to attend movies. They insist on rearing their children free from the influence of violence and sex which characterize American movies and TV. They say they do not want their children to make heroes of gangsters and sex perverts.

A driver's license cannot be obtained by children under 18, and tests are so difficult that they rarely get them until they are 19. Hence, there are no car thefts or crimes involving motor vehicles.

Dignity of labor is emphasized in Switzerland. Youngsters serve compulsory apprenticeship to learn a trade after they are 16. They are kept busy with their studies and craftsmanship when many young people in other nations loiter at drive-ins or street corners, or play high speed games of "chicken" on the highways. Jewish parents during Old Testament days were disgraced if their boys grew up without knowing a trade by which they could support a family. Our youth in America think they are smart if they can scheme to get by without doing any work.

Dating is not allowed until the age of 16. This is not the ruling of a few "prudes"; this is the national philosophy. This may be the reason Switzerland has the lowest divorce rate in the world; 3.59 divorces for 1,000 marriages.

While the young of the world are enslaved in the cult of violence and crime, people of this tiny landlocked nation have managed to solve the problem of juvenile delinquency by setting a pattern for their children -- a pattern of hard work and meaningful living.

Thirty - five years ago, Muleshoe raised mules (and some horses).

But today it's birds -- parakeets. Last Sunday's issue of The Journal contained an account of C.F. Garth's bird plant on West Third. Garth told how he got into the business and now is finding the vividly-- feathered little creatures profitable and interesting.

His neighbor, Mrs. Jay Brantley, also is in the business in a smaller way.

But now it develops that H.H. Snow, 308 W. 29th is also in the parakeet business in an even bigger way. He has 2000 birds, and a neighbor is building a similar plant. Snow, who houses his birds in 10 by 16 foot pens, is planning to help his neighbor put in a 2000 bird plant in September.

Snow is so fond of the bird business that he's willing to finance other couples while they are getting a start in the business. "I'll sell any older couple 100 pairs to get them started in this business," says Snow, "and sell them on credit, too."

Snow like Garth, has found the national demand for birds, "very good." He adds: "I can sell all the birds I can raise; they want every bird I can ship them." He sells to a wholesale firm in New York.

The commissioners evidently felt it best to go along with the "sure thing," by voting to support the eastern site for the dam.

Local supporters were beginning to press a "deadline" for getting a multiple-purpose dam in the overall work program for the Running Water Draw Watershed Project. Now, however, its inclusion in the program has been assured.

Monday's action isn't by far the last word as to the multiple-purpose structure, however. Next big hurdle will be to secure Department of Agriculture and congressional approval for the program (expenditure of federal funds), and eventually it will be voted upon by county residents.

Next immediate step for the project will be designing of possible recreational facilities by SCS personnel in cooperation with the local sponsoring group. The SCS will also estimate what the entire program will cost the county, and what the total federal participation will amount to.

"We felt the program would be a sounder one from a technical point of view by choosing the eastern site for the dam," stated County Judge Loyde Brewer.

Brewer pointed out that SCS officials estimated that the eastern location would be without water only once every 20 years on the average, while the western site would be dry three times during the same span.

In choosing the eastern site, commissioners also took into consideration legal drawbacks to the other two locations, which could have delayed the selection of a site indefinitely.

Also, the other two locations had not been surveyed, providing permission had been granted. The Williams site had already been surveyed, saving the county additional money as well as time.

It was estimated by the SCS that the cost of such a structure at the eastern site would be less than if it were built at the middle site.

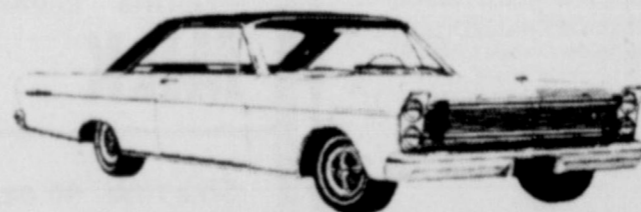

### On The Farm In Palmer County

By JOE VANZANDT  
County Agent

Now is the time to get your soil tested, (before wheat planting time arrives). The importance of testing your soil can be easily seen.

Recommendations from recent soil test for wheat in the county have varied from 80-0-0 to 100-50-0 for light grazing to 140-60-0 for heavy grazing.

It doesn't take much fertilizer saved to pay for a \$2.00 soil test. We just can't look at soil and know what nutrients it contains and what it needs to produce a good crop.

At the present time the best reliable method we have available to determine fertilizer requirements is a soil test. It is hard for the farmer to calculate the amount of soil nutrients that remain in the soil after the previous crop.

For a \$2.00 investment, plus a little time, a farmer can easily cut his fertilizer cost. Plus knowing that he is applying the right kind and amount of fertilizer necessary to produce the yields he is shooting for.

Come by the County Agents office for any soil testing information and supplies you need.

#### CHECK FOR COTTON INSECTS

We continue to see and hear of scattered infestations of fleahoppers, lygus bugs, bollworms and square borers over the county.

This means everyone should be checking his own cotton fields to see what the insect situation is and how much damage has been done.

We recommend only spraying when damaging numbers of insects are present. This is about 5% on bollworms and 15% to 25% fleahoppers or this many bugs per 100 terminals over a field. Also, we recommend using the recommended amount of an insecticide that is listed in our Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects available thru the County Agents office in Farwell.

#### COTTON AND 2-4-D

Our rainy weather last month brought on too good a crop of weeds.

We have received several calls lately about suspected 2,4-D damage to cotton over the county. Careless use of herbicides we feel causes a lot of 2,4-D damage.

If you suspect 2,4-D damage on cotton, continue caring for the crop as most damage claims are based on yield reduction. You should contact Gene Cupp with the Texas Department of Agriculture at 1924-34th Street, Lubbock, Texas.

Herbicide drift can be minimized by using a large volume of carrier per acre (10 to 20 gallons) and a low spray pressure (20 pounds per square inch). High pressure produces small spray droplets which are easily carried by wind.

Drift can also be minimized by keeping the spray boom as low as possible. This is usually about 20 inches above the top of the weeds. Sprays should be applied when the wind is less than 10 miles per hour and blowing away from sensitive crops.

2,4-D is very toxic to cotton and even when the best precautions are followed damage may result. Also it is not a good idea to spray wheatland hybrid sorghums as up to 1000 pounds of yield may be lost.

Under the State Herbicide regulations persons spraying their own land or crops must get a permit and pay a fee of ten cents per acre if he applies herbicides on more than 10 acres. Everyone using herbicides must have access to a wind gauge and comply with the wind velocity as outlined in the regulations. Copies of the permit and regulations are available at the County Agents office.

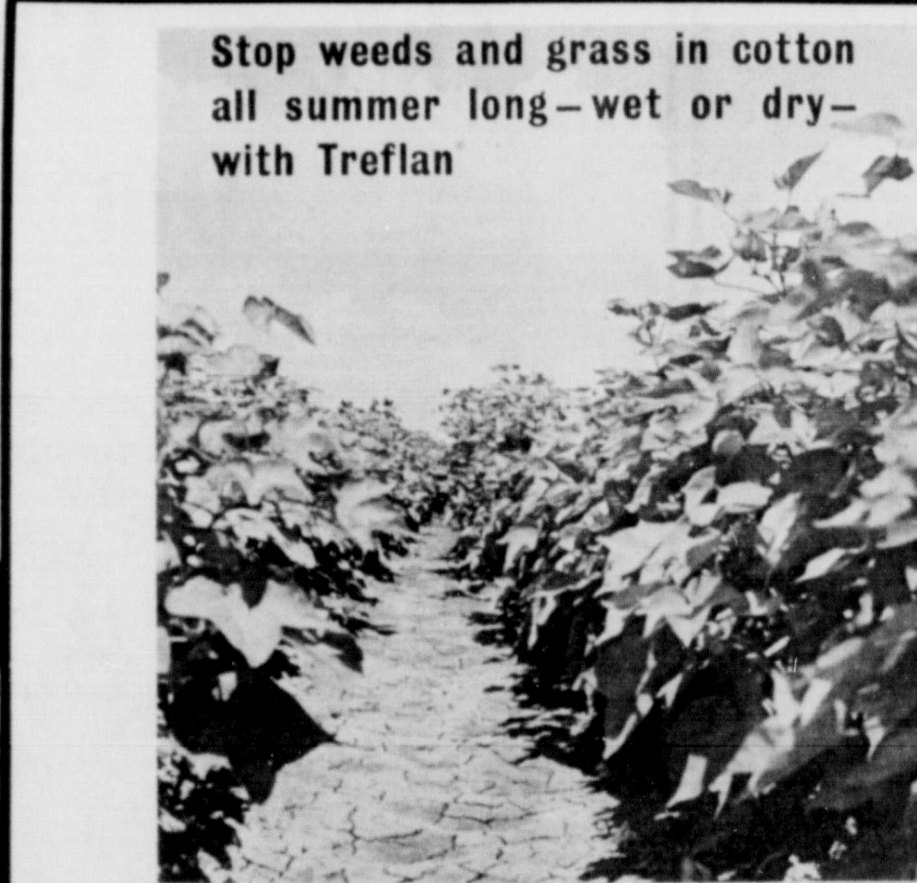

RESOLUTION APPROVING AND ADOPTING ESTIMATES OF THE COST OF IMPROVEMENTS, OF AMOUNTS TO BE ASSESSED FOR IMPROVEMENTS IN THE NATURE OF GRADING, LAYING CURB AND GUTTER AND PAVING PORTIONS OF STREETS, HIGHWAYS, AND AVENUES IN AND ALONG THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS, FIXING THE TIME AND PLACE FOR HEARING OF THE OWNERS OF ABUTTING PROPERTY, AND OTHER PERSONS INTERESTED IN SAID PROPERTY AND DIRECTING THE CITY SECRETARY TO PUBLISH NOTICE ON BEHALF OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS.

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Friona has heretofore ordered that portions of the streets, highways and avenues be improved by grading, installing concrete curb and gutter and paving with caliche base and triple asphalt surface together with incidentals and appurtenances, and arrangements therefore have been made and entered into by the City of Friona, Texas, with L. A. Purteill, Contractor, and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS, BY WHICH IS MEANT THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY, sometimes referred to as the City Council:

Section 1. That the estimates prepared by the City Engineers, Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, Consulting Engineers, be and are hereby adopted.

Section 2. NOTICE TO THE OWNERS OF PROPERTY ABUTTING UPON THE HEREINBELOW MENTIONED PORTIONS OF STREETS, HIGHWAYS AND AVENUES AND TO ALL OTHERS AFFECTED:

The governing body of the City of Friona, Texas, has heretofore ordered that the following portions of streets, highways and avenues in and along the boundaries of the City of Friona, Texas, be improved by raising, grading and filling and installing concrete curbs and gutters and installation of sewers and drains where necessary on streets, highways and avenues hereinafter designated, and it is hereby found and determined that the amount per front foot in each unit proposed to be assessed for such improvements against the abutting property and the owners thereof on the portions of said streets, avenues and highways improved and the total costs of improvements on such portions of said streets, highways and avenues are the amounts set forth in the respective following paragraphs which cover the units therein designated, to wit:

Unit 1-65, 14th Street (Except Nelson Welch Property) from the East Property Line of Pierce Avenue to the West Property Line of Walnut Avenue; assessment per front foot for paving and curb and gutter, \$5.44; estimated total cost of improvements \$9,303.04.

Unit 2-65, 13th Street from the East Property Line of Virginia Avenue to the West Property Line of Maple Avenue; assessment per front foot for paving and curb and gutter, \$3.88; estimated total cost of improvements \$2,556.40.

Unit 3-65, 13th Street from the East Property Line of Jackson Avenue to the West

Property Line of Virginia Avenue; assessment per front foot for paving and curb and gutter, \$3.88; estimated total cost of improvements \$2,556.40.

The arrangements for the making and construction of such improvements with pavement of triple coarse asphalt surface treatment and a six (6") flexible base has been made and entered into by the City of Friona, Texas, and the rolls and statements showing the proposed amounts to be assessed against the abutting property and the owners thereof, have been filed with the City, and such rolls and statements showing other matters and things, have been approved and the City Council of the said City has fixed a time and place for hearing to the owners of property abutting upon said portions of streets, highways and avenues and to all others affected, at which hearing the amounts to be assessed against the respective parcels of abutting land and the owners thereof, for improvements in the units upon which the particular parcels of property abut, and the amount of benefits to the respective parcels of property by means of the improvements in the unit upon which the particular property abuts, the regularity of the proceedings with reference to such improvements, the apportionment of the cost of such improvements, and other matters and things will be determined, and after such hearing, assessments will, by ordinance, be made and levied and such hearing will be had and held by and before the City Council of Friona, Texas in the City Hall of the City of Friona, Texas, on the 9th day of August, 1965, at 8 o'clock P. M. The rolls and statements showing the proposed amounts of such assessments are on file in the office of the City Secretary and open to inspection of any interested parties at any time and of all said matters and things, all such owners of property, as well as any others in any wise affected or interested will take due notice.

By order of the City Council of the City of Friona, Texas, this 19th day of July, 1965.

No notice other than hereinbefore provided for shall be necessary but publication of such notice shall be due and sufficient notice to any and all

other persons, firms, corporations, and other parties,

Section 3. That a hearing be given and held by and before the governing body of the City of Friona, Texas, to all persons owning or claiming any property abutting any part of portion of said streets, highways and avenues described in Section 2 of this resolution, as well as owning and claiming any interest in such property. Such hearing shall be given and held on the 9th day of August, 1965, at 8 o'clock P. M. in the City Hall of Friona, Texas, and the City Secretary is hereby directed to give notice of the time and place of such hearing, and of other matters and facts in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Laws of the State of Texas and Article 1105(b), Texas Revised Civil Statutes, 1925 as amended. Such notice shall be by advertisement inserted at least three (3) times in a newspaper published in the City of Friona, Texas, the first publication shall be made at least ten (10) days before the said hearing. Said notice shall comply with and be in accordance with the terms and provisions of this resolution and said act as amended.

#### PROPER LAUNDRING METHODS HELP KNITS HOLD THEIR SHAPE AND SIZE

There is an art to laundering knit clothing, and you can become an expert in no time. Reading the labels carefully before laundering avoids wash day hazards.

When buying cotton knits, be sure they are made by a new process which compresses the fabric and makes it highly resistant to shrinkage. Wash in warm water to reduce shrinkage.

Select a low-to-moderate setting and do not allow the cotton knits to get completely dry, as this causes shrinkage, also Remove the garments from the dryer, then gently pat and pull into shape.

Acrylic or nylon knits may be dried completely in the dryer with relatively little shrinkage. But don't leave them in a turned-off dryer as they are apt to wrinkle badly.

Because agitation has a tendency to felt wool fibers, the woolen knits should be hand washed by gently squeezing rather than rubbing and wringing. Wash them in lukewarm water or in cold water, using a special cold-water detergent. Block them for drying, and dry flat.

#### MEATS FOR THE OUTDOOR GRILL

Outdoor meat cookery need not be limited to the expensive cuts of meat. With the barbecue season at hand, it's time to take inventory and consider all of the meat choices.

High quality chuck, ground beef and round are all good cooked on the grill. The chuck and round are improved by a tenderizer.

This renewal of interest in tender steaks for outdoor cooking comes when the supply of steaks begins to get short. Some beef prices are up slightly because fewer beef animals are being marketed.

This is also the time of year when pork prices usually rise. Add to this the fact that the pig population is down, and the natural result is that pork prices also are on a slight rise.

Indications are that plenty of chicken will continue to be available.
