ered poorest. Members of the county steering committee for the multiple - purpose dam met earlier Monday and recommended that a site be chosen. The committee had favored the middle location because of its more central location and accessability, with the 'eastern" location rated second choice.

However, Andy Hurst, chairman of the county committee, stated that he is pleased with the commissioners' action.

"The main thing, as we have stated all along, is to secure a dam for Parmer County. The location is minor, so long as we get the dam while we can at such a relatively small investment," Hurst said.

At a meeting earlier this month in Bovina for members of the committee and commissioners court, SCS officials told the group they felt confident that Parmer County's project would be approved if the eastern site were chosen. AN EDITORIAL

Perhaps We Could Learn From The Swiss

The nation with the lowest crime rate and the fewest law enforcement officers per capita in the world is Switzerland. They have practically no juvenile delinquency problem. How would you like to live there?

Children under sixteen are not allowed to attend movies. They insist on rearing their children free from the influence of violence and sex which characterize American movies and TV. They say they do not want their children to make heroes of gangsters and sex perverts.

A driver's license cannot be obtained by children under 18, and tests are so difficult that they rarely get them until they are 19. Hence, there are no car thefts or crimes involving motor vehicles.

. . . .

Dignity of labor is emphasized in Switzerland. Youngsters serve compulsory apprenticeship to learn a trade after they are 16. They are kept busy with their studies and carftsmanship when many young people in other nations loiter at drive-ins or street corners, or play high speed games of "chicken" on the highways. Jewish parents during Old Testament days were disgraced if their boys grew up without knowing a trade by which they could support a family. Our youth in America think they are smart if they can scheme to get by without doing any work.

Dating is not allowed until the age of 16. This is not the ruling of a few "prudes"; this is the national philosophy. This may be the reason Switzerland has the lowest divorce rate in the world; 3,59 divorces for 1,000 marriages.

While the young of the world are enslaved in the cult of violence and crime, people of this tiny landlocked nation have managed to solve the problem of juvenile delinquency by setting a pattern for their children -- a pattern of hard work and meaningful living.

Snow is so fond of the bird business that he's willing to finance other couples while they are getting a start in the business. "I'll sell any older couple 100 pairs to get them started in this business," says Snow, "and sell them on credit, too." Snow like Garth, has found the national
