Trustee Election Set By Friona School Board

The folks at our office were sure hoping Monday that the predicted blizzard would bring so much snow that we'd have to suspend operations.

We even saved some film on the roll in our press camera for the snow picture we thought would materialize.

However, it appears at this writing that if we wait until it snows or otherwise precipitates to finish our paper, we may miss several issues.

At the risk of sounding pessimistic, it's beginning to look like that period of time when the old-timer said it "never did rain."

Kinda liked one man's opinion who said he wouldn't care if it snowed until it was "down-hill to Denver" (from Friona).

Sure signs of the dry spell one day last week in Friona, when we decided to water our lawn during the springlike weather. The water pressure was down, so apparently many others were doing the same.

Last Saturday night we were guests of the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association at the organization's annual meeting. R.B. McAllister, Lubbock radio man, was the speaker. Many of you no doubt remember "Mac" from his radio days in Clovis.

We're going to quote some of McAllister's material in the next several lines hoping he won't object too much. Don't know whether he writes his own jokes, or has a "ghostwriter," but he had some good ones. Like the prospective teacher down in East Texas who was applying to the school board for a job. "Do you teach that the earth is flat or round," asked the board president. "Gentlemen, I'm prepared to teach it either way," was the retort.

He said that the government had found the perfect place for Cassius Clay -- at Fort Bragg. However, the rumor was that Cassius, if he had to be inducted, wanted to go "AGH" -- After George Hamilton.

Mac's talk was on a "young at heart" theme. He pointed out that the only way we'll ever have peace is to find it first with ourselves, our fellow man, and with our God.

Highlighting the meeting as far as Friona was concerned was the naming of A.L. Black to the organization's board of directors.

When you get that paycheck about 60 cents out of every income dollar is already spoken for, says "Finance Facts" monthly newsletter published by the National Consumer Association. (And in our case, that sounds low).

Most of the consumer's income is either deducted from his paycheck before he gets it, or is regularly blocked out for necessary outlays such as food, clothing, transportation, fixed expenses like home mortgages or rent and interest charges, and payments to insurance and pension funds.

Beyond this, most consumers have also already committed much of what is left of their income by prior spending decisions.

The newsletter says that in the first half of 1966, aggregate consumer purchasing power (income plus credit) was at an annual rate of 529 billion dollars.

Of this amount, discretionary purchasing power (the dollar amount that measures the American consumers' ability to exercise independent choice as to spending or saving) was estimated at 218 billion dollars or 41 per cent.

Consumers are saving about 15 per cent of their discretionary income, according to the report.

TEACHERS' PAY

Texas ranks 29th in the nation in the average salary of public school classroom teachers. The figure for Texas is \$5,950 while the national average is \$6,506, according to the Texas State Teachers Association.

The annual board of trustees election for the Friona Independent School District was set at a meeting of the board last week. The election will be held on Saturday, April 1.

Three members of the board have their terms expiring. They are Mrs. V.J. Zeman, C.V.

Potts and Ralph Shelton.

Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr reported on the six new teachers who have been employed beginning at mid-term. They are Larry Howe, high school vocational agriculture; Mrs. Annamary Ortega, Spanish, replacing Mrs. L.B. Mc-

Clain, who resigned for reasons of health.

Also Mrs. Mabel Reese, third grade; Mrs. Bill Teal, sixth grade; Mrs. Billy Sides, first grade; and Miss Patsy Sue Brown, fifth grade.

Porter Roberts, school tax assessor - collector, reported

that during December, a total of \$111,000.88 in taxes was collected. Delinquent taxes as of December 31 stood at \$7,745.66.

Taxes collected as of Dec. 31 the past year represented 66.5 per cent of the total. On the same date year previous, a total of 71.2 per cent had been collected.

The board discussed literary and academic awards for high school students. A committee was appointed to work out a plan and present it at the next board meeting.

Farr presented his monthly reports on the activity, cafeteria and transportation funds, as well as the school budget. December bills were approved for payment.

AT DIMMITT

Squaws Win First Half; Chiefs Fall

Friona High School teams "traded out" first half championships at Dimmitt Tuesday night. The Squaws, with an assist from Abernathy, sacked up the first half title by downing the Bobbies, 65-58.

The Chiefs, needing a win to tie the Bobcats for the first half crown, carried the fight to the hometown Dimmitt club, but dropped a 69-61 decision. The Squaws went into the game deadlocked with both Dimmitt and Floydada for the district lead with a 5-1 record. Abernathy did Friona a favor by beating Floydada, 34-30, to leave Friona at the top of the list at 6-1.

The girls' game was much

closer than the final score indicates. Friona had only a one-point lead with 38 seconds left in the game (59-58), but added six points to their total before the buzzer sounded and Dimmitt went scoreless.

The Bobbies salvaged individual honors as A'llan Webb singled the nets for 53 points, including 29 of 32 free throw attempts. One of Dimmitt's regular forwards, Barbara Summers, was injured in the team's last game and did not play; thus most of the scoring responsibility fell to Miss Webb.

And she didn't let her team down. She played the entire second half with four fouls,

finally getting her fifth with 15 seconds to play.

Cindy Ingram, who had upped the margin from 59-58 with a pair of free throws with 33 seconds left, scored two more following Miss Webb's foul, and that made it 63-58. Hazel Fallwell got open for a layup at the buzzer for the final margin.

Four-point leads were the most either team enjoyed during the first half. Friona erased Dimmitt's longest lead with two field goals by Fallwell, and then Ingram's two charity shots with a second left gave Friona a 35-33 halftime lead.

Miss Ingram scored two baskets in the last minute of the third quarter as Friona went ahead to stay at 44-43. Susan Neill canned a jump shot to give the Squaws their longest lead to that point; 48-43 at the three quarter mark.

The Squaws made it a seven-point edge on Miss Neill's jumper to start the final quarter, but Dimmitt, riding the hot hand of Miss Webb, rallied to trail by just a point and less than a minute to play.

The Chiefs carried the fight to Dimmitt, and had the lead or a tie for all the first quarter, which ended 16-15 in Friona's favor.

Friona grabbed a 22-17 lead midway of the second stanza, their longest lead. However, Dimmitt scored seven straight points to assume the lead at 24-22.

Census Being Taken

The annual census for Friona Independent School District of children who will be school age next year is being taken this month, reminds Alton Farr, superintendent of Schools.

Deadline for the census blanks to be turned in is January 31.

All children who will be six years old or older by Sept. 1, 1967 and not more than 18 years of age by the same date and live within the boundaries of the Friona Independent School District must be included in the census report.

Even though a child is not in school or is married, but is within the ages of six to 18; he should be enumerated, Farr points out.

The census is required by the state, and also helps the local school in planning for the next year according to how many school-age students may be expected.

Parents are urged to see that all children of the district are enumerated, Farr says.

Census blanks are available at the superintendent's office. Parents may also call 247-2281 for a blank.

AN EDITORIAL

Manufacturers Increase Their Advertising Budgets For 1967

Advertising budgets of national manufacturers in the United States have been increased for 1967.

The increase is a reflection of evidence that there is no real basis for fear of a serious depression or uncontrolled inflation. It is also an investment in what could be a resurgent boom.

While buying power has increased to an all-time high, and unemployment reached an all-time low, the productive capacity of American industry is not being fully utilized.

Money is not "tight" from

the standpoint of most industries and local retailers. The consumer has been tight with his money in making certain types of purchases because he has not been stimulated to buy.

The national manufacturers have taken the first step toward speeding the movement of goods and money with vigorous advertising programs.

However, the efforts of national industries cannot be effective unless the local retailer takes a major share of the responsibility.

The large manufacturer begins the selling process through national advertising, but local retail advertising must finally place products in the hands of the consumers.

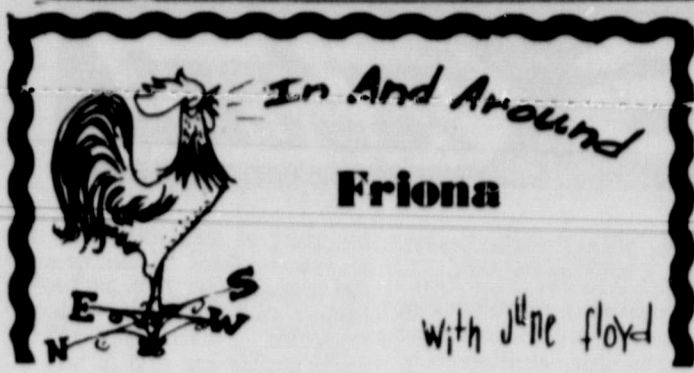

Norton had radioed to Clovis airport for landing instructions immediately before the crash. Two pilots in the area heard him request wind velocity and direction and one reported seeing the beacon light on the plane vanish, but did not see the crash.

Mrs. Norton and Mrs. Langford were in the Langford home when the crash occurred about 300 yards from the house. Mrs. Norton notified the Farmer County sheriff's office of the crash.

2. Call in person at the School Tax Office and get a census blank and fill it out.

Remember if your child will be six years old next September 1, he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older next September 1 he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.

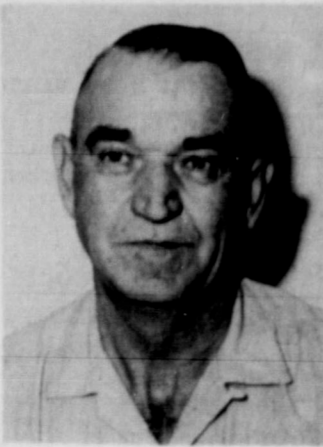
PHELPS PREACHES

SOIL SAMPLE INFORMATION

When filling out the soil sample information sheet to be sent with the soil sample be sure you fill it out as complete as possible.

Complete part "B" (Cropping History) as accurately as possible. The soil scientist needs this information in order that he can make the best recommendation for the type crop that will be grown on a certain type of soil.

Previous crops grown and amount of fertilizer applied information helps the scientist determine possible fertilizer

carryover. Many samples are sent in without the cropping history information. If you are farming a new piece of ground for the first time and do not know the cropping history make a special effort to get this information for sampling purposes.

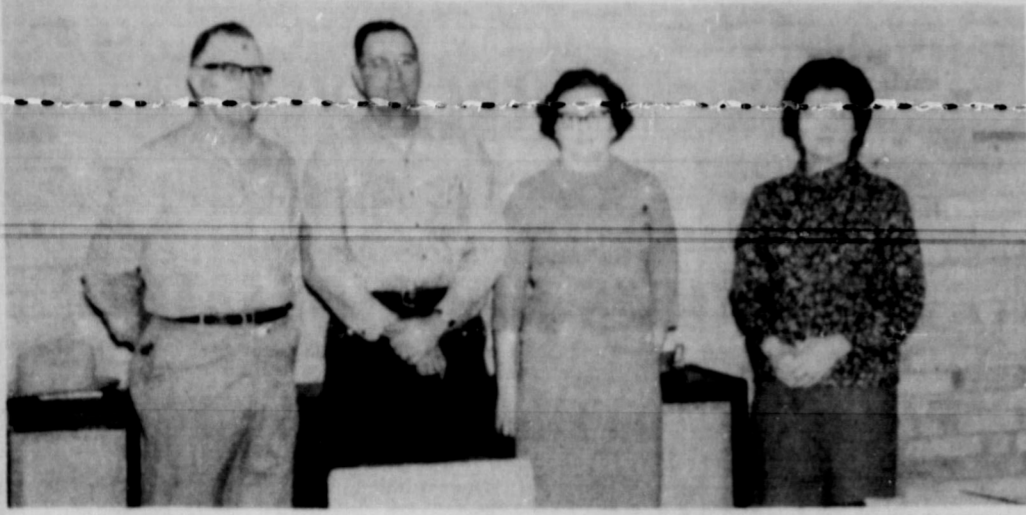

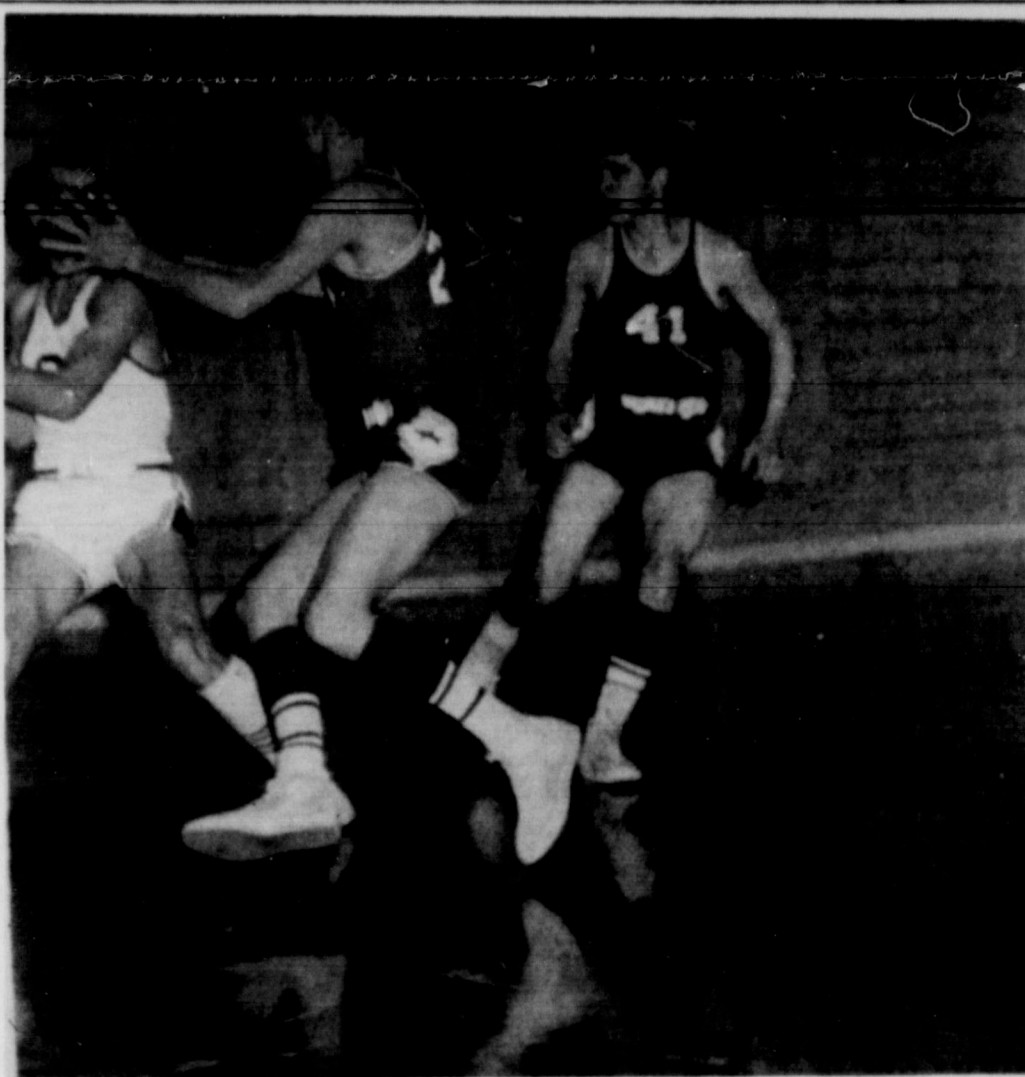

Teams Edge Past Abernathy

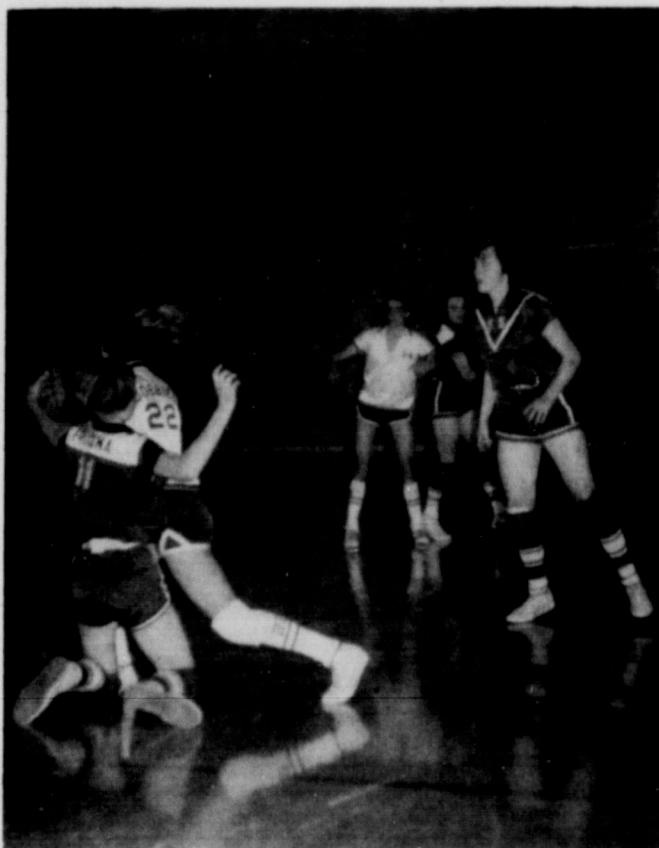
Both the Friona High School Chieftains and Squaws rose to the occasion at Abernathy last Friday, beating the Antelope teams in important district games.

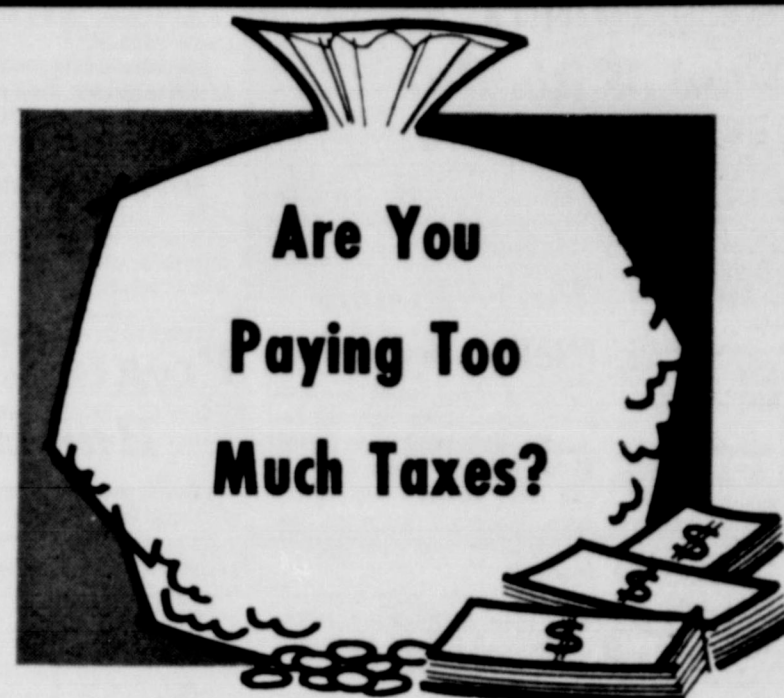
Hazel Fallwell led the Squaws in scoring with 28 points. Ray Murphree had 18 and Bobby Jordan 17 for the Chiefs.

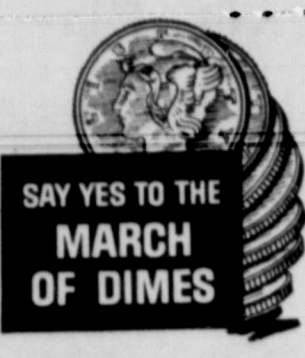
