

Earl Drake Now Stationed Near



suggests, a "Southern Weekly." Well, so much for the power of the OPA to control votes. Now a paragraph from Lynn W. Landrum's writings concerning the vote controlling power of Sidney Hillman's CIO and PAC, which is also taken from the Southern Weekly, but reprinted from the Dallas Morning News:

"If the CIO takes \$6,000,000 out of the pay envelopes of American workers to have a monetary say about who goes to ongress, what have you to say about it here in the Dallas congressional district? If Sidney Hillman, who probably never saw Dallas, decides to send \$60,000 to \$100,000 here to assure the election of a man who agrees to vote in congress as Sidney Hillman and his PAC say to vote on each of seventeen stated matters, he can do it and he will do it. What Mr. Hillman is doing, is in effect, if not in fact, practically this: He gets together a committee who lay down seventeen planks, which they-the committeefavor. Then the CIO take the \$6,000,000 out of the pay envelopes of men who cannot veto a single one of those plankswho, in most cases, never heard of those planks, and finally Mr. Hillman says where that \$6,000, 000 shall be sent to elect 100 congressmen.





Gilchrist, however, in his letter to Evans, cleared the decks as fan as the college might be involved in the bidding for the property.

"We have gone into great detail with reference to the advisability of the college taking over the POW camp at Hereford", he said. "We do not find a y practical justification for taking over the camp, hence we wish to release you completely from any obligations to us concerning it."

Gilchrist still held open the possibility that an experiment station might be established in the future.

"We are of the opinion," he stated, "that you have some research problems in that area, particularly as they refer to vegetable crops, on which no experimental work is being done under conditions typical of your

"If there is general interest in such work covering a large area in your section of the state, we want to do what we can in helping answer such problems.
