# COUNTY TO ISSUE \$45,000 IN WARRANTS

Minutes of the Commissioner's Court state that a montion has been made and passed by that body Christmas Issue To issue \$45,00 in Warrants. The vote on the motion was unamicus.

This money will be spent, as set forth in the minutes of the court, for completition of the remodeling work on the courthouse and the purchasing of furniture and fixtures for the building.

Since the work was started some six months ago, it has been decided by the court to make some changes in the original specifications for the remodeling work. Funds for this additional work were not available in the original sum agreed upon in the contested bond election which would have seen \$410,00 put into the work but was cut to \$225, 000 by the settlement on the contest.

Work on remodeling the old part of the courthouse is now underway and is expected to be completed by Spring.

Work is also well along on the addition to the Rankin Park Building. A large room is being added to the south side and is expected 60 days or so.




