## Rutherford Talks About Political Interest Projects

John J. T. Rutherford, a visitor Monday night at the Lion's Club and to the local people.

He is presently engaged in an adjournment-period throughout the sprawling 16th Congressional District.

He said the concept that we are sending money into foreign lands



can solve our problems, and said that he has voted "against every penny" of the foreign aid program. He also said that he has voted seven consecutive times against increasing the national debt, and has voted for considerably less Government spending than President Eisenhower has demanded each year during his Congressional service. He pointed out that all Texas Democratic Congressmen and Senators have staunchly supported the 27 1/2% oil depletion allowance, and said that "we will continue to support the oil and gas industry so important to this area—and to a man".

## Midland Highway Road Work Gets Underway

The Highway Department has started a new highway project eleven miles from Midland-Upton County State 349 and extends to U. S. 67 in Rankin. The project is approximately

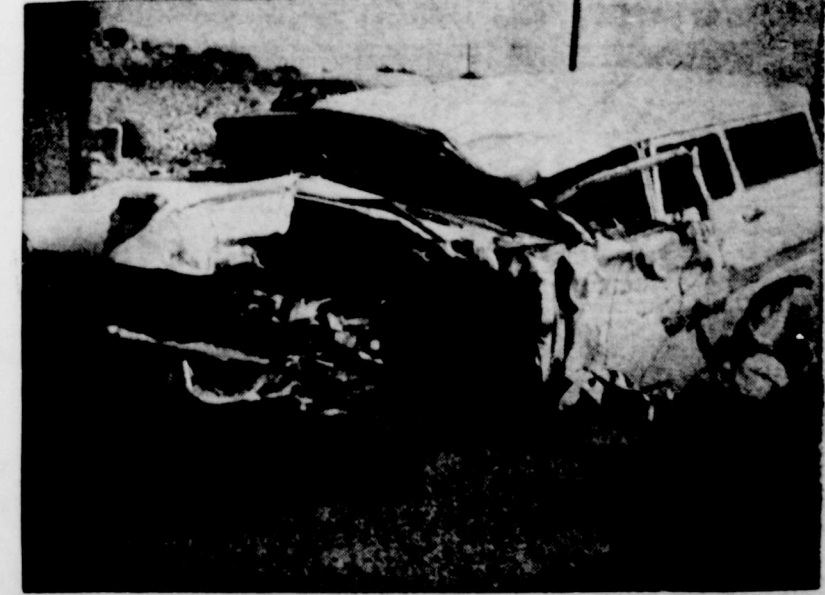
## Father of Rankinite Buried Sunday

Hindu or Buddhist as President. You might not care for a Baptist or a Methodist. That's your privilege and it's just as good a reason as not liking a man's politics.

And on the question of what the Constitution has to say about religious freedom, the Democrats are getting the cart before the horse. 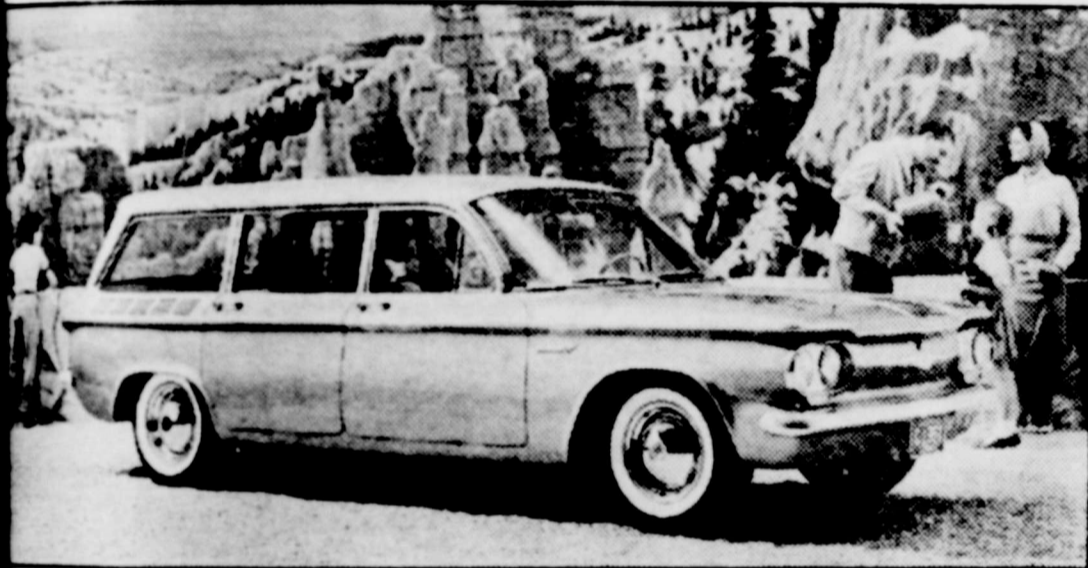
**RANKIN STUDENT NAMED TO MERIT AWARD HONOR**

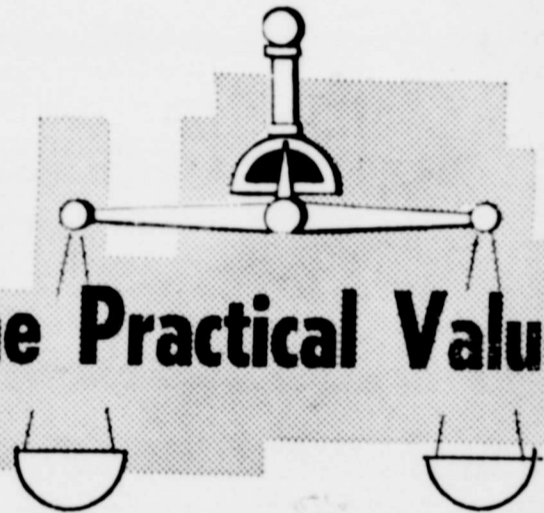

## TELEPHONE TALK

### FIRST PHONE CALL VIA SATELLITE!

The day isn't too far off when you and your family, relaxing in your home right here in Rankin, may watch a royal wedding in Europe or a tennis match in Australia by live television. Or you may place a call to Singapore or Calcutta—by way of man-made satellites thousands of miles in the sky.

These things were only dreams a few years ago. Now they are much closer to reality, all because of "Project Echo." It was the first successful attempt to "bounce" a voice off a satellite.

Perhaps you've seen the silvery "Echo" satellite orbiting the earth. To think of "bouncing" a phone call off it staggers the imagination. But that's what happened when a Bell Telephone Laboratories engineer in New Jersey talked by way of outer space with an engineer in California. They said they could hear each other as clearly as if they were talking across town.

Project Echo relied heavily on telephone science and technology. Bell Laboratories scientists not only participated in the first test of voice communications via satellite, but Bell Labs provided the guidance system that directed the satellite into its selected orbit.

This test opens a new era of worldwide communications. The Bell System has already proposed a plan for using satellites as relay stations to carry telephone calls and television programs throughout the world.
