Rankin Student Sets College Math Mark

A news item appearing in "The Skiff", T. C. U. Campus Newspaper, dated September 29, 1961, tells the following story of another success by a Rankin High School graduate:

"For the first time in TCU history, a freshman has scored 59 out of a possible 60 on the mathematics achievement test.

Emmett B. McGill, from Rankin, made the record grade.

The achievement test is given to all students with two years of high school algebra or geometry.

Dr. Ben Goldbeck, Associate Professor of Mathematics, said average scores on the test usually run from the middle 20's to the 30's. It was given this year to approximately 1000 students."

McGill is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. McGill and was the top honor student in the graduating class of 1960 from RHS. He competed in many mathematical contests during his high school years and represented the local school in State competition several times.

First District Game Will Be Top Homcoming Attraction

"Alumni Come Home!" This is the cry at Rankin High School this week because the 1961 Homecoming takes place Friday, October 13.

Homecoming officially opens at 8:30 a.m. with the Freshmen beating a drum until 7:30 Friday evening. This has been a noisy tradition for the past six years.

Afternoon activities include a down-town pep rally at the traffic light intersection on 8th and Main at 3:30 and the senior class-sponsored barbecue in the school cafeteria from 5 'til 7 p.m. The pep rally is free but admission to the barbecue is \$1.25 for adults and 75 cents for students.

After the barbecue is the highlight of the homecoming events—the Red Devils engage the Van Horn Eagles in the first conference game of the season. This contest begins at 7:30 instead of 8 as have the non-conference games.

Following the football game will be the Homecoming Dance which will continue until 1 a.m. Admission is \$1 per person.

All ex-students, their dates, and present high school students and their dates are invited to attend. The dance is not open to the public but parents of alumni and current students will be welcome also. The dance will be held at

the Rankin Park Building.

Music will be by a Stu Ross combo.

With a new game offered every few minutes, fans at the Rankin-Sonora game last Friday night got 60 minutes of thrill packed football before the Red Devils were nosed out on the score board 21-20 by the visitors from Sutton County.

Both teams played fast, hard ball with the Sonora defense being all that it was billed to be. Rankin maintained a lead most of the way in the game but could never get in an extra score for a buffer and consequently lost the match with about 4 minutes left in the game when the Brochos kicked the extra point on their last touchdown.

The Sonora squad had given up only 35 points in five games until they ran into the Red Devils and were elated to get out with their one-point victory.

Friday night, Homecoming, the Red Devils will entertain a strong Van Horn team in their district opener. The Eagles and the Red Devils have always put on a first class show over the years and are about even in the won-lost department with each other.

Van Horn will go into the game this week with the most impressive

record for non-conference games of the two teams but their competition has not been on quite the same equal as that met thus far by the Rankin Red Devil eleven. The Eagles have a young team but will field an eleven with experience in the key posts and is expected to outweigh Rankin by some 20 pounds in the line while backfield averages will be almost equal.

Elsewhere in the district Wink is expected to have an easy time with Fabens while Sanderson will be the choice over Iraan. The Rankin-Van Horn game should be the game of the week in this district with the odds about a toss-up.

B AND JUNIOR HIGH

In the B game scheduled last week in McCamey, it was no contest as the Badger squad called off the contest due to injury of one of their players. This week the B team will go to Iraan for a game at 6 o'clock.

This will be preceded by a Jr. High tilt at 5 p.m. Iraan Juniors hold the only win over the Rankin Junior High and the local lads, following an open date last week, are expected to be out to take care of the mark on their season record.

It has been pointed out to him by several "Boys" that there are a number of former Red Devils living right here in Rankin who used to beat Ozona almost as regular as the stage coach ran. In fact, back then, the Rankin crew beat just about everything in sight including such places as Midand. Of course, at times they had to do a little looking to find enough to make up a team and it has even been rumored that for one game, a coach was suited out—this, of course, is purely rumor-talk and is without doubt, truthless.

Some of these "Boys" have had their own boys play for the Red Devils and are now looking forward to their grandchildren following in their footsteps—but they have not forgotten that they won ball games all over the place.

Now I would not for a second think of trying to take away any of the credit due this group of athletes who carried the old school color to great heights and such were not my intentions in saying that this year's team was the first to win over Ozona. It's just that my reference had to do with the present-day teams while the former players were from another era. I'll admit that their record should stand as the basis from which to judge but the fact is that I can find no record of the record.

Somewhere back down the line, Rankin gave up the eleven-man football team and went to the six-man game. After playing this for several years—years in which they were the terror of the league—they moved into Class B eleven-man about 1952 and up into Class A last year.

My record keeping is dated from the time they resumed their eleven man playing in the early 50's.—but it looks like I'm going to have to change my dates and move back a few years—which I will

 that's just part of it.

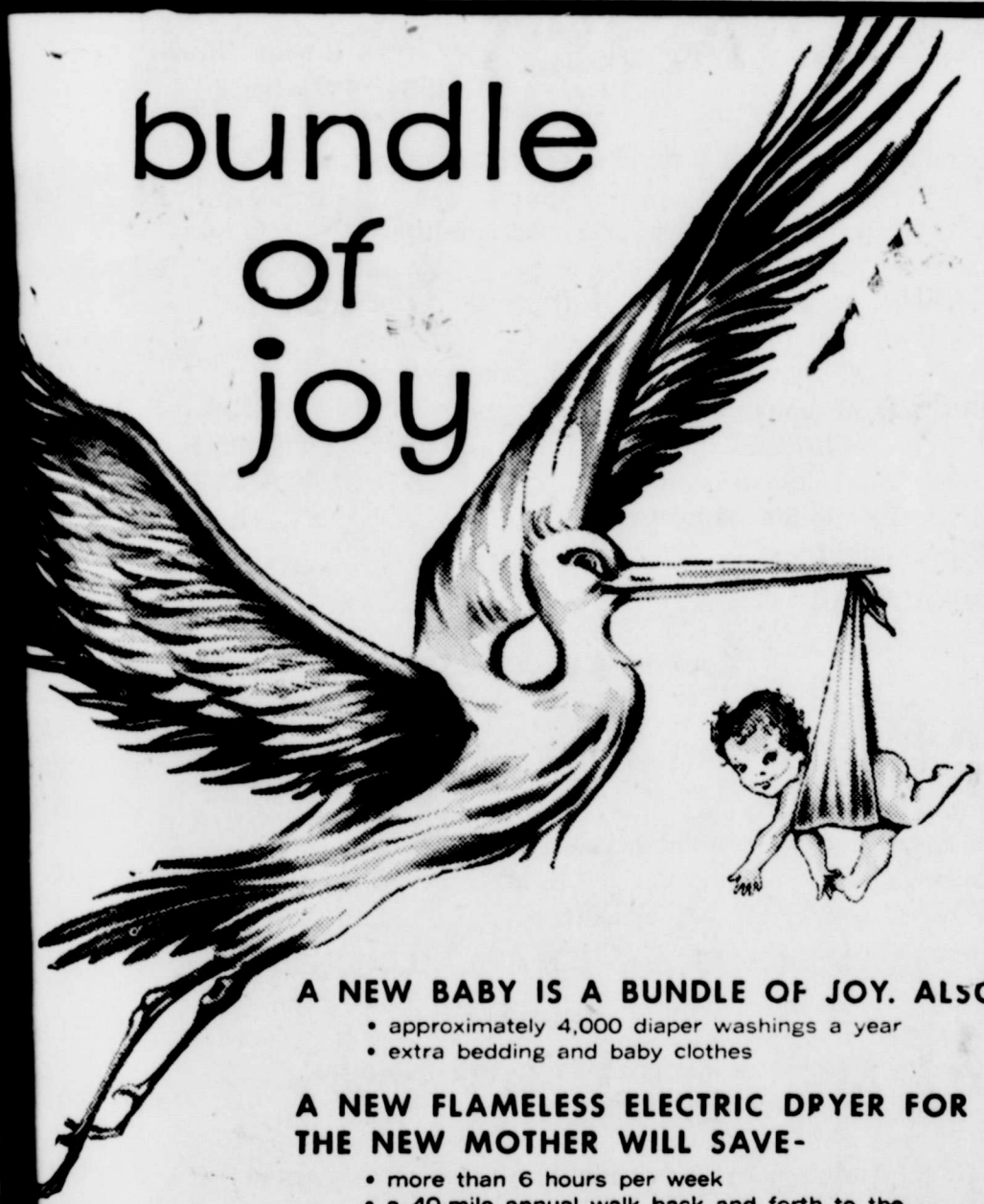
Program building committees in

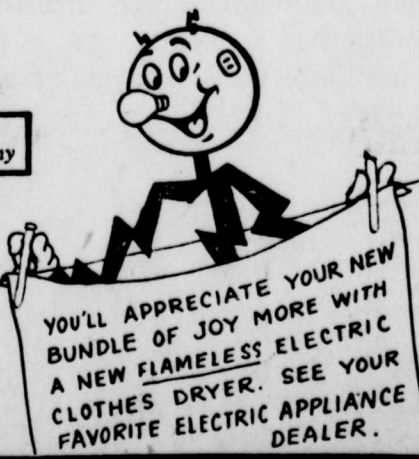

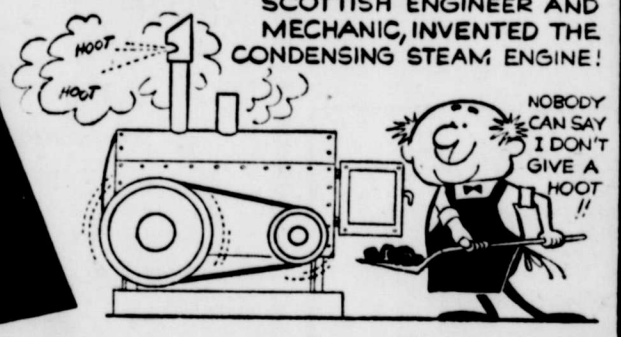

Draft Status Told for "Eligible" Men

Since President Kennedy's announcement of increased draft calls some men who have no legal obligation for draft registration or military service have been corresponding with Texas draft boards about their "obligation", according to Wm. B. Sinclair, Maj., USAF.

If you were born on or before August 30, 1922, you are not registered with a draft board and you have no legal obligation to register. Furthermore, you have no responsibility to keep a draft board advised of your current address, according to the Major.

If you were born after August 30, 1922, you are legally required to be registered, unless you are not yet 18-years-old.

If you are registered and have reached the age of 35, you are no longer liable for military service under the present law; but you are still obligated to keep your local board advised of your current address.

Some men are no longer liable at the ages 26 and 28. At least three ages, when a man is no longer liable for service, he is classified V-A, and the little classification notice he is required to carry in his pocket is so marked.

year was announced this week.
This year, the parade will form at the parking area of the football field and proceed North up Main Street, disbanding near 10th. This will be a somewhat shorter route than that previously taken and will enable the smaller children to make the parade without having to walk so far.

In addition, a 10 or 15 minute stop will be made near the center of town to allow judges to make a better inspection of the contestants for awarding prizes as well as give spectators more time to view the "spooks" and to take pictures. In addition, it will prevent the parade from breaking up along the highway and will be an added safety factor.

Parade time will be 5:30 p.m. according to chairman W. O. Adams. Prizes of \$10 for the best float from each of the 3 schools and 10 one-dollar prizes for individual costumes, plus a \$10 float prize for the best out-side-of-the-school entry will be given by the Parent-Teacher Association.

There will be 3 judges for the contests.

Anyone may enter either a float, or take part in costume in the parade.

The parade and the carnival is to be held on Saturday, October 28.

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TEXAS LAWMEN

Major George Wythe Baylor Ranger

"... the Apaches ran like a herd of deer . . ."

George W. Baylor is said to be the first ardent secessionist to raise the Confederate flag in Austin, and he soldiered with distinction throughout the Civil War. However, Texans remember best his Ranger service on the western rim of the state. There, in 1879, a particularly vicious band of Apaches from Mexico, led by the notorious Victorio, was raiding and killing. Ranger Lt. Baylor was ordered to Ysleta to clean up the frontier. Accompanied by his wife and small daughter, he made the lonely six-hundred mile trek from San Antonio to Ysleta by mule and wagon. With Baylor's Rangers in action Victorio's days were numbered. His defeat and death ended the Apache terror for all time. Later, as a major, Baylor commanded a number of Ranger companies during the disturbance over fence cutting. After retiring from the Rangers in 1885, he represented El Paso County in the State Legislature, one of the many men of the Baylor family to leave their mark in Texas history.
