Closing date for this phase of the balloting is June 2. Voters are reminded that they can cast an absentee ballot only during the regular office hours at the Clerk's office which are from 8:00 a. m. until 5 p.m., five days a week. Absentee ballots may also be cast by mail in certain instances.

Kirby Dawkins, Democratic Chairman for Upton County, announced this week that only two election boxes will be in operation in the county for the June 6 vote.

In a statement mailed out on Tuesday, Dawkins said:

"According to Article 2.02, paragraph (g) of the Texas Election Code, and with the approval of

the Executive Director of the State Democratic Executive Committee, the Upton County Democratic Executive Committee will combine voting boxes for the Democratic Primary Runoff on June 6, 1964.

This is possible since there are no County Offices on the ballot for this election.

Voting Precincts 1, 2, and 3 will vote in the Courthouse in Rankin with E. C. Higday as Presiding Judge. Voting Precincts 4, 5, and 6 will vote in the McCamey school administration building with Mrs. Geneva Sumrall as the Presiding Judge."

Only two races will appear on the Democratic Ballot. They will pit Joe Pool against Robert W. Baker for United States Representative-at-Large; and Richard C. (Dick) White against Malcolm McGregor for United States Representative of the 16th Congressional District.

Dr. James Gossett, Republican Chairman for Upton County said that his party would also hold a Run-off election in which George Bush faces Jack Cox for United States Senator, the winner to meet Ralph Yarborough in November. Voting places will be at the same locations as the May 2 primary. Rankin area Republicans will vote in the lobby of the high school.

Taxes, Budget Hearing Commence June 1

The annual business of budgets and taxes will open for Rankin Independent Schools and Upton County shortly.

On June 1, a budget hearing is to be held at 8:00 p.m. in the high school auditorium at which time the 1964-65 budget for the Rankin Independent School District will be presented. The public is invited to attend this meeting and will be free to comment on the proposed expenditures.

On the same date, at 10:00 a.m. in the courthouse, the Upton County Board of Equalization will begin holding sessions in an effort to fix values on all taxable property in Upton County for the tax year of 1964. This board is composed of the Commissioners Court.

Anyone who wishes to do so may meet with the board and discuss property values.

On June 3 at 9 a.m., the Board of Equalization for Rankin Independent School District will begin deliberations for the purpose of fixing tax values on property situated within the district. Here, again, anyone who wishes may go before the board.

The Rankin School's Board of Equalization is composed of Walton Poage, Tom Workman and J. Linton Clark with W. O. Adams, school business manager, as secretary.

Any property owner who has had his tax values raised, has been notified by the board of this meeting.

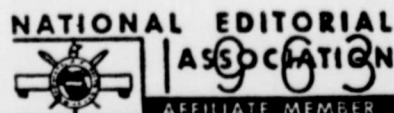

Cancer, however, is still with us. It is no respecter of age. One does not "grow out" of danger. Already, this year, in Rankin, it has claimed several victims — some young children. It will continue to take its toll—until it, too, like polio, is stopped.

And it will be stopped. When—depends on how much time can be devoted to research and how much time is devoted to research depends a great deal on how much money is available. There is an expense to everything that is productive and research will produce the means of putting cancer on the shelf as a has-

been killer — a shelf now occupier by such diseases as scarlet fever, typhoid, small pox, polio and many others.

There are many people alive today—and some of them here in Rankin—who would not have made it even ten years ago. The time is near.

Research is the answer.

Those who worked and most especially, those who gave, are literally the troops in the front line of the battle.

Do you ever contribute to the delinquency of a minor?

"OH! NO! NEVAH!" you say? Wan'ta bet?

Dr. John T. Lowry, addressing the Laredo Junior Chamber of Commerce during National Law Enforcement Week, charged that much of the delinquency problems—including narcotic addiction which was his special topic, can be traced directly to the adult disregard for minor laws—instilling in our youth the disregard that fosters major offenses.

The first thought most of us will have to that is that the good doctor just must have a head full of rocks. But does he?

Have you ever been driving the family bus and had a small voice

from the back say, "Pappy, you just went thru a read light." or "Pappy, you're breaking the speed limit." or "Father Dear, you did not signal for a right turn back there." or "Why did you throw that cigarette wrapper out the window?"

Of course, when such has happened—and you can count yourself in the minority if it hasn't—we all come up with brilliant answers such as: "That dad blamed light ought not be there," or "So, I'm driving too fast now—I'll slow down pretty soon and drive under the speed limit to make up the difference." or "Hush, up, Kid. Your Pappy is operating this unit." or that old favorite, "Aw, Shuddup."

All real sharp answers. And in most instances, the small voice in the back will be satisfied for he really believes—along about that stage in life—that Pappy is the smartest fellow in the world. And, of course, the little tyke has learned another lesson that day—that his all-knowing Pappy doesn't give a big hoot about the law—just as long as he doesn't get caught.

And on and on could go the list from cheating on the parking meter, to jay-walking, to double parking, to bragging about how fast you drove without getting caught—even to the smart trick of posting a letter when no one was looking — without a stamp so as to save postage. (I'll bet that has been tried.)

But why babble a point. We all get the picture.
