# Fifteenth Annual Upton Kid Rodeo Opens for Two-Day Stand Friday

For the fifteenth year in a row, the Upton County 4-H Club will stage their two-day All-Kid Rodeo. Action gets underway at 5:30 p.m. Friday with a parade in Rankin. Mrs. Coral Rankin, parade chairman, has requested that all entries in the parade be on hand at the Rankin Park Building by 5:00 p.m. Friday.

Prizes are to be given for the best float and the best individual. The parade route will be down 10th Street from the Park Building, to Main, South on Main to the Highway, and from there on out to the Dub Day Arena where action in the rodeo will get off to a fast start at 8:00 p.m. Announcer for the performan-

ces will be the popular Ezra Trotter from Pecos. Furnishing a lot of fun and foolishness will be Bill Shaw as the clown. Bookkeepers are Mesdames Shank Bloxom, Jay Lane and Tex Collins. Timekeeper will be Grimm Taylor and Les McFadden, Tommy Owens and Bud Poage will act as judges. General chairman of the 15th Rodeo will be J. D. Shipp while Ellis Helmers is to be chairman of the horse show—and added feature this year.

In the Youth Horse Show, to get underway at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, age brackets will be 13 and under for Juniors and 14 thru 20 for Seniors. Contestants do not have to be members of a 4-H Club in order to participate. Some 90-100 horses have already been entered in the Horse (Continued to Page 4)

In referring to the Bible School, Shannon said that enrollment is near 100 and that a good program is underway. He also stated that everyone—regardless of church affiliation—is cordially invited to attend the revival services and hear the messages that are to be brought by Rev. Dunn. He also indicated that anyone who wishes would be most welcomed to take part in the choir.

Second round action for the Rodeo performers—who will be divided into Junior and Senior divisions—gets underway at 8:00 p.m. Saturday.

Juniors must be 13-years-old or under while Seniors will be in the 14-16 age bracket for the Rodeo.

Competition in the Rodeo will consist of calf roping, steer riding, hair pulling, boot scramble, ribbon roping, pole bending and barrel racing—that latter for girls only.

## POLICY CHANGES MADE BY BOARD

In its regular meeting for the month of June, the Rankin Independent School Board of Trustees accepted the resignation of E. E. (Diz) Reeves, who is taking a teacher-coach position with the Jay, New Mexico, schools for the coming year.

The Board also voted to give a 1 percent discount on 1964 taxes if such taxes are paid during the month of September, and they made the following addition to the existing SUBJECT FEES AND ASSESSMENTS policy:

"Junior High P. E. students will be assessed a fee of \$1.50 annually, such students to receive school-furnished and school-laundered towels."

The following addition to the current transfer policy of the Rankin Schools was adopted:

"Students in the Rankin School who are not legally transferred are expected to conduct themselves while under the school's jurisdiction at an even higher level than are the regular students of the district because of the lack of remuneration from local and state sources. The school administration has the prerogative to ask non-cooperative students of the nontransferred category to withdraw from school without prior Board approval."

## SORRY THING—

There has been reports lately by a number of people that their telephones are being used as toys by some unthinking children in Rankin. Calls will be placed and when someone answers the phone, the caller will ask if the refrigerator is running, if any lights are on, or merely snicker and say nothing.

This could be chalked up as a childish prank. It is in fact a sorry thing to have happen.

Many of the people called have been elderly persons and the callers seem to take a special delight in timing their ringing so that it will be most distracting to the person called—often after they have gone to sleep. In one instance, a family had a very sick relative and each time the phone rang, they expected to get an urgent call. Day sleepers have been another favorite target of the anonymous callers.

This is not a funny matter. It may be done without the people responsible for the calling realizing the tension, bother and inconvenience they are causing; but,

nevertheless it is a sad state of affairs when parents do not teach their children that other people's property is private—as are their lives—and are not to be used for the entertainment of kids who—if they are old enough to know how to dial a telephone ought to be old enough to know that such tactics are most unkind.

Partens of the guilty parties may not know about these practices but if they have not made any checks lately on their children's use of the telephone, it would be a good thing to do so. These calls can be traced. It will be necessary for the telephone company to bring in some special equipment and help but if they continue, the company will almost surely do this.

And when they do, and the callers are traced down, the consequences will be most unpleasant. I don't imagine that the telephone company is going to take lightly the use of their equipment for nuisance purposes nor the expense that they will

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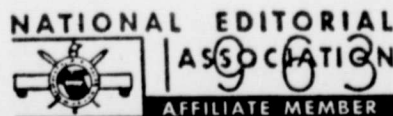

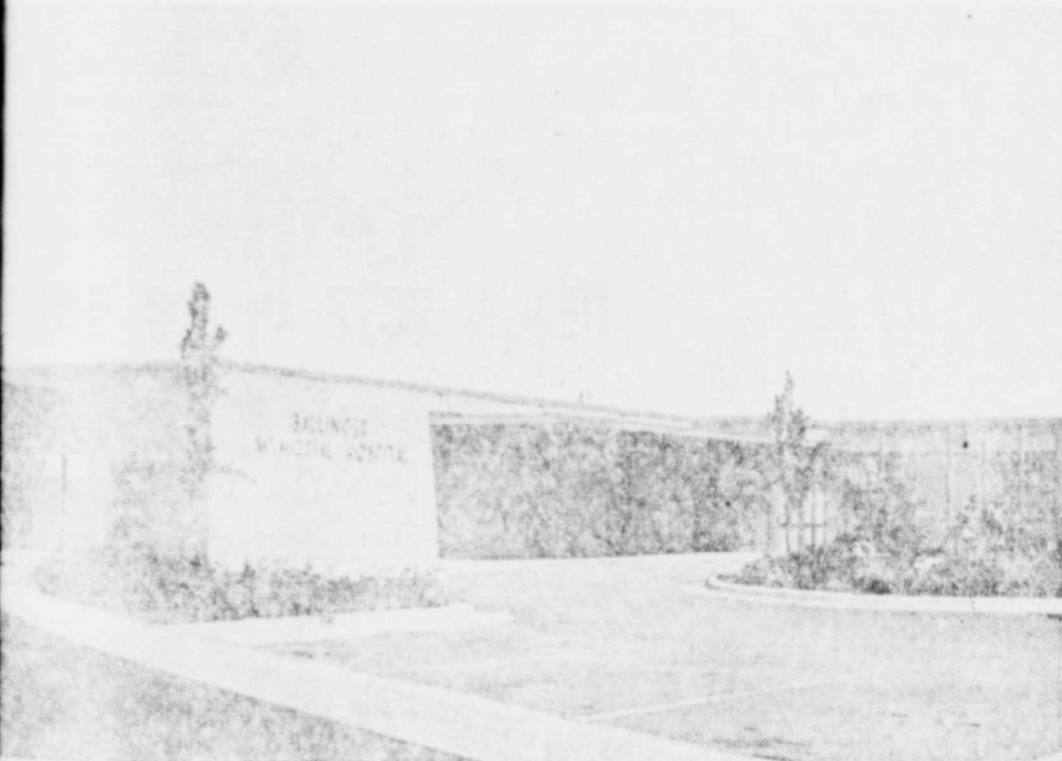

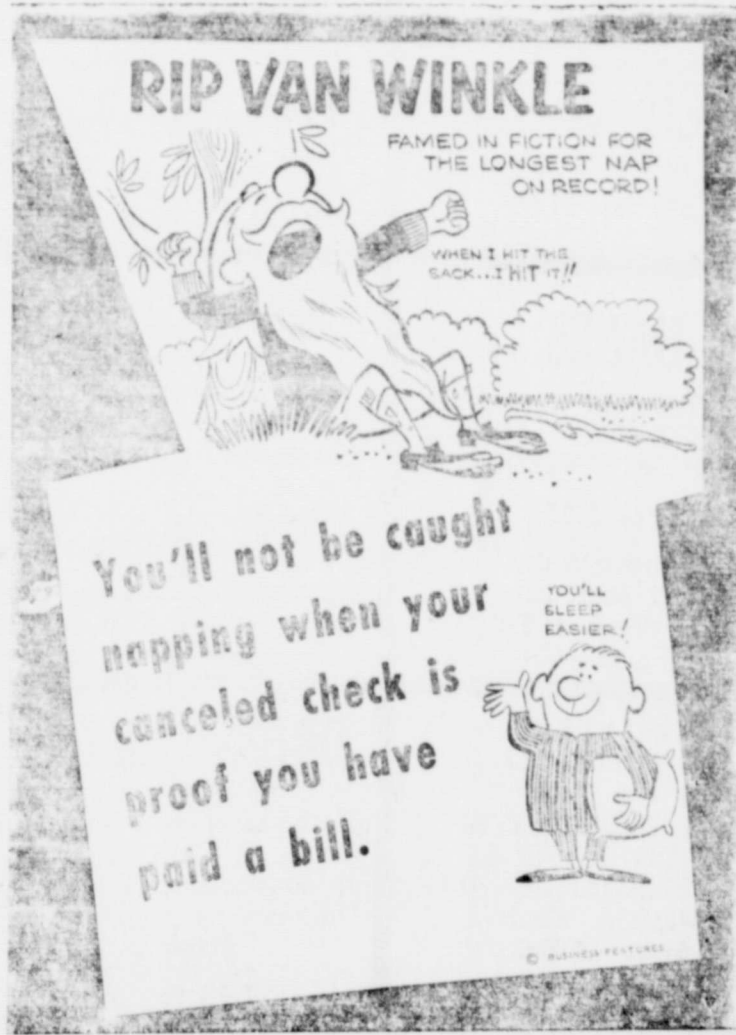

## Rep. Gene Hendryx Appointed to Top Committee Position

Rep. Gene Hendryx of Alpine has been appointed to the Council of State Governments, according to word from Speaker Byron Tunnell in Austin. The Legislatures of all 50 States assign five members of each state legislature to the Council.

Its purpose is to work out problems between the various States and to keep each State informed on how other States are meeting

and coping with the many and varied problems confronting them. All fifty States participate in the meetings with the Speaker of the House from each State acting as chairman of his delegation composed of four other members.

Tunnell said Hendryx was the only freshman member to serve from Texas and so far as is known, he is the only first term member of any Legislature in the United States to be named to the Council.

Hendryx won re-nomination as a Democrat in the 72nd District for his second term without opposition. Upton County is a part

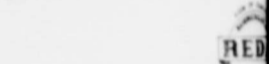
