## Overall Financial Condition Improved --

# Audit Reveals Increased Income for City of Rankin

In a recently completed audit of operations of the City of Rankin, a partial report of which is carried in this week's News for the benefit of the public, it has been revealed that business was somewhat better this year than last for the City of Rankin.

Meter installations for both gas and water, and sewer connections showed an increase over previous figures. The fiscal year for the City is from March 31 to April 1. As of March 31, 1964, the City had 382 gas connections as compared to 374 for a year ago. Water connections totaled 374 as compared to 284 for the previous year and sewer connections were down to 284 from 382.

A decline in these connections had been noted by the City since 1958 when they stood at a 10-year high. Current, they have gained back to about the 1960 figures.

Total assets for the City were set at \$510,662.22 by the auditors with bonds outstanding amounting to 235,000.00. \$13,000.00 in bonds were paid off last fiscal year.

Of these bonds, \$112,000.00 are owed against the waterworks and sewer systems and 111,000.00 against the gas system. Reserves for Bond and Interest Retirements amount to \$20,107.08.

Gross ad valorem taxes collected amounted to \$14,183.80. In ad-

dition, \$2,050.05 was collected in delinquent ad valorem taxes — plus \$584.24 in penalty and interest.

Gross tax receipts, those collected from utilities operating within the city such as the telephone company, amounted to \$2,000.82. Trash hauling accounted for a further collection of \$4,848.50.

Gross receipts from water and sewer system amounted to \$36,328.93. Miscellaneous other receipts brought this total to \$38,618.36.

From the gas system, the City collected a gross of \$31,462.74 for the year past.

Excess of revenue over expenses by funds for the year were: General Fund, \$4,350.62; Waterworks and Sewer System, \$2,121.71; Gas System, \$3,236.79; Interest and Sinking, minus \$535.00; and Bonds, \$35.00—for a net operating gain of \$9,209.12 over expenses.

**HINTS** for the  
**HOMEMAKER**

To get the most for your food dollar you must buy good nutrition. A basic low cost menu for a week might include these protective foods:

Meat, eggs, fish, ground beef, fryers. Eggs and white fish are as nutritious as the expensive cuts of meat. Dry beans and peas may be used as substitutes twice a week.

Vegetables and fruits such as carrots, green beans and green peppers give as much vitamin A as asparagus and many others.

Fruit juices in the can give as much vitamin C as fresh frozen. Canned fruit juice will provide 6 servings for the same price as 4 servings of fresh frozen.

Energy foods with the B Vita-

mins may be bought in breads, cereals, macaroni and others. Cooked cereal is as nutritious as ready prepared. Each serving costs approximately half to one

fourth as much.

Potatoes are not so good for bread or cereal because a potato has 90 calories—of protein, 23 grams carbohydrates, 2.0 Niacin and 22 mg. of biotin. Two slices of potato contains 120 calories, 4 g. protein, 12 grams carbohydrate, 32 mg. of calcium, 12 mg. B vitamins, Thiamine-1.0 mg., Riboflavin-.06 mg. and .10 mg.
