Red Devils Make It Three in a Row

In what looked like just another Saturday work-out, the Rankin Red Devils made it no contest again last week-end as they boomed to another 100-point-plus win in the Iraan Cactus Relays. For the hometowners, it was a total of 183 points. Closest "competition" came from Sanderson with 81 points. Iraan was 3rd with 75, Wink had 21, and Grandfalls, 18.

Rankin gathered in 1st in the 440 relay, the 880 dash, the 120 high hurdles, the 100 yard dash, the 330 intermediate hurdles, the 220 yard dash, the mile relay — in which they presently have the best time in the state in Class A, the high jump and the long jump. In addition, the Red Devils picked up numerous other placings to add to their point total.

This week they will enter another big one in the West Texas Relays in Odessa, and this time,

will likely find points much harder to come by. Still, on the strength of their three-in-a-row win record, will be one of the favorites in their division.

Charles M. Prock is 112th D.A. Candidate

Charles M. Prock, Ft. Stockton attorney, was in Rankin for three days last week and authorized the News to carry his announcement for the office of District Attorney, 112th Judicial District. He is to be on the Democratic ballot.

Born in Pecos County near Ft. Stockton in 1938, he is a graduate of Baylor and has practiced law in Ft. Stockton since 1967. Married, his wife, Sue, teaches in the Ft. Stockton Schools and they have two children. He is a member of the First Baptist Church, the Masonic Lodge, the State Bar Association where he serves on the Grievance Prosecuting Committee, and is a past president of the Ft. Stockton Jaycees.

"I have practiced in the Criminal Courts of West Texas and in other parts of the State," Prock told the News. He continued:

"I know how our present system works—and I also know how it should work. I have seen a petty thief get 10 years and convicted murderers get 5 years or a suspended sentence or probation. We West Texans have the finest courts and judges in the Nation and it's time we put the prosecution on the same level. There is no justifiable reason for this situation continuing to exist.

"I promise the voters of Pecos, Upton, Sutton and Crockett Counties that the 112th District of Texas will not be a haven for the criminal element.

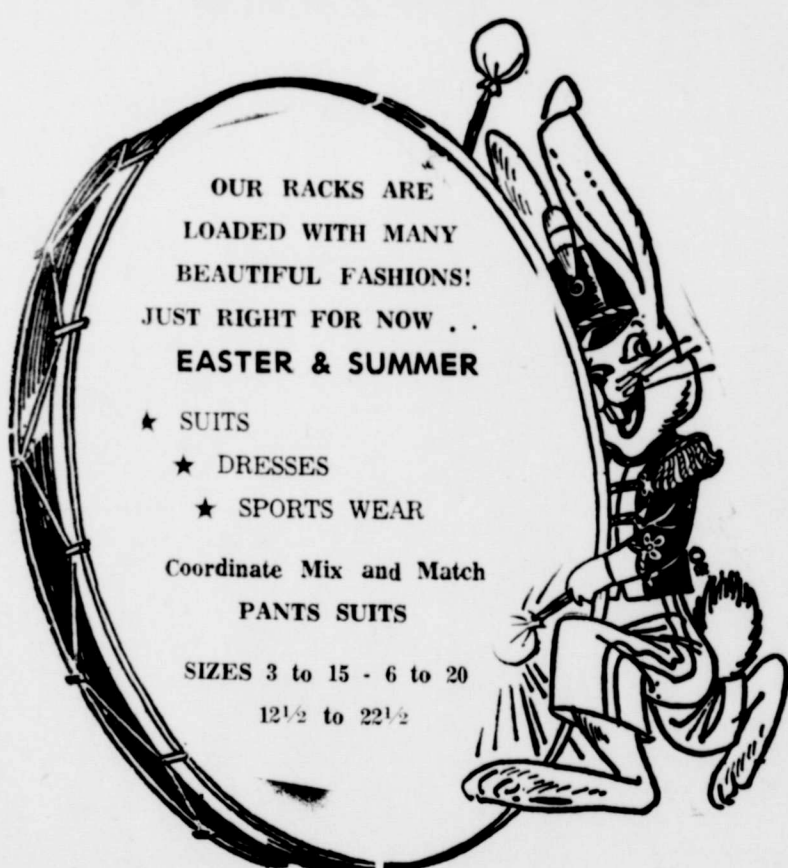

suppose but sometimes it gets a little hard to take when you know that the candidate very possibly couldn't care less about the common herd.

Mr. Dolph Briscoe, candidate for Governor comes under this heading as far as I'm concerned. True, he's a rather popular candidate in this area, being from Uvalde and projecting the image of being an ole country boy who dabbles in banking and ranching.

Still, I wonder how popular Mr. Briscoe would be with some folk if it was generally known that he had a big hand in almost busting the Eagle Pass Ind. School District? He wouldn't pay his taxes on land within the district and was the big gun in a law suit that eventually forced the District to have to borrow \$300 thousand, spend \$69 thousand in court, hire a re-valuation firm for \$65 thousand, forgive \$14,000 in penalty and settle a \$400 thousand tax bill with Mr. Briscoe for \$376,614.71. It was either that or the District could not have held school for the 1971-72 term.

And all this is not political mudslinging. It is a matter of record and in addition to that, one of my old high school buddies was—until recently when he threw up his hands and quit—a member of the school board in Eagle Pass and from time to time, he and I have visited and talked on the problems of the school.

Now Mr. Briscoe had every right to protest his tax assessment if he did not feel it was just, fair and equal. He even had a perfect right to take it to court. But one wonder's if Briscoe, reportedly to own between a half million and a million acres of land in Texas and to be financially well off, actually had to bring this relatively poor school district to its knees — to

the point of going his way or not going at all? Does he really act like a man who is big hearted and has at heart the interest of the common man? Or is he a big shot who uses his power and money to have things his way or not at all?

With the current crop of candidates, The News doesn't endorse any particular candidate for the

office of Governor in the upcoming elections. On the other hand, there are those we certainly are against and Mr. Briscoe heads the list.

With the school problems we are going to be facing the next few years, he has already proven that he has no sympathy at all for public education — if it hits him in the pocketbook.

or Big Lake on the other. With Fort Stockton being centrally located in the 83rd District, I believe I can provide the services which the public is certainly entitled to."

A native of Fort Stockton, Gonzalez graduated from Fort Stockton High School in 1951. After spending the next four years in the United States Navy, he attended Sul Ross University where he received his B.A. degree in 1958 and his M.A. degree in 1960.

He was elected Justice of the Peace in Fort Stockton in 1962 and left that position to become Administrative Assistant to Congressman Richard White in Washington in January of 1965. He left Washington in 1967 to become Executive Officer of the Peace Corps in Peru, staying there until 1969. He again served as a Special Assistant to Congressman White in Austin and in the 16th Congressional District until the fall of 1971.

In addition to his two degrees from Sul Ross, Gonzalez holds a law degree from the University of Texas and also attended the prestigious American University Law School in Washington, D. C.

Married to Sendaída Ureta in 1956, he has four children—Christina, Linda, Alex John and Arthur.

"To sum up, I believe the number one concern of the district attorney is simply to see that justice is done. I will apply all my energies to this important job when elected," Gonzalez declared.

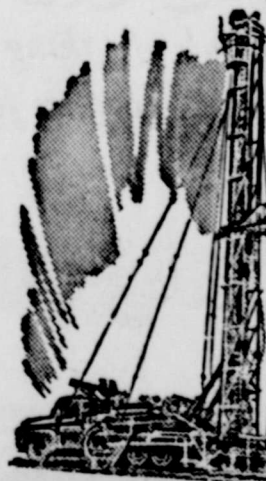

Southwestern Bell has announced a \$294 million expansion program for Texas during 1972 to meet the growing demands for telephone services.

Despite a generally dull economy last year, the expansion is \$39 million more than the amount spent for new plant and equipment during 1971, according to H. D. Schodde, the company's vice president for Texas.

Schodde pointed out that the company's Texas operations in 1971 showed "very good" growth over the same period during 1970.

He said that the company added nearly 265,000 phones to its network in Texas during 1971, bringing the total Southwestern Bell phones in service in the state to more than 5.3 million. He said that another 304,000 are expected to be added during 1972.

Schodde also noted that along with the increase in telephones, customers in Texas used their phones more in 1971 than ever before. As an example, he pointed out that the number of completed Long Distance calls on the average business day increased by more than 57,000 to a total of more than 907,000 in the state.

The company remained one of the largest employers in the state with a work force of just under 34,000. Payroll for Southwestern Bell employees jumped nearly \$22 million to more than \$294 million annually.

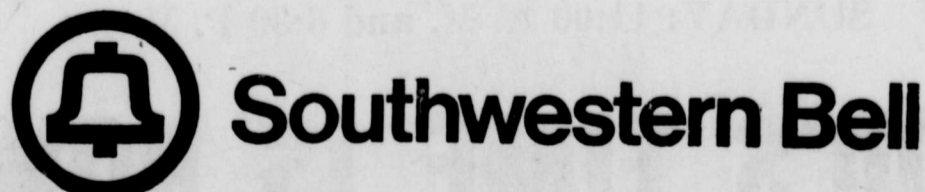
