Football Games

With a 7:30 p.m. kickoff time slated, the Rankin Red Devils are to host the Clint Lions Friday in the second district game for both teams. Clint lost their opener to Sanderson last week by a 35-8 mark while the Rankin crew was wrecking the Wink Wildcats by a 40-0 count. Rankin is now 2-3 and Clint has won 1 game.

Although still without the services of several key players, the Red Devils will be top-heavy favorites to have things all their way. This will mark the 6th meeting of the two teams and Rankin has won them all, rolling up a total of 243 points to 10 for the Lions.

Clint, catching the overflow of El Paso, is said to have an enrollment large enough to qualify them for a class AA school. Last year they shocked the Devils by jumping off to a 7-0 lead before going down 57-7. They are rated to be a somewhat better team this year than last.

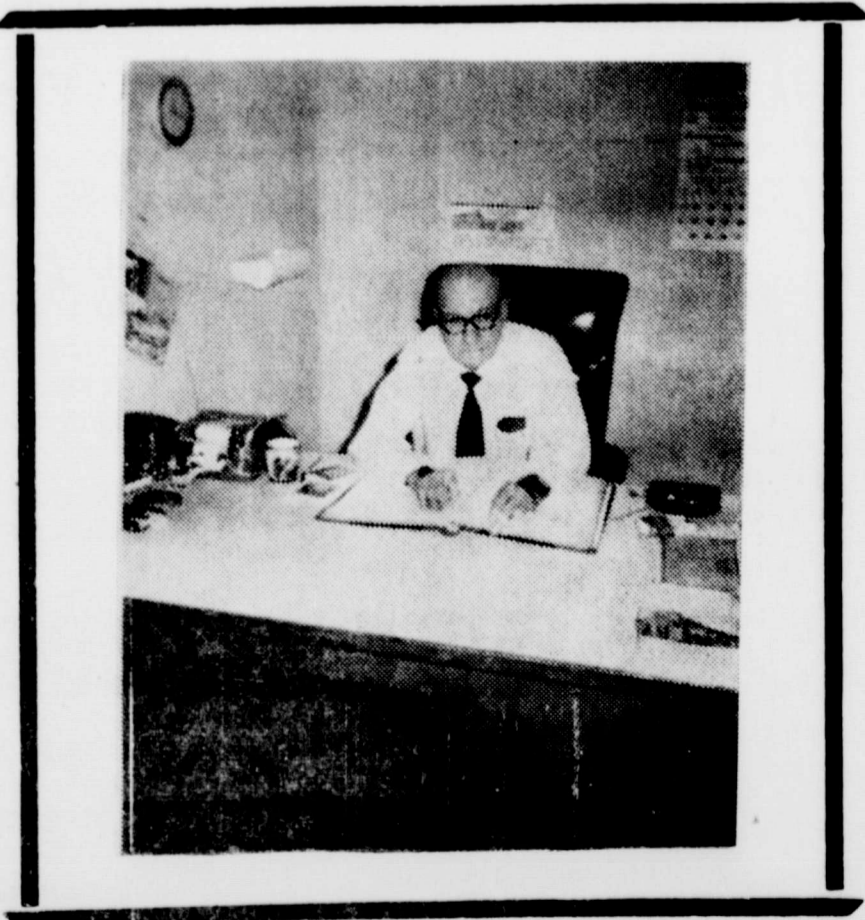

Wednesday Services Held for William E. Sherrill

Funeral services for William E. Sherrill were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday, October 10 in the First Church of Rankin. Rev. Wankersley officiated and burial was in Rankin Cemetery. Sherrill, 73, died Sunday afternoon about 3:30 p.m. while being transferred from Rankin Hospital to Odessa Hospital. He had been ill for some ten days.

Sherrill was born September 20, 1900 in Indian Territory, now Oklahoma, he was a farmer in his early years before moving to California where he worked in shipyards. He moved to Rankin in about 1955. In 1966 he was elected Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1 of Upton County. He was re-elected without opposition and was planning to run for the race again in '74. He is considered to be an outstanding citizen.

Taylor is a long-time resident of Rankin and Upton County and has served in past years as a County Commissioner. He has also operated businesses in Rankin and retired some two years ago from duty with the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts, Sales Tax Division.

He began his new duties effectively with his appointment Monday.

"To lose a friend is the greatest of all losses," so said a philosopher of old. With the passing of William E. Sherrill, there are, indeed, many who will say they have lost a friend. For many years now it was his custom each Wednesday to buy the first copy of The Rankin News off the press. Somehow paper day just won't be the same anymore around here.

Bill had a quiet quality about him that is not found too often—a mood that was always jovial but never frivolous and somehow you always felt that he really cared when he would say, "How are you today?"

As has been pointed out in this column before, it would be hard to find a more dedicated public office holder than was Bill Sherrill. He took an office, that is often little more than a place to hand out fines for speeding tickets, and gave it a dignity and a

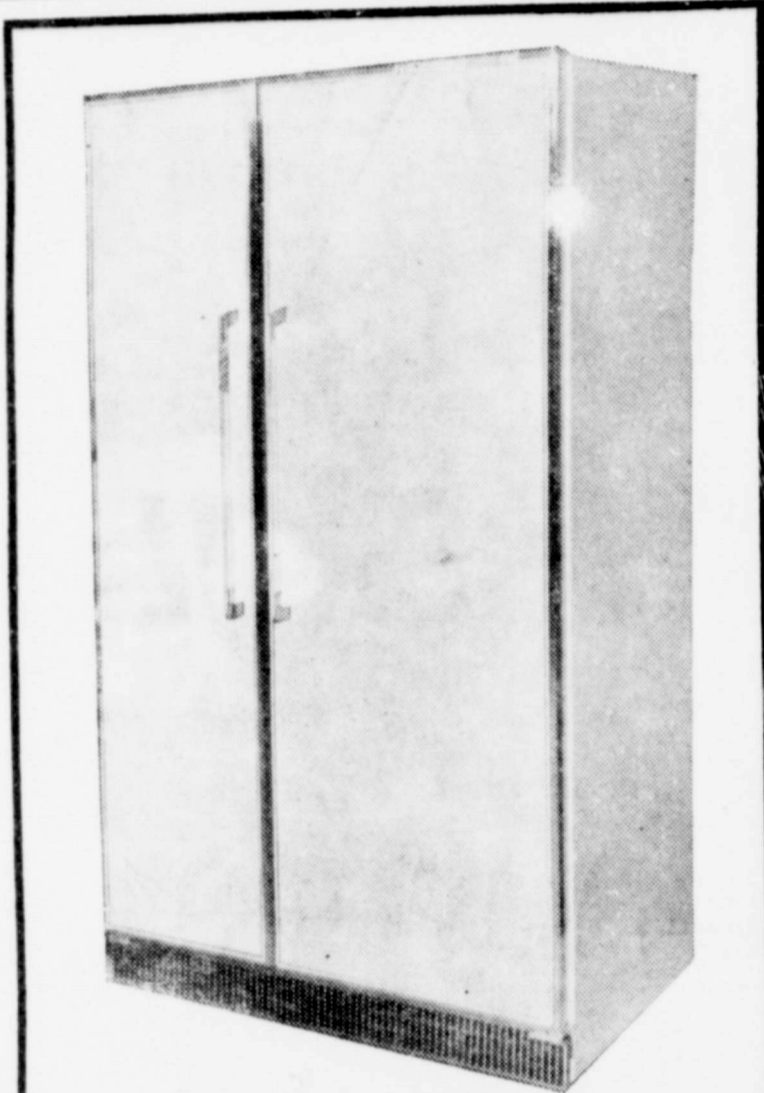

In addition they will participate in a tour, view exhibits and attend a fashion showing.

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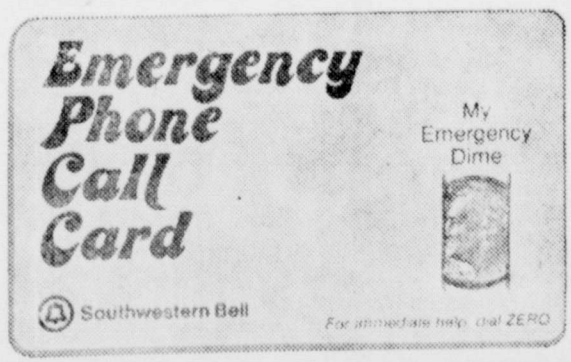
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A GOOD START --

It was a good way to start off district play—for the Red Devils, at least. Strong all year on defense but not able to generate a consistent offensive punch — despite being able to move the ball against all comers—the Devils apparently found themselves Friday night and looked almost awesome as they slashed through the Wink Wildcats, moving the ball at will on both the ground and in the air.

It's true that Wink could in no way match the Rankin squad in manpower; still, it was primarily the play execution of the RHS unit that gave them domination of the game. It was apparent from the start that the Devils had not taken the 'Cats for granted and had come to play—and did. The game should be a confidence builder to the offense and an indicator that the Marron and White is, indeed, serious about taking each game as it comes up and giving it their full attention.

With that kind of action, somebody may beat them but it's going to be one heck of a ball game if they do.

ELSEWHERE --

In other games around the district, it now can be assumed that Bolmorhea is a good ball team—as are the Iraan Braves, despite their no-win record. The Braves have the toughest non-conference schedule in the district and they have not lost all that bad — even in the shelling by Big Lake. In that one the Braves moved the ball—much like the Red Devils—on both the ground and in the air, and were successful on several third down situations when they needed long yardage.

Of the two teams, Balmorhea is possibly the more explosive while the Braves have the size to shove people around and can hurt you with the pass. Sanderson is not



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much on defense, has some very good running backs and may pull off an upset any week-end. Clint and Marfa appear to be more in the class with Wink.

A final note on the Wink game has to do with fan support. There are probably two kinds of fans—maybe even three. One is the diehard who will always be out to support his team — and thank goodness Rankin has a bunch of that sort; then there is the fan who only comes out when his team is winning. The possible third type of fan— and I really feel there is such—is the one who will not show, not because he or she doesn't support the team; but, simply, because they are so deeply involved that they can't bear to see their favorites beaten.

I guess every team has some fans in all three categories but you can't help but feel that the once mighty Wink Wildcats could be better than they are today if they had even half the supporters

that used to pack their side of the field when they were winners.

I'm not knocking the good folk of Wink in any manner but I do—on behalf of the Red Devils—say "Thank You" to RHS's loyal fans who have always been there—even in the lean times. We all say that we're proud of the Red Devils. I expect they are a little chesty about the loyalty of their fans.

Before the homecomers Friday night the Red Devils will take on the Clint Lions and should be able to extend their district winning streak to two in a row. The Lions, never a very strong team, are not doing too well thus far and unless they can come up with something outstanding in the way of a big game effort, will be

Immunization Law has Oct. 19 Deadline

According to requirements of the State of Texas, every school age child must have a certified copy of their immunization record on file in the school district in which they reside. The law further says that students not meeting the requirements are met and a complete record is on file with the school district.

Parents with children who have not met these requirements will be notified by letter, and these requirements must be completed by October 19, 1973, or their child will be asked not to return to school until he has completed the required immunizations.

Students of Kindergarten age and younger are admitted free to all athletic contests.

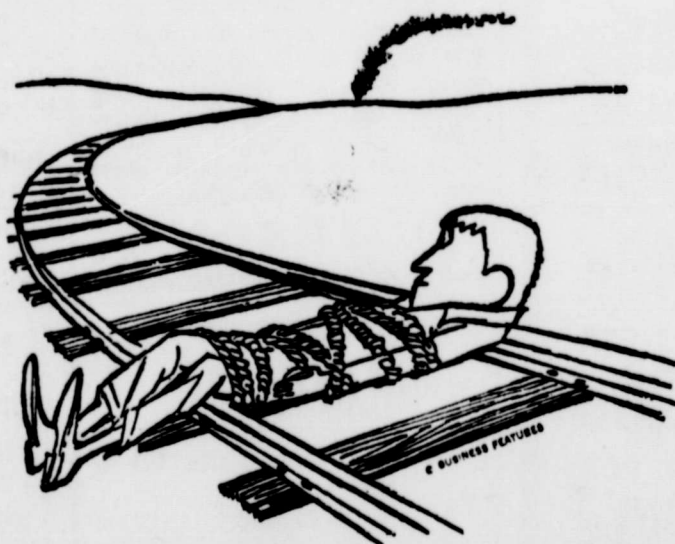
