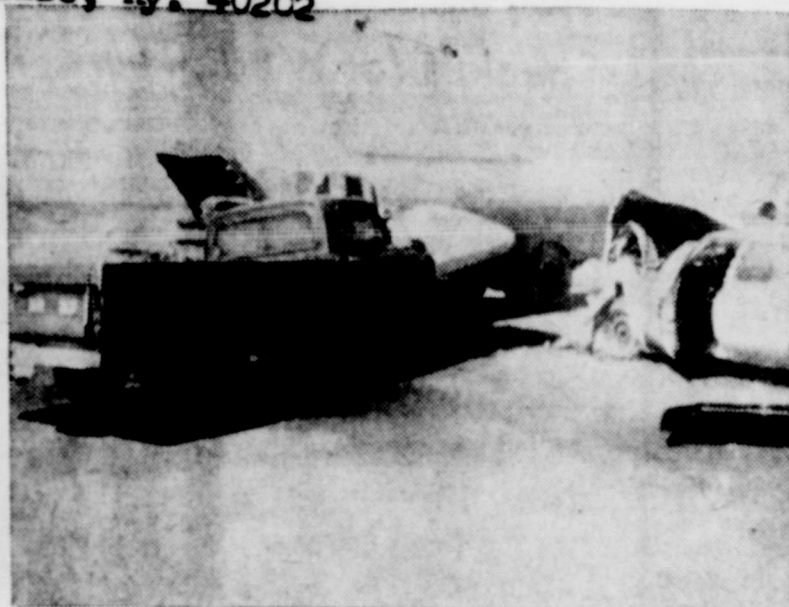

Vehicle Pile-Up Result Of Dirt Storm on Highway

...second time in less than a week, blowing dirt clouds on the west side of Midland Highway has caused a pile-up of vehicles. Pictures show five vehicles that were involved in the accident during last Friday's storm. Previously, it had been reported that two vehicles were involved in the same area under similar conditions.

...ately, in both instances, there were no serious injuries; several persons have been taken to hospitals. It is reported that only two were hospitalized last Friday. One was Rankinite Roy Dirickson who was injured during the night in Rankin and was released. The injured party, said to be a woman, was taken to Midland and her condition is unknown.

...time the above pictures were taken, dirt still sifted down the highway and Texas Highway Patrolmen were still working to determine the sequence of events that led to the pile-up.

One officer at the scene said he thought a station wagon and a pickup towing a pulling tong unit may have been the first to hit. Also involved were a butane truck, another pickup—belonging to Dirickson—and a passenger car. Information on all the drivers and occupants was not available.

Cars and trucks began crashing into one another shortly after 3:00 p.m. The pictures were taken at 4:30 p.m. Both Rankin Hospital's ambulance and the Rankin Fire Truck were called to the scene.

Ironically, with the plowed field fronting only about three hundred yards of the highway—in which visibility was said to be zero at the time of the collisions—miles of the road on either side was unaffected by the dirt storm that hit the small area of highway.

on Voters Put on Proposals

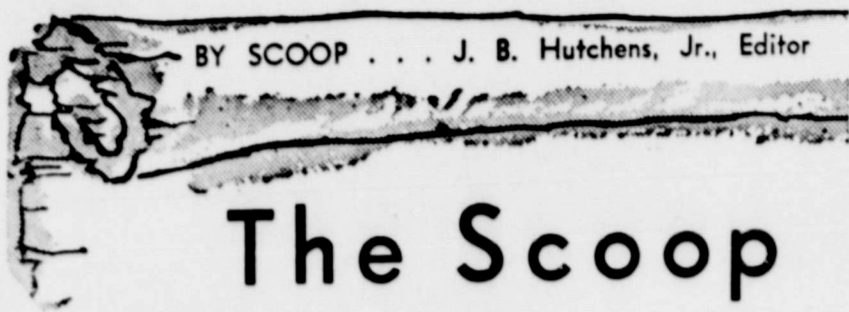

Time To Spray Your Pecan Trees

County Extension Agent

This is the time for you to spray pecan trees with zinc. According to research, when the bud first breaks, the first application should be applied; then seven days later, the second application should be made, followed fourteen days later with a third application.

The mixture for this is as follows: 2 lbs. zinc sulfate per 100 gallons water, plus 1½ quarts of uran.

For small sprayer: 3 gallons of water, 3 tablespoons zinc sulfate, 1 tablespoon of uran.

If you can get zinc nitrate, it is better than the zinc sulfate. However, any zinc is much better than none.

In order to get good growth on young pecan trees, zinc is the most important element for West

When the third application is made, a little sevin can be added to the mixture. This is also at the same rate as the zinc: 2 lbs. per 100 gallons of water or 2 tablespoons per 3 gallons of

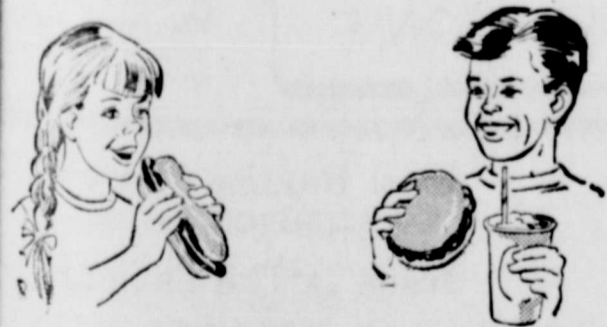
