The railroad meeting on last Monday was called to order by T. F. West, Chairman of the Railroad committee, and on motion Maj. Horton was called to the chair, and

J. N. Rogers chosen secretary. The chairman requested Mr. West to explain the objects of the meeting, to which he responded, stating for the benefit of those present that the Texas and Great Western Railroad Co. were going to build a road

through Jack county, and that Capt Wood, Gen'l Manager, had agreed than if the citizens of Jacksboro and Jack county would give the Company the right of way, depot grounds, &c. and \$15,000 he would have the road built through the corporate limits of Jacksboro within one year, and the object of this meeting was to secure the money and right of way for said road. J. R. Robinson was called on for a speech. He said he did not think a speech necessary, but he did say a few words, in which he stated clearly the necessity of having the railroad to run through the County Seat. If the roads should be built a few miles from town the question of moving the county seat would be raised; when if the road is built here that question that has never been raised never would be.

Maj. Stewart of Gertrudes was called but declined to respond. However, he said that he was in favor of a railroad.

Dr. Elliot of Crafton was called on and also declined.

The meeting was not very enthusiastic; only about \$4,000 was added to the amounts already subscribed. The committee say they will be able to raise about \$10,000.

Atlanta, December 27.-A shooting scrape in high life is reported from Hawkinsville, South Georgia. Quite a number of ladies and gentlemen assembled at the Female College in that plece the other night to rehearse the comedy of "Married Life" for an amateur performance. Among the party were Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Steele. It seems that some one threw a firecracker in the hall, which exploded near Mrs. Steele, whose husband thought that Mr. James T. Davis, a young man, was to blame for it. A difficulty between the two gentlemen was the result, during which Davis drew his pistol and fired at Steele, the ball (a 32 calibre) entering his breast, cutting Ihrough the right lung and coming out at the back. The wound is expected to prove fatal.

The San Antonio Express refers to the "toy pistol" as follows: "The many serious and oftimes fatal accidents that are brought about by placing the mis-called toypistol in the hands of children for playthiogs seem to be on the increase. Time and again the press of this country has warned parents and guardians of the dangerous nature of these toys, but the warning seems to have little or no effect, for almost daily there is some serious accident brought about by their use. The latest happened in this city, on Laredo street yesterday afternoon, in which a little year. boy by the name of Johnny Finnie shot his playmate, Willie Anderson in the face, in all probability blinding him for life. The cause of this accident was one of those innocent toy pistols exposed for sale in our shop windows in the toy department.

Chicago, December 20.-There were 25 deaths from smallpox last week in Chicago, 4 deaths from this disease yesterday, and 13 new cases developed.

Little Rock, December 20.—A telegram from the Indian Territory says that an effort is being made to prove that the Choctaw Council was inveigled into granting the right of way through the Chactaw Nation to the St. Louis and San Francisco Railroad. The opponents of the proposed grant hope to receive through the Secretary of the Interior some action that will prevent or at least delay the construction of the road. It is not believed however, that the grant can in any way be effected.



Wahpeton, D. T., December 28. -Seventy-seven cases of small-pox have occurred in the infected districts below here, 25 of which proved fatal. The disease is spreading considerably on this side of the river and seems to be singularly fatal. Some of the victims are said to have died within 24 hours after being attacked. It is also said that before death blood gushes from the eyes, ears and noses of the victims. These symptoms suggest that the disease is not simply small-pox, but rather partakes of the nature of a plague.



As the examination proceeded Guiteau frequently interrupted and roundly abused Scoville for his incompetency and charged him with compromising his case. Turning toward the judge he added deprecatingly: "Seoville is a perfect idiot in this matter, and between him and Corkhill I have a pretty hard time. [General laughter.] I'm a good-natured man, laughing, "but I can't stand abuse, and when I'm abused I want to talk right back."

Scoville, who had borne everything heretofore with apparent equanimity, seemed to feel very keenly this last evidence of heartless ingratitude. His voice trembled and for a minute he was unable to go on. Even the prisoner realized the injustice of his conduct and hastened to apologize, saying: "You are doing very well, Scoville; to the best of your ability!"

Several times afterward, during the examination of Worcester, Guiteau denounced Scoville. At one time in evident anger and again with a sareastic smile: "Why, your Honor," he shouted, if I was indicted for manslaughter I would be hung for murder if Scoville should defend me."

Mrs. Scoville reached over to speak to Guiteau when he snarled, "You keep your mouth shut, you're as big a fool as your husband. You're a crank on this business. If you had all stayed in Chicago it would have been far better for my case. These relations are a nuisance. I would be better off if I didn't have any. I would have plenty of friends if this pack of relatives were out of the way." Mrs. Scoville whispered some expostulatory reply, when he turned again angrily and shouted: "You have been an unmitigated nuisance on this case all the way through." Then changing quickly from anger to mirth, he added with a laugh, "You're a queer lot, you Scovilles." IN. O. Times-Democrat.

The Graham Tragedy. A terrible tragedy took place at Graham on Sunday morning, which resulted in the instant death of four men and the wounding of two or three others, one of them perhaps fatally. The three murderers of Martin, at Belknap, named McDonald, were all killed. A deputy Sheriff named Murfee was shot through the heart, another deputy named Davis Melton, brother of the Sheriff, was shot three times, perhaps fatally. Another man was seriously wounded in the leg. The affair occurred about 10 o'clock. The two deputies named were giving the prisoners their breakfast. For this purpose the two McDonald boys were let out the steel cage as usual, into another room, which is called a calaboose, and which is separated from the steel cage by two iron doors and a heavy oak door. An oak cell also opens into this calaboose. Davis Melton stood in the door of the wooden cell with two revolers in his hands, guarding them while they ate, but it seems the prisoners were carefully watching him. The other deputy was in the steel cell with a hatchet, testing it. Watching their opportunity, when Melton unguardedly transferred both pistols to one hand to put his hand in his pocket to get a match, the Mcdonalds seized his weapons and held him as their prisoner. He called to Murfee for help, he came immediately, but was instantly killed by the prisoners. They then tore a hole in the calaboose floor, and made their escape into the room below, and out the back door of the jail, taking Melton with them. 
