

# Deposits Soar To New Record



Deposits and total assets Friona State Bank have soared to the highest in the bank's history as far as a quarterly statement is concerned, a look at the quarterly report revealed this week.

Total assets at Friona State Bank topped the \$8 million mark for the first time ever on a quarterly statement. Assets as of April 5, 1966 at the bank stood at \$8,332,75.

Deposits, meanwhile, took a giant step forward as compared to the statement of one year ago, showing a gain of well over a million dollars, and a fat 16.3 per cent increase over the corresponding statement in 1965. The deposits, also an all-

time as well as a first-quarter record, totalled \$7,403,903.19. This was a gain of \$1,035,611.66 over the deposit total of \$6,368,291.53 which was on the quarterly statement dated April 26, 1965.

It marked the second all-time record for deposits and total assets in consecutive quarterly statements. The deposits total for the last quarter statement for 1965 stood at \$7,306,691.52, but the current statement topped that amount by \$97,211.67. It is a bit unusual, since the fourth quarter statement is normally the largest of the year in this area.

Previous high for a first quarter statement came two years ago, when the deposits stood at \$7,136,435.96. That statement was the first time a quarterly report had shown bank deposits at Friona in excess of seven million dollars. It has happened three times since then, with the current report standing as the fourth time in nine quarters that the \$7,000,000 plateau has been reached.

The other time the deposits climbed above seven million was in December of 1964, when they reached \$7,144,832.53. Frank A. Spring, bank president, said he could not attribute any one thing to the good quarterly report. "Our crops were generally better. Also, we had more cattle and then, too, people have been a little more careful with their money lately than they had been previously."

The bank executive said he doubted that the fact that this year's report coming ten days ahead of income tax deadline had much to do with its big totals. "Since the farmer's deadline is now February 15, they had already paid their taxes," Spring said.

Spring admitted that the good financial report spoke well for the economy of the Friona area. "If we can keep the steady growth we've had the past few years, we should continue to do well," he concluded.

The total assets figure of \$8,002,332.75 was a healthy gain of \$1,070,308.90 or 15.4 per cent over the total of \$6,932,024.66 registered on the report for April of 1965.

Other comparisons showed a decrease of almost seven per cent in the amount of money on loan. Total on the current statement is \$3,943,955.72 a decrease of \$291,216.23 from last year's total of \$4,235,171.95. This is a difference of 6.9 per cent.

Still other comparisons of figures with current totals listed first and those of April, 1965 in parentheses, were as follows: U.S. Government bonds \$571,220.63 (\$711,173.97); Other bonds and warrants \$77,787.31 (\$115,006.79); CCC Certificates of Interest \$1,887,901.72 (\$887,571.61) cash and exchange \$1,448,613.11 (\$924,776.34); and other assets \$3,286.85 (\$3,133.65).

In liabilities column, the figures were Capital stock \$200,000.00 (\$200,000.00); certificate surplus \$250,000.00 (\$200,000.00); undivided profits \$98,429.56 (\$113,733.13); reserves \$50,000.00 (\$50,000.00) and deposits \$7,403,903.19 (\$6,368,291.53).

## Carltons To Remain In Business

While attending the annual Panhandle Press Association Convention last weekend in Amarillo, we were privileged to hear Lt. Col. John C. Hughes, an officer in the United States Army, give a first-hand report on the Viet Nam situation.

"This is not just a civil war, and United States troops are not getting involved in the middle of a civil struggle," said the well-decorated colonel, who has spent seven years in the Southeast Asian country.

The United States has a very definite place in Viet Nam, and is there by invitation, Colonel Hughes states. South Viet Nam represents a country which is attempting to pull itself up and become a democracy, and is being thwarted by the communist invaders, he points out.

Should the United States stand by and let the communists spoil South Viet Nam's bid for a democratic government, it would be an open invitation for communism to come in and take over any and every underdeveloped nation, the Army officer said.

"You can't tell me the people around the world do not appreciate what we are doing in South Viet Nam", Col. Hughes stated. He cited the fact that soldiers from South Korea were much in evidence in the Viet Nam struggle.

"Those people whom we helped 15 years ago in the Korean conflict are rallying to the cause and are fighting alongside Americans in South Viet Nam", Hughes said. As a matter of fact, Koreans have the most soldiers in Viet Nam at present, with the United States standing second, he said.

Also, there are many Filipinos, Australians, New Zealanders and soldiers from Thailand taking part in the conflict, the two-time winner of the silver cross pointed out.

Many men have volunteered for service in Viet Nam, because of the principle behind the struggle. Hughes cited a 57-year old Indiana farmer, who has reared his family and almost reached retirement age, only to enlist for service in the Asian conflict. He was teaching the Vietnamese better farming methods.

"I also met one of the top officials of the University of Manila there in Viet Nam. He has volunteered for service," Col. Hughes said.

"We're winning the war, and making good progress," Hughes told the gathering of Panhandle editors.

The enemy thinks that he can wear down South Viet Nam and the allies through time and manpower, but Hughes states "I don't think they're going to do this."

Col. Hughes paid a tribute to the young soldiers who were engaged in the Viet Nam conflict. "They're a better lot of soldiers than we were several years ago. They represent an idea; they know what the war is all about, and are well-schooled in the world situation," he said.

Col. Hughes passed off the Viet Nam student demonstrations which at one time had a "Yankee Go Home" theme. He said that they were motivated by different factions of the Viet Nam political set-up, who tried to achieve the American backing through manipulation of these demonstrations.

The Army officer pointed out how meaningless these demonstrations are to the student participants with a story about one demonstration which turned into a big joke.

Demonstrators had painted signs saying "Yankee Go Home", and were supplying them to the students. An American soldier, who had been AWOL, came across the signs, and lettered one for himself, which said "Send Me First". The American took his place among the Vietnamese students in the demonstration.

Before the demonstration was underway good, the Vietnamese

### Joint Meeting Talked On Bookmobile Future

An enthusiastic group of library supporters from four counties heard reports on the recent Governor's Conference on Libraries, discussed the urgent need for good library service, and endorsed the continued operation of the High Plains Bookmobile at a meeting in Muleshoe April 19.

During the discussion period following the speeches, the group was told a joint meeting of commissioners' courts concerned with the bookmobile was in the making. To the obvious pleasure of the audience, County Judge Glen Williams stated that the Bailey County Court was inviting Lamb, Farmer, and Cochran County judges and commissioners to Muleshoe at an early date to discuss the continuation of the mobile library service.

This response to intense public interest in the matter was lauded from the floor of the meeting, as was the earnest desire expressed by Ike Stinson and Lloyd Stephens, the Bailey County Commissioners present, for the opportunity to give careful study to the operating costs the county must assume if the service is to continue after this year.

A feature of National Library Week observance in this area, this "Post-Conference meeting" was one of over 150 scheduled throughout the State of Texas to express the deep concern of Governor John Connally and bring back the message of his conference, which drew 2500 delegates to Austin March 23.

Rev. J. Frank Peery, Pastor of Muleshoe's First Methodist Church and Muleshoe Area Public Library Board Chairman, summarized the Governor's Address, pointing out that Texas ranks 37th among the 50 states in library expenditures devoting only 84 cents per capita annually and providing public library resources of less than one whole book per person.

Taking part in the panel discussion were: Mrs. Fred Thompson of Olton, president of the Friends of the Library of that city, Mrs. Jac Hicks, Lamb County Public Librarian, of Littlefield, Mrs. Flora Burkes, Littlefield High School Librarian, Mrs. Earl Stevenson, Bovina Women's Club, Mrs. Benny Pena, High Plains Bookmobile Librarian, and Joe Harbin, president of the Muleshoe Friends of the Library. Mrs. Bernis Camp, Muleshoe Area Public Librarian, and Roy Davis, Manager of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce are "Post-Conference" co-chairmen for this area of the South Plains.

Terry Blake, Bula Church of Christ Minister and school teacher, discussed "Library Support, A Shared Responsibility," asserting that the city, county, state, and federal governments, along with private benefactors, must all share the responsibility for library service.

"Libraries Need Citizen Support" was the subject covered by Mrs. C.S. Silcott, Lamb County Library Board Member from Olton. She said libraries need people support - business people, professional people, school children, and retired individuals. She went on to point out that at current levels

## Good Crowd Attends Library Open House

A total of 77 visitors attended the Friona Public Library's open house April 20.

"Wide community interest in the library was evident as it was noted that these 77 visitors represented 15 clubs and organizations," stated Mrs. J. T. Gee, who helped register the guests.

The open house was held in conjunction with National Library Week.

Main purpose of the open house was to show the growth of the almost three-year old library. Many remembered the library's beginning with shelves made of bricks and borrowed boards, and 100 books loaned by the Texas State Library.

Mrs. J.G. McFarland was the first library committee chairman. Over 4,000 books have been borrowed this year from the library's stock of about 2,000 owned books and 210 on loan. Mrs. Ross Ayers is the current chairman.

Guests to the open house donated three books and cash amounting to \$125.30. The money was designated three ways: to establish a fund to buy a set of World Book Encyclopedias; to buy a devotional book in memory of Mrs. Dave Moseley and to buy needed children's books.

Mrs. Sloan Osborn was general chairman of hospitality arrangements, assisted by members of the Modern Study Club.

Signs throughout the library acknowledged gifts of shelves, a desk, and new books from the Lions Club, George Taylor, Modern Study Club, Friona Public Schools, New Horizons, Progressive Study Club, Northedge Home Demonstration Club; the Jaycee-ettes; and Friona Woman's Club. In addition, a total of 1925 books have been donated by over 70 families, the Rebekahs and study clubs.

On exhibit was a traveling collection of 100 children's books from the state library. It was noted that the library be bought to enrich the local library as money is available.

of expenditure, Texas spend \$5100 to expose a child to education through the 12 grades and then spend only \$42 to provide the child, now grown, with materials to utilize the reading and studying skills, to assist him in understanding his world, in keeping abreast economically, politically, socially. This 42 dollars is based on the per capita expenditure for library service over 50 years.

Marion McDaniel, Superintendent of Bula Schools, described "Library Financial

Sources," stressing that the two primary sources of funds for public libraries in Texas are the city and county governments and describing various "matching funds" now becoming available from the federal government.

students were falling over themselves at the humor of the American's sign, and as a result the demonstration broke up, without achieving the results of its organizers.

South Viet Nam faces a long battle in setting up its democratic government. The communists used terror raids to discourage the democratic movement. All leaders of communities were killed, along with their families.

Thus, it has been an ordeal to organize the South Vietnamese into a group wanting to fight for this freedom, since they have seen what happened to those community leaders who favored our way of life.

The Vietnamese will hold an election later this year, with their democratic future resting in the balance.

Col. Hughes urged that Americans be patient, understanding and indulgent during the next three months. "I feel like we're making progress. This is a very important war. Our positions as the leader of the free world is at stake. We must never fail to respond to the request of those being plagued by an aggressor," Hughes said.

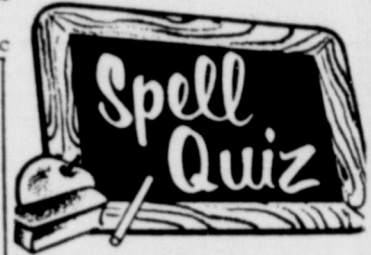

## On The Farm In Parmer County

Rain at last! As we write this column on Monday morning, it is sure good to see that it hasn't forgotten how to rain. This rain and cold has slowed down a lot of planting the last ten days. However, results of a 3 year grain sorghum test at the Plains Branch Experiment Station, north of Clovis, for 1962-64 serve as a basis for the following statements that indicate late May plantings do not lower yields.

Full season or late maturing varieties produced minimum yields when planted June 1 or 6907 pounds. The next best yields were produced from May 15 plantings, 6,512 pounds. May 1 plantings had a three year average of 6473 pounds. Late varieties, represented in the test by Apache planted after June 1 had reduced yields of 5367 for June 15 plantings.

In the same tests, medium maturing varieties represented by RS 610 had similar yields from plantings May 1 to June 15 which varied only from 5968 to 6290 pounds.

Early maturing varieties, represented by NK 125 gave similar yields from May 1 to July 1 plantings and these yields varied from 4548 to 4828 pounds. On both of the medium and early maturing varieties, May plantings gave the lowest yields, however it was only a small decrease from later plantings. Early plantings usually require 2 to 3 weeks longer to reach half bloom stage than later plantings. Also, an early planting may require an extra irrigation but produce no more grain than later plantings.

For protection against midge, sorghum that blooms before August 7 will usually escape midge damage. Producers need to keep this in mind when they are selecting their varieties and planting dates.

1965 data from the Bushland Experiment Station continues to verify the fact that double rowed sorghum yields more than single rowed sorghum on 40

inch centers. Double rowed sorghum had a yield of 7,060 pounds compared to 6,322 for single rowed sorghum. We also recommended that an 8 pound seeding rate will give maximum yields.

### COTTON PLANTING

Several of the farmers I visited with last week had put their cotton planting off till about May 2 because of the weather. Actually, I don't really believe they have hurt themselves any by not getting cottonseeded in the ground before that date.

There seems to be a lot of farmers that are going to try to fungicide treatment for cotton seedling disease this year. Research results over the years have shown that the use of in-furrow fungicide treatments have increased stand counts and some times increased yields. Yields would probably have been increased more consistently if seeding rates had been about 20 to 25 pounds of acid delinted seed. In many cases the fungicides did a good job and there were just too many cotton plants per foot of row. We sure believe 3 to 4 plants per foot of row will give the maximum net profit based on yields and price.

I've had several farmers ask me about the use of cotton fungicides as a hopper-box or a seed overcoat method of application. Our research people have not done any work with the seed over coat method of application and we just don't know how this method will do. I highly recommend that farmers leave a check plot of some rows without a fungicide to actually see for yourself what kind of results you obtain. The real test of any practice is the net profit returned. On testing new practices, many farmers try something one year, but to really give a true picture of the benefits, something like cotton fungicides should be tried for at least 3 years. If it can save a replanting one year in three, it has paid for itself the other two years more than likely when you consider all three years together.

Mrs. Areen Draper, Deaf Smith, Extension Agent, discussed the Permanent Press wearing apparel and fabrics. In talking about the new fabrics she said: "Consumers need to know what performance to expect from fibers as each fiber family has certain jobs they can do best - they are products to be understood for complete satisfaction and serviceability."

Mrs. Kate Gamble, Extension Agent from Randall County gave a short but very informative review of "Whats New in the hoisery line of clothing." This was not only of interest to Mrs. Lane Goar's Homemaking class in Bovina High School, but the older group gained useful information on "Whats New," also.

"Bonded" fabrics was discussed by Cricket B. Taylor, County Home Demonstration Agent of Parmer County. Standpoint of selection, care and sewing. "Fiber Content" is the most important clue to performance and care of this modern fabric, therefore reading labels, following instruction for care and saving label tags for

later reference is a must if consumer expects complete satisfaction in appearance, and serviceability", Mrs. Taylor said.

Modeling garments were Mrs. O.H. Jones and Mrs. George Turner of the S&S Department Store in Bovina. Mrs. Turner modeled a rose, permanent press shift of 65% Polyester and 35% cotton. Mrs. Jones modeled a white dress of 64% mohair and 36% wool bonded with acetate.

From Friona, Mrs. Ralph Taylor modeled a bonded two-piece beige, dress of Polyester and cotton from Foster's Department Store.

Also exhibits of "Permanent Press" garments and material were furnished by Bovina Dry Goods, and S&S Department Store, Hurst Department Store and Foster Department Store of Friona exhibited material and garments in "Permanent Press" and "bonded fabrics". Anita's Dress Shop of Friona and Holiday Store in Farwell had exhibits also.

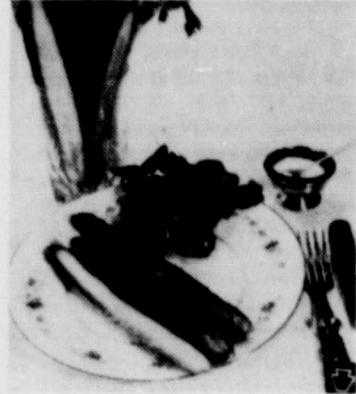

It may be used sliced, in salads, or cut into sticks and eaten as a finger food.

MAY-SENIOR CITIZENS MONTH

Clubs, organizations or study groups that may be interested in protecting senior citizens against frauds may be interested in securing a leaflet from this office entitled "Your Money and Your Life." It is put out by the Food and Drug Administration and would be especially good to give some older persons that you may want to remember and help.

BEWARE OF MOTION SICKNESS AND NAUSEA DRUGS

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration acted in March to warn against the use of certain drugs by pregnant women. These drugs, which are used for nausea, motion sickness and vomiting may cause birth deformities taken during pregnancy. These products are considered safe for older persons and are sold without prescription.

Action by the Federal Drug Administration was taken because certain of these products do not contain a statement warning women of the potential danger. Unless the companies change their labeling they will be required to withdraw the product from the market.

It is important for women to never take medicine, not even aspirin, while pregnant, without the doctor's approval. This is a fact of which many women are not aware. When a woman is pregnant, nothing (vitamin pills, medicines for an upset stomach, headache prescription) should be taken without her doctor's consent.

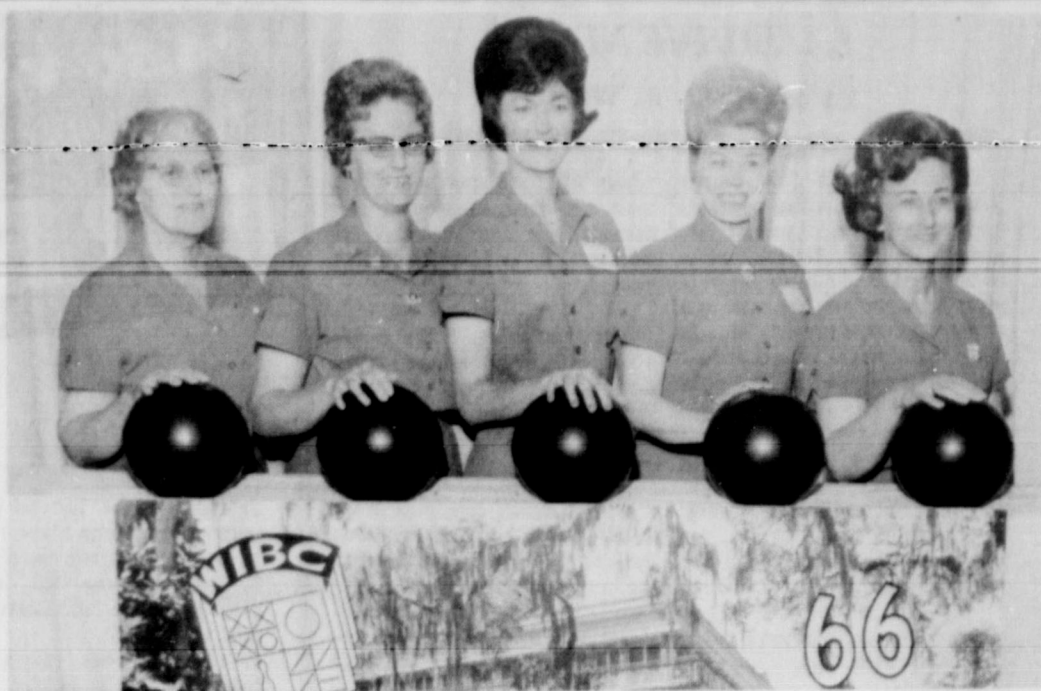
