



**GRAND, RESERVE CHAMPS**

**Gary Phipps Is Double Winner In Steer Show**

A couple of Lazbuddie families have a "Good thing going" when it comes to winning championships in the county barrow show; and a certain Friona family hasn't done badly in the steer division in recent years.

The Lazbuddie families are the Seaton and Gleasons, and in Friona, it's the Phipps family we're talking about.

Checking with Scotty Windham, Lazbuddie's fine vocational agriculture instructor, we found that the two Lazbuddie families have claimed the county show's champion barrow title for the last six years in a row.

Three members of the Jimmie Seaton family have been responsible for the Farmer County grand champion barrow four times in the past six years, while Bobby Gleason, the son of Mr. and Mrs. T.L. Gleason, has had the grand champ the other two years.

The Lazbuddie exhibitors started their current streak in the 1961 show, when Jimmie Dale Seaton won top honors with his Hampshire entry. In 1962, younger sister Theresa Seaton made it two in a row with another Hampshire.

The Gleasons got into the act in 1963, when Bobby's Poland China won the grand championship. Theresa Seaton was back in the spotlight in 1964 with another Hampshire for county champ, and then Bobby Gleason made it a case of swap-out by winning with his Poland China in 1965.

The current county champion barrow, exhibited by Rickie Seaton, was the first for this member of the family, as well as being the first time a cross-bred barrow was judged tops in the show.

The last time a non-Lazbuddie exhibitor won the grand champion's trophy in the barrow show was 1960, when Mickey Wilson of Friona won it with a Poland China entry.

Meanwhile, back in Friona, the Phipps family is getting a pretty good record going for themselves in the steer division.

Thirteen-year old Gary set a precedent by showing both the grand and reserve champion steers. Older brother Dewain had won the county show in 1963 and also had a breed champion lamb that year.

Another member of the family Tex, had the show's reserve champion in 1964. In 1963, when Dewain won the county title, he later exhibited the reserve champion steer at the Houston Fat Stock Show with a Short-horn entry.

All of these families have won many more ribbons and trophies in several other shows. This is just a thumbnail sketch of their good fortunes in the local show.

Both of the family streaks mentioned above had a much better than average chance of continuing, when the various grand champions were judged.

In the barrow division, the Gleasons and Seaton had three of the six breed champions in the ring for the judging of the grand champion. Besides Rickie Seaton's grand champion there were Theresa Seaton with the champion Hampshire, and Bobby Gleason with the champion Poland China.

In the steer show, Gary Phipps of course won two of the four divisions himself, but a third class winner was a Phipps animal, shown by a cousin, Monty. This was the lightweight winner, and gave the Phipps family three of the four class champions being judged for grand champ.

Lanny Tucker, the judge of the barrow and lamb shows, is to be commended for running off a real fine show the first day, especially in light of the fact that there were more barrows in the show than usual. Tucker kept the show moving, and it never lagged from start to finish.

"It's good to be working with you folks from Farmer County, rather than against you as is the case so often," observed the Hart High School vocational instructor at one point during the day's activities. He often has his youngsters in direct competition with county youngsters in

The first day of the tenth annual Farmer County Junior Livestock Show was dominated by youngsters from Lazbuddie,

but the second day belonged almost exclusively to a 13-year-old 4-H club youngster from Friona, Gary Phipps.

Phipps made county show history by exhibiting both the grand and reserve champion steers in Saturday's judging, and later sold the two animals in the auction sale for a combined total of \$1,096.50.

Lazbuddie youngsters claimed breed championships in four of the six barrow divisions, and while winning just one of the top three lamb trophies, Lazbuddie names were on eight of the top 15 lambs shown.

Young Rickie Seaton, 10-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmie Seaton, gave Lazbuddie a string of six consecutive years with the grand champion of the barrow show, winning honors with a cross-bred animal.

The show's judge, Lanny Tucker of Hart, said it was the first time in his career as a judge to make a cross-bred barrow the grand champ, and it was also a first for the Friona show.

Another 4-H club youngster, Wayne Schueler of Friona, had the reserve champion barrow with his 209 pound Duroc, the champion of its breed. Schueler is the 13-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Schueler.

Other breed champs were shown by Larry Eubanks of Lazbuddie (Berkshire); Curtis Drager of Bovina, (Chester White); Theresa Seaton of Lazbuddie (Hampshire) and Bobby Gleason of Lazbuddie (Poland China.)

Top lambs were shown by David Nelson (Fine Wool), Royce Barnes (Southdown) and Daryl Kirkpatrick, Bovina, (medium wool).

Top animals were sold for a total of \$28,708.97 in premiums at the sale Saturday afternoon. Friona Wheat Growers was successful bidder on Phipps' grand champion steer, at 80 cents per pound. Friona State Bank bought his reserve champion at 50 cents per pound.

The S.I.B. Gin of the Lazbuddie Community bought Seaton's barrow champion at \$1.00 per pound. Bovina Wheat Growers was high bidder for the reserve champion of Wayne Schueler's, at \$1.10 per pound.

Eubanks' Berkshire was bought by North Lazbuddie Gin at 70 cents per pound, and the gin also bought Gleason's Poland China champ at 50 cents. Herring Implement Co. was high bidder on Miss Seaton's top Hampshire, at 80 cents per pound, and Bovina Wheat Growers bought Drager's Chester White at 70 cents per pound.

The top sheep were bought by Foster Fertilizer, Lazbuddie, Security State Bank, Farwell and Generalgas, Bovina, all at \$1 per pound.

Good premiums were paid all the way down the list for the animals as the sale total hit the highest in the 10-year show history.

**Principals, Counselor Get 2-Year Contracts**

The three Friona Independent School District principals and counselor were given a new two-year contracts at the monthly meeting of the school board Monday night.

The principals are John R. Cook, high school, Tom E. Jarboe, junior high and J.T. Gee, elementary school. B.E. Duggins, is the school counselor. Each had two year contracts expiring this school term.

In other business, the board heard tax collection reports from assessor-collector Porter Roberts, who stated that collections during the month of January totaled \$100,594.15. The total tax collected through February 1 amounted to 97.2

per cent of the tax roll.

The board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Dorothy Rowlett, history teacher in high school, effective February 25. The January bills were accepted for payment.

Classroom teacher election will be acted upon during the board's March meeting.

The three principals have been in the Friona School system a combined total of 63 years. Cook is in his 11th year as high school principal, and has been in the school system 17 years. Jarboe is in his tenth year as principal and 15th year overall.

Gee is currently in his 31st year with the local school system. He has been elementary school principal the past seven years. Duggins is in his eleventh year with the school system. Adding his total to the other three gives 74 years of service by the four to the Friona School system.

**Two File For School Board**

Two men have filed for positions on the Friona Independent School District's board of trustees, with the deadline for returning signed petitions next Wednesday, March 2.

Those filing are W.M. Masstie, who is up for re-election and Charles Howell. The other board member whose term is expiring is D.C. Herring, who as yet has not filed for re-election.

The school board election day is Saturday, April 2.

**Small Percentage Have Accepted Farm Programs**

A very small percent of the farmers in Farmer County have signed up under any of the farm programs offered for 1966 at this date according to a report from the ASCS office. As the final date for signing an "Intention to Participate" is March

31, 1966, it appears quite likely that there may very well be a real "rush" in the last few days of the sign up period. That is, if as many of our farmers participate in this year's programs as have in the past few years.

"There are we know, several reasons why farmers are waiting about signing up in the programs, says Prentice Mills, ASCS office manager. "For one thing, it has been rumored that some "changes" might take place in one or more of the programs to cause it to be more attractive. Another is some farmers are not aware that it is necessary to sign up in all the programs (including cotton) to be eligible for program benefits. We do not anticipate any changes in the program provisions and it is necessary that any person who proposes to receive program benefits must sign up."

"Those of us in the ASCS office would like to urge persons who are planning to participate in one or more of the programs to come in and sign up at their earliest convenience in order to avoid the "last-minute rush" and a possible long wait in line," Mills concluded.

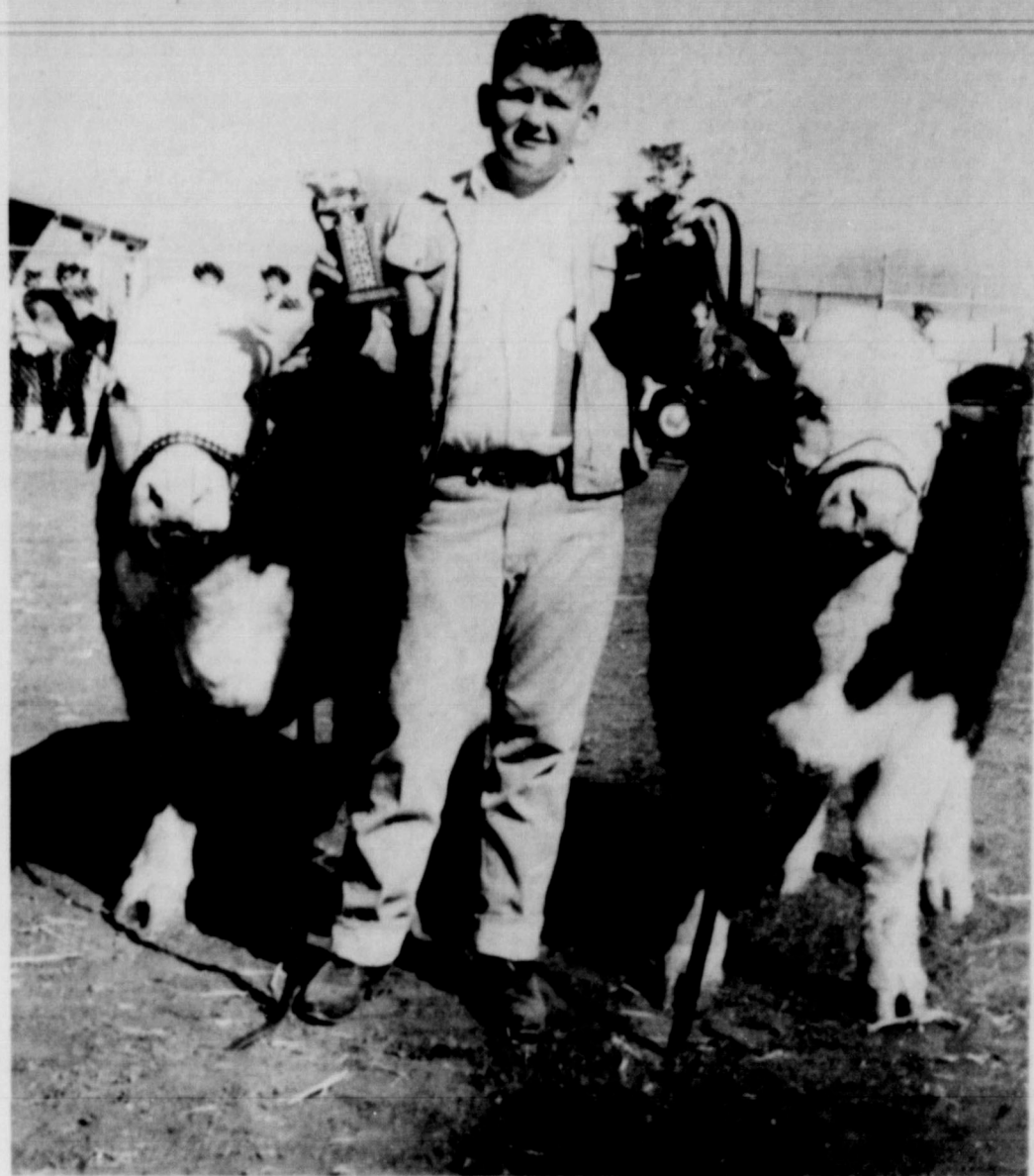
The people in the ASCS office will be happy to discuss the programs with any interested person at anytime.

Directors whose terms are

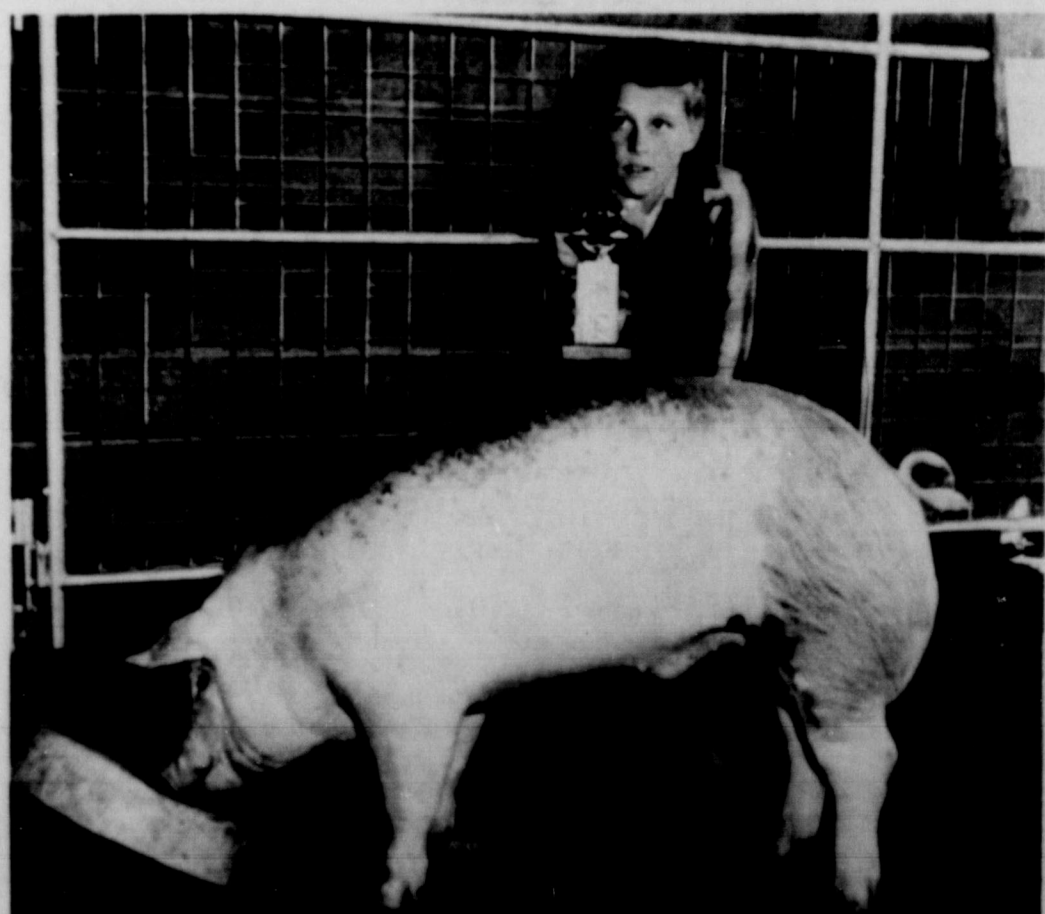
expiring are: Gary Brown, Raymond Cook, and Eric Rushing. Marty Martinez, who recently moved from Friona, also had been a member of the board.

### Cannon AFB To Employ Students

## What About This Angle To Build A County Showbarn?

This past weekend, merchants, farmers and organizations paid out \$28,708.97 in prize money for winners at the annual Farmer County Junior Livestock Show.

This is a pretty sizeable amount, and it set us to wondering. Why couldn't a part of this money be funneled back into providing a permanent show barn for the youngsters? Every year we're face with a similar dilemma at the time for the county junior livestock show: no real adequate place for the show. Oh' we bet by all right, but it could be so much nicer.

Bruce Parr has loaned us portable corrals for the last couple of years, and that helps a lot. But the main problem is that there is no place for spectators.

By the time the fence is lined one-deep, it requires something like hanging from the

rafters to be able to see what's going on in the ring.

We annually put on a big publicity campaign to get the people out to see the show, and then when they get there, there's no place suitable for watching it.

Why couldn't a percentage be taken off the top of each prize animal, to be designated for a new show barn? With an automatic donation of, for instance, ten per cent, a nice show barn could be paid for in ten years or less.

We're not specialists on building costs, but we'd hazard the guess that this year's sale grossed enough to pay for a show barn that would adequately serve Farmer County youth for years to come.

If an arrangement could be worked out such as been suggested, then the building could be built, and the kids (and spectators) could enjoy it while it was being paid for.

### THE FAMILY LAWYER

#### "I Forgot!"

A motorist, hurt in a collision with a freight train, sued the railroad for damages. But in court, the railroad retorted that the motorist himself was guilty of negligence.

"He crossed those tracks twice a day for months," noted the railroad. "Yet he admits he failed to look out for a train."

"On this particular occasion," explained the motorist, "I just happened to forget about the tracks. But that isn't negligence. Everyone has a lapse of memory once in a while."

However, the court ruled that his excuse was no excuse at all and that he was indeed guilty of negligence.

If you should ever seek damages for an injury, your own conduct is likely to come under careful scrutiny. Were you partly to blame for the accident? If you knew that danger lay ahead, is it an excuse to say "I forgot about it?"

The general rule is: no. On the contrary, forgetfulness itself is one of the commonest forms of negligence. Said one court:

"Though we may regard with amused tolerance the proverbial abstractions of middle age hunting for the thimble on its finger, and of old age troubled that it cannot find the glasses on its nose, absent-mindedness is not a satisfactory

standard of care in the modern world."

Nevertheless, the law does not expect you to have instant and total recall of everything you have ever known. Mitigating circumstances may make your forgetfulness forgivable.

One such circumstance is the mere passage of time. Thus: A schoolteacher who stumbled in a hallway won damages from the school board, even though she had known the floor was defective. Because the defect was hard to see, and because three weeks had gone by since she noticed it, the court decided she bore no blame for the accident.

Another possible excuse for forgetting is that something suddenly and forcefully diverted your attention.

In one case an elderly woman, walking home alongside a lonely road, heard men's voices in the darkness ahead. Terrified, she crossed the road—momentarily forgetting, in her panic, that there was a sharp dip on that side.

She fell, suffered assorted injuries, and sued the county. And the court, in upholding her claim, found no negligence in her impulsive action.

"There is a clear distinction," a judge commented, "between forgetfulness which is one phase of negligence, and a sudden arising of conditions which throw one off his guard."

plants. These winter outdoors and bloom the following year. Red Monarch sweet william acts, instead, as an annual, blooming in two months from seeds sown in early spring; or in spring from fall-sown seeds. That's one characteristic that makes it "different."

A second is its flower color which is solid scarlet red, relieved by white stamens. Since mature plants grow 18 inches high if spring sown and 16 inches tall if seeds are sown in fall, those scarlet red blooms are good for cutting. They last a long time as individual florets continue to open.

Because of its annual flowering habit and its new color Red Monarch received an award for 1966 from All-America Selections. Seeds of all award winners should be purchased early as there never is enough to go around.

**Fishing With An Active Cork**  
One of the drawbacks to fishing with a cane pole and cork float is that the cork usually stays in one spot. You can make your cork and line travel every-which-way by sticking a couple of six-inch-long feathers in the top of the cork.

Do this and your float will range over a wide area, in keeping with the breeze, carrying the bait in a very life-like manner.

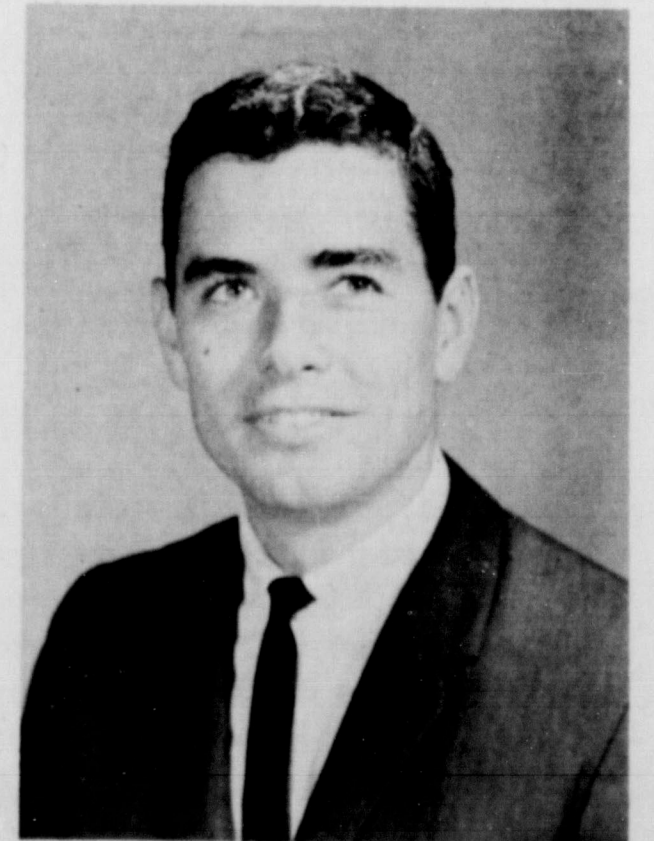

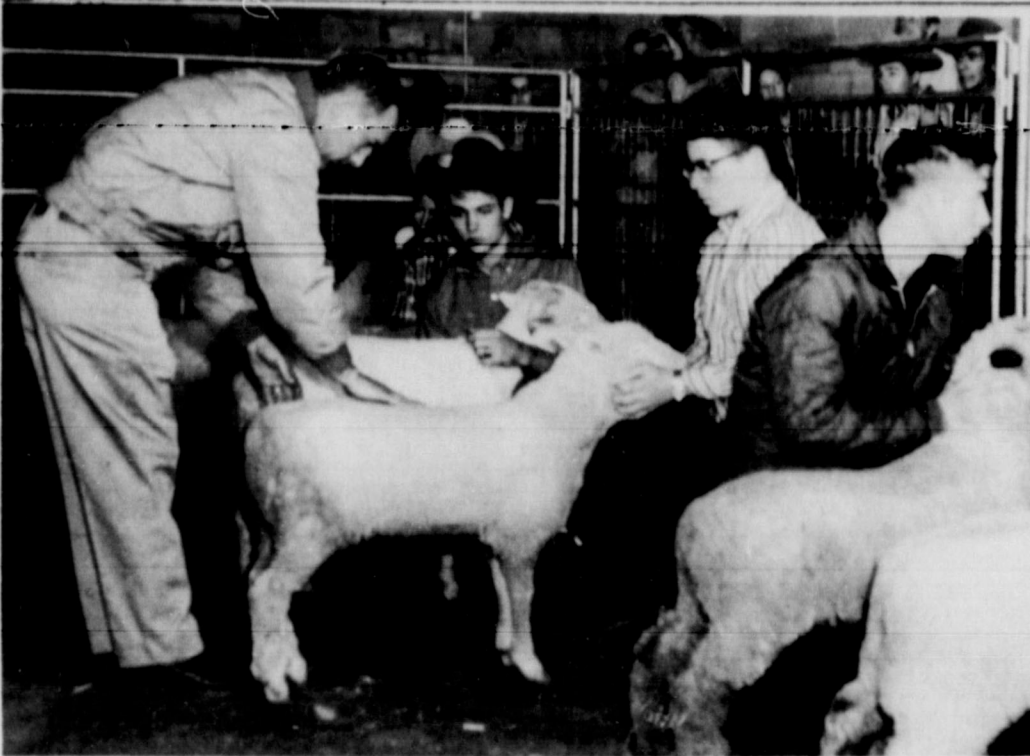

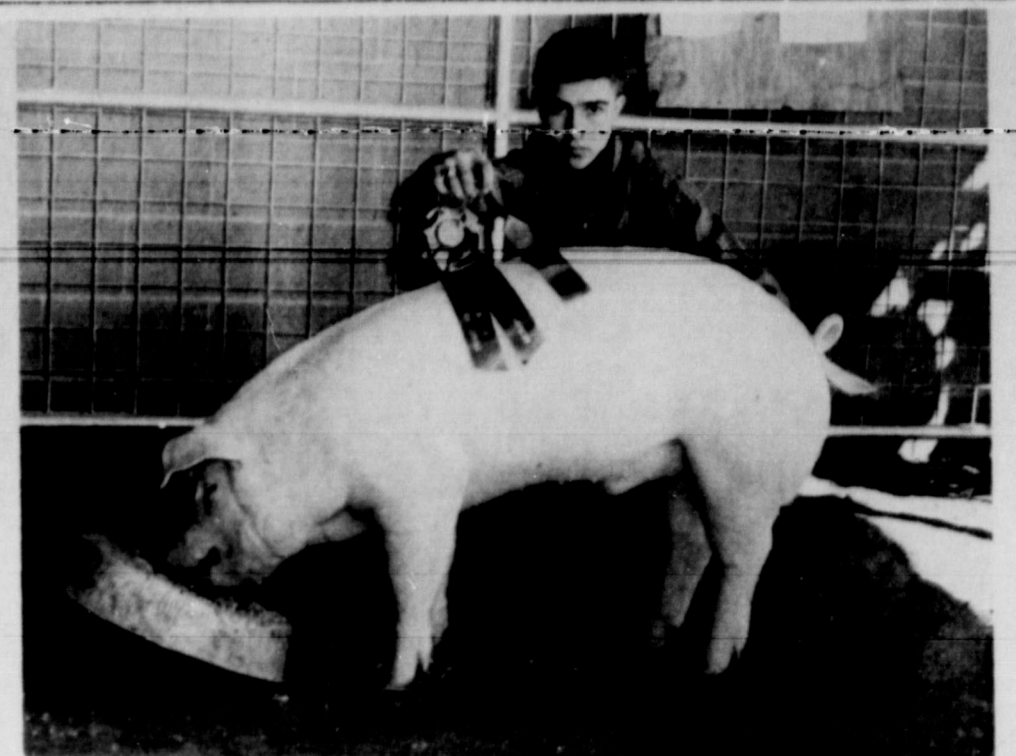

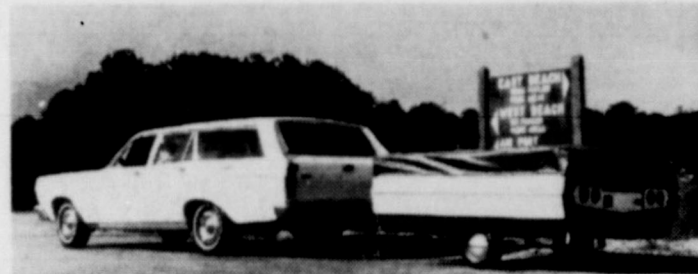

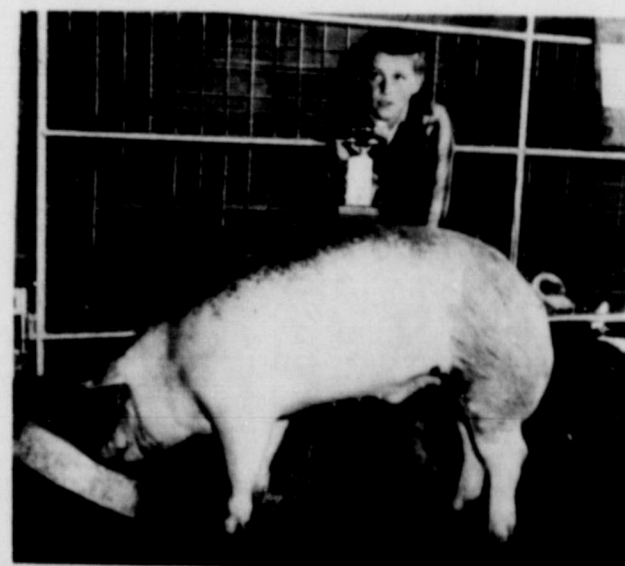

(Makes 5 to 6 servings)

- 1/2 cup butter or new Danish margarine
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 tablespoon dehydrated minced onion
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup flour
- 2/3 cup Starlac nonfat dry milk
- 1-3/4 cups water
- 2 cups (1/4 of 2 pound loaf) Borden's processed American cheese, shredded
- 3 (7-oz.) cans flaked tuna
- 6 hard-cooked eggs, sliced

In a medium-size saucepan, over medium heat, melt butter. Add green pepper, onion and salt; sauté until tender. Blend in flour. Sprinkle nonfat dry milk over water; stir to blend. Gradually stir milk into vegetable-flour mixture. Stir constantly and cook until thickened and smooth. Add cheese; stir until melted. ## Increase In Soybeans Seen For Plains Area

Dr. Earl Collister, Director of the High Plains Research Foundation, predicted today that soybean production in the High Plains of Texas will be increased substantially this year due to the recent ruling by the U.S.D.A. permitting the substitution of soybeans for feed grains. This change was made as a major factor in the food and peace program.

Farmers can plant soybeans on allowable grain sorghum acres this year and receive price support payments, just as if feed had been planted. In the 1966 feed grain program, producers who divert at least 20% of their base feed grain acreage will receive price support payments 53¢ per hundred weight. The same price support payment will be received when soybeans are substituted for grain sorghum.

For instance, on 100 acres, a farmer can divert the minimum of 20 acres, plant 30 acres to soybeans and 50 acres in feed. He can divert 30

acres, plant 35 acres to soybeans and 35 acres to feed. He can divert 50 acres and plant 50 acres to soybeans or divert 20 acres and plant 80 acres to soybeans.

The major soybean varieties planted in the area are the LEE, HILL, and HINN. The new short-season PATTERSON soybean, just released by the High Plains Research Foundation, will be especially attractive to those who produce certified seed. The HINN, released last year is also in demand by some certified seed growers. The higher price received for all certified soybean seed is sure to increase planting of Foundation seed under the new program.

Foundation seed for the HINN and PATTERSON varieties are available at the Foundation headquarters at Halfway. Those interested in obtaining information about soybeans can contact the Foundation at Box 1870, Platview, Texas.

## New SCS Employees Get Special Defense Course

New employee of the Soil Conservation Service, USDA, received instructions in radiological monitoring in a school held in the conference room of the Plains Coop Oil Mill, Lubbock.

Instructors for the school which concluded Tuesday afternoon, were furnished through Headquarters III Corps and Fort Hood CBR Intelligence Division, G2 Sector B CBR Center, and by the Soil Conservation Service.

Attending from Friona was Clayton Jobe.

Instructors were Lt. A.H. Bacas and Sp. 6 John D. Stewart, U.S. Army and Mr. Jack C. William, Soil Scientist USDA, SCS.

In case a nuclear attack, it will be the responsibility of the

SCS to measure radiation on food and to locate those land areas which would be safe for continued production of agricultural products.

Subjects covered by the specialists included: Effects of Nuclear Weapons, Exercises Using Radiological Monitoring Equipment, Operations and Techniques in Radiological Monitoring, Medical Effects of Fallout, Protection and Decontamination Measures and Dose, and Dose-Rate Calculations, and Fallout Prediction. All SCS employees are required to take this course.

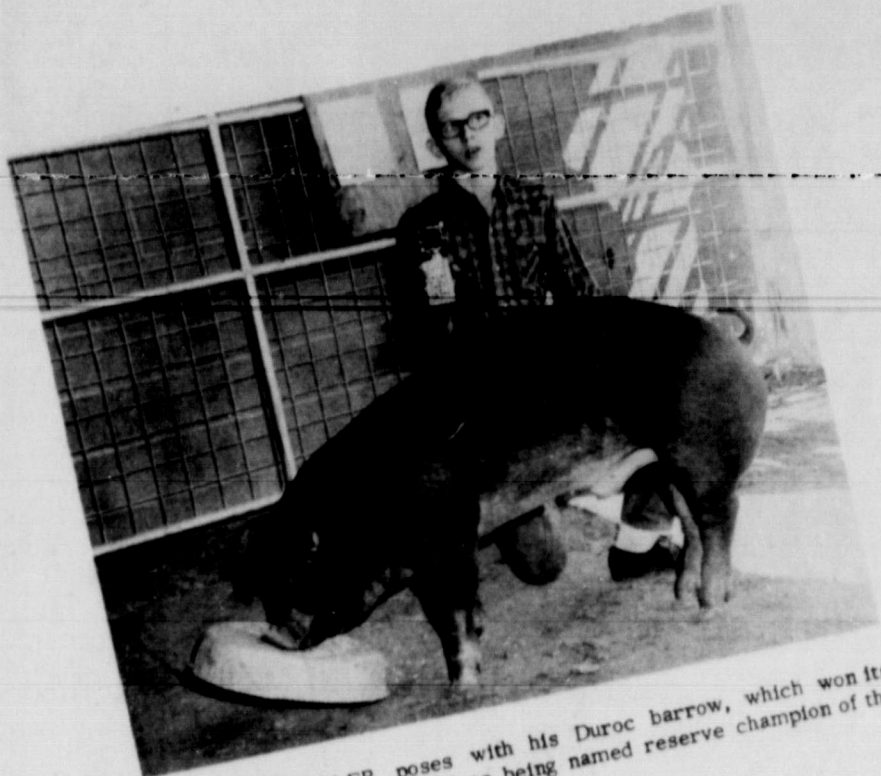

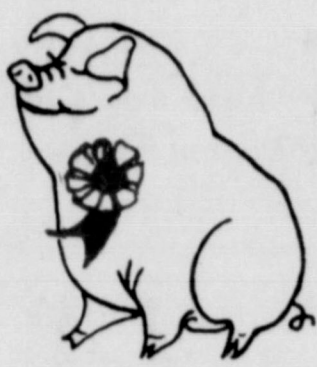
WAYNE SCHUELER poses with his Duroc barrow, which won its breed championship as well as being named reserve champion of the show last weekend.

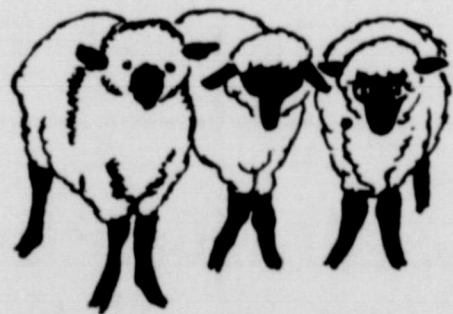

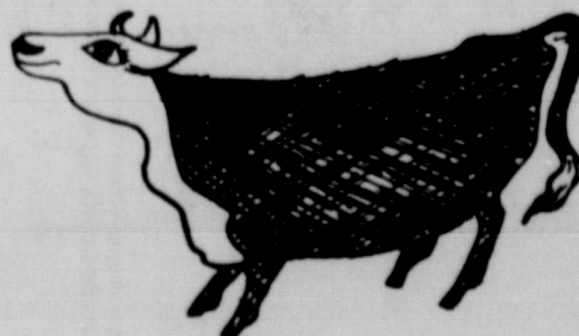

and 5 per cent nitrogen. Organic matter improves soil structure and its ability to take in water and hold it in storage for later use by plants. It also improves soil aeration, loosens dense, compact soils and granulates loose, open sandy soils to give them a friable crumb structure.

During the decomposition process, a continuous supply of carbon dioxide, nitrogen in various forms, phosphorus and other nutrients so essential to plant growth are liberated. Organic matter serves as a storage facility for mineral nutrients such as calcium, magnesium, nitrogen, and many others making them less likely to be lost in drainage or water seepage.

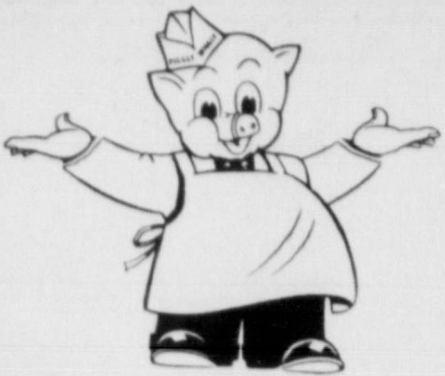
Continuous cultivation without giving attention to regular additions or residues gradually lowers the organic matter in the soil. The level may become so low that maximum production cannot be obtained. A soil test will show the organic level in the soil.

Breakfast is a very important meal and really warrants thought and planning for every family member - and mothers are included too. Do you know teenagers and the mothers are the most poorly nourished family member - taking the nation as a whole. Being fat does not mean "well nourished." In fact the overweight person can be and most usually is the most poorly nourished. Too many "empty" calories that contribute nothing to their hearty and well-

### DESIGN A MENU WITH BREAKFAST APPEAL

You can help your children do better in studies and school games. Back your children up with a good nutritious breakfast every day, and you'll be starting them off right in the morning and encouraging them to develop a habit valuable to them all their lives.

### Good breakfasts don't just happen.

If family members eat at different times, or if a child must be left to eat alone, keep ready-to-eat foods handy or provide foods that take little preparation. Include plenty of fruit, juices and ready-to-eat cereals in your food supply. Prepare hard-cooked eggs and fix bacon to leave for the latecomers.

Every minute counts for mothers who work. Prepare frozen or fresh fruit juice the night before. Chill canned juice overnight. Buy pre-cooked sausage or ham. They'll take only minutes to heat

through for serving. Serve cold sliced meat or cheese as an alternate for eggs.

Devise a menu that appeals to children, if they aren't interested in breakfast. Try mixing fruits, such as berries and sliced peaches, for a tempting flavor change. Have a variety of fruits on hand, and let the youngsters choose a favorite to go with their cereal.

Breakfast can be brighter for everyone if you can plan and serve food that everyone likes.

**GOOD POSTURE FOR GOOD HEALTH AND WORK ABILITY**  
If you are dreaming about how you are going to look in the new styles this spring-you may need to give some thought to posture. Poor posture spoils our looks, health and effectiveness at work.

A variety of things can cause poor posture.

Worry, fear, emotional disturbances and problems at home, school or work affect posture. Fatigue from overwork, or overplay may result in stooped shoulders and general slumping. Beds that are too soft or that sag will prevent proper rest and force the body into unnatural positions.

An infection, poor vision or poor hearing can cause poor posture. Many people with poor vision push their necks forward to enable them to see better. Defective hearing can also result in the head being inclined and the body being off-balanced.
