### On The Farm In Parmer County

Sprayers and dusters should be given special attention prior to winter storage. Proper care at this time can add years to their useful life, and have them ready for use without delay next spring. Be sure and follow the manufacturer's manual for cleaning and storage.

All pesticide materials should be removed from the equipment by washing or by other means. Moving parts should be lubricated. Some parts, may need to be disassembled for cleaning.

After spraying is completed in the fall, soak nozzles and strainer (screens) in kerosene. Run a wire through the spray rods and rinse the hoses. Clean hoses should be put where they will not crack or freeze.

Before putting the cleaner power sprayer away for the winter, a good practice is to pour at least a pint of new or used oil in the tank, filling it with water and starting the pump. As the water is discharged, a thin coating of oil will cover the inside of the tank, pump, valves and circulating system. The sprayer should then be drained com-

pletely and stored in a dry place.

Dusters, like sprayers, should be cleaned to prevent caking, clogging and eventual corrosion. All slip joints should be given a protective coating after cleaning and before being placed in storage.

Winter is the best time to control rats. Reason is the high mortality rate from natural causes and the resulting low level of rat population.

The anti-coagulant rat poisons are good for permanent bait stations. The rats have to feed on these baits for several days and, because there is no pain which they can associate with their feeding, the sick rats continue to eat the baits until they die.

Use fish, meat, bread, fruit, vegetables, cereal, water and yellow corn meal as baits with the anti-coagulant poisons. Mix one part of the anti-coagulant to 19 parts of the bait material.

The bait should be concealed along a rat runway, because rats avoid feeding in the open whenever possible.

Make sure small children can not get a hold of the poison or bait.

Progressive Study Club this week announced that the annual Christmas Gift Bazaar which has heretofore been held on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving has been moved up a week.

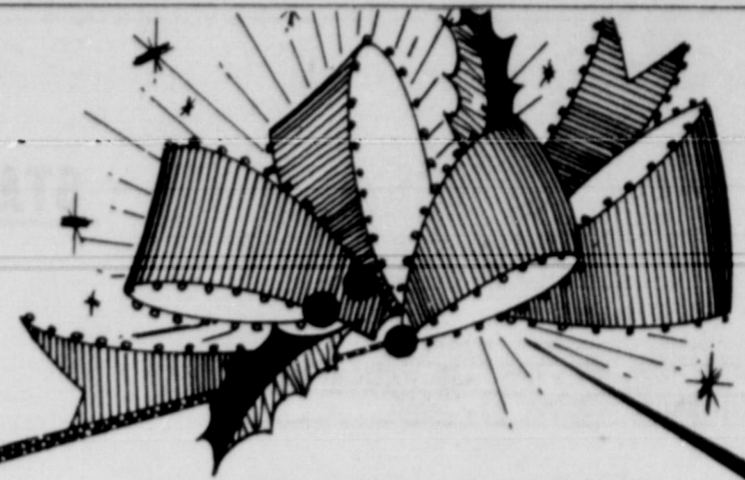
"We believe the public will be more in the mood to buy for Christmas gifts after Thanksgiving is over," stated committee chairman Mrs. Wesley Barnett.

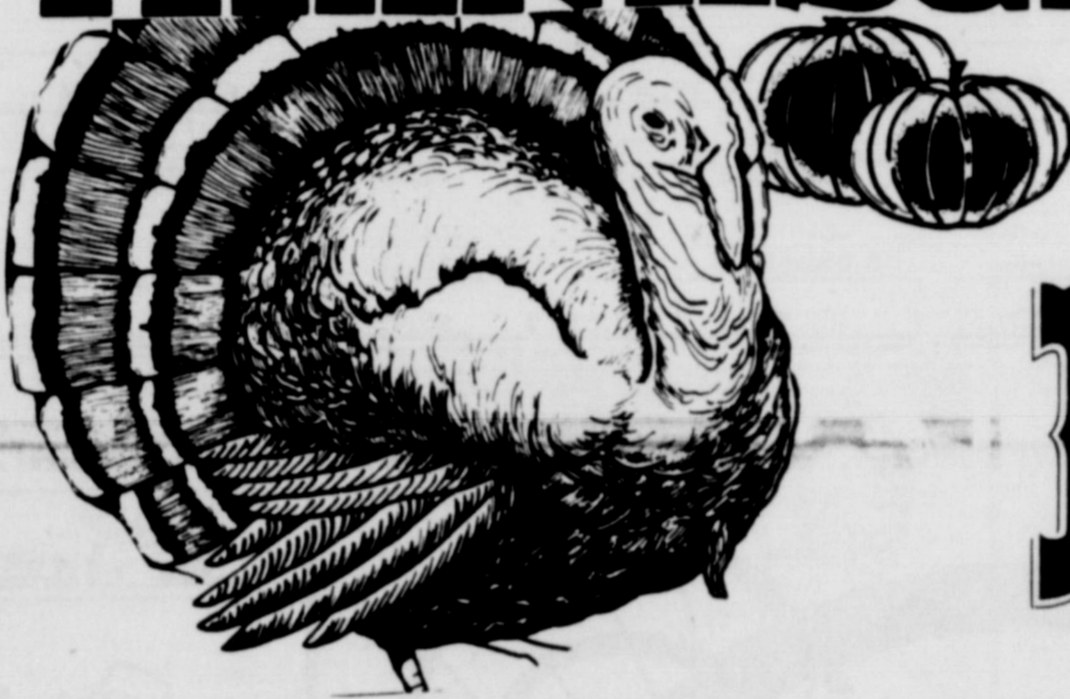

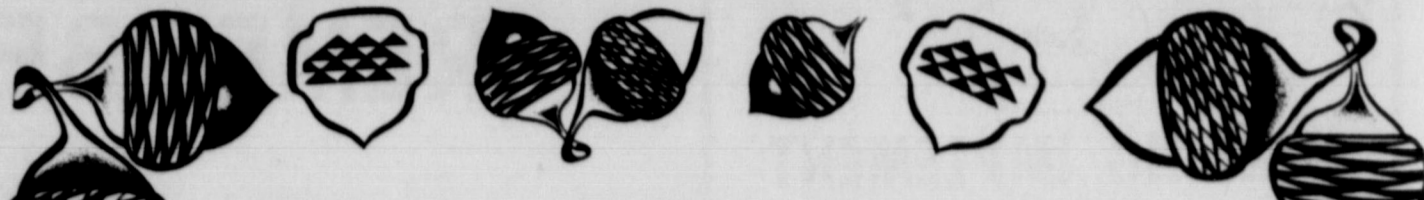

## Clayton Outlines Top Legislative Issues

Texas lawmakers might try working out some this month and the next to get themselves in shape for the upcoming legislation session, destined to be a big one for the State of Texas.

Representative Bill Clayton says that legislation dealing with the State's water problems will be on the top priority list. Also to get attention in the session will be these issues:

\*Salaries of State employees. At the present time, the State of Texas is short 180 highway patrolmen, and short 200 highway engineers. These are only two departments. Great expense is incurred by the State, Clayton said, in the training of State employees. Pay scales better than what the State can presently offer have been draining off potential manpower. Also, Clayton points out that a definite shortage is seen in the in-between age group; a large number of employees will reach retirement age soon, with only young inexperienced personnel to fill their places.

\*Revenues. This item naturally affects all others; an extra \$200 million is going to be needed to run the State government this next biennium. The figure is above the expected tax revenues.

\*Education. Pressure is mounting for an increase in tuition at the State's senior colleges and universities; Clayton says he believes he would favor a tuition hike in view of the fact that the Texas Opportunity Plans has been established to help those students who have financial assistance. \*City sales tax. Increased demands by municipalities for the right to impose their own sales taxes are increasing, Representative Clayton says. Clayton had introduced a bill in the last legislature which would have made provisions for City Fathers, but the legislation did not pass.

On the water front, things look "much better than what they did," Clayton explains. As a member of the House interim study committee on Texas' water problems, he has been work-

ing along with others on legislation which will go before the lawmakers when they convene in mid-January.

Bills which will clarify existing legislation will be introduced, and also bills dealing with strictly new legislation. Perhaps the most controversial will be the Water Adjudication Act. A part of this act will determine that "in considering trans-basin diversion, the consideration will be determined by whether the benefits to the receiving basin are greater than benefits to the original basin."

Opposition to the adjudication act may come from East Texas opponents, whose water supplies are destined to help water other areas of the State. A Civil Penalties bill will define powers and rights of the various agencies dealing with the water problems in the State. Clayton said the U.S. Representative George Mahon had had a public works study include the study of bringing water to Texas from the Missouri River. The figure amounted to \$200,000. Other State feasibility studies have already been started, and may be completed by mid-year.

ABOUT BACON -- Had you realized that there is more difference in bacon than just thickness of slice? There are several things to consider. Regular bacon comes from the underside of the hog, is sliced and packaged in 1- and 2-pound packages and is priced in three different ranges. Irregular bacon comes from the ends of the bacon slabs. It's less expensive because the slices aren't as uniform and attractive, but the flavor is the same. Bacon square is cut from the jowl of the hog. It is fatter than regular bacon. Leanest of all is Canadian-style bacon which isn't bacon at all, but one of the most expensive cuts of pork, the loin.

DON'T HAND DOWN CHILDREN'S SHOES -- Don't be tempted to hand children's shoes down to the next child. Each child's foot is different. A good leather shoe, when new, will conform to a child's foot. Once the shoe is molded to the foot, it will not change shape.

## How to Select Right Lumber For Remodeling Projects

Home handymen, contemplating an improvement project this fall, can realize the best results when armed with a working knowledge of lumber.

Lumber can be classed as soft or hard wood. The difference lies not in the surface of the wood, but in the leaves. For instance, while Southern Pine is known as a soft wood, it is harder than many hardwood species. Soft woods are identifiable by their needle-like leaves. Hardwoods have broad leaves, and lose them seasonally.

Care should be taken in selecting the quality of structural lumber. Called framing, this includes the studs, joists and rafters which support a home or room addition and hold it together.

Most framing lumber is two inches in thickness and can be purchased from a lumberyard in various widths for different uses. Most common widths include 2 by 4s, 2 by 6s and 2 by 10. Grades run according to number—1, 2 and 3. Durability, strength, and nail holding ability are critical considerations in securing the proper grade.

Proper seasoning and pre-shrinking before being surfaced to final size are important. Seasoning is a process of drying that eliminates much of the moisture in the wood. Proper seasoning assures uniformity and strength. Nails will hold in pre-shrunk lumber, but not in unseasoned lumber that dries in service.

You should keep low maintenance in mind when selecting finish lumber. Finish lumber consists of interior paneling, exterior siding, flooring and millwork. Wood siding is usually given a brush dip or vacuum processing with a water repellent preservative before painting. This increases the retention of the paint.

Pigmented water repellents are often applied instead of paint. Such finishes are inexpensive, durable and easy to apply. They also add an element of color to the natural wood grain appearance.

When working with lumber close to the ground or in a climate of severe temperature and moisture change, a chemical preservative is required. Your local building material dealer will have wood that has been pressure treated with such a preservative.

Pressure treated lumber is ideal for:

- fences or open sun decks
- exposed members of open wood trellises used to screen sunlight over outdoor recreation areas
- any wood flooring system members joined within 18 inches of the ground.

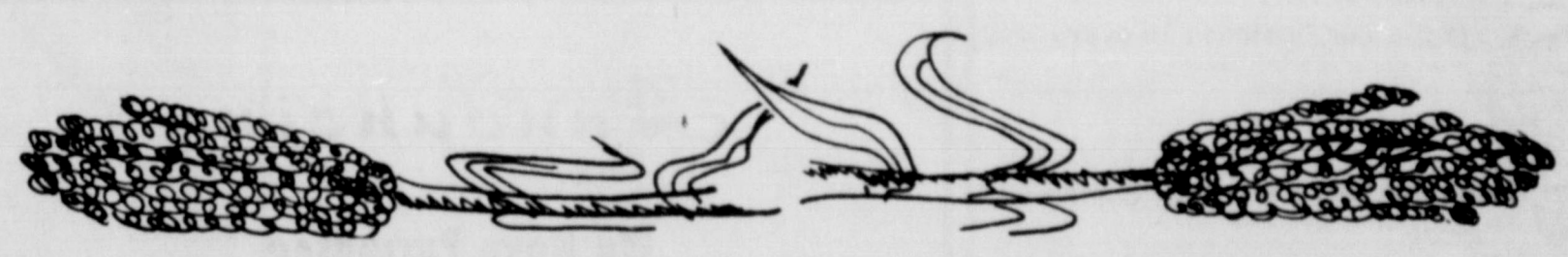

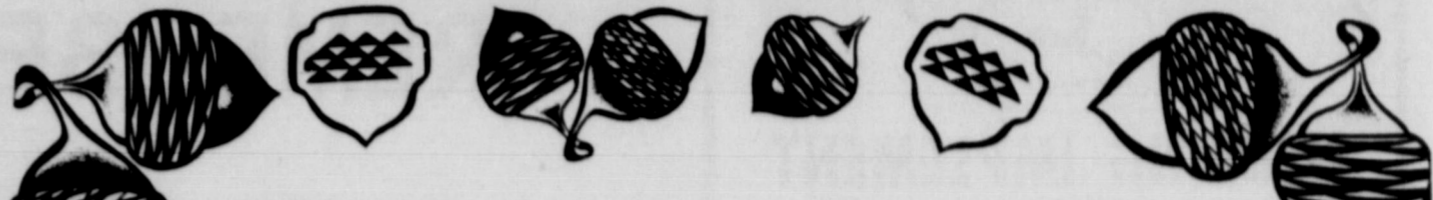

## Clayton Outlines Top Legislative Issues

Texas lawmakers might try working out some this month and the next to get themselves in shape for the upcoming legislative session, destined to be a big one for the State of Texas.

Representative Bill Clayton says that legislation dealing with the State's water problems will be on the top priority list. Also to get attention in the session will be these issues:

\*Salaries of State employees. At the present time, the State of Texas is short 180 highway patrolmen, and short 200 highway engineers. These are only two departments. Great expense is incurred by the State, Clayton said, in the training of State employees. Pay scales better than what the State can presently offer have been draining off potential manpower. Also, Clayton points out that a definite shortage is seen in the in-between age group; a large number of employees will reach retirement age soon, with only young inexperienced personnel to fill their places.

\*Revenues. This item naturally affects all others; an extra \$200 million is going to be needed to run the State government this next biennium. The figure is above the expected tax revenues.

\*Education. Pressure is mounting for an increase in tuition at the State's senior colleges and universities; Clayton says he believes he would favor a tuition hike in view of the fact that the Texas Opportunity Plans has been established to help those students who have financial assistance.

\*City sales tax. Increased demands by municipalities for the right to impose their own sales taxes are increasing, Representative Clayton says. Clayton had introduced a bill in the last legislature which would have made provisions for City Fathers, but the legislation did not pass.

On the water front, things look "much better than what they did," Clayton explains. As a member of the House Interim study committee on Texas' water problems, he has been work-

ing along with others on legislation which will go before the lawmakers when they convene in mid-January.

Bills which will clarify existing legislation will be introduced, and also bills dealing with strictly new legislation. Perhaps the most controversial will be the Water Adjudication Act. A part of this act will determine that "in considering trans-basin diversion, the consideration will be determined by whether the benefits to the receiving basin are greater than benefits to the original basin."

Opposition to the adjudication act may come from East Texas opponents, whose water supplies are destined to help water other areas of the State.

A Civil Penalties bill will define powers and rights of the various agencies dealing with the water problems in the State. Clayton said the U.S. Representative George Mahon had had a public works study include the study of bringing water to Texas from the Missouri River. The figure amounted to \$200,000. Other State feasibility studies "we already been started, and may be completed by mid-year.

Governor Connally has nam-

ed Clayton to represent Texas in a water forum to be held in Scottsdale, Ariz., December 4 and 5.

## The Happy Homemaker

These cool mornings we have been having give homemakers a good excuse for spending some additional time in the kitchen. If there is anything that adds more to a crisp fall day than the smell of freshly baked "goodies" coming out of the oven, I don't know what it is. When you think of baking, remember it isn't too early to bake fruit and nut breads or cakes for Christmas gifts. Of course, you can always bake a number of them for the freezer, but baking a special item for a special person for a special occasion should give each of us a special lift.

Baked items can be frozen and the taste and food value will remain the same at Christmas time as when freshly baked. Several recipes which are especially adaptable to freezing for future use are:

**BANANA NUT CAKE:**

- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons soda
- Dash of salt
- 6 tablespoons buttermilk
- 3 mashed bananas
- 1 cup pecans
- 1 tablespoon vanilla
- Cream sugar and shortening.

Add eggs, one at a time, then beat thoroughly. Sift flour, soda and salt. Add dry ingredients alternately with buttermilk to creamed mixture. Add mashed bananas, nuts, and vanilla and mix.

Pour into two 9" greased and floured cake pans for layer cakes on one loaf pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 35-40 minutes or until well browned.

**GINGERBREAD**

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup salad oil
- 1 cup boiling water
- 2 teaspoons soda
- 1 teaspoon ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 2 eggs, well beaten

Combine ingredients in order given, dissolving soda in hot water and adding eggs last. Pour mixture into a greased pan and bake at 350 degrees for about 40 minutes.

Most of us have learned to use and appreciate spray starch very much. It is one of the most useful products packaged in a spray can. Recently I read four suggestions for the most effective use of this kind of starch.

1. Shake the can each time before you use it.
2. Tilt the can only slightly—not over a 45 degree angle while spraying. If the can is tilted too far, the pressure in the can is reduced and the starch has no way to come out.
3. Hold the nozzle of the can 6 to 12 inches away from the fabric, and press the button firmly to produce a fine, even spray.
4. Clean the soleplate of your iron often so the starch will not scorch on the iron.

Five fire calls were made during October. Three were outside the city limits (tractor fires) for an estimated loss of \$4,000. The two inside the city were a pick-up truck and a grass fire, estimated loss: \$1,000. Police records showed 26 arrests during October. Seventeen were for traffic violations; four were traffic warnings; Three were drunkenness and two were for passing worthless checks. A total of 29 complaints

were investigated, including 10 dogs, five vandalism reports, four thefts and three each for domestic disturbance and truancy and two of house burglaries and runaways. Two traffic accidents were investigated, resulting in three injuries and property damage estimated at \$800.

The winterization of vehicles, including installation of anti-freeze, was done during the first week of the month.

## First Class Mail To Viet Nam Bolstered

**TEXAS TAXES**

Texans pay out less taxes from their personal incomes than citizens in 33 other states. Only about 9.1 per cent of the average Texan's personal income goes for taxes. The national average is 9.7 per cent, according to Texas State Teachers Association.

Postmaster Wright Williams of Friona announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal recording (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available on bases between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, order Public Law 89-725-The Dulski Military Mail Act -- which was signed by President Johnson on Nov. 2, 1966, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines, published weekly or monthly, and featuring current news of interest to the military will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces in Viet Nam.

Postmaster Williams explained that parcels weight 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from points of military to the port of importation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these small parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brian directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail).

This will eliminate the task of re-weighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco Concentration Center prior to Dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas Military Post Offices.

Postmaster Williams also reminds mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds and under, though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Airmail, he said should be sent no later than December 10.

The deadline for Christmas packages weighing more than 5 pounds going to Viet Nam and other overseas military post offices by surface mail is Nov. 10. However, Postmaster Williams expects packages mailed by December 1 to be delivered in time for Christmas.

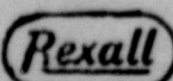

# Teams Sweep Three Games From Farwell

Three Farwell Steer and Sterette teams were no match for Friona basketball teams here last Friday night as Friona gained a measure of revenge for dropping their opening football game to Farwell, winning three basketball games on the local court.

The Chiefs won their season opener, 56-46; the Squaws took their second win of the season, 58-38, and the boys "B" team won, 37-22.

The varsity boys game was the most interesting for the fans, as it was fairly close throughout the contest. The Chiefs trailed only twice, at 4-2 and 5-4, but several times they saw their lead trimmed to a shaky margin.

After struggling for a 6-5 lead through the first five minutes of the game, Friona scored six more points within a one minute period to pull ahead, 12-5, and that momentum seemed to give the team the boost it needed.

Bobby Jordan scored eight of the team's first period points, as Friona had 14-7 lead at the buzzer.

Long set shots by the Steers twice cut six-point Friona leads back to four in the second period, but the Chiefs rode the shooting of Jordan and Ray Lynn Murphree to a nine point advantage at 28-19 with 1:30 left in the half.

The Chiefs would have gone to halftime with a ten-point lead, but a long shot from near the center line was good for Farwell, to cut the edge to eight, 32-24.

Friona built the lead up to 13 points, the longest of the game, early in the third quarter, and that's where it was (45-32) when Jordan got his fourth foul and went to the sidelines for a rest.

The Chiefs still had a 13-point edge after three quarters, 47-34. It remained that way through the first two minutes of the last quarter, but Farwell began to use a press to cut the Friona lead.

The score went from 47-34 to only a five-point lead at 49-44, with three minutes left to play. However, the Chiefs snapped out of a scoreless stretch, and the Steers were able to score only two more points the remainder of the game, as Friona triumphed, 56-46.

Jordan's 19 and Murphree's 16 points led Friona. Bobby Field had 15 for Farwell.

The Squaws had trouble with Farwell during the opening part of the game, and led by only three points, 11-8 after one quarter.

But Friona used layup shots by Cindy Ingram and hookers by sophomore Hazel Fallwell to push a four-point lead midway of the second quarter into a 28-14 halftime edge.

The Squaws sputtered at the start of the third quarter, and Farwell pulled to 33-21. At this point, Friona rallied for a commanding 19-point lead, 46-27 after three quarters, and this about put the game out of reach.

With Miss Ingram hitting with uncanny accuracy, the Squaws continued the onslaught, and with a 32-point lead, Coach Mel Williams used an all-sophomore lineup the last three minutes of the game. The sophs didn't score much, but held on for a 20-point margin.

Cindy's 35 points and Hazel's 15 paced the Squaws as they brought their season record to a 2-1.

In the first game of the night, Coach Maddox's B team took a 37-22 win, as Dale Neel led the B Chieftains with 11 points.

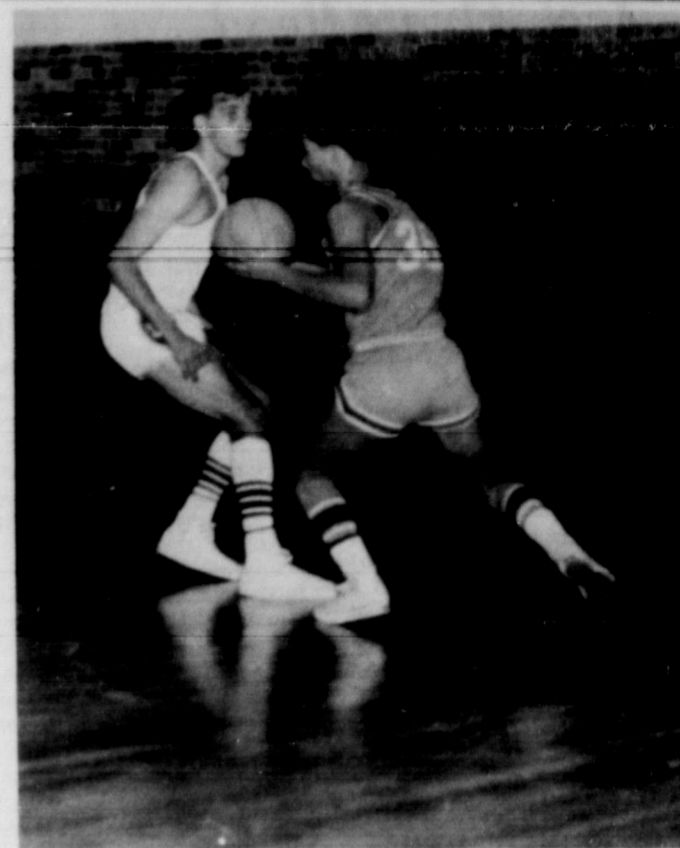
The games marked a successful debut for Maddox as boys basketball coach at FHS.

It was the fourth straight basketball win for the Chiefs over Farwell stretching over three seasons. For the Squaws, it was only the second straight, since Farwell snapped a 20-game Squaw winning streak over the Steerettes in the opening game last year at Farwell.

## CHIEFS GOT GOOD MILEAGE

### Opponents Hold Big Season 'Stat' Lead

A tabulation of season football statistics this week revealed what fans and those close to the situation had known all along -- the team made quite an accomplishment with its season record.

Coach Don Light, in his fourth year as FHS coach, certainly got the "most mileage" possible out of the team as it compiled a 4-5-1 record. The wonder of it all was that the team almost won two other games.

Fans knew before the season started that this was a "building" year, and the season statistics bear this out. The Chieftains rushed for an average of 120 yards per game, as opponents averaged 206.6 yards. The team gained only 26 yards per game passing, to 42 for opponents. This adds up to an average output of 146 yards for Friona to 249 for opponents.

Opponents had an edge in practically every category.

They led in total first downs, 143-86.

In two games, the Chiefs had less than 100 yards total offense (Memphis and Hale Center), yet the team tied Memphis, claiming a penetration win for district purposes, and were barely edged by Hale Center.

The team had its best output against Farwell and Bovina, two county rivals. The Chiefs made 194 yards against Farwell, and 190 against Bovina.

Memphis' total yardage of 333 were the most made by any team against the Chiefs. Floyd-ada's 109 yards passing were the most gained through the air against the Chiefs. Least total yards were Olton's 176. The Mustangs were also held to no passing yardage.

Bovina and Lockney were the only teams which Friona out-gained during the season. Lockney was the only team which Friona beat on first downs.

With all this information, then, the 4-5-1 record (or 5-5, if you count the Memphis win in the season column as well as district) wasn't bad at all.

### How To Select Your Next Door

Your lumberyard has a vast assortment of doors on hand from French Provincial and English Tudor to American Colonial and Class Dutch.

If you've been nominated to choose the new family front door this month, here are some pointers to consider:

- make sure the wood has been pre-treated for protection against termites, moisture and rot.
- check the grain for uniformity and knots
- inspect it to be sure it is weather-stripped. No matter how well it fits the frame, there are always hairline cracks for easy opening.
- insist on three sets of hinges, instead of two and at least two coats of paint, or for a lacquer like finish, three coats.
- measure to make sure it's at least 1 3/4-inch thick.

District. She served the Eighteenth District on various committees, one of the more important being Girls State chairman and parliamentarian. The most important, of course, was to serve the District as President.

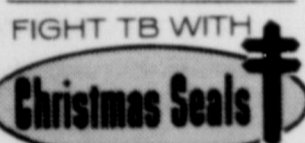

Blend ingredients in order given, in large mixing bowl. Spoon into 9 inch tube pan or 2 loaf pans (8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/4). Bake tube cake at 350 degrees for 1 1/2-2 hours. Bake loaves at 325 degrees, 1-1 1/4 hours, or until fingertip touch leaves no imprint. (A pan of water set on bottom shelf of oven helps keep cakes moist.) Frost with egg-nog frosting made by gradually stirring 1 pound of powdered sugar into 1/2 cup soft butter, adding 5 Tbsp. egg-nog a little at a time, until right consistency to spread. Decorate with red and green glaze cherries or tri-color pineapple slices.

## McDermitt Urges Safe Driving Habits

Ken McDermitt, Friona Chief of Police, this week asked the citizens of Friona to make a concerted effort to make Friona a safer place in which to drive.

"The city is currently experiencing an upswing in traffic accidents," McDermitt points out. "The police department has investigated six accidents since Nov. 1, with a total of three injuries," he continues.

Since the first of the year, there have been 44 accidents

inside the city limits, with property damage of \$13,000, 14 injuries including one pedestrian injury, McDermitt's figures show.

"We of the police department ask for the cooperation of all citizens of Friona in helping to cut these accidents. All persons who operate a motor vehicle on public streets have the responsibility of knowing traffic laws and making an effort to obey the laws," McDermitt concluded.
