AFTER EIGHT months of study, you'd think the commission set up to study rioting and its costs would come up with some better idea than to just give all the poor Negroes in the cities the moon with a red ribbon around it.

Without doubt there is a growing rift between the black and white societies in the big cities--fortunately this is not the case in this area, anyway. But to say that the answer to the problem is to increase welfare, build nicer homes for unappreciative people and force a person to live next door to someone simply because of his color raises some strong doubts in my mind.

The Negroes who live in the big city ghettos, and any other underprivileged persons of any color, should be given opportunity to help themselves. But handouts without accompanying responsibility on the part of the recipients to conduct themselves as good citizens will only create new problems.

THERE'S THIS FELLOW who says monkeys can be trained to take over jobs in industry, on the assembly line, and to harvest crops. He even claims they can be taught to do these jobs for money, which they can learn is spendable for goodies they like to eat.

The fellow is Don Smith, an animal psychologist, and graduate of the University of Texas. He and his wife already have trained pigeons to inspect pills in a pharmaceutical laboratory. They learn to tell the difference between good and bad pills, observe them through a glass, and peck twice on the glass when they see a bad one.

They have trained cockatoos to lift the phone at home and say "hello" and trained a pig to turn on the TV set (even the pig probably turns it off when Jonathan Winters comes on). And they trained a chicken to play the piano.

But monkeys, he says, can be taught to do many things better than man, and this I don't doubt at all.

The trouble is, those trained monkeys probably would soon start forming political alliances, levying taxes and going to war, then they'd be back down on the level with human beings again.

Funeral Services for John Everett Knox, 71, who was beaten and robbed here Sunday night, were held Tuesday, March 5, 2:30 p. m. at the First Baptist Church.

Knox died in an ambulance enroute to the hospital. An autopsy was performed Monday in Lubbock.

Rev. O. L. Turner officiated for the funeral services. Burial in Sudan Cemetery with Payne Funeral Home of Amherst in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include four sons, R. B. of Sudan, Bunk of Gainesville, Glenn of Tyler, Billy John of Decatur; two daughters, Mrs.

Elizabeth Williams of Gainesville, and Mrs. Martha Cross of Decatur; two sisters, Mrs. Minnie Hendrix and Mrs. Julia Tidwell both of Seymour; and several grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Glyn Williams, Eddie Ford, Pat Brown, Charles Rich, Harvey Grigsby, and Billy Hanna.

Knox, who was a longtime resident of Sudan and lived alone in his home on Railroad Ave., was fatally beaten and robbed by an assailant or assailants between nine and 10 p. m. Sunday. He was thought to have several hundred dollars in the house, according to investigating officer Deputy Sheriff Homer McLaury.

McLaury was called when neighbors heard the victims cry for help, and finding Knox on the ground near the south side of the railroad clad only in night clothes, he summoned an ambulance. Tracks showed that Knox had stumbled and crawled from his house to where he was found by the deputy sheriff. Apparently he was trying to reach his son, R. B. Knox, who owns the Sudan Texaco Station.

McLaury stated that Knox told him two men (Anglos) came to his home, one short and one tall, and all clues are being checked out as the search continues for the attackers.

The description of a car seen at the Knox home Sunday was broadcast by the Lamb County Sheriff's office. However, at press time no arrests had been made.

He is seeking to fill the unexpired term--the final two years--of the late O. J. Mangum.

The present county judge has experience in business and farming, having operated an implementing dealership in Olton along with other business interests.

He and his wife, Euna, have a 16-year-old son, Danny, a junior at Olton High School, and two married daughters, Mrs. Bill Walden of Hereford and Mrs. Danny Smith of Earth.

A native of Van Zandt county, Sides grew up in Lubbock County and attended Texas Tech, where he was graduated in 1938 with a B. S. degree in agricultural education.

His first job was as agriculture teacher at Olton High School. Six years later, in 1944, he entered the implement business, operating the Olton John Deere dealership until 1950.

Since that time, he has farmed in addition to maintaining other business interests.

Sides has been active many years in Olton civic affairs, having served 12 years as a school

board member, past president of the Lions Club, a former member of the city council, and as a director in the Olton Chamber of Commerce.

He is a member of the Chamber board at Olton at present, and serves as chairman of the official board of the First Methodist Church there.

He also is associate conference leader in the Methodist Church.

A Mason, he is past master of the Olton Lodge and a past district deputy grandmaster.

In 1961, Sides was honored as Olton's "Citizen of the Year."
