



In an age when bigness seems to have become a necessity in government and industry -- in fact in virtually an activity you can name -- it is gratifying to find one place where size is not necessary to success and no real relationship to quality of service nor the importance of the enterprise.

That is the hometown community newspaper.

A national director of weekly newspapers reports that there are more than 8,000 "hometown" newspapers in the country. These newspapers reach approximately 32 million homes. While metropolitan papers have been beset by circulation troubles, strikes and shutdowns, the smaller papers have been flourishing and enjoying steady circulation increases.

The thousands of smaller papers are a bulwark of independent thought. Without them, there would be little freedom of the press. There would be no record of community life, no reporting of important community events, no expression of editorial views or opinions that gradually crystallize into public sentiment on issues of the day.

In fact, without the thousands of editors to give it meaning, the institution of a free press would wither and die with it the freedom of the people. The local newspaper is a small enterprise that does a big job.

There are times when putting out a newspaper is a frustrating and exhausting job but there is always someone else having a worse time.

Take the case of the newsman who moved to a frontier town in Colorado, unpacked his hand-set type and started his first issue. This is the way it came out?

"We begin the publication of the Roccay Mountain Cyclone with some phew diphiculties in the way. The type phounder phrom whom we bought our outphit phor this paper phaled to supply us with any ephs or cays, and it will be phour or phive weeks bephore we can get any."

"The mistake was not phound out till a day or 2 ago. We have ordered the missing letters and will have to get along without them until they came. We don't like the looks of this variety of spelling any better than our readers, but mixtax will happen, in the best regulated phamilies, and iph the ph's and the c's and the x's and the q's hold out, we shall ceep (sound the chard) the Cyclone whirling apther a phasion til the shorts arrive. "It's no joke to us -- 'it's a serious aphtar."

Co. Agent Leaving

Joe VanZandt, Farmer County Agricultural Agent for the past two years, will become Moore County Agent on August 11, he disclosed this week in a personal interview at the Friona Star.

VanZandt, who came to Farmer County in May of 1964, had been county agent at Live Oak County prior to coming here. He was previously assistant county agent at Travis County for two years.

A 1959 graduate of Texas A&M, VanZandt had a major in animal husbandry. He is a native of Wheeler County, Farmer County Commissioners are seeking applications for the position to be vacated by VanZandt, and hope to be able to make an announcement on his successor in the near future.

"We certainly hate to leave Farmer County, but the opportunity for advancement will be such that I could not afford to pass it up," VanZandt said. At his new office in Dumas, VanZandt will have an assistant county agent.

Although there is quite a bit of ranch land in Moore County, VanZandt indicated that the area is just "getting into" irrigation.

While in Farmer County, VanZandt has been primarily interested in getting 4-H Clubs organized in each community in the county, and having projects and activities for each club. He has also worked with crop demonstrations in off-station research trials, with fertilizers and weed controls.

He was instrumental in getting the 4-H Club horse program started in the county, and has attempted to keep farmers informed on developments of agricultural chemicals, chiefly through a weekly news column and other news releases, carried by each newspaper in the county.

COUNCIL MEETING

Motorcycle Laws Are Hashed Over

A discussion of laws governing the operation of motorcycles highlighted the regular meeting of the Friona City Council Monday night.

A group of Friona citizens opposed to the recent enforcement of the law forbidding drivers under 14 years of age to operate the cycles appeared before the council, and voiced their opinion.

Council members went on record as being sympathetic to the cases in point, but recommended that Friona policemen continue to enforce laws using discretion and "good judgement" at all times.

In other business, the council was told that arrangements were being worked out to move the Dempster trash boxes from Canyon to Friona, at an estimated cost of \$175.

An equalization board was appointed for Duty August 9. On the board are O.F. Lange, Mack Balum and O.J. Beene. C.L. Lillard is alternate.

Requests for new street lights at 14th and Washington, Fourth and Prospect, 10th and Austin

and 10th and Baylor were approved.

Allan Waldrop of General Telephone appeared in the interest of possible Extended Area Service between Friona and other parts of the country. Waldrop is to ask for a survey which will give the council an estimate of how much EAS will cost between Friona and other points.

In his monthly report of the city activities, City Manager A. L. (Jake) Outland stated: Ten transfers of city property were reported by the county clerk's office during the month. Only five building permits were issued during the month; three for additions/alterations of garage or carports, estimated at \$3,150 and two siting of trailer houses, estimates \$200, for a monthly total of \$3,350.

Water department records showed 18,321,700 gallons pumped during the month. This was an average of 591,023 gallons per day, down considerably from the previous month's figure, mainly because of 4.22

inches of rainfall falling over ten different days during the month.

One new water tap was connected, bringing the total number of active meters to 1043.

Three new sewer taps were made, to bring that total to 973 as of the end of June.

Four fire calls were made, all to locations outside the city limits. Estimated loss was \$3,050, mostly to wheat and farm machinery.

Drills were held June 2 and 16. A fried chicken and ice cream picnic was held June 30 for the firemen, their wives and children.

Forty - four arrests were made during the month; 14 for traffic violations, 21 court notices, and nine for criminal court.

Street department records revealed that the new Gallion motor grader arrived and was put into service June 13.

Four thousand pounds of BHC dust was purchased June 11 and mosquito dustings were made June 15 and 29.



Early Settler Passes Away

Mrs. Ada Fannie Parker, 92, who moved to Farmer County from Central Texas more than half a century ago, died at South Plains Hospital, Muleshoe, Saturday, July 9. She was the widow of the late T.E. Parker, who died March 7, 1922.

Funeral services for Mrs. Parker, who was born October 20, 1873 in Rockwall County, Texas, were conducted from Friona Methodist Church at 2:00 p.m. Monday, July 11. Officiating clergymen were Rev. Jimmy Tidwell, Brownfield, former pastor of the church, and Rev. James Price, pastor.

Survivors include one son, Lee, Friona; two sisters, Mrs. B.B. Lanham and Mrs. Ben Beane, Rockwall, one brother, Homer Willess, Rockwall, seven grandchildren, Mrs. T.E. Woods, San Rafael, California; Johnnie Parker and Mrs. Joe Carlisle, Lubbock; Billy Parker, Amarillo; Mrs. Delvin Langford, Goldthwaite, Texas, and Jerry and Danny Parker, Friona.

Eight great - grandchildren also survive.

One son, Willis, preceded his mother in death. He was killed in a construction accident here in March of 1951. One grandson, Arthur T. Parker, was killed while in service during World War II in 1943.

Early-Day Area Resident In Friona For Visit

An early - day resident of Farmer County looked back over his experience in the area during a visit to Friona this week.

P.W. Berg, 80, who farmed 14 miles southeast of Friona from 1920 to 1936, was amazed at the growth of Friona, and at the progress of the farming industry since he left the area.

Berg broke out 260 acres of his own, and 400 in all of Syndicate land southeast of Friona. After raising wheat, corn, red top cane, maize and kafir corn, Berg had a small dairy, and also raised pigs.

He rode through the dark depression days, and the "Dust Bowl" days with his wife Katherine, and nine children. "We had several good years, though, before and after the depression," Berg attests.

Leaving Farmer County, the Bergs went first to South Texas, then to California, where Berg still lives (Reedley).

All of the Berg children started to school in Friona except the youngest, Le Roy. There are four boys. Their names and addresses are John, Redwood City, Calif.; Fred, Reedley, Calif.; Harold, Redding, Calif.; and Le Roy, Frazier Park, Calif.

There are five girls: Mrs. Wesley (Marie) Haws, Missoula, Mont.; Mrs. Gordon (Leona) Courtney, Reedley, Calif.; Mrs. Oscar (Ruby) Capers, Houston; Mrs. Charles (Evelyn) Page, Redding, Calif.; and Mrs. (Lena) Dewey Jones, Everett, Wash.

Mrs. Berg, who was in bad health for many years, passed away the past March 10.

When the Bergs were farming near Friona, there was little talk of irrigation as yet. "There were a few wells just south of Black, but the feeling was that it would be too expensive to develop for farming," Berg remembers.

Some of the businesses in Friona included Blackwell Harding, Rushing (E.V., Sr.) Variety, and Fallwell Bros. Gas & Oil.

The Bergs' neighbors on the farm included Gene Smith, Harold McAllister, and Winters & Son.

Berg, along with his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Haws, and other relatives, have been visiting in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Wilson in Friona.

Bank Deposits Set Record For Quarter

Deposits at Friona State Bank at June 30 set an all time record for the second quarter statement, a check of records revealed this week.

The deposits on June 30 of this year totalled \$6,112,851.67. This was a 4.4 per cent increase over the total deposits on June 30 of 1965, which was \$5,854,137.92. The former record total for a June 30 statement came in 1964, when the second quarter report showed \$6,107,440 on deposit at the local bank.

It marked the third consecutive quarterly report for Friona State Bank which turned out to be the best report ever for the quarter covered by the report.

Quarterly report for the first quarter of 1966 set a new all-time deposit record for the bank, when there was \$7,403,903.19 on deposit April 5. Total assets stood over the \$8 million mark for the first time on a quarterly statement.

Total assets stood at \$6,734,739.40 on June 30. This

also was an all-time high for the June 30 statement, beating the figure for the same date in 1965, which was \$6,417,828.11.

Other figures on the quarterly statement also showed increases from the second quarter statement of 1965. Loans were up, from \$4,590,979.17 to \$4,694,221.51.

Comparisons of other figures on the statement, with current totals listed first in those of June, 1965 in parenthesis, are as follows:

Municipal Bonds and warrants, \$132,633.26 (\$56,936.79) U.S. Government Bonds \$569,220.63 (\$613,192.97); CCC Certificates of Interest \$212,218.81 (\$16,204.06); Cash and Exchange \$1,050,191.43 (\$1,072,191.12).

In the liabilities column, the figures were capital stock, \$200,000 (\$200,000); Certified surplus \$250,000 (\$250,000); undivided profits \$121,887.73 (\$11,690.19); reserves \$50,000 (\$50,000) and deposits \$6,112,851.67 (\$5,854,137.92).

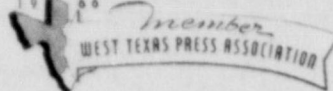

vice-president; and Mrs. Tommie Jones, secretary-treasurer.

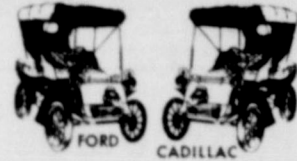
The meeting at which 56 persons were present, began with a barbeque supper.

The youth choir of the First Baptist Church will present a concert Sunday, July 10 at the church, beginning at 7 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

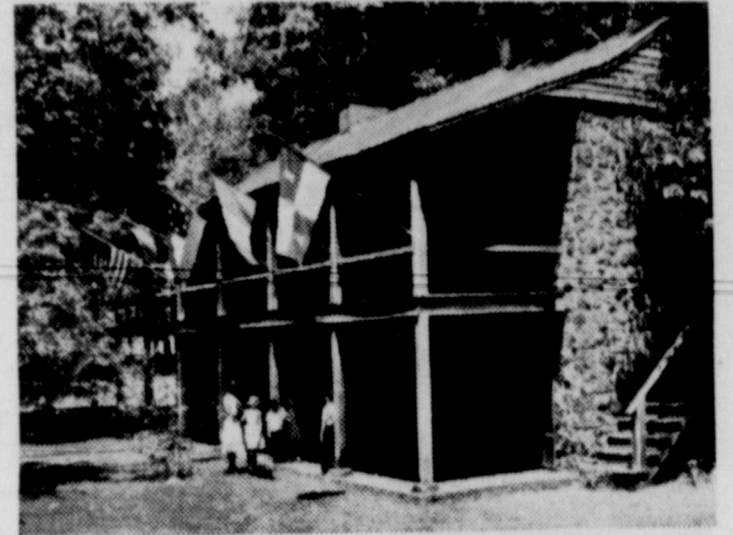
The choir, under the direction of David Campbell, will leave soon on a tour which will take them as far as Galveston.

On The Farm In Parmer County

By JOE VANZANDT

As we travel over the county, we see many farmers who have really gotten with the job of killing their Johnsongrass. The work isn't over, merely getting started I would say is a better term.

Most treated areas look like a fairly good first kill has been obtained. However, a few did not get a good first kill. May be due to temperature below 85 degrees when applied, did not add surfactant, or did not wet the leaves enough. Don't give up - we expect 2,3 or more applications to be necessary to kill established Johnson grass. However, some farmers report a high kill with only one spraying of a methyarsenate.

Methyarsenate is the herbicide that most are using as it is reasonable in price and will give a good grass kill.

Farmers will need to maintain a close watch on Johnson grass seedlings for years to come. This is where persistent effort is required to control Johnson grass seedlings each year before they can make seed.

GET BAGWORMS EARLY

Bagworms damage to evergreens such as abovita, cedar and evergreen species is being reported.

Evergreens should be watched carefully at this time of year, especially if old worm bags are found on the twigs. Wingless females crawl out and die after laying eggs inside the bag. In this case, each bag may contain hundreds of eggs which hatch into tiny larvae.

The newly-born larvae immediately start to make bags by chewing off small pieces of the tree. Young worms carry the bags wherever they go. The larvae can be killed with insecticides applied when the bagworms are still small. Chemical controls are ineffective when worms are full grown.

Chemicals suggested as controls include sprays or dusts of Toxaphene, Sevin or Malathion. Directions on the container should be followed carefully.

If control measures are initiated too late, hand pick and

burn the bags, because the worm goes through the winter in the egg stage within the bag.

GRASSHOPPERS

During the past two weeks, we have received calls from about 10 farmers who have reported some local grasshoppers infestations. Most of them have been confined, to small areas in either cotton or sorghum fields. The grasshoppers have migrated to these green fields from grass cover nearby, which is where they hatched out after our rains 5 weeks ago.

In a growing crop we recommend using either Malathion at 1 quart per acre or Toxaphene at 1 to 1 1/2 quarts per acre.

Two additional insecticides are also recommended for control on grassland and these are Sevin at 2/3 to 1 3/4 lbs per acre and Heptachlor at 1/2 to 3/4 pint per acre.

Most of these have some grazing restrictions especially for dairy animals so be sure and follow directions on label.

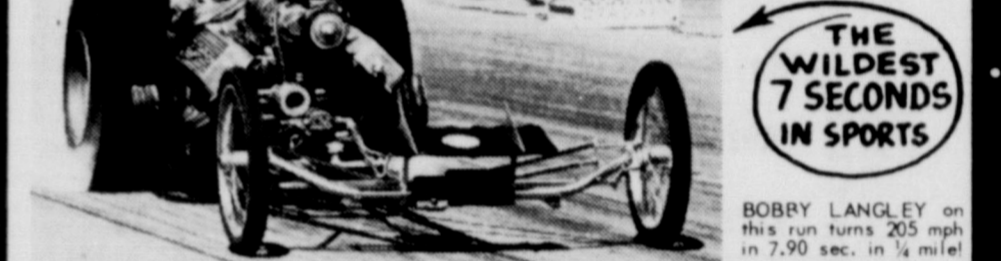

Tentative Work Plans Are Complete For Draw Project

Tentative work plans are complete for both the upper and lower watershed protection projects on Running Water Draw. The Draw extends from north of Clovis, New Mexico southeastward through Plainview.

The drainage area has been divided into two subwatersheds to facilitate planning and administration but have been developed simultaneously since they are component parts of the larger watershed. Plans call for three dams to be located in Parmer County.

The preparation of the tentative work plan was done by the Soil Conservation Service at the request of local sponsors. Money to pay for the cost of preparing these work plans was made available through a trust fund set up by the County Commissioners Courts and City Councils in the Counties affected by the Watershed Project. In excess of \$70,000.00 was put into the trust fund by these sub-divisions of local government.

Estimated total construction costs, including fair market values of land to be covered by water or structures is \$2,500,000.00. It is estimated that total Public Law 566 expenditures will be in the neighborhood of \$1,600,000.00. The entire project is being carried out under the authority of the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act (Public Law 566, 83rd Congress) as amended.

The primary purpose of the project is flood prevention. Major floods on this draw cause severe damages to crops, fences, farm improvements, county and state roads and bridges, and low water crossings in the agricultural area of the watershed. Severe damage is also done to industrial, commercial, and public properties in the City of Plainview. It is estimated that more than \$1,000,000.00 in non-agricultural damage would occur in the City of Plainview if a flood such as that of 1941 were to recur. The 1941 flood was one that is expected only once in every 38 years.

The entire project consists of 8 floodwater retaining structures and 5.3 miles of channel improvement. All channel im-

provements will be done in and adjacent to the City of Plainview. The floodwater structures will be located on private lands at intervals along the draw.

In addition to reducing damages to agricultural and non-agricultural areas, there will be secondary benefits of ground water recharge at an estimated rate of 6,000 acre feet per year. The dollar value placed on an acre foot of water is \$16. per acre foot. The ratio of average annual project benefits to the average annual project cost is above two to one (2:1). Water based recreation, one of the hoped-for primary benefits, has been ruled out as unfeasible due to the high permeability of the soils in the floodplain of the draw. Only one small recreation area is planned and that is the Clovis Site, just north of

Clovis, New Mexico. It is anticipated that some forms of private recreation enterprises will be established at one or more of the structures.

The next phase in the project is securing adequate land treatment on private land that contributes to the drainage area of the Watershed. This phase is being spearheaded by local Soil Conservation Districts with technical assistance from the Soil Conservation District. Adequate treatment of land in the watershed must be secured before any construction is started. Treatment is considered adequate when 75% of the active erosion from wind and water is controlled. This is necessary to prevent sedimentation of the flood prevention structures and thereby prolonging the effective life of the project.

Pantries Not Out Of Style, Economist Says

Grandmother had quite a pantry, probably backed up with a cellar, a smoke house, and ice house and some meat on the hoof. It was rare occasion indeed when she did not have several weeks' supply of food on hand.

Often we think that a pantry is not needed today. After all, you can go out almost any time and pick up what you need. So why bother about maintaining a pantry or sizeable reserve of food supplies?

This is not quite so, claims Cricket B. Taylor, County Home Demonstration Agent of Parmer County, with the Texas A&M Extension Services. According to her, each person should keep enough food on hand for at least 14 days. This recommendation is not based solely upon possibilities of war emergencies, either. Natural disasters, such as floods, power failure, hurricanes and the like also make this 14-day pantry a desirable possession. It is not unusual to find persons shut off from sources of food and pure water for several days during em-

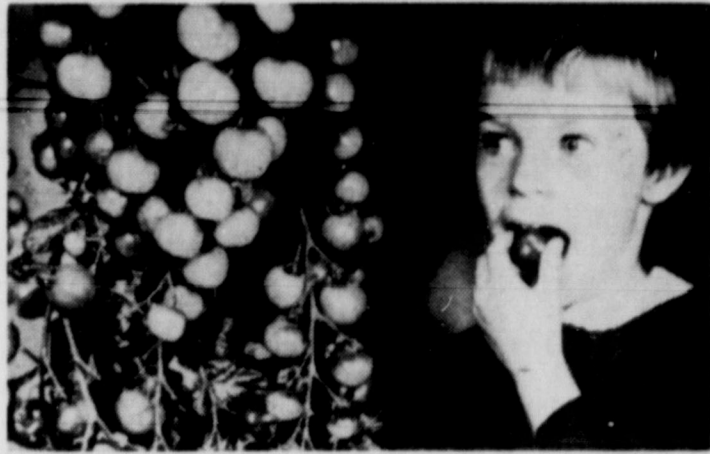
ergencies of this sort.

Still another excellent reason for keeping such a pantry is an economic one. Although the original investment could run into several dollars, a food stockpile could become quite a budget stretcher. For example, a carefully planned and well stocked 14-day pantry can practically eliminate those extra fill-in trips to the grocery store. Over a period of time, considerable savings may result -- food budget savings, savings in time spent on trips, savings in money spent on transportation, and savings in money spent for "extras".

Many families already have close to 14-days' supply of food on hand or more at all times, whether they realize it or not.

Make a start with foods already on hand, then build up a 14-day pantry over a period of weeks, or months if you need to do it that way. Such a reserve food supply could then be emergency insurance as well as a family budget boom.
