As one studies the life of Judas, three things stand out about this man. The first significant fact about the life of Judas is the fact that he was one of the<sup>b</sup>twelve disciples. One of those chosen to be among Jesus' closest followers. Jesus spent more time teaching and training these men than He spent with any other individual or group during His entire ministry. They were carefully selected by the Master, which gives us reason to believe that Judas must have had many outstanding qualities that Jesus felt could be beneficial to the spreading of His kingdom. on earth.

Also, we learn in the Scriptures that it was Judas who held the office or position of treasurer of the disciples. He was chosen to keep whatever. money they had and to take care of their financial needs. He was a man that knew the value of a dollar and could handle money.

Finally, and most importantly, we know the name of Judas to stand synonomous with the word "betrayer." It was this disciple who chose to sell his Lord. And, so our knowledge of this man consists of these facts: He was chosen as a disciple; He was the treasurer of the group; and he betrayed

The big question mark that presents itself in the life of Judas is placed after the word, 'why' Why? Why did Judas sell out? Why did he choose to betray the person he had left all to follow? Why did he send the one who loved him most to a very certain cross? There have been many theories and much speculation in an attempt to answer this piercing question. There are three basic possible reasons why Judas betrayed Jesus. The first of these

possible reasons is greed. Mat-thew tells us that Judas actuwent to the authorities and asked what they were pre-pared to pay. He made a bar-gain, but only for thirty pieces of silver, which was worth less than twenty-three dollars. If it were for money alone, then this is the most terrible example in history of the depths which the love of money can reach

Judas may have hated Christ. Judas may have been those who wished to among drive the Romans out of Palestine and felt that Jesus could lead the great plan. He may have become disappointed in The Lord when he learned that this was not his plan at all. Disappointment may have turned to hatred and hatred to

the act of betrayal. It may have been that Judas did not plan for Jesus to die.

Judas may have felt that Jesus, as a divine leader, the King of the Jews, was moving too slowly and this betrayal would compel Him to act. The best in modern Christian scholarship holds with this view. This would explain why Judas, seeing his plan fail, became

money and finally took his own life in the act of suicide. As one gains an insight into the personality of Judas, he cannot help but see the tragedy of a man who thought he knew better than God, Judas could have received the crown of life. He could have had the privilege to die for the cause of Christ, and yet he chose evil instead of the way and will of God. We condemn Judas. We con-

repentant, sought to return the

demn him for his ambition, his greed and jealousy. Are we so different? These things made Judas betray Jesus and these are the things which still make men betray the Master today.




