

Seagraves had 276 total yards gain while Sudan gained 220. Sudan led in the number of first downs achieved with 11 compared to 10 for Seagraves.

Quarterback Bo Lance connected on four passes for some 45 yards. May captured the the longest one for 23 yards. May was also the leading ground gainer with 83 yards.

Coach Bill Adams said, in commenting on the game, "It was just that we made more mistakes than Seagraves did. " He added that whoever makes the fewer mistakes in tomorrow's game with Springlake-Earth will be the winner. He said that Springlake is big and tough and will be able to captalize on our mistakes, as we intend to do on






