Another man was in the office ~ the other day and he has become so adept at trout fishing that he enters contests, And when you're in the coffee house and somebody starts talking about fishing, everyone else immediately wants to tell you about the great places they know about where the fishing is so great that you can almost walk along the bank and the fish jump out into your hand, dressed; rolled in corn meal and smeared

with tartare sauce. Fishing must be a great sport for those who catch fish, thoughor maybe these guys just like to get away for a few days. I used to think there were more boats in Sudan and Ambers, a heck of a long way from any sizeable body of water, than there were in some of the coastal communities. Some of these people drag. a boat 600 miles to go fishing, so obviously they like it.

Some of you have heard this before, but I'll say it agains I've been fishing at some of the best fishing spots, with some people who are recognized as good fishermen, and never have I caught a fish big enough to bring home. Pulled in one once at Texoma about 3 inches long one time; it probably was somebody's bait, But otherwise, nothing, from about four fishing expeditions at Texoma, one in Galveston Bay, two at Possum Kingdom, once at whatever lake that is a Daingerfield, and once

at Lake of the Pines. Statements such as the one above invariably start my fisherman friends to saying things like "If you'll just go fishing with ME, I'll guarantee you will catch some fish," I've tried that too. They just don't understand. At least three people have told me this and I tool them up on it. I didn't catch They didn't catch any. They couldn't understand why not. One guy sheared the pir off his motor.

I could go into a lot more detail, but it's too sordid. Let it suffice to say that I'd just as soon you guys didn't mention these fantastic fishing trips to me. I love to get outside, but I suppose I have enough hobbies
