PATTON NAMED LAMB CO. EASTER SEAL CHAIRMAN

Doyle L. Patton Jr. will head the 1973 Easter Seal Appeal in Lamb County, it was announced by Rodney D. Hargrave, Dallas, President of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

Residents of Lamb County will receive the annual Easter Seal Appeal letters in the mail beginning March 1. The Easter Seal Appeal, conducted yearly to provide disabled persons and their families treatment and services, will continue through Easter Sunday, April 22.

Patton is one of 223 men and women throughout Texas who are serving in this capacity. The cost of the statewide Easter Seal program is over one million dollars, financed mainly by the Easter Seal Appeal. Almost 90 percent of all funds raised by the Easter Seal Appeal remain in Texas to support the growing needs of the disabled in the State.

Special emphasis is being given in the 1973 Easter Seal Appeal to the disabled citizen in Lamb County who may need assistance and not know where to obtain it. Any disabled person can contact Patton at Security State Bank, Littlefield, who will provide the request form for a determination of the extent and type of assistance needed and the most efficient means of obtaining that assistance. Arrangements for qualified treatment or service will be made by the Easter Seal Society.

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EX-ADDICTS SPEAK TO ROTARY JAN. 31

Guests at the Rotary Club meeting Wednesday, Jan. 31 were four former drug abusers, Roy Gewant, Les Hart, Arlene Heede and Don Thornton. The group will return to Sudan Friday for a visit at Sudan Livestock, a member of National Livestock Feeders' Association, among those contributing beef to Synanon each year.

If any group or organization is interested in having the former drug abusers speak to them, they may be reached at the Holiday Inn West in Amarillo.

Four former drug abusers are in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico from Jan. 8 to Feb. 20 contacting cattlemen to procure the beef necessary to feed young men and women who live in Synanon, the drug rehabilitation center which has grown in fourteen years from a small group of addicts to a unified community with centers in five California cities and in Michigan.

Roy Gewant used heroin and other drugs for 15 years, served time in many state and federal institutions, and was considered incurable when he arrived at Synanon's door five years ago. Roy is an example of what can happen at Synanon for those declared "incurable" -- he has remained free of drugs for five

years now, and is a role model for newer residents of Synanon. Roy, 36, is now married and he and his wife live in Synanon's ranch community near Tomales Bay in Northern California.

Les Hart is from Gruver, Texas, where his father, Don Hart, operates feedlots. In 1971, two Synanon representatives were in the Gruver area, contacting local cattle feeders. They met Don Hart and told him about Synanon's program for drug rehabilitation and reeducation. Don asked them to talk to his son, Les, who was using pills and psychedelics and had found other "cure" tries totally unsuccessful. The Synanon representatives talked to Les, and four days later he came to Synanon where he has been successfully rebuilding his life for almost two years.

Arlene Heede, 25, began smoking marijuana in college, then went on to pills and finally heroin. Three years ago she came to Synanon, after spending time in hospitals and jails trying to end her addiction. Now she's one of the team members for Synanon's Supply Department, the department with the responsibility of seeing that Synanon obtains the food and other needs to keep it operating.

Don Thornton is 38. He started using pot and pills when he was in his teens, and after he got out of the Army began with heroin. For the next eight years he was in and out of jails and hospitals because of his heroin addiction. Then he came to Synanon in 1965 and he's been completely free of drugs ever since, able now to offer a helping hand to others still caught up in the drug scene.

Roy, Les, Arlene and Don personify the clean-cut, personable, healthy young men and women produced by Synanon, where the emphasis is on hard, rewarding work, wholesome socializing, self-reliance, honesty, and personal responsibility.

While in the three states, the four Synanon people will be available to local youths.

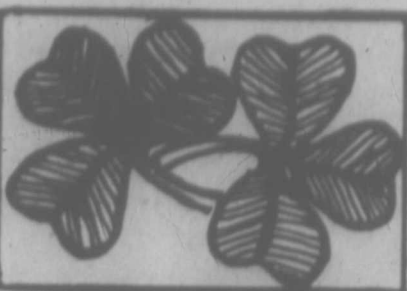

All Americans are grateful that a Peace Treaty has been signed with North Vietnam and that many of our POWs will soon be home. Unfortunately, the list given by North Vietnam after the signing of the Peace Treaty is more inclusive, but no more accurate, than any of their former "complete" lists.

No information was included on Lt. Ron Dodge nor many of the other men of whom there is proof of capture.

Our task is obviously not completed. We have pledged to all POW-MIA families that we would continue our efforts until a satisfactory international inspection is obtained and ALL POWs are returned.

We intend to intensify our efforts to encourage people of good will throughout the world to demand that North Vietnam and her allies live up to the basic laws of humanity and provide complete information on all men they have captured.

We ask all Americans to wire their congressmen to demand that not one penny is given to rebuild North Vietnam until they satisfactorily account for all POWs and MIAs.

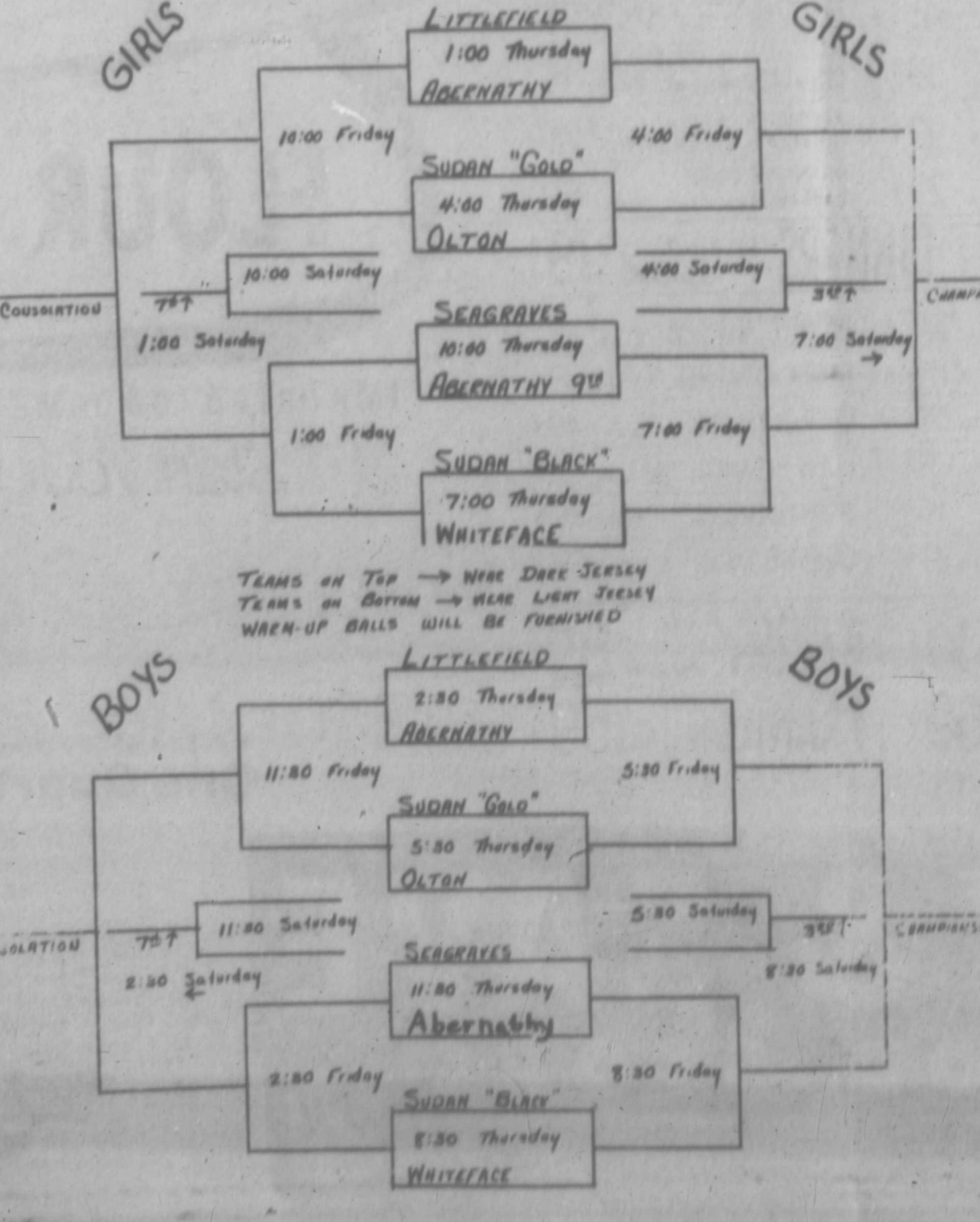
