DON'T BELIEVE that any of the stations around here are doing it yet, but some of the gasoline retailers in California and Nevada and such out-of-theway places are beginning to charge customers for road maps, and some even have started charging a dime to wash the windshield.


Personally I don't think they ought to charge for washing the windshield, but I see nothing wrong with paying a dime or 15 cents for a road map if you want one. One of my pet peeves has always been the station where they don't wash the windshield. even if you buy a full tank of gas. The good stations always do, but some places you always have to ask them to do it.

The reason that some gasoline stations are thinking about charging for maps and other services normally considered free (pay toilets, too!) is that they aren't being allowed to make a fair return on their gasoline sales. They claim they are squeezed by government restrictions on prices at the retail level, while the wholesalers can charge them about what they want to. That's why many stations, particularly out west, closed for a time in protest. And service station people right here and everywhere else are struggling to stay in

Road maps, if needed, ought to be worth a dime to a motorist. They always have been free in the past, and one station man said he'd seen people get a load of road maps and put them in the floorboard to wipe mud on, or look at one, then crumple it up and throw it away.

Of course, I've thrown away a few, but only after trying every way I knew how to fold it back like it was originally. Road maps are like store-bought shirts; once you've unfolded one, it is physically impossible to put it back like it came.

My biggest complaint about the Texas road maps are these that have half the state on one side and half on the other, and those that have chopped off the state somewhere north of Lubbock and stuck the Panhandle over in one corner. It is extremely difficult to figure out where you're going if your route takes you from one main section to another, or from the rest of Texas to the inset. The Texas Official State Highway Map is one of those lopped-off jobs. It is a crime. I'm sure that we are raising an entire generation of kids who think Texas looks like this:



If you look at the Official Texas Map, you'll find Amarillo due northwest of Carlsbad, N. M., and Shamrock looks to be about 50 miles west of Plains. It's kind of weird, unless you know better.

IF YOU'RE buying a used car and a dealer misrepresents the amount of mileage or the model of a car, he can be liable for a fine. The same thing if he rolls back the odometer. Of course, none of our local dealers would do a thing like that, but you gotta watch some of those sharpies out-of-

On the fourth play from scrimmage, Hart displayed the type of speed that has made them one of the top ranked teams in the area as Jimmy Brown "powered" the ball off left tackle and sped 79 yards to the Hornet end zone. The extra points passing attempt went awry and the 'Horns led 6-0 with 7:19 still left in

Sudan gambled early on their next possession and it paid off as on fourth down and one foot, down on their own 40 yardline. Fullback Pat Hedges, behind the blocks of Curtis Chester and Richard Tamplin, plunged for three yards and Sudan had their initial first down of the evening. On the next play, Quarterback Mitch Chester pulled off a slick screen pass to Halfback Danny Williams who outraced the Longhorns defenders to the endzone, 57 yards away. The Hornets, finding the passing game to their liking, decided to try it again on the conversion, and strike to Split End Donald Johnson who had worked his way around the Longhorn secondary. Sudan led at this point 8-6 and they had more tricks still in the

With the first quarter drawing to a close, the Longhorns attempted to pass but Cornerback Mark Hanna was in the right place at the right time and he intercepted on the Hart 41. Following a fine block from

Craig Harper, Hanna zipped down the sideline for 47 yards to the Longhorn 12 on the return. From there, Williams drove to the seven on first down, and Hedges to the two on third down. Quarterback Mitch Chester took over from there as he dove into the end zone for the score on a keeper play behind the blocking of Tommy Seymore and Terry Graves. The run for extra points was stopped short and Sudan led at this point, 14-6 with 11:04 remaining in the second quarter.

The second quarter touchdown wrapped up Sudan's scoring for the night but Hart was just getting warmed up, as the Longhorns scored three times in the last six minutes of the stanza. Twice after the kickoff, Hart was faced with fourth down situations but managed to get a first down in both instances: one via a penalty after the Longhorns had been forced to punt. A little running room was all Jimmy Brown needed on his second touchdown as he raced 30 yards to paydirt to close the gap to 14-12 with 6:11 to play. Terry Graves intercepted the passing attempt for the extras and the Hornets held a razor-slim 14-12

The Hornets moved the ball into Longhorn territory on their next possession following a 17 yard sprint around left end by Mark Hanna but a fourth down they elected to run for the first running attempt fell short of the first down and Hart latched onto the ball once again. Two straight runs by Brown netted no yardage but on third down, James McLain hit Wingback Barry George on a deep pass up the middle and George rambled to the end zone 65 yards away. > OATMEAL PANCAKES WITH ORANGE SAUCE Makes 6 servings

Oatmeal Pancakes:

2 cups milk 1½ cups quick or old fash-ioned oats, uncooked

1 cup sifted all-purpose 21/2 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons sugar 1/4 cup wheat germ 1/3 cup vegetable oil

Orange Sauce: 1 cup sugar

2 tablespoons cornstarch 2 cups orange juice

2 tablespoons lemon juice 1/4 cup butter or margarine

2 eggs, beaten For pancakes, pour milk over oats; cover and let stand. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Stir eggs into oats-milk mixture. Add sifted dry ingredients and wheat germ. Stir in oil. Bake on moderately hot, lightly greased griddle (375°F.) or fry pan until golden brown, turning only once when tops are covered with bubbles and edges look cooked.

For orange sauce, mix sugar and cornstarch in saucepan Stir in juices. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture is thickened and clear. Boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; blend in butter. Keep warm and serve over pancakes.




